



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

## **Tetanus Deaths Unnecessary,** Says AMA Health Official

new "wonder" drugs, man's ancient enemy, tetanus, has not yet succumbed to a cure.

Even so, death from tetanus, or "lockjaw" as it is commonly called, is "almost entirely unnecessary," says Raymond L. White, M.D., Director of Environmental Medicine for the American Medical Association. "As a disease, tetanus is completely preventable," Dr. White

noted. "The only reason it per-

sists is that people fail to get immunized, or fail to maintain their immunity. Out of sheer



There are several ways that the vitamin may be supplied to livestock. As little as 2 pounds of green leafy alfalfa hay daily per head for mature cattle and about 1 pound daily for calves, sheep or goats will protect them from Vitamin A deficiency. Due to the price and scarcity of good alfalfa hay this may not be economical. Synthetic Vitamin A may be mixed in feed rations. Many commercially mixed feeds are fortified with Vitamin A source. It is not advisable to mix the synthetic Vitamin A with mineral mixtures or high salt feed mixtures and leave exposed to sunlight, air and heat. Another way to supply livestock with Vitamin A is by injection. One injection will supply an animal with enough Vitamin A to last 50 to 60 days. Calves require one-half to 1 cc per head; yearlings 1 to 2 cc and breeding cattle 3 to 6 cc per head. Cost of the Vitamin A injection is 50c per cc.

One method of supplying Vitamin A would be more practical and economical for one livestock producer, whereas another may be best for someone else.

Hamilton County's second case of screwworms were found last week. Melvin Streger, Route Purmela, collected the larvae and they were identified October 21. Last Thursday a representative of the Texas Animal Health Commission sprayed Streger's cattle, He also made a large cross on the pasture with lime so the air, ane delivering sterile flies would know where to make the drop.

This makes two cases of screwworms in two weeks. There is even more reason now to observe livestock closely and send in any worms collected from wounds.


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


