1734 ANIMALS KILLED BY T. AND P. IN 1916

Fort Worth, Texas, July 11.—One thousand seven hundred and thirty-four domestic animals have been killed during the past year on the Texas and Pacific right of way, according to a written statement given out Monday by J. H. Elliott, general manager of the railroad. Of this number 1027 were cattle, 522 hogs and 165 horses and mules have been killed. In giving out this information General Manager Elliott emphasized the great economic loss which is caused by stock owners in allowing their animals to stray onto the right of way, and urged owners of stock to cooperate with the railroad company in minimizing this useless waste of the country's resources as much as possible.

GOVERNMENT AND STEEL INDUSTRY IN AGREEMENT

CHINA MAY FURNISH MEN TO FIGHT AGAINST GERMANY

Washington, July 12.—China's soon will be ready and willing to treat her countless hordes of men to aid in beating Germany. In fact, oriental diplomats today predicted that she will contribute an initial contribution of 500,000 men. She has 20,000,000 physically fit men of military age, with the first half being already equipped and vast national reserves to draw upon for further equipment. The Orientals see it, China's participation in the war would mean her salvation, inasmuch as it would train her masses in the ways of tactics and make the nation strong to resist what threatens her—Japanese encroachments. Parliament may take any action looking toward actual war participation.

RUSSIAN DRIVE GOING FORWARD WITH NO LET-UP

BRUSILOFF'S FORCES OCCUPY KALUSZ AFTER MOST SANGUINARY FIGHTING

GERMAN ADVANCE HALTS

No Reports of Further Fighting in Dunes Sector Where Germans Made Gains

The Associated Press war summary today says that Brusilloff's offensive in Galicia is developing into a drive with little or no let-up, at least so far as the part in it played by General Koruloff's army is concerned. Yesterday's news of the capture of Halicz was followed today by the announcement that General Koruloff's troops had pushed on beyond Lestaya southwest of Stanislaw and reached and occupied Kalusz, a city of 8,000 population, seven miles to the west of the Stoka river. Kalusz was stubbornly defended but after a sanguinary battle the Russians pushed into the town and according to advices from Petrograd, they are continuing their advance after having taken a large number of prisoners. The German attack on Monday on the Belgian coast ceased with a small sector east of the year which the Germans had devastated with their intensive gun fire. Neither last night nor today at Bisbee were any further fighting in this region. On the Verdun front the German crown prince made a number of attacks on the British lines. The attacks were repulsed, as were attacks on the Aisne and in the region of the Triangle plateau.

### LIMITING NAVY ENLISTMENTS IN THIS DISTRICT

The Navy Department has issued the following telegram to all stations in this district: "The July 15, all first enlistments will be limited to forty-eight per cent for this district, except machinists' mates, landsmen for quartermaster, and machinists' mates for aviation. Shortage during one week may be made up the following week. Discontinue all first enlistments of shipwrights, shipfitters, blacksmiths, boiler-makers, painters and printers."

It will be observed that this order applies only to first enlistments. Men who have been in the service previously, and wish to re-enlist may do so in any branch they wish.

The order from Dallas instructs all sub-stations to be very careful as to these instructions, and adds that no men are to be sent to Dallas who will arrive there later than noon on Saturdays, and none are to be sent who will arrive there at any time on Sundays. Local stations are further advised that there is no necessity to keep their offices open on Sundays.

From the fact that all men enlisting as machinists' mates, either for work aboard ship or in the aviation department, and as landsmen for quartermaster, are not to be included in the weekly quota, it is evident that these departments are in much more urgent need of men than the other branches. The examination for the aviation work is perhaps the most rigid in the service, and a great number of applicants have been turned back because of their inability to pass the examination. There are, however, a great number of inducements offered for this branch of the service. The training lasts for eighteen months; but after five or six months, the men are rated either as quartermaster or machinists' mates, and receive pay accordingly. Besides this advance, as soon as the men are competent to fly, they receive a fifty per cent increase in their pay. The duty of the aviation quartermaster is that of a pilot.

### A MEETING FOR A FISH HATCHERY AT LAKE WICHITA

All sportsmen, and those interested in game and fish protection and propagation are urged to attend a meeting tomorrow night, Friday, at 8:30 at the Chamber of Commerce rooms for the purpose of discussing the establishing of a fish hatchery at Lake Wichita. Geo. C. Shupe, secretary-treasurer of the Texas Game and Fish Protective Association, now in Wichita Falls for a short stay, will explain the facilities under which a hatchery can be built. Other important matters of game protection will also be discussed. This is an important matter for all Wichita Falls, and those who can possibly attend should do so.

### ALL IS READY FOR ENROLLING WOMEN OF CITY

Preliminary arrangements have all been completed and tomorrow morning at 8 o'clock, Mrs. J. T. Traylor and her committee, workers, will commence on the task of enrolling the women of Wichita Falls in the Hoover Home Army for Food Conservation. Friday having been proclaimed Registration Day by Mayor A. H. Britain. The registration of the housewives at the other towns in Wichita county will take place some time next week. Monday Mrs. Traylor will visit Iowa Park, Tuesday, Burk Burnett and Wednesday, Electric, arranging committees in each place to care for the registration.

"I would like it further stressed," Mrs. Traylor stated this morning, "that in asking the housewives to register and thus be put on the government list for economic bulletins, that they are not being charged with extravagance. Instead, they will be shown ways in which to economize to a greater extent than they have been able before by having the advice of experts. And they can show the government that in their kitchens they are helping a part of the great machinery which is devised to win the war. We feel sure that the women of Wichita Falls housewives are not extravagant and that they will be glad to co-operate with the food administrator. If they, with their carefulness and efficiency-of-management keep down the consumption of food, it will not be necessary, even should privations exceed the bounds now anticipated, to put the country on a ration as has been found necessary in the other warring countries. There will be no need of a food shortage if the women of the United States do their part; and we know that the women of Wichita Falls will be ready and willing to do their share."

## TACTICS SCHOOL IS AN INTERESTING FEATURE OF ARMY

Not the least interesting part of army life is the work done in the schools for tactics of various kinds. Here the men are trained to think and act quickly, both in routine work and in emergency. Every company has a school for privates, and one for non-commissioned officers, and in study in these schools is supplemented by practical work in the field. At the maneuvers conducted some time ago at Texas City, one of the officers asked the apparently simple question of a company, "In the event of a hurry

call, to break camp and get out within ten minutes, the call coming in at dawn, and there being no time to prepare breakfast of any kind, what provision for feeding the company would you make?" One man suggested handing out canned goods, tomatoes, salmon and the like. It was pointed out, however, that one man would not require a full can of salmon for his breakfast, and the matter of distributing might be seriously handicapped by the one carrying the food being killed. It was found that the most practical suggestion was sandwiches—one or possibly two to every man—and every man of course, carrying his own.

On the same occasion, a bunch of non-commissioned officers was asked what to do under the following conditions: You have a regiment caught between two batteries of artillery; you cannot go back, and when you go forward, you are caught between two fires. It is necessary to go forward, however, in order to carry out the plan that has been decided upon by the command. How will you get your men across the space in front of you? There were several points of cover

scattered at intervals over the valley in question—a house, a barn, a mound, a clump of trees, and so on; and it was the opinion of the majority of the men that the best course would be to rush small groups of men to the various points of cover, working from point to point. It was pointed out, however, that they would be far safer keeping in the open, as the exact range of every house, tree, and hillock would certainly be known to the enemy.

Besides work of this sort, which is most vitally interesting to every soldier, inasmuch as it pertains to his own personal safety, there is every opportunity to study academic work. Mathematics, languages, chemistry, history and so forth are all taught and are to be had for the asking by any of the men who want to take advantage of the opportunity. In addition to these schools, a great many men take courses in the correspondence schools, in order to prepare themselves for some special work.

There is, of course, every kind of soldier, just as there is every kind of man in business, trade, or profession. The dissolute kind of soldier is not really representative, though he is somewhat more in evidence, perhaps, than his more studious brother. One sees less of the latter, because he is in camp or barracks at work—or in the gymnasium, or athletic field—rather than on the street where he can be seen. The very fact of his being studious is the reason for his not being seen. One does not study on the street.

**ROTARIANS HERE REPORT ATLANTA CONVENTION**

At the Rotary Club luncheon today, Bert Bean delivered the first installment of the account of his trip to the Rotary Convention at Atlanta. The early part of the talk was taken up with description of the towns at which the Rotarians stopped off on their way to Atlanta. Among the many interesting events that crowded every minute of the trip was a luncheon given by the Beaumont country club, at which every dish and everything on the table, except the condiments, was made of rice. Mr. Bean said it was one of the most enjoyable meals he ever sat down to. He was particularly impressed with the excellence of the rice bread.

Mr. Bean quite fell in love with Mobile, which he said reminded one of all that one has read about the antebellum days. The people, he said, showed no mad scramble after money, as in so many places, but seemed more interested in making the most out of life, and enjoying it while they lived.

Montgomery's five hundred and fifty miles of gravel roads made a tremendous hit with Mr. Bean. He said that the roads over the entire country were as smooth as a hardwood floor. "If I had a job, or a single place where one was acutely conscious of the automobile," he said, "I don't remember it."

"But of what took place in Atlanta," he said, "I have no words to tell you. I wish, I could convey to you in any way the earnestness of that convention. If you have read the account of the speeches, you have some idea. But not seeing and hearing them, not coming into direct contact with the force of their thought, their vision, their joy, or a single place where one was acutely conscious of the automobile," he said, "I don't remember it."

One of the four great objects of the Rotarians is to pay strict attention to the causes of this war, explaining why we are in it, and what part we have in it, here at home. In this connection, Mr. Bean spoke very strongly on the subject of aliens in this country. "It behoves us as Rotarians," he said, "to pay strict attention to everything that we hear from the German-Americans in this country. For I cannot believe that the great body of them are as yet as loyal to this country as they should be. There have been no formal protests made by them against the frightful atrocities perpetrated in Belgium, France and Serbia of late. If one speaks to the average German-American on the subject, he answers usually that it is mere newspaper lies, and refuses. It is most part to investigate to find out whether there is any truth in the reports. Even those who must know that the reports are true, have entered no protest. The constantly recurring acts of a very queer nature, coming from these sources, warn us that we may look for very and, therefore, here at home, and it therefore behoves us to be very careful."

**ROAD BONDS SOLD; ST. LOUIS HOUSES ARE PURCHASERS**

**BONDS BRING PAR AND ACCRUED INTEREST LESS \$2,000 ATTORNEYS AND PRINTING COSTS**

The county commissioners this morning sold the \$500,000 road bond issue to Kauffman-Smith-Emert Investment company of St. Louis and the William R. Compton Co. of St. Louis for par and accrued interest less \$2,000 for attorney's fees, costs of printing the bonds and other expenses. The sale is subject to the approval of the bonds by a bond attorney. The purchasers filed their certified check for \$25,000 for the fulfillment of the contract.

The money is to become available as soon as the bonds are printed and registered. Arrangements have been made to distribute it among the banks of the county on deposit to be used as needed.

When bids were opened Tuesday the best bid was 97.5 cents on the dollar of par value. The bids were rejected and the commissioners took up the matter at private sale, resulting in the mentioned above.

Chicago Grain Futures. Chicago, July 12.—The failure of the value of corn resulted today from the action of the Board of Trade directors last night in establishing a maximum price for new crop deliveries. Opening prices varied from 1/2 cents down to 3/4 cents advance with September at \$1.19 to \$1.51. The close was nervous 1/2-3/8 cent lower to 3/8 cent advance, September selling at \$1.19 1/2-3/8 and December, \$1.16 1/2-3/8.

Wheat showed firmness notwithstanding the downward swing in the corn market. The opening was 1/2-cent higher at \$1.98 for September, with July nominal and continued steady at that level. The close was easy with July at \$2.04 and September at \$1.92 1/2.

New York Cotton Futures. New York, July 12.—The failure of this morning's weather news, to show as much rain as expected in the South west led to rather active covering in the cotton market after the big break of yesterday. There was some disappointment over the political news from Germany and the President's appeal for reasonable prices evidently made a considerable impression on sentiment with the result that early situations were somewhat nervous and irregular. After opening steady at an advance of 15 to 25 points the market sold about 25 to 28 above last night's closing figures before the end of the first hour.

Cotton closed irregular; July, 25.23; October, 25.28; December, 25.43; January, 25.53; March, 25.70.
