# And Scene of the Triple Murder RUSSIAN COUNCIL GRANTS - "UNLIMITED POWERS" TO PREMIER KARNESKY

Petrograd, July 23.-The council of soldiers and werkmen's delegates and the peasants of all Russia voted today, after an all-night session, to grant the government of Premier Kerensky 'unlimited powers' under the title of "Government of National Safety" for the establishment of public order, both at the front

The sweeping new powers were granted to the provisional government in a resolution adopted by a combined sitting of the executive committees of the council of workmen's and soldiers delegates and the council of peasants delegates.

The resolution read: 'Recognizing that the country is menaced by a military obstacle on the front established by anarchy at home, it is resolved:

"First, that the country and the revolution are in danger: Second, that the provisional government is proclaimed the government of national safety;

"Third, that unlimited powers are accorded the government for re-establishing the organization and discipline of the army, for a fight to the finish against the enemies of public order, and for the realization of the whole program embodied in the governmental program just announced."

General Gorgas is not only the surgeon general of the army, he is an authority of world-wide reputation on camp hygiene. By his mastery of the medical phases of the labor question in a tropical jungle, he made possible the building of the Panama canal. The New England senators who have protested to the secretary of war against sending the National Guard regiments from these states to the South for training should be somewhat reconciled to the odious tyranny of the war department by General Grogas's exposition of the advantages of military training in the South.

"I am strongly in favor of sites in

to the effect that they are anxious to
promote an Ozark Trail from Kansas
City, or some other Missouri river point
to El Paso, Texas, stating that they
believe such a highway would be of
very material service to the government as a military road. The letter
goes on to say that Wichita Falls has
been mentioned as one of the points
on a tentative route, connecting Lawton and Sweetwater, and the one in
the best condition will be chosen as
the official route, other things being
equal. The letter states that it will
be necessary to use the Meridian highway between Lawton and Wichita
Falls, or to parallel that road. It is
