NEGRO PRISONERS IN CHICA-GO BECOME OBSTREPEROUS

The demonstration is said to have been caused by news of the trouble in East St. Louis, but the jailer denied this and said the men, were being disciplined for petty infractions of jail rules. The negroes refused all appeals of the guards to quiet them.

NUMBER OF NEGROES KILLED MAY REACH 200

East St. Louis, Ill., July 3.—At least twenty negroes were killed by mobs here last night as they field from their burning homes, which had been set on fire by white men, as the climax to a day given over to maltreating or killing negroes wherever found. State's Attorney Schaumfloffel estimates that the dead negroes will number 250, but all estimates are conjectural. Only a search of the ruins tomorrow will disclose how many negroes perished in
