## TO BE VOTED ON SATURDAY

### Text of Proposed Amendments Given

Briefly, here is the text of four Amendments to the State Constitution which voters will ballot on this Saturday, November 9, in a special state-wide election. Local voters may cast their ballots at city hall.

They are listed here in the order that they appear on the ballot.

**Proposition 1 on the Ballot**  
"FOR the amendment of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to repeal the provision making payment of the poll tax a requirement for voting and so as to authorize the Legislature to provide for the registration of all voters."

"AGAINST the amendment of the Constitution of the state of Texas so as to repeal the provision making payment of the poll tax a requirement for voting and so as to authorize the Legislature to provide for the registration of all voters."

This proposed amendment, if approved by the voters, would repeal the provision in Section 2 of Article VI of the Constitution which requires payment of a poll tax in order to vote. It would give the Legislature authority to provide by law for the registration of all voters by amendment of Section 4 of the same Article.

A sound and fair system of registering voters in advance of an election—how such a system can be assured and maintained—is the basic issue involved. The proposed amendment would not repeal the poll tax, it would simply do away with the requirement of a poll tax receipt in order to vote. The poll tax, when originally adopted in

## WASHINGTON—

### As It Looks From Here

"Operation Bill Lift" in which Texas, and particularly Dyess Air Force Base and Fort Hood have had a major part, is to prove our ability to exercise a military strength on short notice anywhere in the world. It places troops and equipment in Western Europe in a matter of hours, ready for combat.

At the same time in other policies and practice, we continue to heavily subsidize a Merchant Marine, under the concept that ships will be used to move this same military strength as they did in World Wars I and II. Whether the sale of wheat to the Soviet Union is right or wrong, the deal will be delayed or made impossible by a requirement that American ships be utilized in the process. It will cost approximately \$10 a ton between the cost of shipping in American ships and foreign ships, which adds 25c to 35c per bushel to the cost of wheat. It adds up to a sensational figure when you add this to the cost of the subsidy for ship construction and operation.

Steadily increasing government grants to medical facilities, education and research are causing the Nation's largest private foundations to curtail their own support for these purposes.

In debate on the Tax Reduction bill recently passed by the House of Representatives, Congressman Wilbur Mills of Arkansas, Chairman of the Ways and Means Committee, said there are two roads that Government can follow towards a larger and more prosperous economy. It is either a reduction in the tax load or increased Government spending. Mr. Mills said in his speech for the Tax Bill "A tax reduction gets us to a higher level of economic activity with a larger and larger share of that enlarged activity initiating in the private sector of the economy." When we choose the road of greater government spending to keep the bloodstream of our economy moving, we invite greater deficits, more controls and Government interference.

As an example of increased government spending, which is almost sure to come unless there is a tax reduction, is an increase of almost a half billion dollars for so-called Area Redevelopment, and another authorization in the present Accelerated Public Works Program, carrying a price tag of \$900 million. This legislation is now pending before the Congress.

The United States Supreme Court is in its second week of a new session. One of the first actions of the Court was to refuse to review an appeal of two death sentences for rape. In this decision, a dissent was filed by Justices Goldberg, Douglas and Brennan. Their dissent was based on the VIII Amendment to the Constitution, which forbids "cruel and unusual punishment" for crime. The Justices noted that what is "cruel and unusual punishment" changes with the advance of civilization. Mr. Justice Goldberg raised the question as to whether this excessive punishment violates the "evolving standards of decency that mark the progress of our maturing society."

In other words, Justice Goldberg seemingly does not believe that any case of rape, regardless of the heinousness of the crime, deserves punishment by death. Incidentally, in one of the cases before the Court in which the dissent was filed the victim was a little nine-year-old girl.

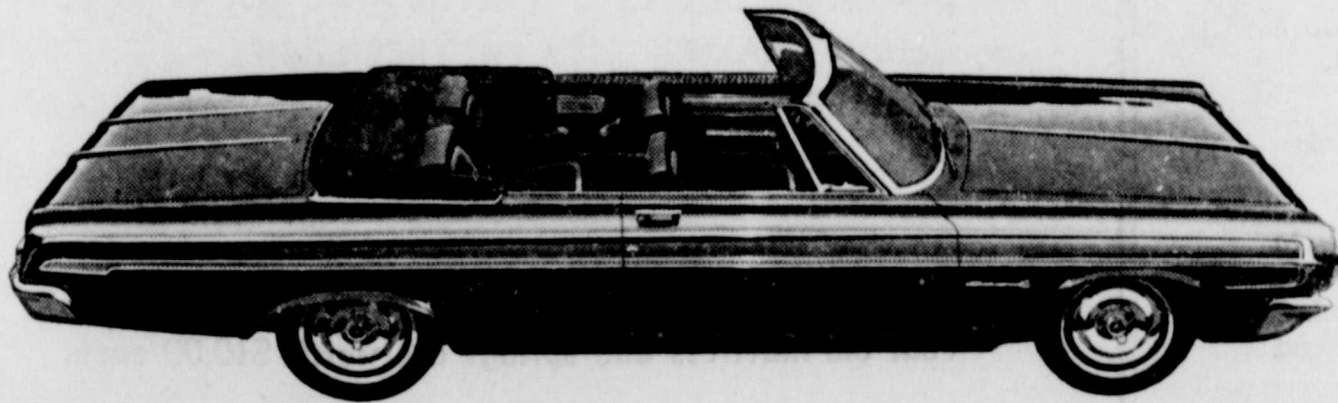

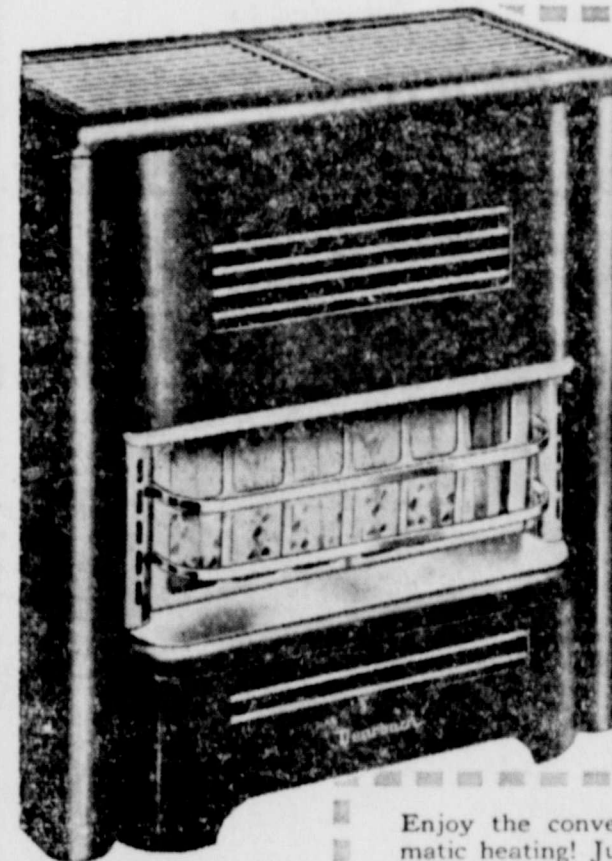

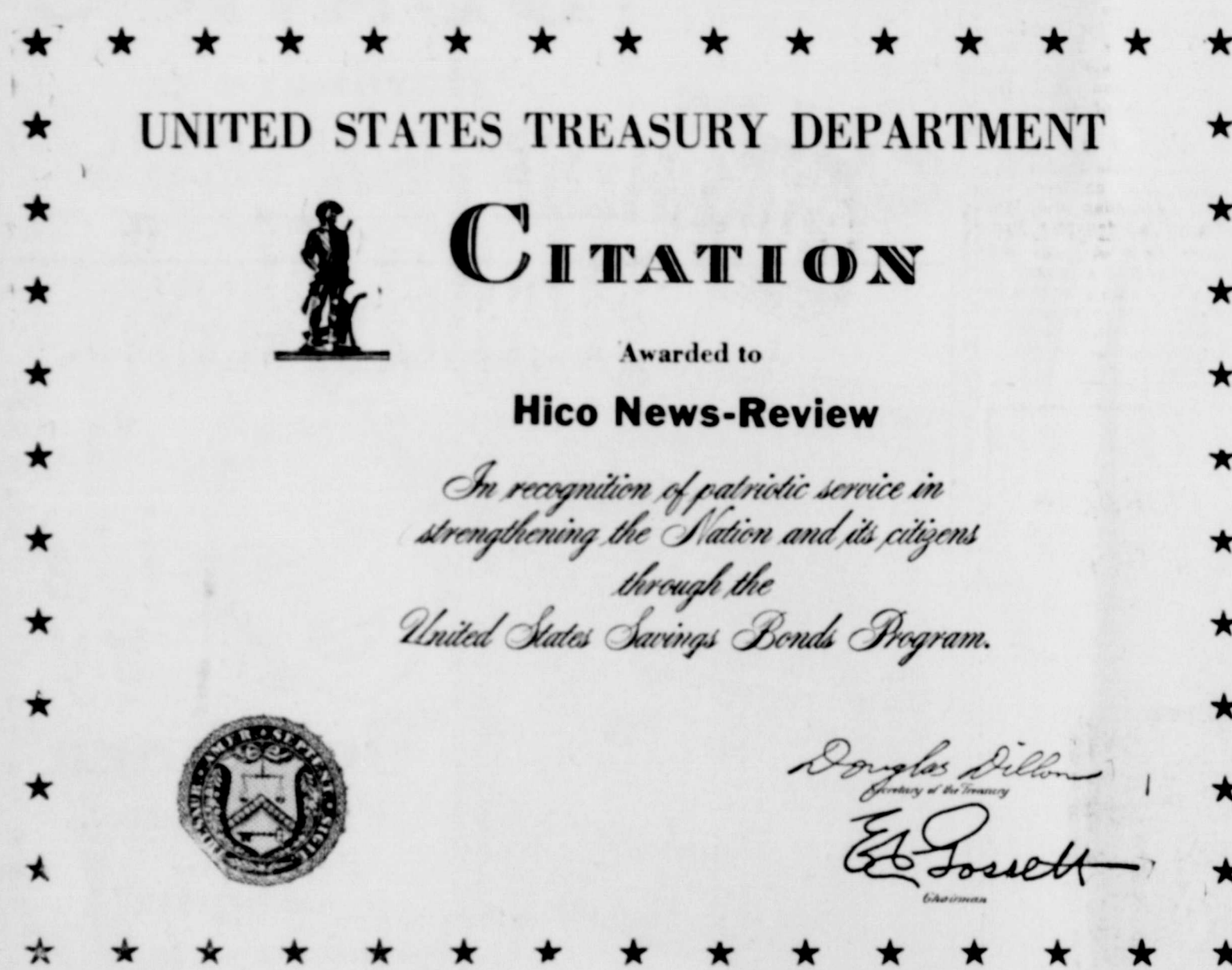

### ORDER OF ELECTION TO CONSOLIDATE DISTRICTS THE STATE OF TEXAS COUNTY OF HAMILTON

WHEREAS, on the 10th day of October A.D. 1963, a petition was presented to me for an election to be held in each of the following named school districts located in (a) Hamilton County, Texas, to-wit:

1. (b) Hamilton Independent School District No. 902, of said County, 2. (b) Fairy Rural High School District No. 706, of said County.

on the question of determining whether or not a majority of the legally qualified voters of said districts desire to be consolidated with each other.

It appearing that each of said contiguous districts have been properly established and created and are legally and validly existing school districts:

THEREFORE, I in my capacity of County Judge of Hamilton County, Texas, do hereby order that an election be held on the 16th day of November, 1963, in Hamilton Independent School District; and Fairy Rural High School No. 706; to determine whether or not a majority of the legally qualified voters of said Districts desire that they shall be consolidated as indicated above for school purposes.

I further order that said election shall be held at the following places in said districts and the following named person is hereby appointed presiding officer and he shall select two Judges and two Clerks to assist him in holding the same and he shall, within five days after said election has been held, make due return thereof to the Commissioners' Court of this County as required by law for holding a General Election:

1. In Hamilton Independent School District at Courthouse Building in Hamilton, Texas, within said district, with Leo F. Rendessy as presiding Judge;
2. In Fairy Rural High School Building at School Building in Fairy, Texas, within said district, with E. C. Parks as presiding Judge.

All persons who are legally qualified voters of this State and of this County and who are resident voters in said Districts shall be entitled to vote at said election, and all voters who favor the proposition to consolidate the said Districts for school purposes shall have written or printed on their ballots, the words:

"FOR CONSOLIDATION"  
And those opposed to the proposition to consolidate the said Districts for school purposes shall have written or printed on their ballots, the words:

"AGAINST CONSOLIDATION"  
Notice of said Election shall be given by posting three notices thereof in three public places within the boundaries of said District for twenty days prior to the date of said election.

## IT'S THE LAW—

### Motorists Required to Stop For Halted School Bus

Thousands of school children are now back in school throughout the state, and many of them are being transported by school buses. Most people are careful when approaching a school bus which may be standing beside the road or school to pick up children or allow them to alight. However, some very bad accidents have already occurred this year because a child or motorist, or both, were careless at that very time.

Most Texans are aware of the law which requires a driver to come to a complete stop when overtaking from the rear a school bus which has stopped to receive or discharge school children. After stopping immediately behind the bus, he is then allowed to proceed past same at a speed "which is prudent, not exceeding ten (10) miles per hour, and with due caution for the safety of such children."

What many persons do not realize is that the very same rule applies when meeting a stopped school bus. While everyone is interested in protecting school children, unthinking violators of this simple safety rule greatly outnumber those who comply. Failure to follow the law in this case can lead to fine up to \$200.00 even when no accident occurs. Following an accident in which some child is injured or killed, the penalties are naturally more serious.

Although the above rule does not always apply when passing a stopped school bus in a business or residential district of a town, the necessity for extreme caution even in those locations is obvious. When it comes to overtaking and passing moving vehicles, ex-

ercise of ordinary common sense will generally keep a driver within the law. For instance, when passing a car it is only common sense to proceed on past it a safe distance before cutting back to the right side of the highway. Also, any driver would realize the danger of increasing his speed while another is attempting to pass him.

In the same category is the prohibition against passing on the right under most ordinary circumstances. Of course, you may legally pass on the right in a few specific instances, such as when the vehicle overtaken is making or about to make a left turn, or upon a one-way street with two or

more lanes, or upon a highway.

However, traffic laws exist even when passing on the right. It shall be done under conditions permitting movement in safety. An event should such passing be accomplished by driving on pavement or main traveled part of the roadway.

Familiar to all are the passing zones designated by lines placed to one side of the center line on highways. Not known are the restrictions on crossing the center line when approaching within 100 feet of a railroad grade crossing.

A driver should never cross the center line of a highway when visible and free of oncoming traffic. Generally speaking, when engaged in passing another vehicle one should not drive to the left of the roadway.

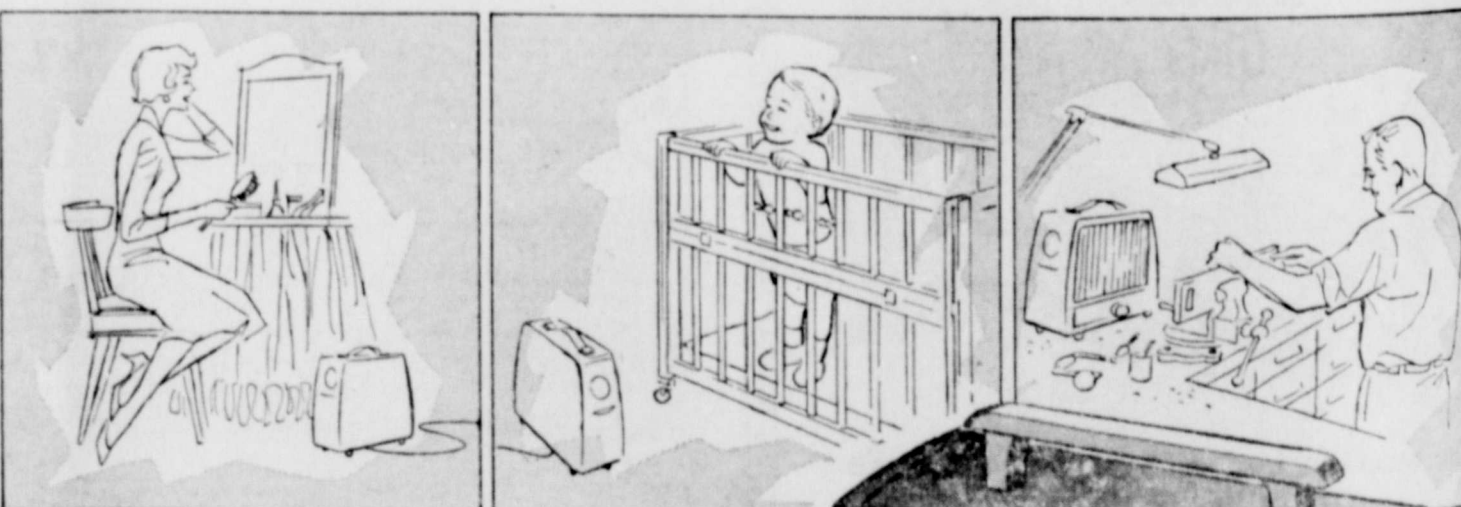

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Farm Welding Short Course Set Here November 11-14

A farm welding short course for adult farmers will be held Nov. 11-14 under the sponsorship of the Hico High School Vocational Agriculture Department, according to Harold D. Walker, teacher.

Mr. C. B. Edwards, welding specialist with the Vocational Agriculture Division of the Texas Education Agency and the Department of Agriculture Engineering at Texas A&M will do the instructing in the course. He is headquartered at Texas A&M.

Mr. Edwards has had experience as a vocational agriculture teacher and as supervisor of state schools. He has organized T&I programs and supervised the operation of several shops, and has been with the Adult Specialist Program since its initiation in 1958.

"Many welding short courses in various parts of the state have been taught by Mr. Edwards and all have met with outstanding success," according to J. B. Payne, area supervisor of vocational agriculture, Stephenville. Arrangements for adult education courses are made through Mr. Payne's office.

The short course at Hico is scheduled to begin Nov. 11 at 7:30 p.m. in the vocational agriculture building. Other meetings in the series of four will be held Nov. 12, 13, and 14. During the dates the short course is in progress Mr. Edwards will be available to assist farmers with individual problems and to provide on-the-farm instructions, according to Mr.

Walker. Farmers interested in attending the short course should write or call the superintendent, or the teacher of agriculture. An entry fee of \$5 will be charged. Farm Welding Short Course Certificates are to be presented to each enrollee who attends all sessions.

Mr. Edwards stated that the course would be adjusted to meet the wishes and interests of farmers enrolled, but that he expects to cover such subjects as safety in welding, factors controlled by the operator in running a bead, striking an arc, types of electrodes, preparation of joints, distortion, cutting, hardsurfacing, and pipe welding.

COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

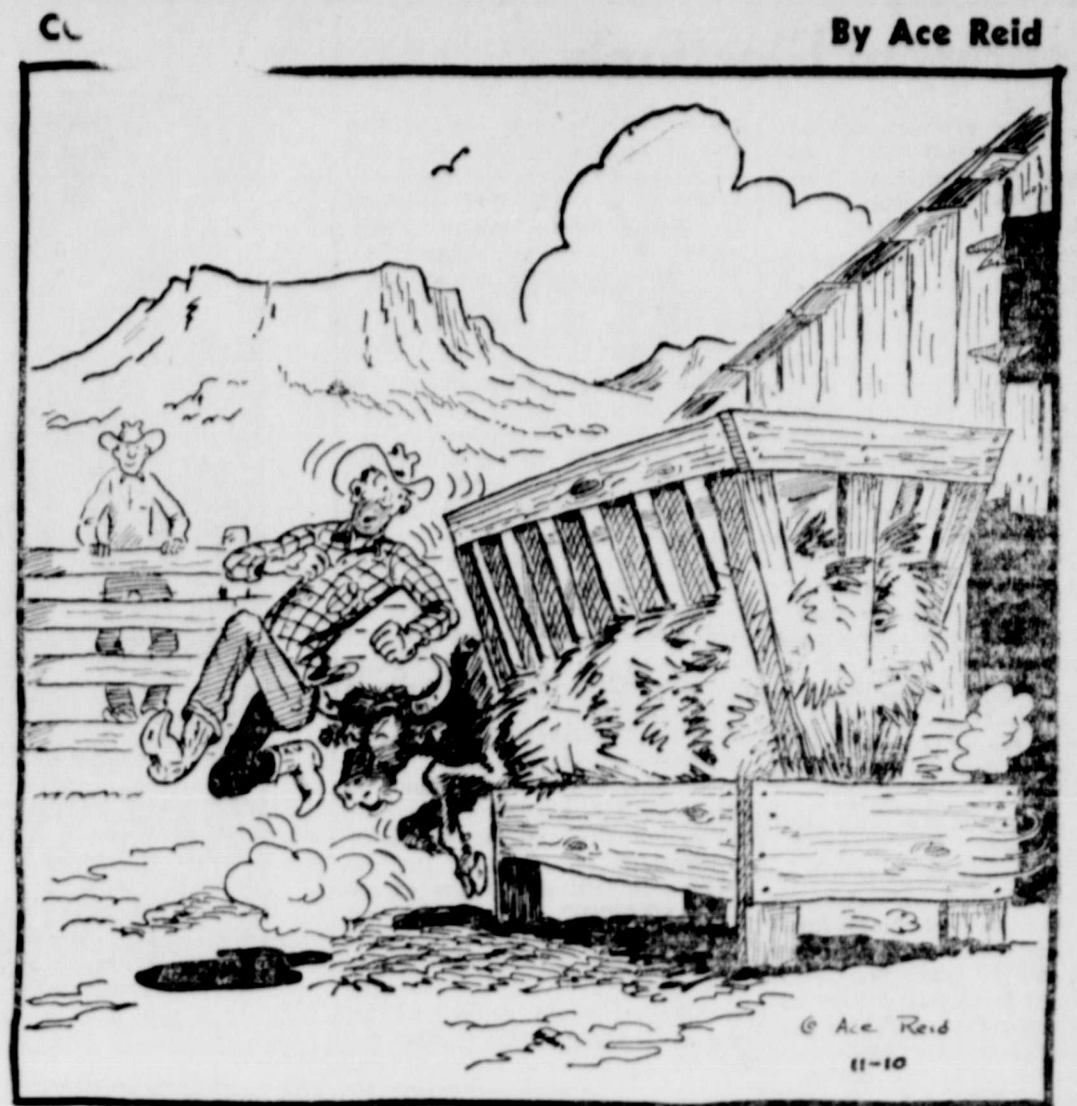

The cool weather we have had recently reminds us that winter is not far away. Records show that we usually have our first killing frost about the middle of November.

The cool weather we had last weekend caused some July planted cotton to lose its leaves. Others reported seeing ice on water troughs last Saturday morning. This means that anti-freeze weather is just around the corner so don't get caught without this item for your tractor radiators.

Care of your farm implements during the winter months can save you some money. The complicated machinery like balers and combines are susceptible to depreciation from weathering during the period of inactivity during the winter months. These should be stored out of the elements where possible. More simple tools like discs, harrows and rakes need to be scraped clean of rust and corrosive material and then painted. Also it will pay to make the necessary repairs now so you will be ready to go next spring.

No one feeds scrap iron to his

cows on purpose, but it is amazing how many do it accidentally. This is something to be aware of since so many are having to feed their livestock.

A tiny piece of wire or a broken nail can cause the loss of a cow. Since cows don't chew their food thoroughly, they often swallow nails, screws, pieces of wire, pins or other bits of metal along with their rations.

These sharp objects usually wind up in the second stomach, the honeycomb, often referred to as the "hardware bucket." They can work their way into the stomach wall and cause a painful injury, or even into the heart and kill the animal. Dairymen usually have more trouble with this problem than the beef producers since they feed twice a day throughout the year. All small objects that cows swallow should be picked up.

Don't mend stanchions with wire and if nails are lost while repairing something around the barn, find it before you go on to the next job. Be sure to account for all baling wire from hay and straw used in the barn. Steel brushes should never be used around feed troughs or stanchions.

ended for any one program, and (3) to set an over-all limit of \$60,000,000 per year on State funds which may be expended for all four programs.

The Constitution now provides that needy citizens of Texas, in order to qualify for old age assistance, aid to the blind or aid to disabled persons, must have resided in the state five out of the last nine years including continuous residence for the one year immediately preceding application. Needy children who are citizens of Texas must have continuously resided in the state for one year preceding application. If the child is less than one year old, its mother must have continuously resided in the state for one year preceding application.

Under our Constitution the maximum amount which can be paid from State funds to needy aged persons is \$25 per month and the maximum which can be paid to disabled persons is \$20 per month. This amendment would strike out both these limitations. It would retain provisions that the maximum amount paid out of State funds to any individual recipient, and the total amount spent from State funds on any program may not exceed the amount which is matchable out of federal funds.

**Proposition 3 on the Ballot**  
"FOR the addition of subsection (c) to Section 62 of Article XVI of the Constitution, to authorize all political subdivisions within Jefferson County, Texas, to establish, after approval of its voters, a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund covering all appointive officers and employees of said political subdivisions."  
"AGAINST the addition of subsection (c) as set forth in above paragraph."  
This proposal would add a new subsection to our Constitution providing for Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Funds. (Art. XVI, Sec. 62 (c)).  
It would apply only to those political subdivisions within Jefferson County (Beaumont county seat) but it has implications that could affect the remainder of the State.  
It would not affect Jefferson County itself, only those political subdivisions within it, such as cities, towns, school districts, hospital districts, water districts, navigation districts, and the like.  
The Amendment would give each political subdivision in Jefferson County the right to (1) set up its own retirement plan or (2) join the County Retirement System of that county which already exists under constitutional authorization. Each political subdivision would determine whether it would adopt a retirement plan and if so, which plan, by the holding of an election within the particular political subdivision at which the plan would have to be approved by a majority of the qualified voters in the subdivision.

**Proposition 4 on the Ballot**  
"FOR the Amendment to Section 49-b of Article III of the Constitution of Texas to increase the Veterans' Land Fund by \$150,000,000;  
said fund to be used for the purpose of purchasing land in Texas to be sold to Texas veterans who served in the Armed Services of the United States between September 16, 1940 and March 31, 1955; such funds to be expended in accordance with instructions and requirements that may be provided by law."  
"AGAINST the Amendment to Section 49-b of Article III as outlined in the above paragraph."  
This proposed amendment would extend the veterans' land program and add \$150,000,000 to the Veterans' Land Fund.  
It would rewrite Section 49-b of Article III of the Constitution. The three major changes made by this amendment would be (1) to allow the sale of \$150,000,000 more in bonds, (2) to increase the rate of interest, and (3) to extend the life of the Veterans' Land Fund to an indeterminate date.  
The first provision for the Veterans' Land Fund, adopted in 1946, authorized the sale of \$25,000,000 in bonds. In 1951 this was increased by authorizing issuance of another \$75,000,000, and in 1954 an additional \$100,000,000 in bonds was approved. All of these bonds have been sold. The proposed amendment would allow the issuance of another \$150,000,000 for the continuation of the program.

If you're wondering what to do with all those apples from the tree in your backyard—or if you'd like to take advantage of the good buys at stores and markets—try freezing some.

Apples frozen for pie or sauce will retain good eating quality for 8 months to a year. You have your choice of three freezing methods: a sirup pack (recommended for apples to be used in fruit cocktail or as an uncoked dessert); a sugar pack for pie apples; or an unsweetened pack for dietetics or those who prefer to sweeten to taste later.

Select full-flavored apples that

are crisp and firm, not too soft texture. Wash, peel and slice medium apples into large ones into 16ths. Freeze your favorite freezing method.
