Pick-Up Set April 29-30 In Current Clean-Up Campaign

Officials pointed out that there is always an accumulation of trash about premises. They urge everyone to cut weeds in ditches, gather up all old tin cans, empty trash barrels, and do anything else that will help the appearance of both the residential and business section.

The city dads are especially stressing the importance of cleaning up all old cans and any type container which might catch and hold stagnant water. Weeds and other vegetation should also be cleaned away.

Trash should be put in easily-moved containers to speed the pickup operation. All containers should be placed as near a curb as possible.

Individuals and all civic organizations are urged to help in making the annual program a success.

Garland Adair, Former Hico Publisher, Feted on Birthday

(Ed Note: The following story from the Austin American is being re-printed here in interest of local people who remember Garland Adair from the time when he was a resident here and was publisher of the News Review.)

Garland Adair is 75 years old Saturday, and his birthday represents the completion of more than half a century of service to Texas.

His health keeps him close to home these days, but his interests and enthusiasms remain as wide as the world.

On hand for the family birthday party will be all three of his and Mrs. Adair's children, and their children. From Waco will come Mr. and Mrs. John Garland Adair, and from Houston will come Mr. and Mrs. Reese Mattheu. Mr. and Mrs. Robert McLean live in Austin.

Adair has never been a clock watcher, nor a calendar watcher, but he has seen and reported many events of historical importance for more than 50 years.

Perhaps his monument is the Texas Memorial Museum, an institution which he served for years as curator of history. Indeed, it was Adair who raised the money for the construction of the museum, dedicated to the history of Texas.

Congress passed legislation authorizing the minting for the 1936 Texas Centennial 50-cent coins to be sold at a premium to help finance the museum.

This project conceived by Adair and sponsored by the American Legion, Department of Texas, netted \$151,000 for the museum. He also prepared legislation by which Austin was made an Exposition City, thereby becoming eligible to receive \$300,000 in federal aid.

As executive director of the Texas Heritage Foundation, Adair worked to bring public recognition

to persons of achievement who had an important part in Texas' history. Among these was the Hall of Remembrance, dedicated to the "heroes and heroines of Texas education."

Adair is author of many books about Texas history, including "Under Texas Skies."

Herschiel L. Hunt wrote this about Adair and it sums up Adair's 75 years: "Some men are scholars, some are gentlemen, and occasionally some can rightly wear the title of Scholar and Gentleman. A Garland Adair is such a man. He has dared to live his life without making concessions to those frailties to which most of us are prone."

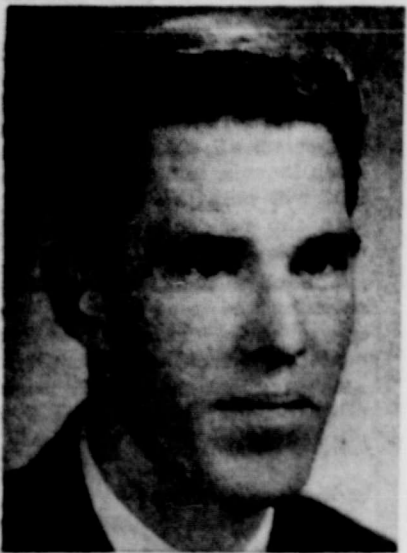

OMAR BURLESON

INCOME TAX REDUCTION

The income tax reduction bill that became effective in April of 1964 had the vote and support of OMAR BURLESON who has long felt that tax relief for the public was one of the most important issues before Congress.

LIMITED BEEF IMPORTS

FOREIGN AID

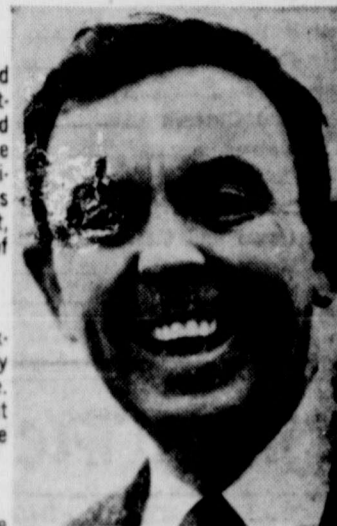

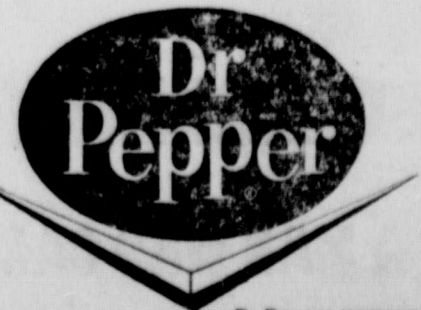

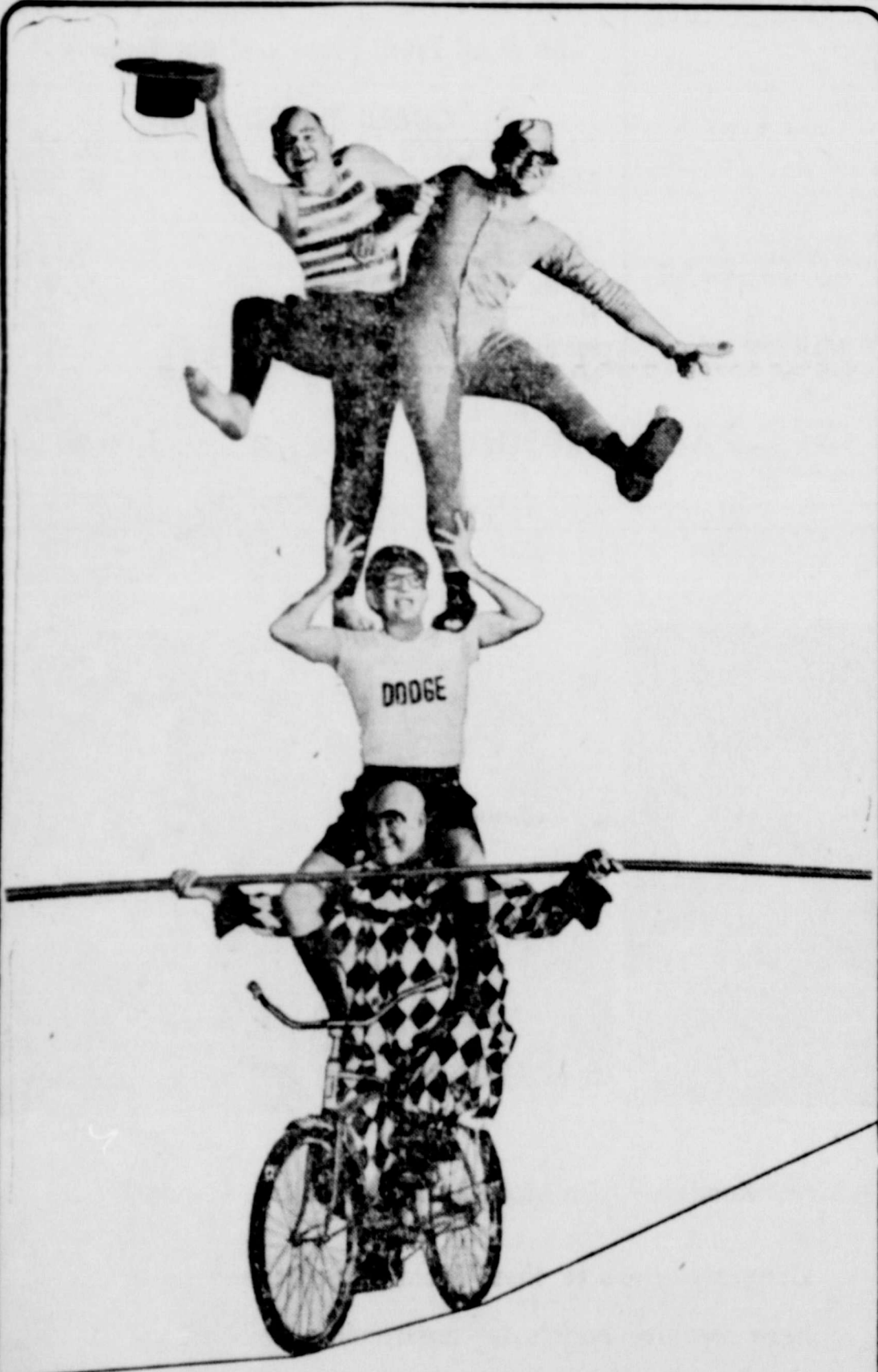

The Tent Caterpillars are much more noticeable now. Some of the earlier ones to emerge from the egg cases are one and a half inch long. Younger ones are only one-fourth to one-half inch long. After the caterpillars reach maturity they are more difficult to control. At this stage they crawl about in search of a suitable pupation place. The insecticides recommended to kill the caterpillars are DDT, Toxaphene, Sevin, Methoxychlor, Malathion, and Chlordane. It may take a stronger dosage to kill the larger worms than that recommended when the worms were small.

Now is the time to apply fertilizer to the lawn for an attractive yard this summer. I would suggest a fertilizer having both nitrogen and phosphate for this first application. Apply at the rate of two pounds of actual nitrogen per 1000 square feet. If 16-20-0 is used it will take 12-15 pounds per 1000 square feet.

During the growing season, apply nitrogen every eight to ten weeks at the rate of one to two pounds of nitrogen per 1000 square feet. The nitrogen is the key element in turf growth. It produces the deep green color. Phosphate helps produce a good root system.

If your lawn grass remains yellow after sufficient fertilizer and water has been applied you may have an iron deficiency. Iron may be applied in the form of iron sulfate as a dust at the rate of 10 pounds per 1000 square feet.

Many people prefer to apply the iron in a spray and get faster results. Iron sulfate (copperas) may be applied at the rate of 3 ounces in five gallons of water per 1000 square feet. Repeat applications will likely be necessary at four to six week intervals. Spray applications of iron sulfate should be made in late evening when the plant is actively growing.

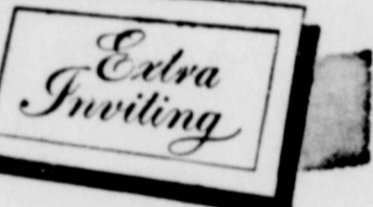
