## Farm Welding Short Course Well-Received By Area Farmers

The farm welding short course offered this week through the Vocational Agriculture Dept. of the local school has been well received by farmers and ranchers of this area. Fifteen adults were enrolled and several had to be turned away the second night because of a full use of facilities.

Mr. C. B. Edwards, welding specialist with the Ag Division of Texas Education Agency was in charge of instruction, and reported good interest and attendance throughout the course. Several visitors attended the four nights, Supt. O. C. Cook visited Monday evening and invited the use of the new vocational agriculture building facilities for all such adult work.

Comments from some of those enrolled in the course ran as follows: J. J. Jones mentioned that he felt that everyone was taking interest in the course and trying to learn something; J. D. Partain, taking his first course, said he felt the course well worth the time and effort; Bill Stearman said he had picked up quite a bit from the course; Woodard Brummett reported that the only time the instructor allowed time away from the job was for a coffee break. Woodard bought a welder recently and brought it in to receive experience on his own equipment.

Others attending the course were Wilburn Templeton, Edwin Shannon, J. T. Grissom, Ed Black, Melvin Henderson, Doc Lackey, George Holladay, Charles Dunn, Bill Meek, Derrel Fillingim and B. L. Holley.

Mrs. Johanson, homemaking teacher, and Mrs. Brummett, along with the homemaking students, furnished cake and cookies each night during the course, and the adult members all expressed their appreciation.

Harold Walker, vocational agriculture teacher, expressed appreciation to O. L. Davis of Community Public Service and others in helping prepare for the course, and asked that those not enrolled but desiring one in the future to contact him.

## Fairy-Hamilton School Merge Vote Saturday

Patrons of Fairy Rural High School and Hamilton Independent School District will vote this Saturday in an election that would merge the two districts.

The consolidation order was issued October 17 by County Judge G. W. Hurley after petitions from both districts had been presented to the Commissioners Court asking for the vote.

The election closely follows one held August 24 when residents of the Fairy District turned down a proposal to consolidate with Hico by a scant two vote margin.

The latest election was called after school officials at

Fairy (school board and superintendent) said that they had no intention of operating a school at Fairy for the 1964 term.

The election is a compromise move by patrons in the Fairy district whereby those landowners who so desire may ask the county board to de-annex their property from the Hamilton district if the election carries.

E. C. Parks will be election judge at Fairy, and Leo Rensderry will preside at Hamilton. Polls will open at 8 a. m. at the Fairy School and Court House in Hamilton, and will close at 7 p. m.

## October Accident Report For Area Released This Week

Sgt. A. A. Eggen, Supervisor of the Texas Highway Patrol in the Stephenville Area, released the area's accident summary for the month of October.

The Highway Patrol investigated a total of 49 rural traffic crashes during the month. As a result, 26 people were injured, and the combined property damage amounted to \$24,645.00.

There were no deaths reported for the month of October. For the first 10 months of 1965 the Stephenville Area's rural traffic record shows a total of 447 crashes resulting in death to 7 people, injury to 275, and the combined property damage amounted to \$244,578.00.

For the same period of 1962, the Stephenville Area reported a total of 445 rural crashes resulting in death to 22 people, injury to 252, and the combined property damage amounted to \$370,600.00.

## Former Hicoan Named Mgr. For Western Hatchery

Walter S. Ramey, former Hico resident, has been appointed new manager of Western Hatcheries' operation at Henderson.

Ramey goes to Henderson from Western's Branch at Lufkin where he managed the hatchery and also the company's Trinity and Houston County commercial egg operation consisting of 60,000 layers and its Huntingdon Egg farm which originally housed 32,000 heavy breeders and is now being converted to a commercial egg farm of 70 to 90,000 hens. Ramey will continue as general manager of these Western holdings from his office headquarters at Henderson.

Western's Henderson operation consists of a modern hatchery supplying layers and breeders for a four-state area, a feed mill, a commercial pullet operation, and a 125,000-bird laying operation.

Ramey's poultry experience began at age 10 in his home town of Hico where (as Ramey tells it) Mr. and Mrs. G. C. Keeney hired him to help in their hatchery at 50c per day to get him "from under foot." He continued to work in the Keeney Hatchery through high school and after about four years in the Navy, returned in 1946 for two more years in the Keeney business which consisted of a Leghorn poultry farm and ROP turkey breeding work, in addition to the hatchery. He availed himself of all poultry short courses and poultry disease courses offered, became an official blood testing and poultry selecting agent for both chickens and turkeys, working Hamilton and several surrounding counties.

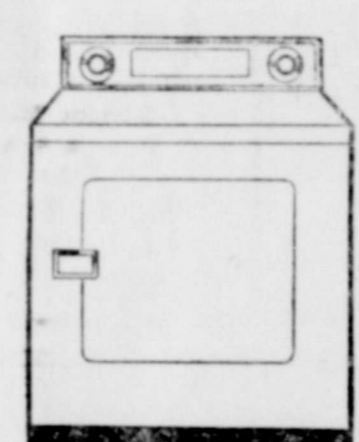

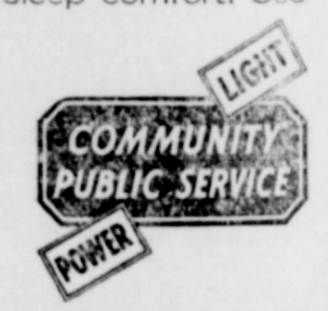

COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

By DeMARQUIS GORDON

At the time this column is being written it is raining. For the first time since I have been in the county I need a rain coat. I was beginning to believe that I would never need one.

This should provide enough moisture to bring the green grass out, that is if a frost does not follow the rain. It should at least bring out the small grain such as oats and wheat. You will know more about this by the time you read this column. Anyway, everyone feels better and I don't mind not having a rain coat.

I will be out of the county most of the last half of November. As you read your paper I am attending a bi-district meeting in Col-

lege Station. The meeting began at noon Wednesday, November 13 and will end at noon Friday, the 15th. I have been chosen to attend the Swift's Marketing School in Fort Worth with 25 other extension agents in the state the week of Nov. 18-22. Most of the time will be spent at the stock yards. The agents will study livestock buying methods and all the processes through the meat packing plants. I will be in the county November 25 through 27 before leaving for the Thanksgiving holidays.

E. G. Hancock Horticulturist for the Agricultural Extension Service was in the county Monday and Tuesday of last week. We did some pecan tree evaluation and selection work. This is a very important step in a pecan management program. Low yielding trees and trees that produce poor quality pecans should be taken out to give more room to the better producing trees. This is the only time of year that a fair evaluation can be made while the pecans are on the trees. The most common mistake made in a native grove is to leave the trees too thick.

The native pecans on the Leon River look very good this year, however the early drop due to dry weather reduced the yield considerably.

Fall Army Worms become a problem when weather begins to get cooler. They attack lawns and pastures and eventually will spread to small grains and winter forage crops. The recommended insecticide to control the pests are sevin, parathion, and toxaphene. Toxaphene should not be used where dairy cattle will graze. The insecticides should be applied when the worms are small for best results.

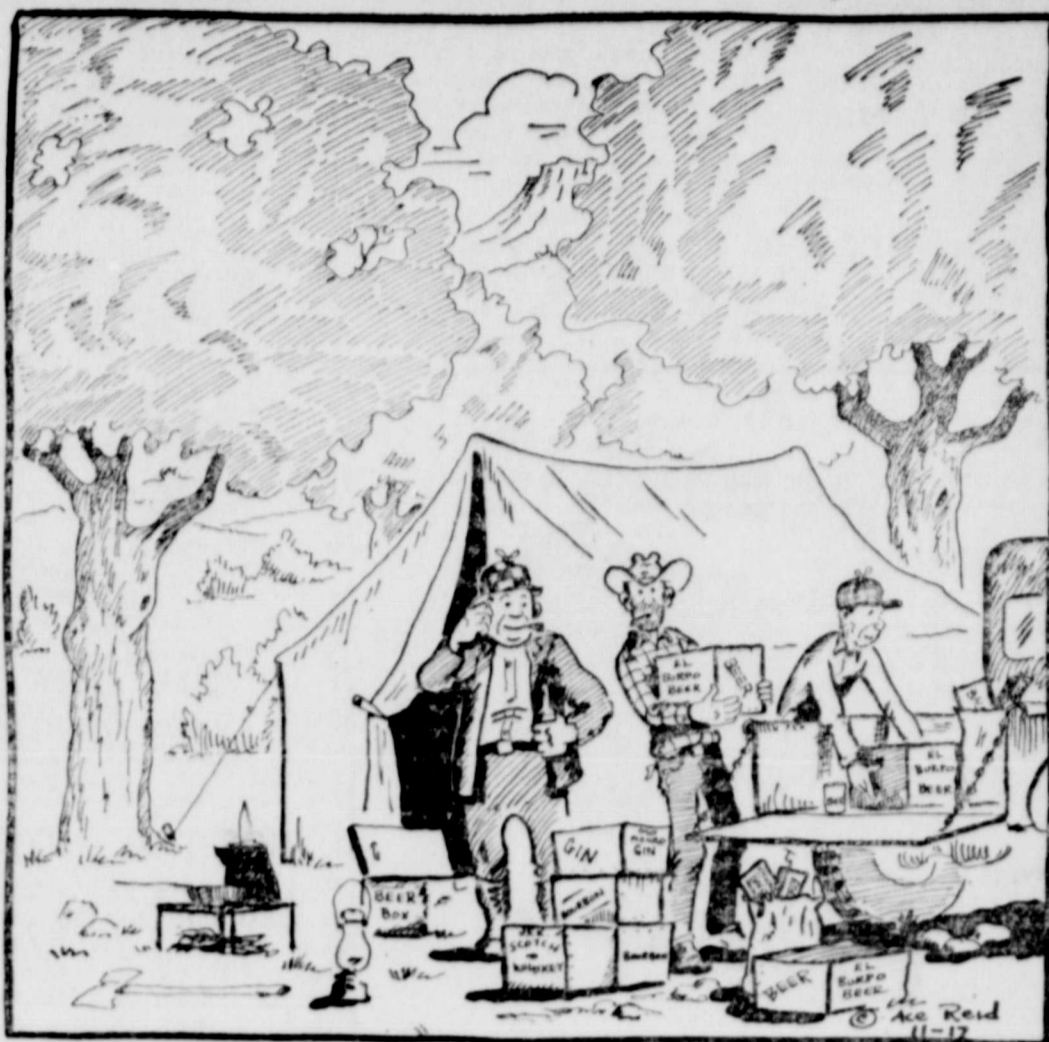

**Game Warden Reports**

This time next week we will be well into the deer season, since it opens Saturday, November 16.

We have almost completed issuing doe or antlerless permits, and around 1200 have been issued in Bosque County. I would like to ask you to use as many of these as possible. I say this because the condition of pastures now, it looks like we may lose some deer this winter due to starvation. And I also believe in some of the heavily populated areas you folks will see a better fawn crop next year by doing this.

I would like to remind landowners again about the new regulation on issuing the hunter doe permits. He must have it in his possession while in the field hunting antlerless deer. All you have to do is sign the back of the hunters copy and let him have it. When he kills an antlerless deer you should tell him to bring it back to you and then you fill out the front of the permit and the stub you have retained in the book. After you have filled out both the stub and permit, return it to him because he must have it in his possession as long as he is in possession of a doe.

Due to the fact that so many folks could not get in on Nov. 4 and 5 to pick up doe permits we have decided to be in the office at 8 a.m. Monday, November 19 for this purpose. This will be the last time this year we will be issuing doe permits so please try to get by then.

Remember to treat all guns as if they are loaded, and always know what you are shooting at before you pull the trigger.

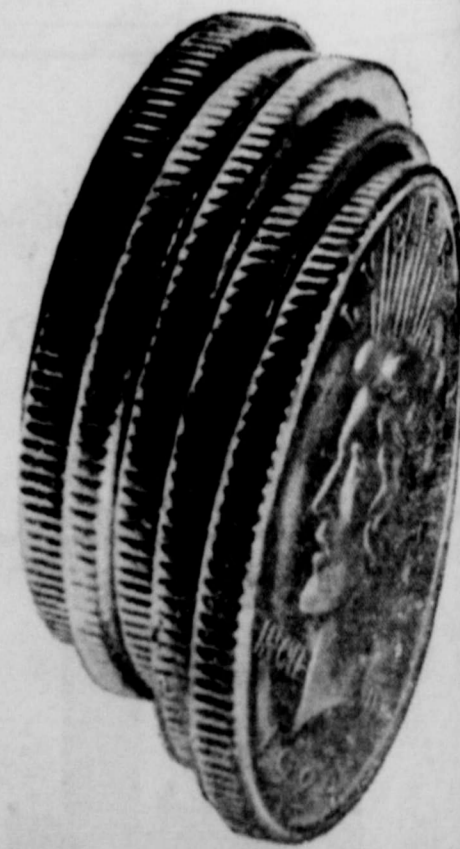
