FIRES STARTED BY RIOTERS ARE SPREADING IN EAST ST. LOUIS AFTER NIGHT MURDER AND HORROR

MOBS TODAY FIRE UPON NEGROES AS THEY FLEE CITY

MOB APPLIES TORCH TO NEGRO HOMES AND FIRE UPON THE FUGITIVES

WOMEN JOIN WITH MEN

Negroes of Both Sexes And All Ages Snot and Tipped By The Whites

East St. Louis, Ill., July 3.—Fires which were started by rioters in three negro quarters at noon were fanned by a high wind and spread rapidly, getting beyond control. A general fire alarm has been sounded, and all fire fighting apparatus in the city has been hurried to the scene.
Troops and police have hurried to the scene of the fires where crowds of rioters also were assembled. Five or six negro shacks were on fire and the flames were spreading rapidly.
Two fire companies came over from St. Louis, Mo., to help fight the flames which continued to spread.
The list of known dead was increased to 27 today when the bodies of three negroes were found. They were in all stages of dress and undress and carried all their worldly possessions, great rolls of money, a few dollars, hats and pants, a baby carriage with two pickaninnies. NEGRO PRISONERS IN CHICAGO BECOME OBSTREPEROUS

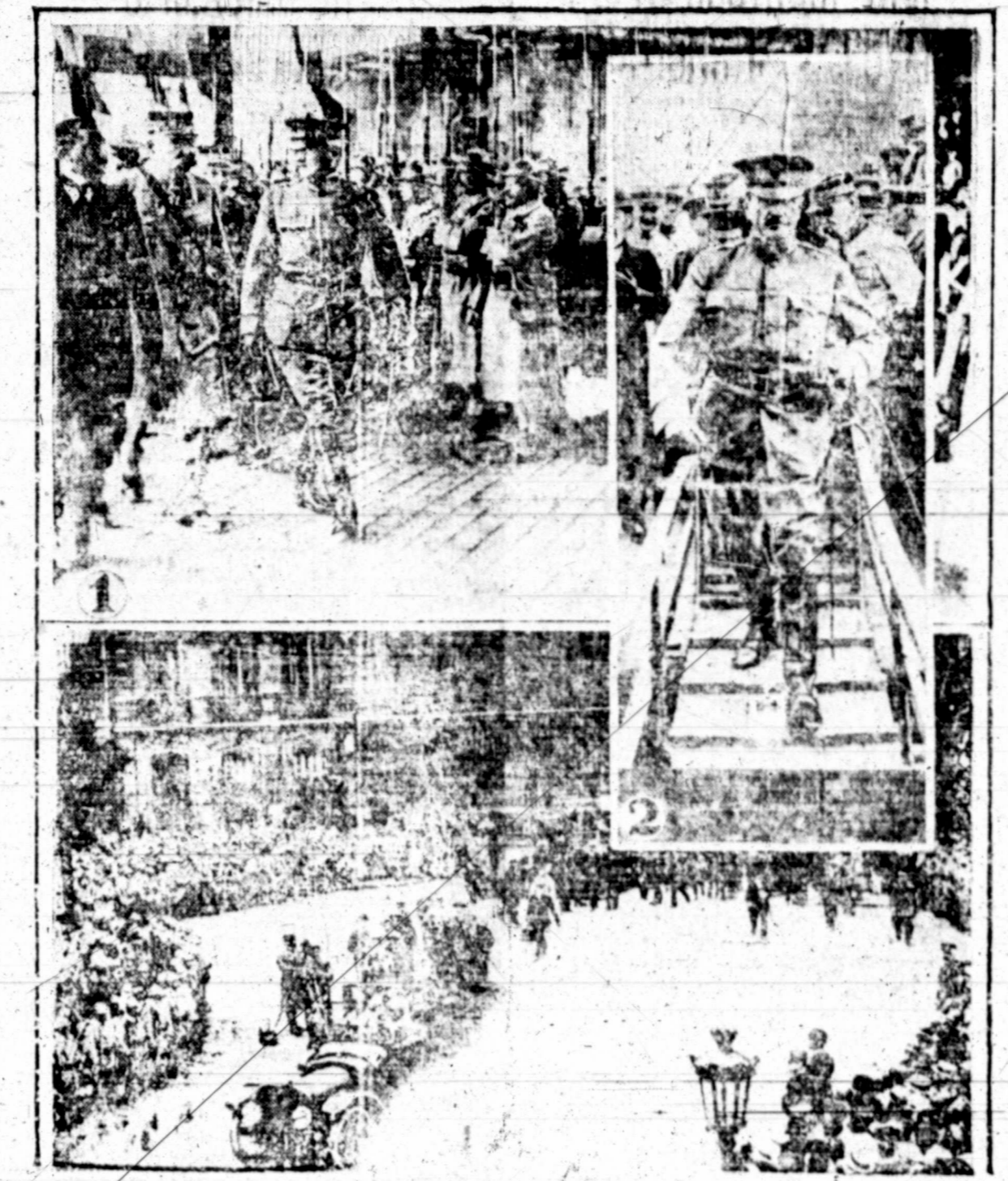

The demonstration is said to have been caused by news of the trouble in East St. Louis, but the jailer denied this and said the men were being disciplined for petty infractions of jail rules. The negroes refused all appeals of the guards to quiet them.

NUMBER OF NEGROES KILLED MAY REACH 200

East St. Louis, Ill., July 3.—At least twenty negroes were killed by mobs here last night as they fled from burning homes, which had been set on fire by white men, as the climax to a day given over to maltreating or killing negroes who had been caused by news of the trouble in East St. Louis, but the jailer denied this and said the men were being disciplined for petty infractions of jail rules. The negroes refused all appeals of the guards to quiet them.

At 9 o'clock the Mayor of East St. Louis sent for Fire Chief Swingley of St. Louis, Mo., to assist in fighting the flames which threatened to destroy a large part of the city. A company of the St. Louis fire department hurried to East St. Louis, but was ordered back by Chief Swingley.
The mobs in East St. Louis were swelled by hundreds of people who early in the evening crossed the river from St. Louis. The fire had advanced to a point where it was impossible to cross the Eads bridge. The fire crossed the Eads bridge and spread rapidly. By 10 o'clock the flames were visible from the St. Louis side of the river and soon flames visible for miles were shooting into the sky.
As the crowds crossed Eads bridge they saw the fires spread and glow in several parts of East St. Louis.
Hundreds of negro women, most of them carrying babies, and leading small children, walked across the bridge to shelter and safety with friends on the Missouri side.

WAR TAX MEASURE LAID BEFORE SENATE BY FINANCE COMMITTEE

HEAVY TAX ON INCOME

These And Excess Profits Bear Heaviest Share of Burden In New Taxation

Washington, July 3.—The war tax bill redrafted and reduced to \$1,760,000,000 by the Senate finance committee as against the \$1,800,000,000 of the original measure, was introduced today by Chairman Simmons of the committee to present the measure to the Senate today for consideration, which will begin after the foot control prohibition measure is disposed of.
Vastly increased income taxes and heavy excess profits tax, upon excess profits of corporations, partnerships and individuals, \$23,000,000, upon liquor, \$14,000,000 and tobacco, \$2,000,000.
No additional bonds will be authorized under the bill as any deficit, it is believed, can be taken care of by Congress in ample time at next December's session, although the measure will fall short by many millions of meeting expenses of the war next year.

CHINA HAS MADE ANOTHER CHANGE IN GOVERNMENT

MONARCHY RESTORED AND HSUAN TUNG PLACED ON THE IMPERIAL THRONE

ISSUES A LENGTHY EDICT

Young Emperor Says He Was Compelled to Take Action Because of Strife

Peking, July 1.—(Delayed)—The Imperial action. China's future government, marking the restoration of the Manchu monarchy. There has been no disorder. In a long edict Emperor Hsuan Tung was restored to the throne today explained how, being southern, he was forced to relinquish sovereign power to Yuan Shi Kai, late president of the Chinese republic.
The country being threatened with disintegration and party strife, and the people appealing to him to take over its administration to save the people from suffering, the young emperor says he was compelled to take action. China's future government will be based on the following:
The country shall be administered according to the constitutional laws promulgated by the late emperor.
Expenses of the imperial household shall remain the same as those fixed by the republic.
Blood princes shall not be allowed to interfere in politics.
There shall be no differences between Manchus and Chinese. Marriage laws between them be the same.
Foreign treaties and contracts shall remain in force.
The Stamp Tax and other petty taxes are abolished.
The republican criminal law code is abolished and that introduced the first year under Hsuan Tung's government is reinstated. Political offenders are pardoned.
The wearing of opium is abolished.
A hundred Japanese have arrived to strengthen the legation guard. There is no news of President Li Yuan Lung's expected resignation.

PRATT AND VROOMAN WILL HELP TO ENFORCE FOOD CONTROL LAW

WRONG IMPRESSION ABOUT PARCELS-POST

Washington, July 2.—Reports that all C. O. D. parcels post packages will require an additional fee beginning today are misleading according to the postoffice department.
"Heretofore," said a statement issued today, "the fee was 10 cents for collecting charges on a parcel amounting to \$100 with an insurance value limit only \$50. Under the new arrangement the fees will be ten cents for \$50 and 25 cents for \$100. While there is an increase of fees on packages valued from \$50 to \$100 it gives the advantage of insurance to the extent of \$100 not heretofore allowed under the regulations."

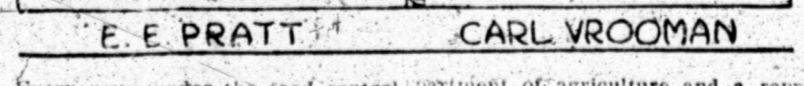

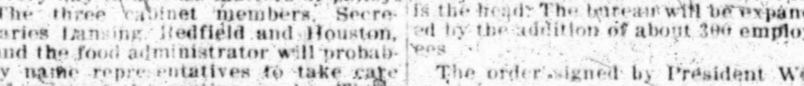

NORTHWEST TEXAS IS REFRESHED BY SHOWERS TUESDAY

PRECIPITATION HERE EARLY TODAY AMOUNTING TO SIX-TENTHS OF AN INCH

A steady shower amounting to six-tenths of an inch here fell over Northwest Texas early this morning, and last night. Rain began in the Panhandle early in the night and extended eastward having reached Fort Worth at about 8 o'clock this morning. Rain had been reported along the Fort Worth and Denver from Amarillo to Fort Worth and while reports were lacking early this morning it was believed that the whole lower Panhandle had been covered.

The Wichita Valley reported a good shower, about the same as here, as far south as Haskell, but south of Haskell the precipitation was scanty. The rainfall did not extend far northward into Oklahoma along the Wichita Falls and Northwestern, but as far south as Newcastle there was a good shower along the Wichita Falls and Southern.

VIBORG

Washington, D. C., July 3.—Viborg, the scene of recent serious anarchistic disorders in defiance of the authorities at Petrograd, is the subject of the following informative war geography bulletin issued today by the National Geographical Society from its Washington headquarters:

"The third city of Finland, and the capital of the province of the same name, Viborg is one of the most interesting and picturesque centers of population in northwestern Russia. It is situated at the head of the Gulf of Viborg, on the important Saima Canal, a gateway 37 miles long connecting Lake Saima (the lake of a thousand 'isles') with the sea. It is eighty miles northwest of Petrograd on the Helsinki-Petrograd Railway, a express train making the trip from the Finnish capital to Viborg in seven hours, and from Petrograd to Viborg in three hours.

"The city has a population of 35,000, and the principal commercial activity is the export of lumber. There are also important foundries, machine works, and saw mills here.

"From a historical standpoint Viborg is one of the most interesting communities in Finland. It owes its foundation to Marshal Toriel Knutson the Swede general who in 1235 built a castle here on a granite islet in the natural harbor. Around this castle grew the city, and the ruins of the old stronghold are still preserved, although its towers, from which the former governors were accustomed to watch for the sails of the enemy Russians, has begun to crumble. This was the first castle on the Finnish coast, and Christianity throughout the medieval province of Karelia, of which Viborg was for many years the capital.

"Many are the legends which have grown up around this old castle, and of these none is of more fascinating interest than that of Knut Possé, and his heroic defense of the town against the assaults of a Russian army reputed to have numbered 60,000 men under Ivan Wasiljevitch. According to a chronicle, thearrison numbered only 20 men, but it must be recalled that Possé, according to the legend, could always increase his numbers by giving to his men, and opening a bag of feathers to the wind, whereupon each feather became a fully armed soldier.

"When the garrison was about to yield Possé determined upon a desperate course. He undermined one of the towers of the castle and placed a great store of explosives beneath it. Concealed, says legend, in a great saucapan, the ingredients closely resembling the noxious brew of Hecate in Macbeth's serpents, quicksilver (or chalk.) When all was ready the little garrison sought safety in the lowest dungeon of the castle, leaving one old man, who had volunteered to give his life, to set off the blast. Sixteen thousand Russians are supposed to have perished when the Viborg Tower was discharged, and the remainder of the besieging army fled as one man. All this is supposed to have happened just three years after Columbus discovered America. And to prove the truth of the account the todjan of the old castle will show you the gigantic saucapan in which, by black magic, Possé mixed the explosive.

"In this period of Viborg's history the townsmen, the castle possessed almost kingly powers, being permitted to ennoble their subjects, and performing other royal functions. It is said that when Governor Karl Knutson made war on Sweden, he had to pay homage to his sovereign he was accompanied by eight hundred men. Viborg was captured by Peter the Great in 1710 and was formally ceded to Russia by the Treaty of Nystad eleven years later. At the close of that century it was blockaded by the fleet of Gustavus III, but the Swedish king was in turn blockaded in the Gulf of Viborg and it was with difficulty that he ran the gauntlet of Russian ships and saved his forces. In 1812 the province and city were reunited to the grand-duchy of Finland.

"The Saima Canal, which was built in 1845-56, is one of the most picturesque artificial waterways in the world. Lake Saima, the largest lake in Finland, with an area of 600-square miles, is 250 feet above sea level, so that 28 locks are required to lift ships from the gulf to the great inland waterway. Numerous falls and cascades fringe the coast of the wide commercial channel all the way.

"All tourists visit the magnificent country-estate of Baron von Nicolov while in Viborg. It is called Monrepos, and is only a mile or two north of the city, overlooking the Saima Canal. This is said to be the most beautiful home in all Finland.

"The modern section of Viborg is well built, with wide, straight street.

The place was once strongly fortified and surrounded with walls. It is still a stronghold, but is not one of the major fortresses of the Russian empire.

"On Finnish maps Viborg appears as Viipuri.

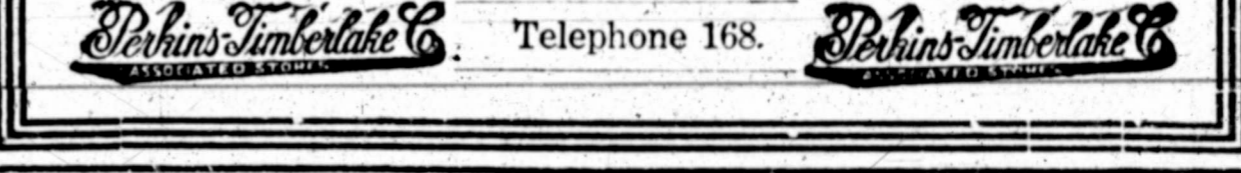

As the wind shifted the American flags, shipped in the breeze, became visible, and a great cry of welcome-strung from the waiting crowds. As the vessels neared the quay, bugles sounded, and soldiers and sailors who had been stationed along the rails in such numbers that the ships careened slightly, turning sharply toward the stern and saluted the crews with the honors of war, though in awe. Hats were removed as the strains of "America" pealed out. The people joined in a tremendous cheer as the welcome as the salute was concluded.

By companies the soldiers started for the camp, two miles from town, where they are to remain for the present in training. The people cheered each company as it passed, even each van and truck, and the cheering continued full of the heat, turned toward the camp. They were eager not to miss the slightest detail of the encampment of the Americans they had heard so much about, but never had hoped to see.

There was an unusual sight in the harbor after the last of the American ships arrived. Boats flashed back and forth with officers from the flagship on visits to smaller boats. Signals were exchanged between the ships. As rapidly as could be the news was spread that not a single vessel had fallen victim to the dreaded submarine. The first American troops so eagerly awaited were actually in France ready and anxious to take up the fight.

MORE DETAILS CONCERNING LANDING AMERICAN TROOPS

A French Port, June 27.—(Delayed by censor) Only a few hours after the landing of the American expeditionary force at this port the men were established in their quarters. By noon order had been brought out of chaos. The troops were divided into companies, a task which they accomplished with the aid of a few orders of amazed and seemingly paralyzed German prisoners, most of whom refused to believe that Americans actually had arrived to fight their countrymen.

BALLIN EVIDENTLY HAD HIS DATES MIXED

Copenhagen, July 3.—July 1 was the date rather rashly fixed by Albert Ballin, shipping magnate and intimate friend of Emperor William, when an all probability peace treaty had been established. It is interesting to recall his prophecy made with all positiveness at the annual meeting of the International Maritime Committee on March 29 and based upon the expected working of the submarine campaign and the Russian revolution in view of the subsequent optimistic predictions of the submarine advocates in Germany to bolster the public's sinking hopes of a speedy ending of the war.

O'BRIEN URGED TO TAKE PART IN CONVENTION

London, July 3.—Sir Horace Plunkett in a letter urging William O'Brien to reconsider his decision not to participate in the approaching Irish convention says that while he had no official authority for the statement he has the best reason for believing that the feelings of the convention will be submitted to a referendum, if the convention scheme fails to meet a popular favor.

PRESIDENT MOYER SUGGESTS I. W. W. TREASURY BEING FILLED WITH GERMAN GOLD

Denver, July 3.—The Industrial Workers of the World were charged in a statement issued last night by Charles H. Moyer, president of the International Union of Mill, Mine and Smelter workers, with participation in a nation-wide conspiracy to shut down the copper mines of the country. He called attention to recent successions of strikes in other copper mining sections of the west and continued:
"The Industrial Workers of the World have had no money in the treasury. It seems to have plenty of money now. Where it got this money I cannot say. The public may speculate as to the source of it."
