Fairy School Consolidated With Hamilton Saturday

Fairy school patrons, 106 strong went to the polls last Saturday and voted by nearly four to one to consolidate their school with Hamilton.

The final tally at Fairy was 83 votes for consolidation and 23 against.

Thus comes to the end of a long and successful tenure of an education plant that served people of that area for many years.

The election was ordered Oct. 17 by County Judge G. W. Hurley after petitions from both Fairy and Hamilton school districts had been presented asking for an election to consolidate the two schools.

The balloting followed by two and a half months a like election called to consolidate Fairy with Hico. The issue was voted down 78-76. Following the turn-down, a series of meetings involving trustees from Fairy, Hico and Hamilton were held and the compromise election called after Fairy school officials said that they had no plans to operate school there for the 1964-65 term.

School will not be disrupted at Fairy for the remainder of the 1963-64 term, with the consolidation becoming effective at the beginning of next year's term as far as students are concerned. De-annexation procedures of that property which will go to the Hico district is expected to be started soon.

Hico came back in the third period, with Charles Erick rolling out for 37 yards and six points, and then scoring the conversion points.

The loss left the Tigers' record at 3-6-1 for the year, and a last place finish in the district.

Two deer hunters, for the most part, were successful on the opening weekend of the season, but the kills reported thus far were of the "bragging" size.

The first deer reported was the second six point buck killed by Booth last week in the White Mountains of New Mexico. His hunting companion, 13-year-old Adams bagged a 7-point pound buck on the trip.

Boyd, perennial champ and these parts, is currently leading the pack, waiting until today to down a huge 138-pound point buck. As usual, she had to have shot him in her yard. No report from husband Bill, who made his annual trip to the Hill Country.

The second largest killed in this area was the nine point 132-pound buck downed by Bill Doty Saturday morning. He was hunting with Kenneth Southall and Bobby Hand of Hamilton, who also bagged their bucks. They were hunting on the Raymond Cunningham place at Fairy.

After killing the deer with the 13 points was 13-year-old Travis Adams of Dublin, hunting with grandfather, Lusk, and his son, Lusk Jr. The buck carried 13 points and was killed in Blain County. The youngster also bagged a doe, but grandpa and papa were home empty-handed.

The youngest hunter to score that has been reported here was Roy French, 8-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles French of San Antonio and grandson of Mrs. Roy French of Hico.

Another unusual kill made by a 10-year-old hunter was that by Van Hooper. He abandoned the modern bow and returned to primitive style to down a 7-point buck with bow and arrow near Ford.

Over to home Steve Ogle and son Hyles both reported kills their lease near Chalk Mountain.

Russell, who lives five miles north of Hico, stole a page from the Boyd's record book, and downed an 8-pointer practically in his back yard. The deer was estimated to weigh 120 pounds.

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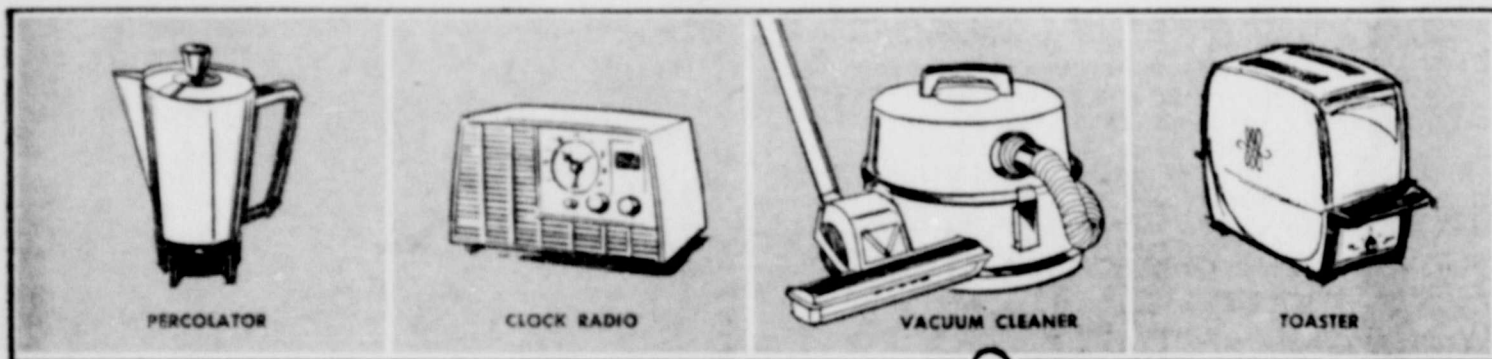

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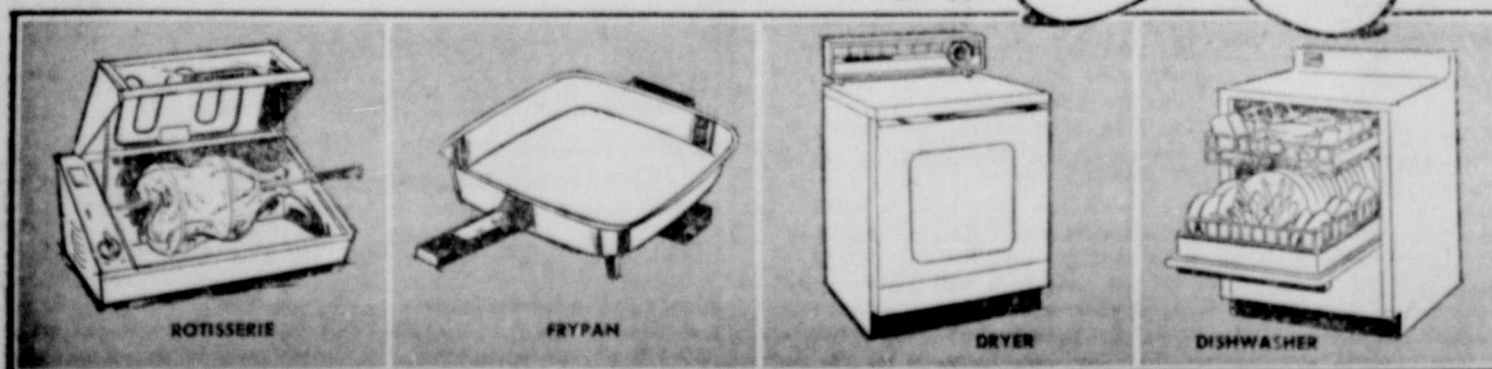

State control of schools and government control of farm land is fast gaining control of all rural schools. We live in a land of waste, grudge and jealousy and it seems a shame to dismantle a school plant such as we have here which has been brought about by just such conditions. Again let us say thanks to you who have shown your loyalty to the community in which you live. May you continue to be faithful to the end.

Tribute Paid Final Fairy High School Football Team

"Hats off" to the Fairy Tigers, Coaches Lowry and LaDuke, students, pep squad, and friends of the Fairy School.

And hats off to all former students. The Tigers played and won this one for you, the final game in the history of the school.

The Tigers downed Morgan 57-30 in the game.

At the time of the game (before the consolidation election) no one knew for sure that this would be Fairy's last football game. But the players expressed it in the pep rally and the patrons felt it would be the last, and they wanted this one in a most certain way. And this is the way the Tigers played it to tie for second place in the district.

On the first play from scrimmage Sammy Guinn swiveled his way for the first score after catching a long pass from Mickey Streater. Streater, who played an outstanding game, kicked the goal and Fairy led 8-0. Morgan received, tried to move, but the charging Clifford Bullard put a mad rush on and caused a fumble with the Tigers recovering it. On the first play, Sammy Guinn took the pitch out from Streater and went the distance for the score. Streater's kick was good and the Tigers led 16-0. Morgan then started moving until Bullard got another fumble. After three plays Bullard scored and Guinn passed for the extra point making the score 23-0. After two first downs Morgan connected on a long pass and kicked the goal for their first 8 points.

But with a minute left on the scoreboard clock Guinn got good blocking from Don Jones and Ramon Halle and went all the way for a 6-pointer increasing the lead to 29-8 at the end of the first quarter.

The second quarter defense on both sides was good. However, Clifford Bullard romped for a touchdown from a pass thrown by Streater, which gave Fairy a 37-8 halftime lead.

In the second half Morgan's famed passing attack started clicking. They scored after the kickoff for 8 points. Then on Fairy's first play Bullard lateraled to Guinn for 60 yards and Fairy led 43-16. On Morgans possession they passed, scored and kicked to make the score 43-24. Fairy received and still playing for dear life in their school's final game, scored once more for a 51-24 lead as the third quarter ended.

At the onset of the final period Morgan scored on a 40-yard pass play for their last score now reading 51-30. In the final 8 minutes of play every Tiger gave his best last effort. Clifford Bullard and Ramon Halle rushed through the line, Don Hall intercepted a Mor-

gan pass and almost went all the way. Mickey Streater and Sammy Guinn broke up Morgan passes, and Donald Jones blocked and tackled the surprised Eagles.

No one scored until the last play. With seven seconds left the Tigers were on about the 10 yard line. They went into a spread formation with Streater taking the snapback and passing to Guinn behind the line of scrimmage, then Guinn passed back to Streater making the final score 57-30.

This ended football for Fairy individuals who now may belong to Hamilton or Hico after Saturday's Consolidation election. Only Clifford Bullard is a senior. Mickey Streater and Sammy Guinn are juniors, Donald Jones, Ramon Halle, Don Hall, David Gleason are sophomores, and Charles Edwards, Jerry Garner and Ronnie Tackett are freshmen. Jimmy Sellers, a sophomore, is team manager.

For those who the Hico Tigers may inherit they are fortunate indeed, for next year they may have some new Fighting Tiger blood in them. And as the individual Tigers step up the ladder we wish them every success. Adios Fairy Tigers.

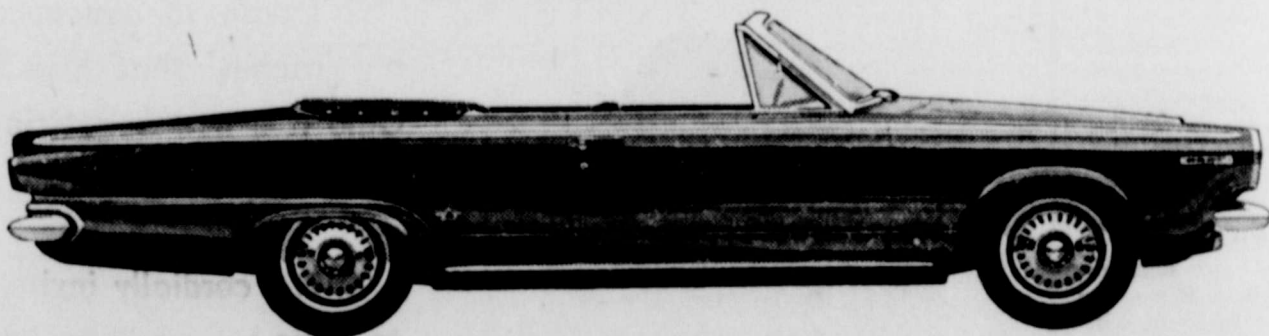
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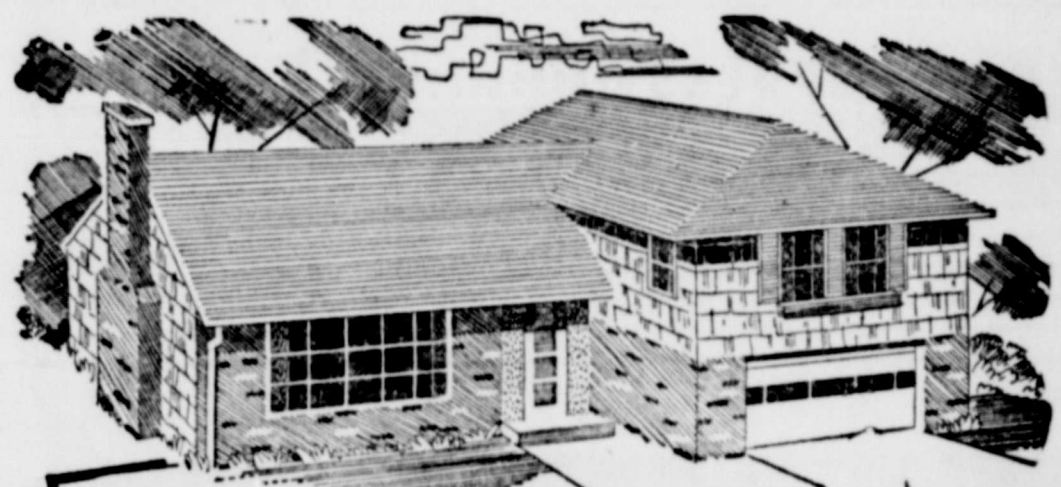
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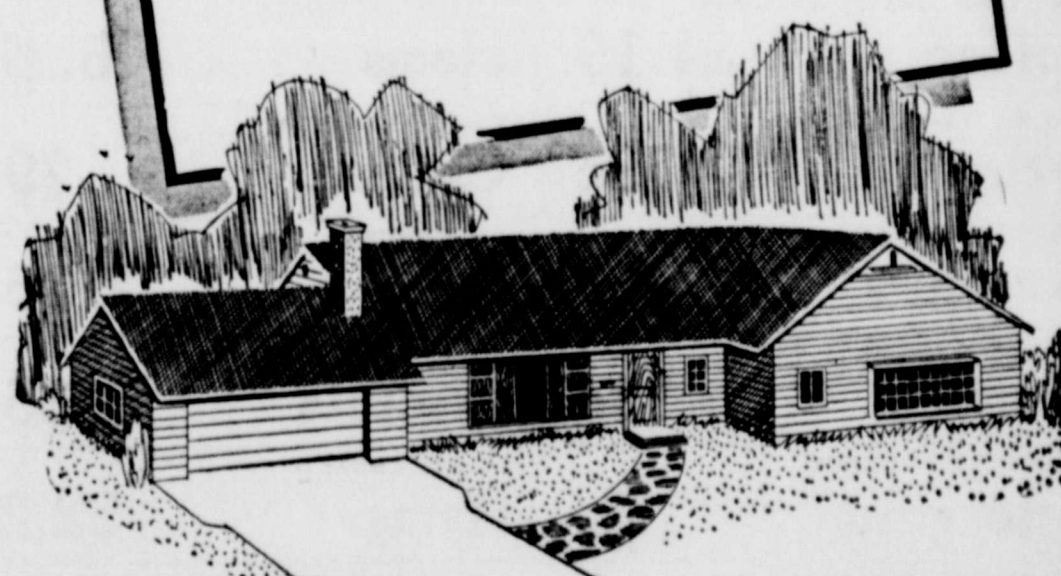

There is a large crop of nuts arriving at Texas markets. Pecan yields are about 64 percent above average, and the walnut crop is approximately 13 percent above normal. Other kinds of nuts are plentiful, too, and homemakers would do well to consider freezing some for the winter months ahead.

I have two bulletins in my office which has directions for keeping nuts fresh the year around, plus excellent recipes. They are "Eat More Pecans" and "Peanut and Peanut Brittle Recipes." Call or come by for one of these bulletins.

Homemaking Hints
Electric heaters collect dust, lint and cobwebs when not in use. Give them a thorough cleaning before putting them into winter service.

Older people need protein for repair and upkeep of body tissue—even though body growth is completed. Research shows that diets of persons over 40 years of age often lack the recommended amount of protein. Important sources are milk, cheese, eggs, meats, poultry and fish, dry beans, peas and nuts.

Light will bleach out the color of foods canned in glass containers, so store these items in a dark place.

Carpets may become dull, even with consistent use of a vacuum cleaner. They need an occasional professional cleaning.

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
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THIS WEEK IN AUSTIN—

Highlights and Sidelights

Recent special elections sent three new members to the State House of Representatives.

Dallas picked two more Republicans, Jack Sampson and Hughes Brown leaving Ben Atwell as the only Democratic House member from Big D.

Travis County voters selected a young Democrat, Bob Armstrong. He came out first in a big field, by a narrow margin over Republican Pete Hord. No runoffs are necessary in the legislative contests.

Drought Puts Dairymen in Danger Agriculture Commissioner John White said denial by railroads of an urgent request for freight-rate reductions on hay to be shipped into drought disaster areas "squeezed out the last hope of our dairymen to stay in business during the present emergency."

"Without a freight rate reduction to ease their costs during the next three critical months," says White "our dairymen apparently must look for an increase in raw

milk prices, or be forced out of business. White said hay costs have increased from 75 to 100 percent over normal and probably would go higher due to high freight charges on bringing in hay from other parts of the country.

State Deficit State's General Revenue Fund was \$18,500,000 in the red at the end of October. Receipts totaled \$5,000,000 less than revenue. State governmental expenses totaled \$128,900,000 last month. Income from various taxes and collections came to only \$123,900,000. Cigarette, beer and wine taxes provided \$9,700,000. A total of \$10,000,000 came from the sales tax. Other big income producers included: crude oil production tax, \$16,200,000; motor fuel taxes, \$16,800,000; federal highway grants \$15,000,000; and federal public welfare grants, \$14,300,000.

Keep Poll Tax A lopsided majority of Texas counties voted in favor of retaining the poll tax as a qualification for voting. In all, only 25—mainly in South and Central Texas—wanted to repeal it.

Rural areas voted strongly against repeal. Metropolitan areas voted to repeal the tax—but very few took the time to vote. Other explanations as to how-come vary widely.

Of the four amendments submitted, only one passed. It raised to \$60,000,000 the State fund ceiling on aid to the needy and liberalizes administration of the program.

Texas Traffic Col. Homer Garrison Jr., director of the State Department of Public Safety, told Governor Connally, "It is almost certain that the death toll in traffic in Texas

for 1963 will be the greatest on record." "From July to November 8, there was an average increase of motoricides of 8 percent over the same period in 1962. On this basis, a projection to the end of this year indicates a death toll of 2,615 which would exceed the 1956 record of 2,611."

In reply, Connally issued his ideas on priority traffic safety needs. 1. Improve competence and responsibility of drivers by revision of present obsolete driver licensing law. 2. Improve police supervision of traffic on rural highways by increasing the salary and benefits of DPS patrolmen and increasing the number of patrolmen by 200 each two years to an eventual strength of 1,800.

3. Include approved high school driver education courses in the Foundation School Program. 4. Improve administration of justice and public respect for traffic laws through the creation of modern Traffic Courts of Record, as recommended by the American Bar Association. 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Game Warden Reports

Deer season got into full swing Saturday with good kills in some parts of the county. The deer are running from mud fat to poor, depending on what part of the county they are from. Many folks have said they did not expect to see them this fat.

We have had several large bucks killed, with the largest being 134 pounds field dressed and he sported 16 points. This buck was killed between Clifton and Cranfills Gap by J. B. Reeder of Arlington. There have been several killed in the 9, 10 and 12 point bracket, of which I was unable to obtain their weight.

I checked the first locker plant Saturday about 3:30 and they had already received 30 deer. There could be several reasons for this, the main one being because of the weather being so warm, but I think this still could indicate a record kill for this area. From what I have checked in the locker plants since opening day I will estimate we had about 250 deer killed the first weekend. Out of these 250 about 30 percent have been does which I would like to say is a very good start on does this year. If we keep this rate up we will set a new record in doe or antlerless kill this year. Had the weather been colder the past week end this 250 could have been 500 instead.

You landowners also set a record on shooting preserve license this year. To date I have sold 175 which is about 25 more than last season.

We have been able to obtain a few more doe or antlerless permits. For you folks that failed to get some this year, Joe Stevens, game biologist, will be here in my office Friday, Nov. 22 to issue permits. The office will be open from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Please get by between these hours.

Again I would like to caution you on the handling of your gun. We got by the opening weekend without an accident so be very care-

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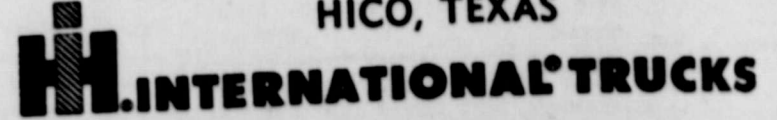
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
