A great many people are writing support of this proposal.

On first blush, the wording in the pending Resolution appears to be a clarification and an obsolete provision to override the decision of the Supreme Court. But does it really do what it intends or appears to do? The separation of Church and State should be inviolate and zealously guarded. In this one sentence. "Prayer may be offered in the course of any program in any public school or other public place in the United States," immediately raises the question as to who should prescribe the wording of the prayer. Would it be done by some governing body such as the school board, which was exactly the case in the State of New York?

A great many constitutional lawvers believe that the Constitution is clear on this subject of the separation of Church and State. They interpret the decision in the New York case as being based on the fact that an official body, which in this case was the school board, required a "set wording" and that the decision of the Supreme Court related to this one case. Many lawyers contend that the denial of prayer in our public schools is not the "law of the land." Rather, it is the law of this particular case

The wording in the resolution now pending before the House of Representatives is not the only approach to this question, but any approach becomes highly delicate. It is sensitive because of interpretation which might be placed upon this language in the future, to render a judgment in almost the opposite than that rendered in June of this year. In this instance the opposite would mean an officially directed religious exercise in violation of the principle of the separation of Church and State. 
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

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
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
