Sam Simpson, Pioneer Meets Tragic Death

Sam J. Simpson, 74, died early Saturday when fire destroyed his house on his ranch near Chalk Mountain.

Mr. Simpson had lived alone in the house about nine miles north of Iredell for many years.

Mr. Simpson was born May 27, 1888 in the Rocky Community, and had lived near Iredell and Chalk Mountain all his life with the exception of time spent in the armed services during World War I.

Funeral services were held at 2:20 p.m. Sunday at Iredell Methodist Church. Rev. Carl Williams and Rev. James Peppers officiating. Burial was in Hico Cemetery.

Mr. Simpson was the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Tom S. Simpson, pioneer settlers of the area. Survivors are a brother, Wick Simpson of Iredell; three sisters, Miss Grace Simpson of Dallas, Mrs. J. H. 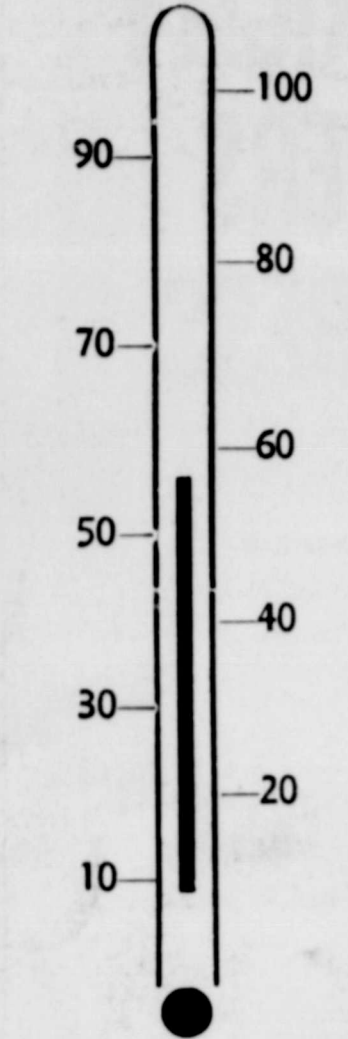

Rev. Burt M. Gillis described the "Mission To People" revivals to be held in Methodist churches throughout the Gatesville District as a two-pronged effort.

The district-wide revival services will be conducted March 8-13.

First concern of the Mission is to deepen the spiritual commitment of Methodists. "Too many of our people are characterized by irresponsibility toward the church, irregularity of worship, and barrenness of their spiritual life," Rev. C. H. Cole, district superintendent, said. "Our greatest need and first goal is to engage all members of our Methodist churches in their 'Mission to People' and lead them to seek and find a transformation in their own lives."

The second goal of the Mission, Rev. Cole said, is to reach those outside any church with the message of salvation.

Rev. Gillis and members of First Methodist Church are cooperating in the area-wide effort and expect to receive the name of their guest preacher soon. Appointments of guest preachers are being made by Bishop Wm. C. Martin and the superintendents of the Central and North Texas Conferences.

Robert Cathey of Alexander In Race For Representative

Robert Cathey, Alexander stock farmer, has announced for State Representative, District 53, composed of Hamilton, Coryell and Erath counties.

Cathey, a native of Erath County, was born between Alexander and Carlton in the old Fields School Community, but lived in Crosby County most of his early life. There he attended Ralls High School and Texas Tech, attending classes half a day and working for the college half a day. He is at present attending night classes at Tarleton State College in special agriculture courses.

Cathey has lived near Alexander since 1950. He and his wife and five children have been active in civic and church affairs of the community.

Before moving to Alexander, Mr. and Mrs. Cathey made their home in Ralls where he operated a business and entered the army during World War II.

Cathey served in the European Theater of Operations in 1944-45 and spent four months in a German Prison of War Camp. After being discharged from the service he returned to Ralls where he was engaged in business there and in Lockney.

Cathey said it was his first attempt at public office. He said he would be for the progress of the state's agricultural, industrial, business and educational systems, also to conserve the government of the sovereign State of Texas with due respect to the constitution and the rights and preferences of the people.

Cathey is a member of the Alexander Baptist Church, the Texas Sheep & Goat Raisers Association, the Texas Swine Breeders, the Texas Turkey Federation, the National Turkey Federation, the National Duroc Registry, the National Hampshire Registry, and the Farm Bureau.

Mrs. Cathey is the former Maurine Weathers. The five children are Jim, 21, a student at Texas A&M; Bill, 19, who is the swine herdsman along with Jack, 17, a junior at Dublin High School; Ann, 10, and Judy, 7, both students at Dublin Elementary School.

Cathey said he would make an effort to see every voter in the 53rd district.

Game Warden Reports

Now that hunting season is over, I know that many of you sportsmen will turn to fishing. I would like to say that I think February is a very good month to catch bass. The only trouble you would have would be finding a day that the weather is nice.

Reports are coming in from Lake Whitney that the black bass are biting good there now if any of you would like to try them. However I have not had a report of the sand bass up the river yet. I talked to Warden Phil Staley of Cleburne last week and he said the sand bass had not come up the river then, but several fishermen were up there waiting on them. Maybe with all this nice rain we have had the past few days they will start up the river soon. If you remember last year the peak period as the last part of February for these fish.

Just to keep the record straight there is no limit on sand bass and crappie in our area this year. However there is still a bag limit on black bass and catfish, but there is no size limit. There has been no changes made in the fishing laws since last year, and you may pick up a fishing law digest from any game warden or any place that sells hunting and fishing license. If you have a question that you cannot find the answer in the digest, please drop by my office or call me.

Due to the long dry spell we had last summer and spring many of you landowners had your ponds dry up. Now that many of these ponds have caught water you will be wanting to order some fish. I carry fish cards and applications in my car, or you can come by the office and pick them up.

it. Our first fish delivery will probably be in May or June, so those that want fish please come by as soon as you can so we will have plenty of time to get your application in. The first delivery will not include any catfish for those of you that want catfish you do not have to fill out applications until summer since we won't have a catfish delivery until next fall.

It seems that we have had landowners that have not turned their doe or antlerless deer permits in. Please check your records and make sure you have turned in yours. We must have them back.

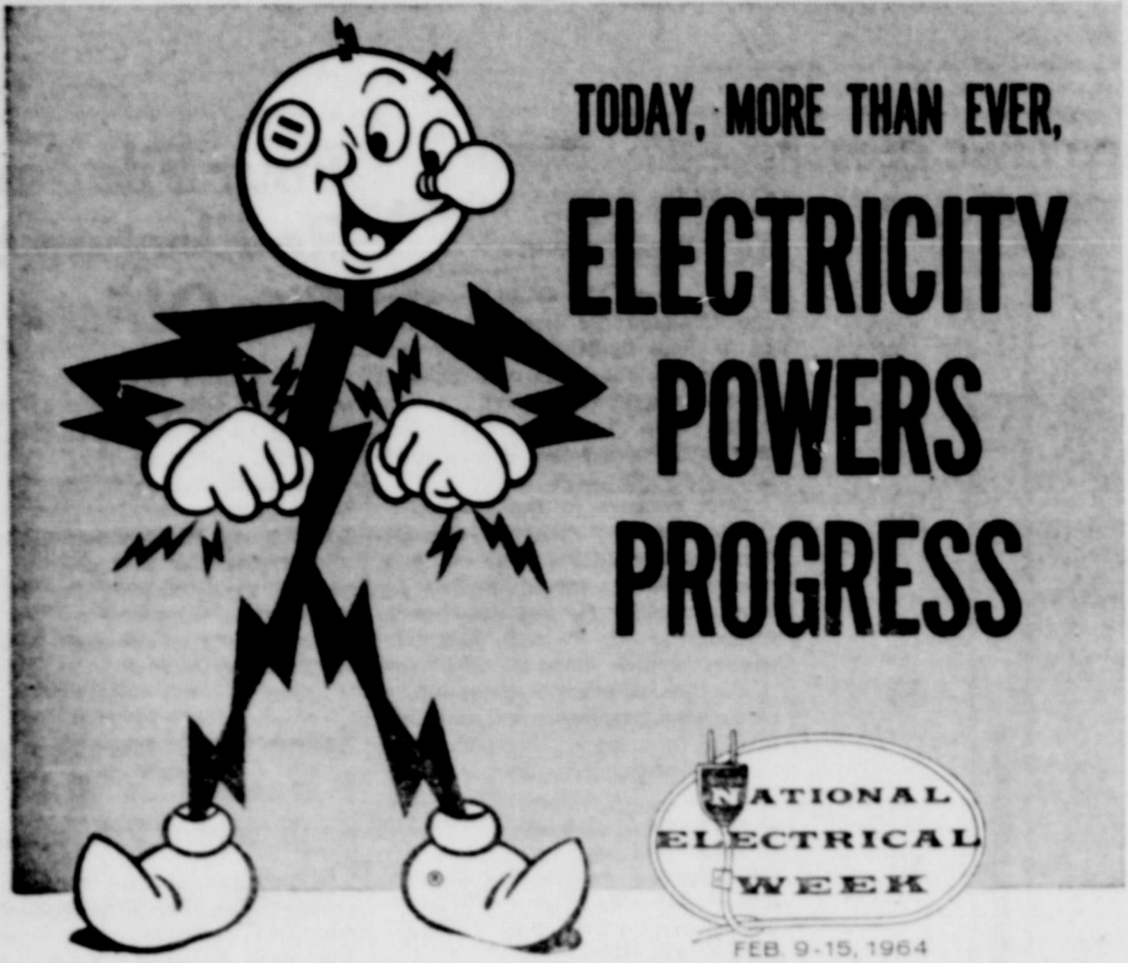

As It Looks From Here

In connection with wheat sales to Russia, Senator Aiken of Vermont said "I do not recall any instance in history in which any people have been starved into democracy. They have all been starved into totalitarianism, but not into democracy."

Of course, people have succumbed to totalitarianism for other reasons than starvation and poverty. There is no question, however, that food, as simple as the word may be, shapes policies of governments and points the course of history. In contrast to the greater part of the world which does not have enough, one of our great problems is having too much. We are blessed with surpluses, and because of our over-abundance, we have attempted during the last two decades or more to legislate ourselves out of it.

Our nation is blessed with fertile soil and a climate variable enough to produce most any variety of foodstuffs which can be raised any other place on the globe. Coupled with these natural resources is our ingenuity for producing the most on the fewest acres. The American farmer and rancher is producing more than ever before by applying methods developed by scientific research.

Never before in history have agricultural products figured so prominently in our foreign relations. The "Food for Peace" Program has caught the imagination of many people. What is commonly known as Public Law 480 permits the sale of huge quantities of agricultural products, paid for by recipient countries in their local currency. With local funds thus rated, we use a portion of

them for our own expenditures in the particular country, such as building of Embassies and related properties. Other portions of such funds may be loaned to the various governments or used in connection with other aid programs.

Aside from being of assistance to underdeveloped countries, this has enabled the sale of surplus agriculture commodities with considerable return to ourselves and an important assist to the American farmer. It is with justifiable pride that I authored this measure together with Congressman Walter Judd of Minnesota.

The problem of farm surpluses has a way of multiplying. As problems increase, so increase the ideas of solution. As a result of trying to improve the situation with one commodity, often we have created difficulty for another commodity. In attempting to reach a solution for one segment of agriculture, more than one program has been pyramided on top of another. As one experiment is abandoned as unsuccessful, another expediency is resorted to. While attempts to reduce production and keep prices as a level for a decent income to the producers, new methods and new developments have increased the yield. For example, today we outproduce Russia by yields of 40 to 50 percent in grains. In cattle our production is estimated to be 31 percent more efficient. As related to pork the figure is 56 percent, and on poultry it is 27 percent.

Depending on how one may view the matter, still other problems follow these. One which has far-reaching effects is the deadline in the number of farms. The number of farming units declined by three percent in 1963, and it is estimated that 100,000 will "disappear" in 1964. Of these, Texas is estimated to lose 6,000. But more will be produced on these same acres with fewer farms than was produced when individual farming operations were smaller.

In these times it is difficult for us to look upon this abundance as the great blessing it is, but the day could be near when it would mean our survival in a world deficient of food.

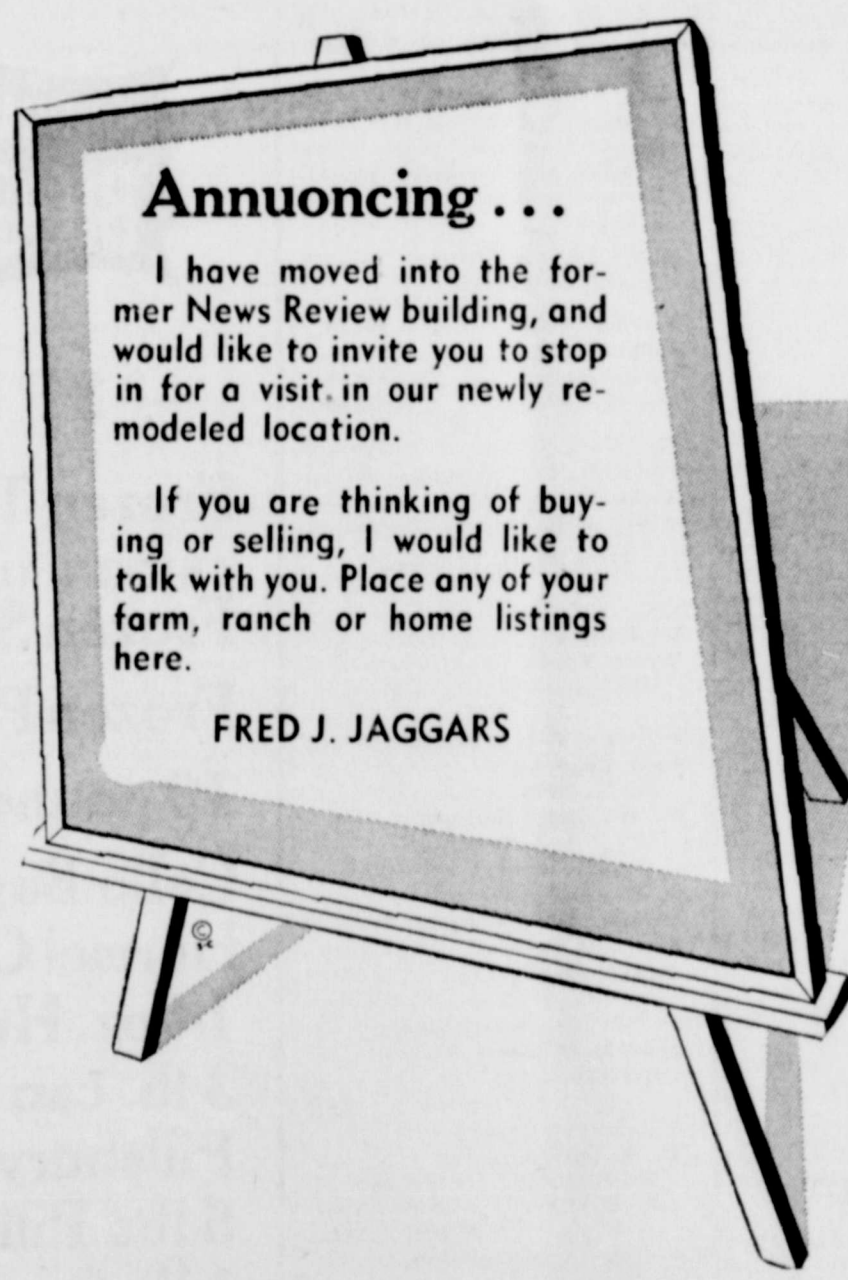

Highlights and Sidelights

Twenty-eight Democratic and 15 Republican candidates bunched through the starting gate before last week's filing deadline in a dramatic beginning to a political year that opened with relative calm.

A ruckus over the would-be U. S. Senate candidacy of McAllen Congressman Joe Kilgore, and Gov. John Connally's last-minute hesitancy about running for re-election highlighted the filing-deadline spectacular.

Kilgore decided not to run against U.S. Sen. Ralph Yarborough. Connally, acknowledging that he had considered retirement, went ahead and filed for a second term.

Conservative Democrats boiled over the Kilgore incident, said it might result in a second Republican Senator from Texas.

Jack Cox, the GOP's 1962 candidate for governor against Connally, was a surprise entry in the Republican senate contest—at five minutes before deadline.

The Republicans fielded a complete slate for state offices (except judicial) and congressional races.

Connally ended up with opposition from liberal Don Yarborough of Houston, Mrs. Johnnie Mae Mackworth of Brenham and Rev. M. T. Banks of Beaumont, a Negro Republican candidate for Governor are Jack Crichton of Dallas and Harry Diehl of Houston.

Yarborough is opposed by Democrats John Van Cronkhite and Gordon McLendon, both of Dallas. Cox and George Bush of Houston, and Dr. Milton B. Davis and Robert Morris, both of Dallas, are the GOP senatorial candidates.

Here is the complete lineup for other statewide offices: Lt. Governor: Preston Smith of Lubbock (incumbent) and Albert

Fuentes Jr. of San Antonio, Democrats; and Horace Houston of Dallas, Republican.

Congressman-at-Large: Incumbent Joe Pool of Dallas, Bill Elkins of Greenville, Robert W. Baker and Bob Looney, both of Houston, Democrats; Bill Hayes of Temple, Republican.

Attorney General: Incumbent Waggoner Carr of Lubbock, Dem.; John Trice, Waco, Rep.

Commissioner of Agriculture: Incumbent John White of Wichita Falls and Millard Shivers of Waco, (D); John B. Armstrong of Kingsville, GOP.

Land Commissioner: Incumbent Jerry Sadler of Grapeland and Fred H. Williams of Dallas (D); John A. Matthews of Abilene (R).

Comptroller: Incumbent Robert S. Calvert of Austin (D); and Dallas Calmes Jr., Houston GOP.

Treasurer: Incumbent Jesse James, Austin (D); and Fred S. Neumann, Beaumont (R).

Railroad Commissioner (full term): Incumbent Ben Ramsey, San Augustine, Democrat.

Railroad Commissioner (unexpired term): Incumbent Jim C. Langdon, Austin, and Jesse Owen of Vernon, Democrats; Don Flanagan, Richardson, GOP.

Supreme Court, Place 1: Sears McGee of Houston and Jack Pope of San Antonio, Dem.; T. E. Kennerly, Houston GOP.

Place 2: Ruel C. Walker, Cleburne, incumbent, Democrat.

Place 3: Incumbent Robert W. Hamilton, Midland, Democrat.

Court of Criminal Appeals: Incumbent K. K. Woodley of Austin, Democrat.

Thirteen of Texas' 23 congressmen escaped opposition in their own primaries, but for the first time in history there will be a Republican to deal with in every district come November.

COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

All farmers who produce cotton in Hamilton County are urged to attend the Cotton Production meeting at the Aleman School Wednesday night, Feb. 19. The meeting will start at 7:30 p.m. and will end at 10 p.m. A team of Extension Service Specialists from Texas A&M University will discuss all phases of cotton production.

Fred Elliott, Cotton Specialist, will be the main speaker on the program. Other specialists will discuss soil fertility, soil management, weed control, insect control, cotton varieties and harvesting. The meeting was planned to give cotton producers in Hamilton County the latest and best information available on cotton production for this area.

I have a supply of the "Texas Agricultural Progress." This is a magazine published quarterly by the Agricultural Experiment Station and the Extension Service. The current edition is devoted to the outlook for agriculture and family living in 1964. It gives the outlook for every agricultural enterprise and the expected supply and demand for each product. It also contains information of interest to the housewives on home management. These magazines are in my office and are yours for the asking.

Hamilton County participants in the 1964 Feed Grain Program can receive advance payments on their diverted acres.

Under this voluntary program, producers receive payments for diverting corn, barley and grain sorghum acres to conservation uses. These payments are based on the farm's established normal yield and the county's total price support rate.

Producers can get up to one-half of this payment when they sign up for the program at the county ASC office. A final diversion payment for taking feed grain acreage out of production will be about September 1. Producers have a choice of receiving payment as a certificate that can be redeemed in grain or as a sight draft cashable at any bank.

Sign-up time for this year's program is set for February 16 thru March 27. You can check with the Hamilton County ASC office for more details about the program.
