## B. A. Gleason Top District Conservationist

Benn A. Gleason, a district co-operator with the Hamilton-Coryell Soil Conservation District, has been selected as the Outstanding Soil and Water Conservation Farmer in the district for the past year. Mr. Gleason's farm is located about 21 miles northeast of Hamilton and about 14 miles southeast of Hico. It contains a total of 796 acres. Two-hundred and fifty-four acres is cropland and 536 is rangeland. There are six acres in the farmstead. Mr. Gleason has lived in Hamilton County all his 48 years except four years that he spent to get a

degree in Dairy Husbandry at Texas A&M University, four years in the army during World War II, and a short time working for the Farmers Home Administration and a dairy herd improvement association.

Benn is married and has two daughters and one son. One daughter is a graduate of Texas Women's University at Denton and the other is enrolled at East Texas State Teachers College at Commerce. The one son is still at home and has won a number of livestock awards in FFA work. Mrs. Gleason is a fulltime housewife and part-time teacher in the school Home Economics Department at Fairy. She has a good knowledge of the things a housewife must do to make ends meet on a farm or ranch now days. The Gleasons produce a considerable portion of their food at home such as beef from their own herd and vegetables from the garden.



Mr. Gleason has been a co-operator with the Hamilton-Coryell Soil Conservation District since 1947 and his farm plan was revised in July 1963 to add about 227 acres to the original farm. Since the additional land was added, the application of practices is not complete but will be established as time permits. Deferred grazing and range proper use are two important practices used on the rangeland and the good quality tall grasses found on this place indicate long range, good soil and water practices were started years ago. Gleason has most of the land terraced and contour farming is carried out parallel with terraces. A conservation cropping system is used that will gradually increase the soil fertility. This is accomplished by returning crop residue to the soil and applying fertilizer. Gleason has a livestock operation and plants all his cropland to grazing and hay crops. As a result of his good management practices practically no feed or cns was purchased during the dry cold weather of the past winter.

In addition to being an outstanding farmer and livestock operator Gleason takes an active part in civic affairs of the Fairy community where he lives. He is a member of the Baptist Church and has served as its Sunday School Superintendent. Also, he has served as the Baptist Association Sunday School Superintendent.

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



## Bequeath to Baptist Missions Lures Dawson Back Into Fold

The following item appeared in the afternoon edition of the Star-Telegram Feb. 14, 1964. Here is the story:

Haskell, Feb. 14 (Sp)—Mr. and Mrs. R. C. Couch Sr., Haskell couple long active in the work of the First Baptist Church here, are bequeathing \$100,000 to various

mission causes at home and abroad. Rev. Ray Nobles, pastor, revealed. Rev. Mr. Nobles said Mr. and Mrs. Couch told him of their plans for the bequest in a recent interview.

Couch and his first wife, Ada, who died in the late 1940's, began the \$100,000 gift program for missions in 1945 with a \$25,000 endowment, which has been completed.

During the last few years, Couch has become interested in western missions, Baptist mission churches in the Western States, and has included in his will \$25,000 for this mission field to be supervised through the Dallas office of the Southern Baptist Church.

Couch and his wife, Hassie, also will leave \$50,000 to the Round Rock Baptist Children's Home at Round Rock, they have informed the church.

The Haskell County pioneer, who taught school in several one-room schoolhouses in this area as a young man, is a retired banker of Weinert and Haskell, cattleman and farmer.

Under Couch's leadership, two mission churches, the South Side and Calvary Baptist missions in Haskell, were established.

I was pastor of Mr. Couch in

1909 and 1910 at Munday, Texas where Mr. Couch was postmaster in that thriving Knox County town. And the two of us, almost twins in the matter of age, have been intimate friends ever since. It was with much elation that I read the story on the day it appeared in the paper, because the causes which Mr. Couch and his wife are making their bequests are such worthy objectives—missions and orphanage.

In addition to the relation that I have to the matter is an additional interesting item, namely The Round Rock Orphan Home is of interest to Editor Meador. His wife's aunt and her husband are connected with the Orphanage as supervisors of a group of children and have been for some years. They are Mr. and Mrs. M. Coalsen Sr.

Mr. Couch was born in Coleman County, on the Jim Ned River and all his life and labors have been given to the state and its welfare. Think of it: school teacher, postmaster, banker, farmer and rancher. And splendid success has been his, as this magnificent gift demonstrates.

His first wife, who died during the 1940's, was a magnificent person and mothered three very excellent children. His present wife is a vivacious soul, vitally interested in numerous worthy activities. We say Heaven bless such devoted and liberal citizens.

### 'Kite-Flying' Season Brings Warning From Local CPS Manager

"One of the most important rules," Mr. Davis declared, "is never fly kites where there is a possibility of their getting tangled in electric power lines."

Other don'ts include: don't use metallic cord or wire for kite string; don't use metal in frame of kite; don't pull on string or climb a power pole to loosen a kite snagged in electric wires; and don't fly a kite over television antennas.

To help publicize the safety rules that are so all-important to kite-flying, Community Public has provided safety rule posters for school bulletin boards.


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

The 1964 cotton insect guides are now available in my office. These guides give detailed information on the kinds and amounts of insecticides to use on each kind of cotton insect. There are very few changes in the new guides. The most noticeable change is the addition of Bidrin to the list of insecticides that will control thrips. Bidrin is a systemic insecticide. Only two or three ounces per acre are required to control thrips for about ten days.

## Dairy Short Course Slated For Hico March 9th thru 12th

A dairy short course for adult farmers will be held March 9th through 12th under the sponsorship of Hico High School agriculture department, according to O. C. Cook, superintendent, and Harold Walker, teacher of vocational agriculture.

Mr. Joe Hillin, Dairy Specialist with the Vocational Agriculture Division of the Texas Education Agency and the Department of Dairy Science at Texas A&M, will be instructor for the course. He is headquartered at Texas A&M.

Mr. Hillin holds a B.S. degree in Dairy Husbandry and an M.S. in Dairy Science. He has served as a teaching assistant in Dairy and with the Agricultural Extension Service in the Dairy Program. His primary responsibility in the Extension Service was with production testing and dairy herd management.

"Many dairy short courses in various parts of the state have been taught by Mr. Hillin and all have met with outstanding success," according to J. B. Payne, Area Supervisor of Vocational Agriculture. Arrangements for adult education short course in dairying and in other fields are made through Mr. Payne's office.

The short course here is scheduled to begin March 9 at 8 p.m. in the vocational agriculture building. Other meetings in the series will be held at the same time on March 10, 11 and 12. During the dates the course is in progress Mr. Hillin will be available to assist

dairymen with individual problems and to provide on-the-farm instruction according to Mr. Walker. Dairymen interested in attending the short course should contact Supt. Cook or Mr. Walker. An entry fee of \$2 will be charged. Dairy Short Course Certificates will be presented to each dairymen who attends all the training sessions.

Mr. Hillin said that the short course would be adjusted to wishes and interests of dairymen enrolled but that he expects to cover such subjects as developing a good dairy herd, raising cows and heifers, feeding for milk production, making and feeding silage, methods of using milking machines, general management problems and dairy equipment.



### Memories Renewed . . .

I went to Tarleton College a few days ago where I contemplated taking a "bone-head" course. I went to school there some 60 years ago. At that remote time there was one wooden building which was heated by a series of wood stoves which we boys fed cord wood into and "toted" out ashes by the tubfuls. So, you must see, our literary regimen was plentifully supplemented by gymnastics. We thought that Zanzibar was a sandbar down on the river where the tomcats went to settle their differences and that a sorority was a place where co-eds go to end their troubles. We were wrong. The sorority is where they go to plan more troubles. On the other hand Zanzibar is where the gents should go to sleep their troubles off.

At that time if a kid wanted to read up on a certain subject he or she asked the garbage man what book to read or better still, he would go down town and consult the shoe shine boy. Discipline was based on freedom. You was free to behave yourself or pack up your rags and seek the great wide open spaces of the vast hinterlands. The profs were quite free to elaborate on matters concerning our conduct.

As you see, freedom was said to be something great at Tarleton at that time. Some of us birds of the rank and file were of the opinion that it was something else, however, we didn't spread our opinions around too much.

We find that Tarleton is something super-great now. There are many two to four story brick or concrete buildings which house dormitories, dining halls, reading rooms, class rooms, which include science and art, gymnasiums, and what have you. Also there is a campus with concrete passways, concrete sidewalks, bordered by grassed lawns and shade trees galore, where gentle squirrels perch on limbs and peer at you out of the corners of their eyes while they nibble pecans. Seemingly the old time rah-rah is gone. When you pass a boy or girl on the campus, he or she is as silent and unconcerned as a page of the prehistoric past and even more hard to understand. They are seemingly so weighted down with knowledge that it hurts them to carry it around. (A handicap that we of the old age didn't have.) The librarians know Einstein and Tarleton lore by heart and presumably now all is harmony, and whatever else that it takes to make this a better place in which to pass the time away, is in progress at Tarleton now.

"Who are you?" you ask. It doesn't matter too much who I am now. I was a young sprout who went to Tarleton back in the antediluvian days when Tarleton (figuratively) wore diapers. My whiskers at that time could have reminded you of the fuzz on a volunteer cucumber and my store of knowledge almost equalled something less than minus nothing. My whiskers have matured, mellowed, and changed to the colors of the eternal frosts of the remote northlands, and according to some sources of information, my store of knowledge has grown in reverse to the passing of the school of experiences. Mostly down around the stock pens among cows, sheep, goats, and hogs. I found that all these are dangerous especially the hogs (more especially the two legged hogs) all of whom are not in the stock pens. As a consequence of my experiences and of my good will toward Tarleton and Tarletonites, I want to sound some notes of warning to the Tarletonites of today. Learn the ways of the two-legged hog while you are in school—if you wait to learn by experience, possibly, you could be hurt
