

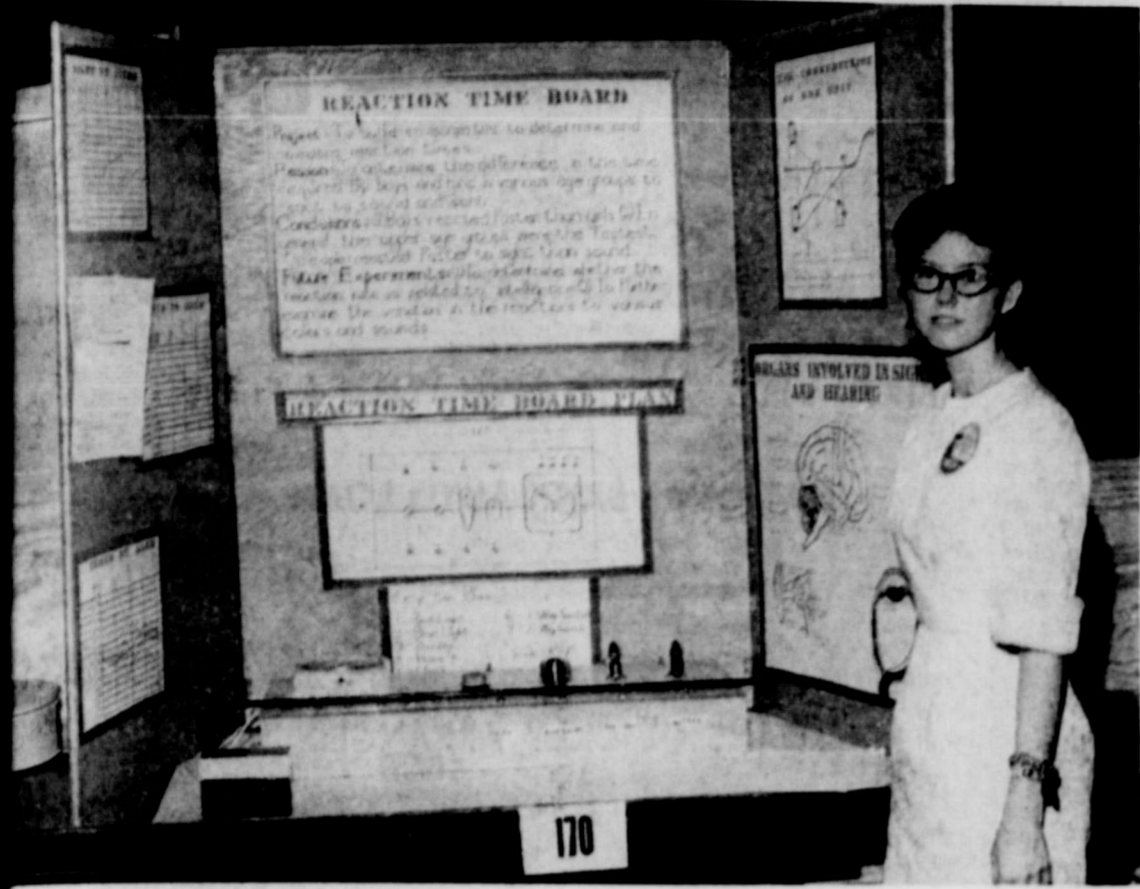

Burleson Issues Statement for Re-Election to Congress

Omar Burleson, veteran Congressman from the 17th District, is conducting a vigorous, active campaign for the Democratic Primary nomination for reelection.

In seeking reelection, Burleson states he is basing his campaign on his record of nearly 18 years service in Congress.

"In that time, I have never been a rubber-stamp, but have fulfilled my responsibility to vote on each issue for the best interest of my Country, my State, and my District," Burleson said.

"I do not think the people of the 17th District want or deserve anything less."

Burleson, at 58, is already one of the senior members of the U.S. House of Representatives in point of service.

His seniority has carried him to the Chairmanship of the potent House Administration Committee, and to the third ranking position on the powerful House Foreign Affairs Committee. In addition Burleson serves on two important Joint Committees formed from senior members of the House and Senate, as Chairman of one and Vice Chairman of the other.

"In all my years in Congress," Burleson said, "I have followed two guiding principles: First to know the views of my constituents and reflect their sentiments to the greatest degree possible in my actions as their Representative. Second, to inform and advise as closely as I can on those issues which affect my District, my State, and the Nation."

Burleson termed his approach to government as one of "common sense," gained through his years of public service.

A former Special Agent for the Federal Bureau of Investigation, Burleson is former County Attorney and County Judge of Jones County, and served three years during World War 2 with the Navy in the Pacific.

As a leader in Congress, Burleson has consistently urged the return to a sounder fiscal policy, and the cutting of unnecessary and extravagant federal spending.

"I have tried to see that your tax money is spent as wisely, and as frugally, as you would have spent it had you been in my place," Burleson said. "The record will definitely show that on many occasions I have found in the minority—especially on needless spending of the taxpayers' money. I am proud that I have never failed

Ray Cheek, Charles Golightly Returned to School Board Positions By Large Margin

One of the best turn-outs in recent years voiced an opinion in the school trustee election held last Saturday, when Ray Cheek and Charles Golightly were re-elected to the board.

Two hundred and fourteen people voted in the election.

Voters here also approved J. B. Woodard as County Trustee from Precinct 3, and Lagree West of Hamilton as at-large member. Woodard received 204 votes, and West polled 198. They were unopposed. Four other names were written in for the at-large post.

Golightly led the ticket in the local race, receiving 136 votes. Cheek was next with 132. E. A. Black polled 79 votes, and Coolidge Wade received 74.

Other members of the Hico

board are M. I. Knudson, E. V. Meador, Chester Land, Bobby Needham and Ralph Turner.

Small Vote in City Election

Only 41 people cast ballots in Tuesday's City election, when Mayor D. E. Bulloch, and Aldermen Jim Jameson, G. M. Bullard and W. C. Howard were returned to their respective positions unopposed. All aldermen candidates received unanimous support, while Bulloch received 40 votes.

Final Rites Held Friday For Colorful Pioneer, J. C. Barrow

James Clay Barrow, former Hico mayor and Hamilton County Judge, died shortly before noon Wednesday of last week in Hico City Hospital. He was 81.

Funeral services were held Friday, April 3, at 3 p.m. in the Hico First Methodist Church. Rev. Bert Gillis, Rev. A. L. Cronk and Rev. R. E. Tatum officiated, with burial in Hico Cemetery under the direction of Barrow-Rutledge Funeral Home.

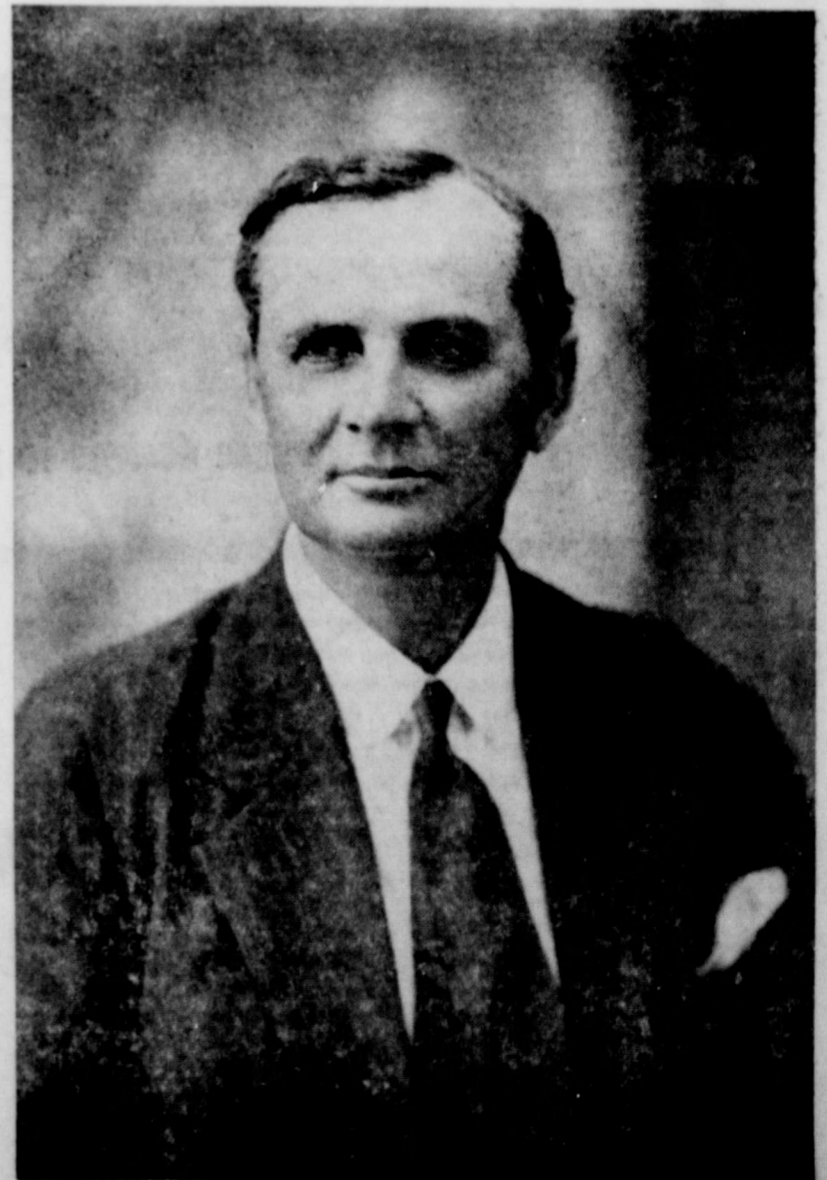
Judge Barrow was the last local descendant of one of the oldest families that settled in Hico. He was the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. D. G. Barrow. Born August 30, 1882 in Notasulga, Alabama, he came to Hico with his parents at the age of nine. He attended public school here and was a member of one of the first graduating classes of Hico Public School. He joined the Methodist Church at an early age and attended and served the church his entire life.

Judge Barrow was married to Miss Ethel Maude Barrow in Hico on August 11, 1901 by the Rev. J. P. Gillis. Three children were born to this union, one daughter and two sons. His wife preceded him in death in 1958. Judge Barrow was a school teacher for many years. His first school was Hollis School House and then he moved to Clairette where he taught for several years. He later moved to Hico where he went to work for Smith-Harris Lumber Yard, later known as Clay Lumber Co. for many years or until his election as County Judge of Hamilton County.

Judge Barrow gave his life to ministry and was a local preacher in Hico Methodist Church during pastorates of Rev. R. W. Nations and W. C. Hilburn. He served the Old Hico and Greyville churches until they were consolidated with Hico. He served his church as Sunday School Superintendent 22 years and steward for many years. He also served in the capacity of Supt. of Church School and as a Steward and teacher of an adult class in Hamilton Methodist Church. He was a lay member of the Central Texas Conference for many years and took an active part in the conference sessions.

Judge Barrow served Hico as alderman many years, and then served as Mayor for 10 years. He was also a member of the fire department. He was traditionally called upon to act as master of ceremonies of the annual fire department banquet, and was always the person to give the welcome address for the annual Hico Reunion.

He served Hamilton County for six years as judge. After his judgeship he moved back to Hico and was associated with Barrow Fur-

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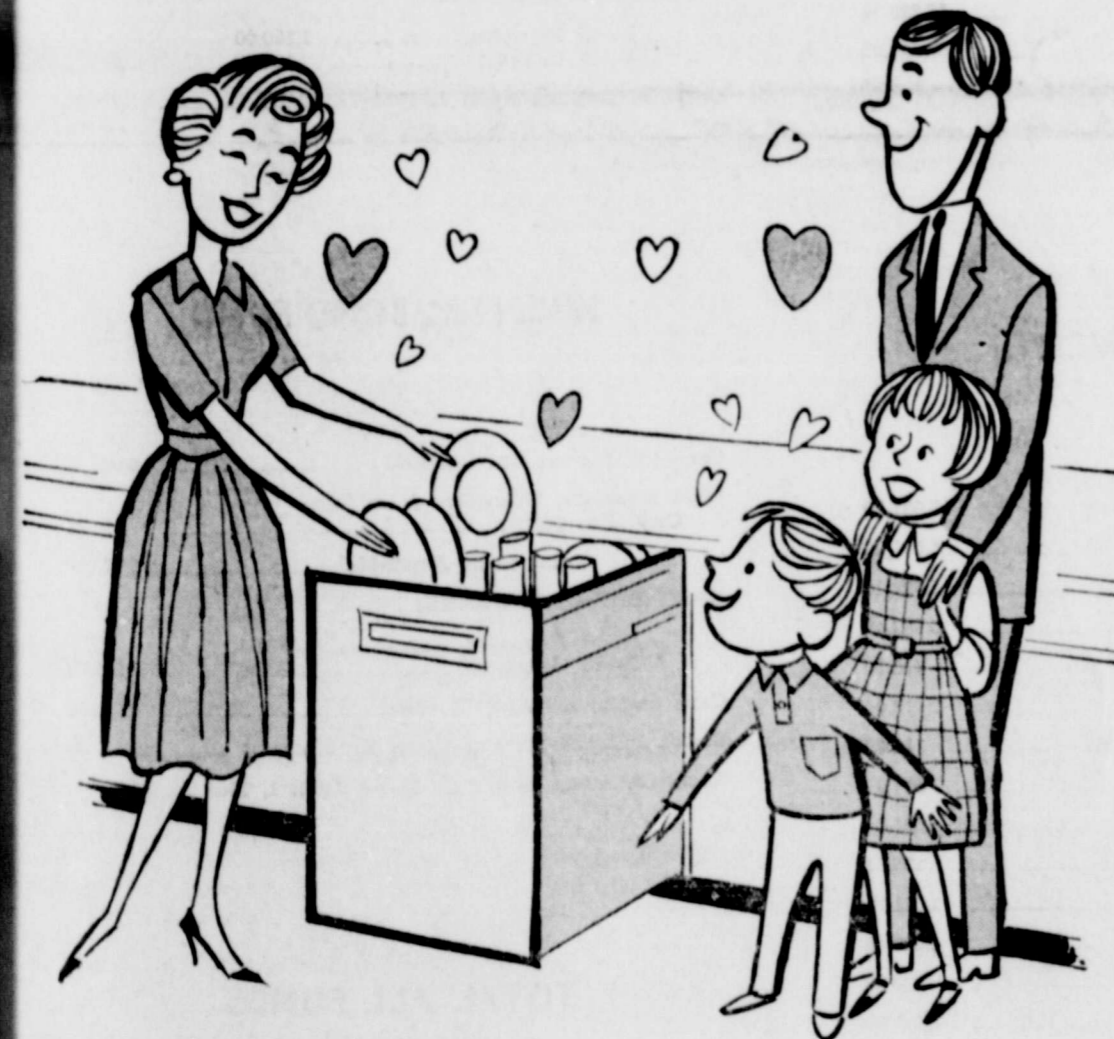

Fire Demonstration Set April 15th By Erath Farm Bureau

Citizens of Erath County and this area will have an opportunity to see for themselves how fire can be man's best friend or his worst enemy by observing a graphic fire demonstration to be presented at Erath Electric Coop building at 2 p.m. Wednesday, April 15. Mr. W. S. Davis, Erath County Home Demonstration Council Chairman, has extended an invitation to everyone to attend.

The demonstration, in seven parts, will be given under the direction of Joe Smetana, Safety Director of Texas Farm Bureau. A variety of demonstration equipment will be placed to illustrate seven basic points, as follows: 1. What fire is; 2. How to control fires; 3. The fact that nothing is fire proof; 4. Kitchen fires and their control; 5. Fuel vapors; 6. The power of petroleum products; and 7. Household wiring and overloaded electrical circuits.

Smetana will point out that fire is like a three-legged stool—it can't work with one of its legs missing. The legs fire depends on are: 1. fuel; 2. heat; and 3. air. Yet in American homes those three things come together in deadly and destructive combination every 57 seconds—an average of 1,500 home fires every day according to Smetana.

As part of a program for fire prevention, the Texas Farm Bureau Safety Department is presenting this demonstration before high schools and other groups of the state. The program is being brought to Stephenville under the sponsorship of Erath County Farm Bureau in cooperation with the safety committee of the Home Demonstration Council. The public is invited.

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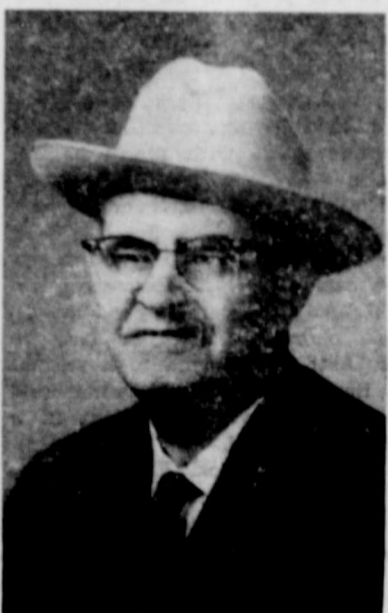

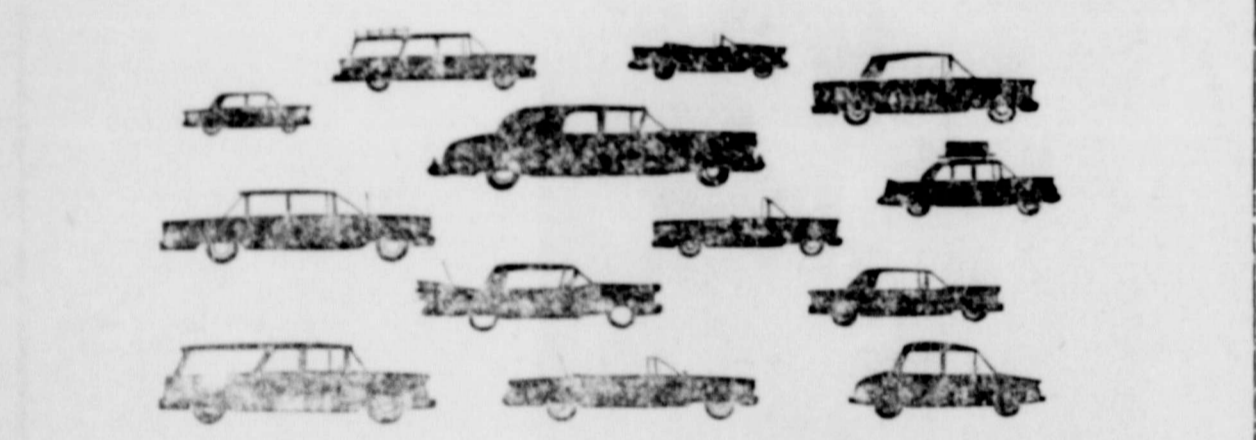

Mrs. Doyle Partain of Fort Worth, former Clairette resident, had surgery in the Hico Hospital Monday of this week. Two different services are offered in the forage analysis program. The producer can get a simple analysis giving only the protein content or a more elaborate analysis listing crude protein, crude fiber, and calculation of digestible protein, total digestible nutrients and net energy. A charge of \$2 is made for the simple analysis of hay and \$6 for the complex analysis of hay and pelleted or wafered forage sample. Silage analysis costs \$1 more for either test. With the complex analysis, balance-feeding recommendations will be provided if requested based on the livestock that will utilize the feed. Test will not be made on other types of feed such as grain or concentrates. I will soon have a supply of details on the Forage Testing Service including sample and mailing bags. Results of experiments in which lambs were weaned at nine weeks will be featured at the Sheep and Goat Field Day scheduled April 16 at the Livestock and Forage Research Center, McGregor. Most ranchers wean their lambs at six months. Though weaning at nine weeks is a radical departure from standard methods, results at McGregor indicate that many ranchers may find the practice profitable. Dr. Maurice Shelton, animal husbandman and geneticist at the Texas A&M University research station is conducting the early weaning tests. He says this method is particularly desirable for producers who are short of good pasture. Dr. Shelton advocates putting the lambs on the best pasture available and letting the ewes rough it on poorer, dry rages. He also found it much easier to manage the lambs by themselves than to manage both ewes and lambs together. Though the early weaning experiment will be a highlight of the field day, other experts will discuss wool marketing, the domestic and foreign mohair situation, and the problem of freeze losses in goats. The afternoon session will include a tour of the station and presentation of research results. Stockmen who attend the event should plan to arrive at the station between 9 and 9:45 to be on time for registration. A dutch treat barbecue will be served at noon and tours will be over by 3:30. COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

Anyone who has ever wanted to know how much grain and supplement to feed with hay or silage will be interested in a new service of the Agricultural Extension Service. This service is called the Texas A&M University Forage Testing Service, and was initiated so producers can find out the nutritive value and quality of forages they grow. Knowing this, they can supplement the feed to give the best level of beef and milk production for profits or can use it in connection with sales. The Forage Testing Service is somewhat like the more familiar Soil Testing Service. Like the soil test, you have to take a careful representative sample. As the soil suggests fertilizer applications best suited for the soil and crop the forage test will give guidelines for the most economical balanced feed.

Wheat

The farmer's share of the retail price of bread is less today than it was 10 years ago. In 1954 when the support price of the wheat to the farmer was at its highest—\$2.24 bu.—the retail price of a loaf of bread was 17.1 cents. The farmer's share of that loaf was 2.7 cents. In 1963, the price of wheat had dropped to about \$2.00 per bushel. The price of a loaf of bread had increased to 21.6 cents a loaf. The share of the farmer had declined to 2.5 cents a loaf.

Rates for 1963 Wool Program

The announced shorn wool payments for the 1963 marketing year to bring the average wool price of 48.5 per pound up to the previously announced incentive level of 62 cents per pound under the National Wool Act will amount to 27.8 percent of the dollars returns each producer received from the

sale of shorn wool during the period from April 1, 1963 through December 31, 1963. This will result in an incentive payment to producers of \$27.80 for every \$100 received from the sale of wool during the nine month year of the program. This compares to a payment of 30 percent per \$100 for the 1962 marketing year. The announced rate on unshorn lambs is 54 cents cwt., as compared to 57c in 1962. Hamilton County 1962 payment on unshorn lambs and wool was \$103,875.00. The 1963 incentive payment will be approximately \$70,000.00. The average price of wool sold by Hamilton County producers in 1962 was 48-1 cents lb. and in 1963 it was 47.3c per pound. No mohair payment will be made for the 1963 marketing year. The incentive payment for shorn wool and unshorn lambs will be made the week of April 6-10 by mail.

to exercise the right to vote and to do as I thought best." "At every session of Congress I have voted for expenditures below that recommended by the Executive Department, and far below that actually appropriated by the Congress, except in the field of National Defense," Burleson said.

"When it comes to the defense of this Country, I have always voted for those things calculated to make and to keep our Nation stronger than any other in the world," he said.

Burleson has been an implacable foe of the constant encroachment of the Federal Government into the area of State and local affairs.

"As the Federal Government has grown to its colossal proportions, the threat of centralized power in Washington has increased," Burleson pointed out. "To this, I am opposed, as my actions have proved."

"Big Government and high taxes are the result of many activities of the Federal Government which should be reserved to the States. Big government with its far-flung

operations has created needless waste and extravagance." Burleson stated he was proud of the "trust and the confidence placed in me by the people who elected me to Congress—and to whom that trust in any respect would be unthinkable."

He urged residents of the District not familiar with his background of service to investigate the record he has made. "And if you believe I have been faithful to duty and worthy of your continued support, then your active participation in my campaign will be greatly appreciated."

Well-known throughout Texas, Burleson is a native of the District. He was born and raised on a farm between Anson and Stamford in Jones County. He attended rural school, and graduated from Anson High School, following graduation Burleson attended Abilene Christian College, Hardin-Simmons University, and graduated from Cumberland Law School. Later, he studied for graduate law at the University of Texas.

Burleson married Ruth Weese, daughter of Reverend D. DeWeese, who pastored Baptist Churches in West and Texas.
