FFA In Texas Observes 35th Year—Continues to Grow

The Future Farmers of America organization is in its 35th year in Texas—and it continues to grow, having over 39,702 members this year. These FFA members are boys who are studying vocational agriculture in approximately 900 high schools in Texas. In their classes, students are provided an opportunity to secure technical and scientific training in agriculture as well as to receive training in leadership, citizenship and cooperation.

In 1950 there were 711 FFA chapters in Texas with a membership of 28,643. Today there are 875 chapters with over 39,000 members. The largest growth has come in the last three years since the membership increased over 3000. In a recent study it was found that 52.2 percent of the vocational agriculture graduates last year who were available for employment are now in full-time farming or in an agricultural related occupation. Approximately one-half of this number is in full time farming.

Agriculture today is more than farming. It involves those who process and distribute many agricultural goods. Many people are employed in agricultural occupations such as engineers, scientists, management personnel, sales and service personnel, and educators. There are 60,000 desirable openings each year for farm operators, farm engineers, and fulltime hired farm labor. This group needs a sound education in a continuing education to help keep them abreast of the rapidly changing technical and management aspects of farming.

Texas Future Farmers produced over 46,700 head of livestock, 1 million head of poultry, and raised over 45,000 acres of crops last year. This represents a total of over four and a half million dollars earned by the 40,000 members in Texas.

Texas is the largest of the 50 chartered state associations with over 10 percent of the total FFA membership. Texas has 937 chapters with a membership of 40,000.

Texas is divided into 10 areas. Members in each area select a state officer nominee and in turn a president is elected from this group by delegates at the State Convention in July.

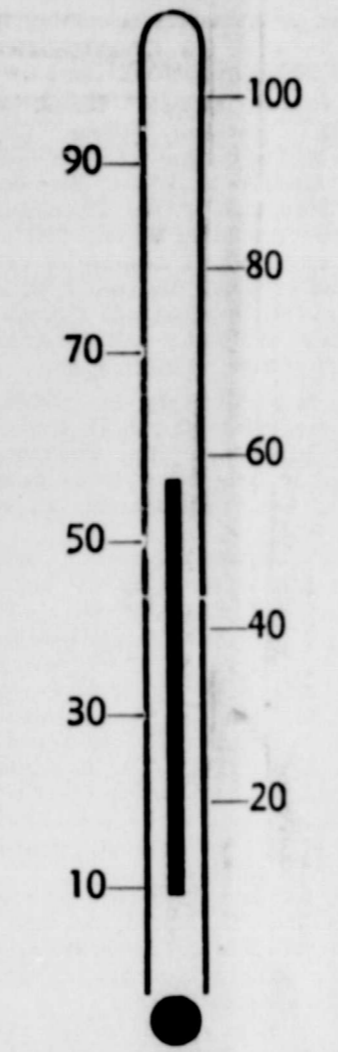

Dairy Short Course Slated For Hico March 9th thru 12th

A dairy short course for adult farmers will be held March 9th through 12th under the sponsorship of Hico High School agriculture department, according to O. C. Cook, superintendent, and Harold Walker, teacher of vocational agriculture.

Mr. Joe Hillin, Dairy Specialist with the Vocational Agriculture Division of the Texas Education Agency and the Department of Dairy Science at Texas A&M, will be instructor for the course. He is headquartered at Texas A&M.

Mr. Hillin holds a B.S. degree in Dairy Husbandry and an M.S. in Dairy Science. He has served as a teaching assistant in Dairy and with the Agricultural Extension Service in the Dairy Program. His primary responsibility in the Extension Service was with production testing and dairy herd management.

"Many dairy short courses in various parts of the state have been taught by Mr. Hillin and all have met with outstanding success," according to J. E. Payne, Area Supervisor of Vocational Agriculture. Arrangements for adult

education short course in dairying and in other fields are made through Mr. Payne's office.

The short course here is scheduled to begin March 9 at 8 p.m. in the vocational agriculture building. Other meetings in the series will be held at the same time on March 10, 11 and 12. During the dates the course is in progress Mr. Hillin will be available to assist dairymen with individual problems and to provide on-the-farm instruction according to Mr. Walker.

Dairymen interested in attending the short course should contact Supt. Cook or Mr. Walker. An entry fee of \$2 will be charged. Dairy Short Course Certificates will be presented to each dairymen who attends all the training sessions.

Mr. Hillin said that the short course would be adjusted to wishes and interests of dairymen enrolled but that he expects to cover such subjects as developing a good dairy herd, raising cows and heifers, feeding for milk production, making and feeding silage, methods of using milking machines, general management problems, and dairy equipment.

On the Home Range

I visited Mrs. George Harris in the Blue Ridge community Friday to make plans for her landscape demonstration. The Harris' have already done a lot of work on the property in the little over a year they have been there. They have planted 20 trees, including fruit, willow, tulip, goldenrain tree, and non-fruiting mulberry. They have planted althea, crapemyrtle and pink spirea shrubs. A retaining wall of natural rock has been started and Mrs. Harris has terraced the sloping yard with rock and she will plant succulents and other plants that will look well in this rock garden type setting. A 17x25 foot pavement of rock has been laid in the back living area. Many of the rocks, all secured from the local area, have fossils and other marks of interest. The Harris' have planned to add more shrubs that are evergreen. The ones already mentioned that they have planted are all lovely, but are also all deciduous. Therefore plans are to include more of the evergreen shrubs in their landscape.

IT'S THE LAW

Points to Ponder When Building a New Home

When you are ready to build, you will find that the law helps in many ways to make your home enjoyable and secure.

Have you decided on the type house you want and the amount you want to spend? If so, then let's go into details!

1. Your lot: Junior's school or your church may be nearby, but find out:

(a) Whether they are planning to run a highway through the area or nearby, or make any improvement for which you can be assessed.

(b) What "Covenants" or restrictions run with the land? To protect residents, the plats or basic deeds of some neighborhoods call on you to build a certain size or type house. Do you want to and can you afford to?

(c) Easements. Either you or your neighbors may need to run other's land or to share a drive-pipes, or string wires over each way. Have the abstract checked carefully to disclose any easements.

2. Zoning Ordinances: For your protection the local government frequently zones some areas, for example, for single houses only, for multiple dwellings; for retail stores, for manufacturing, etc.

Unless the local governing body changes its zoning ordinances, no filling station, for instance, can go up next to you in a residential area. Neither could you turn your home into a store. In any case, you should find out what your neighborhood zoning rules are.

3. Building Codes: Be certain the plans and construction will meet the requirements of the local building code as to size, location and structure. Municipal ordin-

ances usually impose strict standards for the building, the plumbing and the electrical wiring. In many cases only licensed building tradesmen are permitted to make the installations.

4. Financing: Financing contracts protect both you and the lender. Unless you pay cash, you will use credit to pay for your house, most likely a deed of trust or a land contract. Your install-

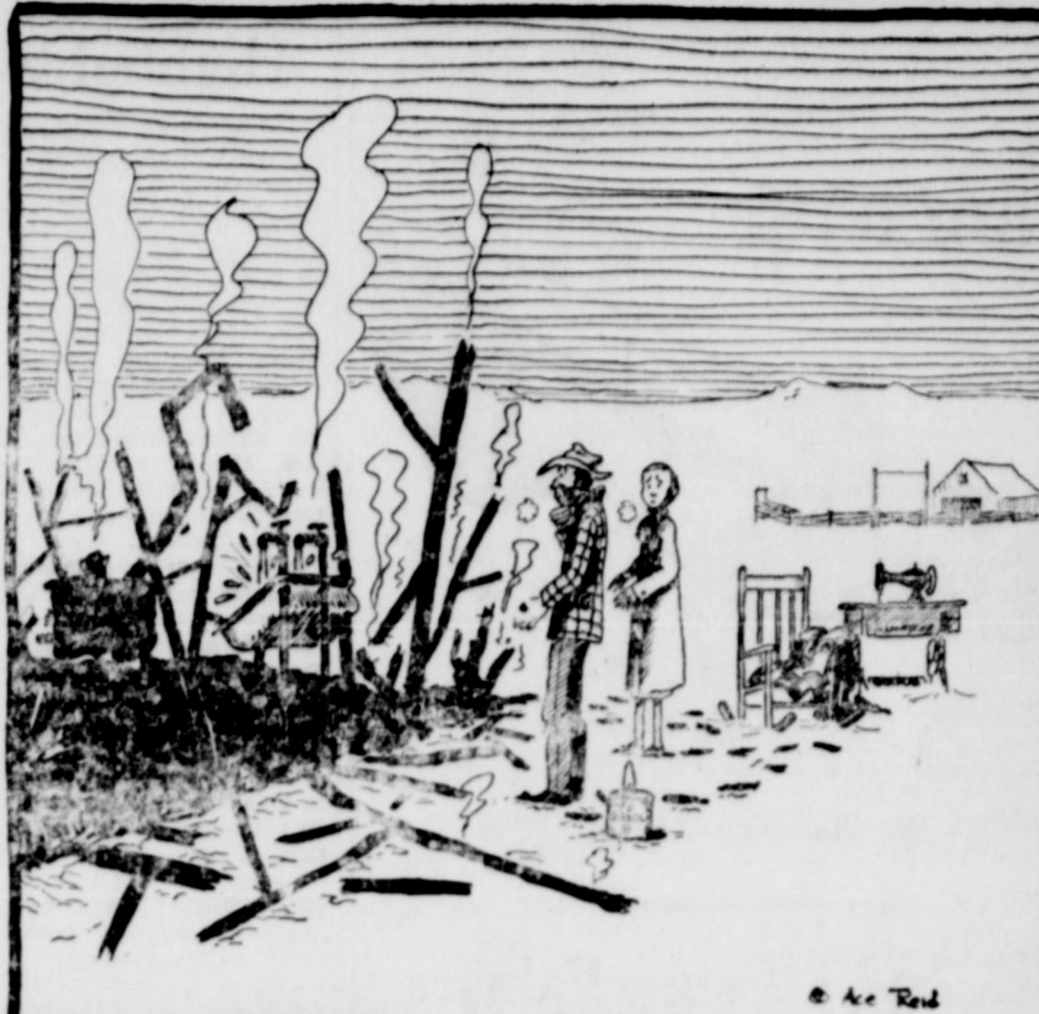
ments often include principal, interest, insurance and taxes. Under a land contract the lender holds title to your house until you pay for it. If you fall behind, the holder can take the house back. With a deed of trust, the lender has a lien which he can foreclose if you default. You may get some of your money back on the principal; but you may also have to make up any loss the lender makes in reselling the house.

Well worked-out contracts can help make your dream house come true. A construction contract or a so-called "earnest-money" agreement or receipt is no job for an amateur. Too many legal details are involved. Your lawyer is trained by education and experience to protect your best interests in contracting and closing real estate deals.

You know what you want. You should be careful to get what you want through careful planning and a properly prepared and executed contract.

THIS WEEK IN AUSTIN—

Highlights and Sidelights

It used to be the dogwood blooms which set off politics in Texas. But the Legislature changed that when it moved primaries to May and June.

So, Texas candidates are losing no time in getting down to rough-house campaigning.

Gov. John Connally and his rival for the Democratic nomination, Don Yarborough, spoke to the AFL-CIO Committee on Political Education, but neither asked for endorsement.

Labor made no endorsements in races for state offices. Instead, it centered its interest on Washington. It gave strong support to President Lyndon Johnson and Senator Ralph Yarborough and to the re-election of Texas Congressmen who support the Johnson program. It urged union members to help defeat Congressmen who do not support the LBJ administration.

Republican candidate for U. S. Senate George Bush complained that COPE failed to invite Republicans to its meeting.

John Van Cronkhite of Dallas announced his withdrawal from the Senate race after what he called "unbelievable pressure". But Gordon McLendon, conservative Democrat, said he was in the race "as solid as a grand piano set in concrete."

Former District Attorney Dan Sullivan of Andrews provided the upset of the session. COPE leaders recommended that the group support former Sen. Robert W. Baker of Houston for the statewide Congressional seat now held by Rep. Joe Pool. Sullivan made a speech that sold many delegates, and when it came to a showdown, the roll call vote was 139-139. As a result, COPE endorsed no one for the place.

Petticoat Politicians

A look at the roster of Democratic candidates for the legislature shows 404 contestants for 150 seats in the House of Representatives, with 13 of these women. And three women are among the 83 House candidates on the Republican side of the ledger.

Two of the 16 female candidates are incumbents — Miss Maud Isaacks of El Paso and Mrs. Myra Banfield of Rosenberg. Texas also boasts a woman state senator, Mrs. Nevelle Colson of Navasota. She is a veteran with 24 years' service in the House and Senate. However, Senator Colson drew a four-term last year and is not up for re-election.

History shows that women have had scant success in state elections. One notable exception is the late Miriam A. Ferguson, governor of the state from 1925 to 1927, and from 1933 to 1935.

Whether their luck will be better in legislative races in 1964—

a leap year—remains to be seen. It may be significant to note that as of January 1964, the number of Texas women aged 21 and over was estimated to be a little more than 3,000,000, while their male counterparts were estimated to number less than 3,000,000.

Free Voter Registration Continues
Registration of voters who want to qualify for free votes in federal elections will continue through March. County tax collectors are issuing the free receipts which may be obtained by direct personal or mail application.

Holders of the free registrations cannot vote in state or local races, in constitutional amendment or bond elections—only for president, vice president, U. S. Senator, U. S. representative and congressman-at-large.

State attorneys emphasize, however, that the free registration receipts are good for primary elections, the November general election and any special election involving federal offices during the coming year. In other words, those who have them can vote in their party primary for senator, congressman and congressman-at-large or in any special election for these offices, as well as the general election.

Voters over 60 in cities of 10,000 or more population who did not get their poll tax exemptions before the January 31 deadline cannot qualify for special registration. Over-age voters in smaller cities need no certificate of any kind.

Record Vote Predicted

Although the official compilation of poll tax payments and exemption certificates is not due from State Comptroller Robert Calvert until the first of April, many county tax collectors have stated they expect the number of qualified voters to exceed 1963's 2,594,000.

This prediction does not take into account registrations of those voters who cast ballots in federal races only.

Business Improves

The 1963 index of Texas business activity was up 5.4 percent on the
