Adair has never been a clock watcher, nor a calendar watcher, but he has seen and reported many events of historical importance for more than 50 years. Perhaps his monument is the

Texas Memorial Museum, an institution which he served for years as curator of history. Indeed, it was Adair who raised the money for the construction of the museum, dedicated to the history Congress passed legislation au-

thorizing the minting for the 1936 Texas Centennial 50-cent coins to be sold at a premium to help finance the museum. This project, conceived by

Adair and sponsored by the American Legion, Department of Texas, netted \$151,000 for the museum. He also prepared legislation by which Austin was made an Exposition City, thereby becoming eligible to receive \$300,000 in federal aid.

As executive director of the Texas Heritage Foundation, Adair worked to bring public recognition



RE-ELECT THE QUIET MAN WHO GETS THINGS DONE OMAR BURLESON INCOME TAX REDUCTION The income tax reduction bill that became effective in April

of 1964 had the vote and support of OMAR BURLESON who has long felt that tax relief for the public was one of the most important issues before Congress.

LIMITED BEEF IMPORTS

OMAR BURLESON introduced a bill in Congress to limit the imports of beef from foreign countries. With a 25% wholesale price decrease caused by foreign imports this bill would provide a broader market for the ranchers and cattlemen. Retail pices remain high.

REDUCE FEDERAL BUDGET

Long an advocate for lower federal spending, OMAR BURLE-SON, in his 18 years in Congress, has voted to reduce the federal budget from three to 13 BILLION dollars each of his nine Congressional terms. He has never voted to reduce defense expenditures.

CUBAN EMBARGO

During the Cuban affair OMAR BURLESON introduced a bill for a complete embargo on trade with that country. He voted against the sale of wheat to Russia, recognizing that it would encourage our allies to sell to Cuba which they have done in fact. CIVIL RIGHTS

Because the present form of the Civil Rights bill contains provisions to limit the freedoms of all Amerians, he voted against it. He is for the constitutional guarantees for all Americans regardless of status.

LIMITED OIL IMPORTS

In 1949 OMAR BURLESON introduced the first bill to limit oil imports, and then voted for the bill that gave the President of the United States power to limit or abolish oil imports.

REDUCE COMMITTEE BUDGETS

As chairman of the House Administration Committee, OMAR BURLESON has consistently reduced the spending of congressional committees. He reduced Adam Clayton Powell's committee spending budget by 50%.

FOREIGN AID







The Tent Caterpillars are much At this stage they crawl about in

The insecticides recommended to when the worms were small.

Now is the time to apply fertilizer to the lawn for an attractive yard this summer. I would suggest a fertilizer having both nitrogen and phosphate for this first application. Apply at the rate of two pounds of actual nitrogen per 1,000 square feet. It 16-20-0 is used it will take 12-15 pounds per 1000 square feet.

During the growing season, apply nitrogen every eight to ten weeks at the rate of one to two pounds of nitrogen per 1000 square feet. The nitrogen is the key element in turf growth. It produces the deep green color. Phosphate helps produce a good root

If your lawn grass remains yellow after sufficient fertilizer and water has been applied you may have an iron deficiency. Iron may be applid in the form of iron sulfate as a dust at the rate of 10 pounds per 1000 square feet.

Many people prefer to apply the iron in a spray and get faster resuits, Iron sulfate (copperas) may be applied at the rate of 3 ounces in five gallons of water per 1000 square feet. Repeat applications will likely be necessary at four to six week intervals. Spray applications of iron sulfate should be made in late evening when the plant is actively growing.
