The First Progress Report Upper Bosque Watershed

The watershed protection program on the Bosque River had its beginning many years ago with the individual farmers and ranchers carrying out the needed conservation measures on their farms and ranches. Practices such as waterways, terraces, contour farming, cover crops, management of crop residues, pasture planting and management of ponds, brush control and seeding of grasses are the basic pre-requisite to the success of all watershed activities.

The structural program is to supplement the land treatment measures needed to reduce siltation and hold the water where it falls. The structural program was started by a small group of farmers and businessmen on September 24, 1954.

Much time and effort by many people has gone into the program to bring us to where we are now. We must work even harder to secure the necessary easements before construction can be started.

The project, involving over \$8,136,000 is a tremendous boost to our area—not only to agriculture but to all phases of our economy. Recreation and irrigation offer excellent opportunities for development. The eight million dollars is broken down into about four million for cost of construction which will be paid for by

the federal government, and about four million as the local people's share.

The cost of applying needed conservation measures on the land within the watershed makes up the majority of the local people's share of the program cost. Local people must also provide all easements and rights-of-way, operate and maintain the structures, and let and administer construction contracts. Actual cash needed by local sponsors to complete the 28 structures in the planned five year

construction period will be a small amount.

Each dollar spent for the program is returning \$1.40 in benefits. The program as planned with the 28 flood water retarding structures and the land treatment programs, will give a 72 percent reduction over what flood losses and damages would be without the program. Many people, both in the towns and the country, will benefit directly from the program, but all people in this entire area will benefit indirectly.

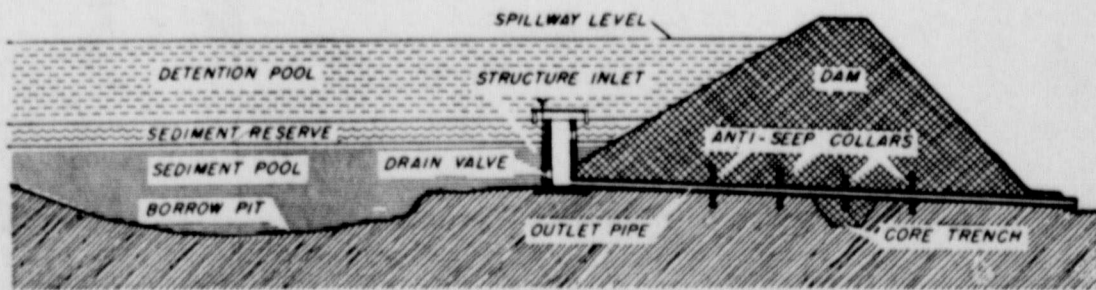

All of the needed easements have been granted by the landowners involved on the following sites (see map): 5, 12, 13, 17, 18, 19, 20, 21, 22, 23, 24, 25 and twenty-six. Sixty percent of all easements needed have been donated by the landowners concerned to this time. Owners providing easements retain full ownership of their land and receive many benefits under the program.

(ED NOTE: Feeling that the Upper Bosque River Watershed Program is of such great importance to each and every citizen in this area, the entire front page of this issue is being devoted to the program so that readers may have a better understanding of how and why the project is being carried out. Other information will be presented from week to week as further planning is

completed. Only delay in actual start of construction is the securing of additional landowner easements. The News Review is indebted to Marion Porter, work unit conservationist of the Bosque Soil Conservation District for his work in preparing the map and information on this page. The map shows location of the 28 sites that have been approved for construction.)

28 flood water retarding structures will be constructed in the watershed. Fourteen are located above Stephenville and 14 between Stephenville and Hico. Each structure is designed to detain the runoff from a 25 to 100 year frequency

rain that would fall in the watershed above the structures before the emergency spillway will function. While the program is designed primarily for flood prevention, experience in other watersheds has shown that the reservoirs

have considerable value in themselves. Water is available for livestock, recreation and irrigation if all state water laws governing the use of the water are complied with.

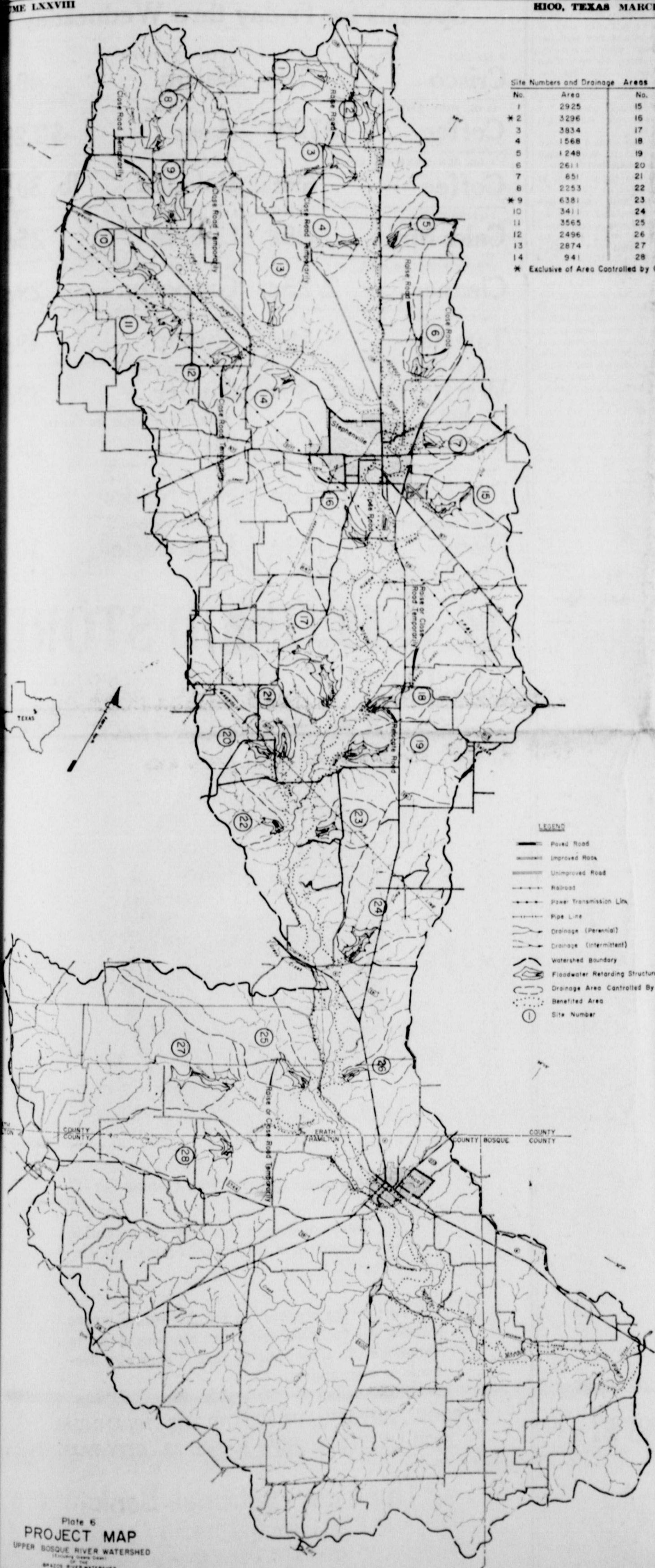

As One Becomes Older Many Past Events Recur to Him

As a person grows older, a lot of events of life recur to him. It is like opening a picture album at which one has not looked for de-

cadences. He sees faces and remembers events he had not thought of for many a year and off-hand he might have said "No such persons or events had ever happened."

Then he looks at the old album again and is a bit surprised at the mental pictures that come to him.

Well, now that I am approaching the mid-eighties, a lot of those mental pictures come to the fore and I am surprised at what shows up. And I get many a chuckle as I view the event that recurs. And a lot of one's failures and faults may parade before him, too, and make him feel very humble indeed.

On a recent night one of those long-forgotten events showed up. This is the story of it.

It was more than 50 years ago that I was pastor at Munday. We had three children. There was no dairy in the town and there was no such thing in those days as canned milk. And a home without milk with children in it has a serious problem. Some of our members became aware of the situation and started a movement to get us a cow. The scheme succeeded and one day a fellow showed up leading a rather small cow and said to us that it was ours. We were much elated and the children at once began to consume the commodity in quantities to make up for their abstinence from that very desirable fluid.

Then one of the deacons remarked to me that I ought to also have a pig, or a shoat, to eat our table scraps. So I began to look out for a small hog and soon found one at a very reasonable figure, though the critter was not very appealing to my eyes. The whole

family rejoiced with me that we then had milk and when winter came we would have hog meat.

I did the milking for wife had never milked in all her life, and for that matter neither had I. But I soon mastered the art and felt rather proud of my accomplishment.

But one morning I started to milk and lo and behold, the lady kine had no milk. And just her teats were wet. She had sucked herself. When I was growing up father had a young cow that gave great milk, but she took to sucking herself and dad sold her to a catman who turned her over to the range. So now when our Nellie had no milk, but had wet udders there was but one normal conclusion—she had consumed her milk, presumably because the pressure of her milk in her udders pained her.

Wife asked me what I was going to do about it. We decided that since the critter had been given to us by the church folk, to sell her would not be right. I decided I would milk earlier and we would say nothing about the gift cow's bad habit.

So the next morning I got up earlier than usual and hurried to the lot to milk Nellie before she decided to ease the pain she felt in her milk bag. Out I went and there stood Nellie chewing her cud in seemingly contentment. It was in the dawn twilight. I looked for my porker, heard him grunting contentedly, and strange to say he was underneath Nellie, with his head uplifted to Nellie's udders. He paid no attention to me but continued his breakfast on Nellie's milk.

So Nellie was not the guilty one robbing us of our milk supply, but Buster, the pig, was the sinner. I sold the pig to the butcher that day, and for less than he had cost me.

Claude Hoffman, Range Conservationist with the SCS at Hamilton assisted Allen with his plan.

A. G. Kirk and Paul Schwalbe cooperators with the Hamilton-Coryell SCD, purchased a farm

about 7 miles northeast of Jonesboro. Schwalbe operates the farm and has recently completed a soil and water conservation plan on another 463 acres. He also has a farm plan on other land and is an experienced conservation farmer.

Schwalbe has planted 30 acres of native grass on his new farm and has just finished building about two miles of goat fence. He has a brush problem in his pastures and is planning to go the underbrush about two years before bulldozing the larger trees. In the meantime he will destroy cedar with ax and bulldozer.

J. C. Kenney, Lanham, has completed springing two five-acre waterways to Coastal bermuda.

These two waterways were shaped last fall, seeded prepared and planted to bermudagrass. Both waterways were fertilized.

Jim Davis, 3 miles west of Fairy is seeding range grasses on 50 acres of cropland. His plan for the next three years is to convert all cropland to range and pasture grasses.

Raymond Cunningham, 1 mile

east of Fairy, deferred 200 acres of rangeland last summer and is planning to defer about the same amount this summer.

He also plans to sprig a waterway and about 20 acres of crop-

land to Coastal bermudagrass. These practices are a part of his ranch plan.
