Republican Primary Will Be Held In Hamilton County

Saturday, May 2, will mark the beginning of a true two-party voting system for electing public officials in Hamilton County.

C. C. Baker of Hamilton County Republican Chairman, said this week that a Republican Primary would be held the same day as the regular Democratic Primary in Hamilton County.

Mr. Baker has appointed J. V. New of Hico as precinct chairman, and Mr. New will hold the election at a place to be determined later.

The ballot will contain the

names of all Republican candidates for office. Only race of direct prominence to local people is that of Congressman from the 17th District of Texas, where two candidates are vying for the Republican nomination. Names of all candidates for statewide and national offices will also be printed on the ballot.

Mr. New said that two boxes would be located in the county, one at Hamilton and the local box. Only residents of precinct 3 will be eligible to vote in the election here.

Theme for the popular attraction is "Here in Hico--Where Everybody is Somebody."

Co-Chairmen of the show this year are Mrs. V. H. Jenkins and Mrs. H. W. Sherrard, who released the following rules which will apply:

1. Entries for the show will be accepted from 8 a.m. to 10:30 a.m.
2. Each member must make at least two and not more than five entries in artistic divisions, and only one entry to the class. No limit in horticultural division but only one entry to a class variety.
3. All fresh-cut plant material must be used in artistic classes No. 1, 3, 4 and six.
4. Bought flowers are permitted in arrangements, but preference shall be given by the judges to home grown flowers.
5. Potted plants must have been in owners possession at least three months.
6. The standard system of judging will be used.
7. Foliage or accessories are allowed in all artistic classes.
8. Only the flower show judges, flower show chairman, awards chairman, and clerks will be allowed in show during judging.
9. Judges will give all ribbons

and awards possible. More than one honorable mention may be given in a class.

Hico High School took first place and Hico Elementary School won second in Interscholastic League competition at Meridian last weekend.

Four schools participated in the district contests, and the local high school scored more points than the other three schools combined. Whitney, Meridian and Valley Mills were the other participants.

Hico scored a combined total of 145 points to win first place. Meridian scored 49 points, Whitney 39, and Valley Mills 25 points.

The elementary school scored a total of 54 points, with Whitney winning top honors with 84 points.

Competition began with science and ready writing Thursday night. Alma Burgan made 15 points for Hico with first place, in ready writing. Hico's science students brought home 20 points, with Elene Gannaway placing first for 15 points and Butch Knudson 3rd for another five points. Jerry Casey placed fourth in the science contest.

On Friday night, Hico's one-act play ranked second for 10 points. Saturday morning Hico students scored a total of 110 points, as given below:

INCOME TAX REDUCTION

During the Cuban affair OMAR BURLESON introduced a bill for a complete embargo on trade with that country. He voted against the sale of wheat to Russia, recognizing that it would encourage our allies to sell to Cuba which they have done in fact.

CIVIL RIGHTS

Because the present form of the Civil Rights bill contains provisions to limit the freedoms of all Americans, he voted against it. He is for the constitutional guarantees for all Americans regardless of status.

LIMITED OIL IMPORTS

In 1949 OMAR BURLESON introduced the first bill to limit oil imports, and then voted for the bill that gave the President of the United States power to limit or abolish oil imports.

REDUCE COMMITTEE BUDGETS

As chairman of the House Administration Committee, OMAR BURLESON has consistently reduced the spending of congressional committees. He reduced Adam Clayton Powell's committee spending budget by 50%.

FOREIGN AID

OMAR BURLESON has voted against foreign aid since the late 1940s. The recent reaction in Congress as to drastically reducing foreign aid and discussion about abolishing it proves him correct.

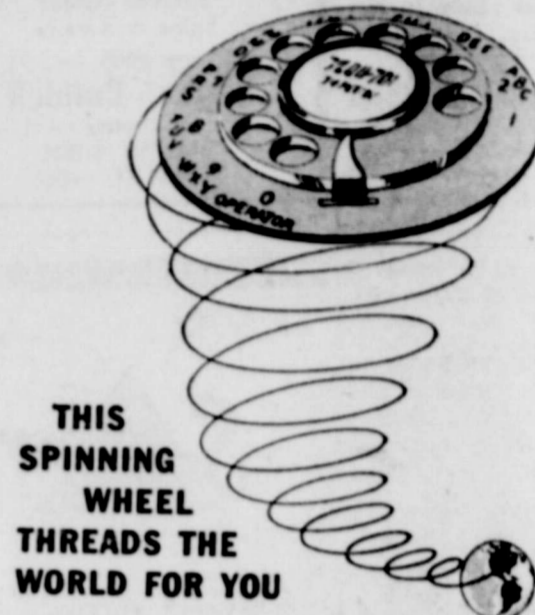
