RUSSIAN RETREAT STILL CONTINUES ON WIDE FRONT

CONFIDENCE FELT IN PETROGRAD THAT FIRM FRONT WILL SOON BE PRESENTED ENEMY

FRENCH REGAIN GROUND

Hold Recovered Territory in Craonne Region Against German Counter Attacks Today

The Associated Press war summary today says: Russia's shaken armies in Galicia are still in retreat, which bids fair not to end until they reach the line occupied by them last year before General Brusiloff began his big offensive. Despite this retrograde movement covering practically all the front between the North Galician border and the Carpathian foothills, the tone of both official and unofficial dispatches from Petrograd is not pessimistic. There is apparent confidence that the disorganization in the ranks induced by the machinations of the extremists and believed to have been largely promoted by German intrigue will be adequately dealt with and a firm front again presented to the enemy. The Germans, by their own admission, have not the men to spare to prosecute a sustained offensive on the eastern front. They are too apprehensive of some extra forceful stroke in the west from the British or French to transfer any great number of troops from the Franco-Belgian war area. The inherent strength of the entente position has just reached a fresh illustration on the Alsace front. Here the French have just won a long struggle with the Germans for possession of the important high ground in the Craonne region. Yesterday's brilliant attack gave General Potain's troops renewed possession in almost complete measure of the slight area regained by the crown prince in his costly series of attacks. The French pressed beyond their old line at some points. This morning came the attacks of the German reaction. It was directed at the line recaptured by the French on the Craonne plateau. Although delivered after a violent bombardment it was entirely futile. A British offensive on the Belgian front is in progress as unprecedentedly heavy artillery fire indicates but it evidently has not been launched. Today's official statement reports successful raids in this area but no wide movement by the British. Exceptionally violent big gun fire is mentioned.

RETREAT AT POINTS BECOMES A ROUT

Copenhagen, July 25.—A semi-official German report described as a striking panorama the retreat of the Russians in Galicia. Retiring columns stretching the horizon can plainly be observed from numerous vantage points. The retreat is occasionally degenerating into a full rout, particularly under the influence of Austro-German field guns which are abreast the infantry vanguards and dash forward to a hilltop from where they pour a demoralizing fire into the masses crowded into the road. Additional supplies of munitions, provisions and six heavy guns were captured.

GERMAN ADVANCE IN GALICIA CONTINUES

Berlin, July 25.—The advance of the Austro-German forces in eastern Galicia continues uninterrupted. The war office announces that "Romania" has been captured and the Germans are nearing Bucarest. Emperor William watches the Germans repel a Russian attack on the plain of the Sereth. It is officially announced. The statement also reports the capture of Stanislaw and Nadorna. Heavy artillery fighting is in progress in Romania. Russian troops taking the offensive south of the Carpathians penetrated the Austro-German line. They were brought to a standstill. The war office reports at the German protective position west of the point of attack. Continuation of exceptionally violent artillery fire in Flanders is reported on the western front.

CANADA WANTS TO BORROW HUNDRED MILLION IN U. S.

By Associated Press. Washington, July 25.—Secretary McAdoo has notified Sir Thomas White Canadian minister of finance, that the United States government has no objection to Canada's obtaining a short time credit of \$100,000,000 from private sources in the American money market. Mr. McAdoo declined to state whether arrangements for the loan had been made. It was understood, however, that negotiations have been proceeding for some time between Sir Thomas White and had reached the point where further negotiations must await the consent of the American government.

FIVE KILLED IN EXPLOSION ON SUBMARINE

By Associated Press. Washington, July 25.—An explosion yesterday on the submarine A-7 at Cavite, Philippine Islands, killed 5 men and injured 1 of the officers and crew. The dead are reported today in official dispatches are: Lieut. Arnold Marcus, Machinist's Mate First Class H. H. Lang, Gunner's Mate Second Class O. Hopewell, Chief Electrician J. E. Curry, Machinist's Mate A. Kuntz. The explosion, from a preliminary examination, seemed to be due to ignition of gas within the ship. The cause of this ignition has not been reported.

CARLOAD OF 700 SACKS FLOUR FOR BUCKNER'S HOME

TOTAL AMOUNT RAISED \$1802.40 OF WHICH \$1,089.40 WAS GIVEN IN WICHITA FALLS. Wichita Falls and other towns in this section have raised \$1842.50 for the purchase of a carload of flour for the Buckner Orphan's home at Dallas. The Wichita Mill & Elevator company is preparing to deliver to the home a carload of 700 sacks of flour at a cost of \$1802.40. The railroads will transport the car to Dallas free of cost. The difference between the amount collected and the cost of the flour is to be used to defray some incidental expenses and the money remaining will be forwarded to the home. The car will contain 700 sacks. The Mill gave a donation of \$50 in cash and sold the flour at wholesale cost since agreeing to let the home have the flour at this cost, the wholesale price of flour on a shipment of that quantity has advanced \$38.50 so that the deal has been a most fortunate one for the home. Of the total amount \$1089.40 was raised in Wichita Falls. Charlie contributed \$100, Burkhardt \$150, Petrolia \$123, Thornberry \$30, Byers \$48.25, Electra \$155.10, Henrietta \$141.30, Iowa Park \$42.90.

GOVERNOR WANTS TO SEE AFFIDAVIT BEFORE TALKING

By Associated Press. Austin, TEXAS, July 25.—Governor James E. Ferguson who returned to Austin this morning refused to make a statement or discuss the "Fuller affidavit" relative to the West Texas A. M. College or the call of the speaker reconvening the House on August 1 to reconsider impeachment proceedings until he, the governor, had seen the Fuller affidavit. The Governor said he did not know even where the affidavit had been filed, indicating that the secretary of state's department was the proper place to file such an affidavit and it had not been filed there. "What about the action of Speaker Fuller in calling the House to convene on August 1?" the Governor was asked. "I do not care to discuss or make any statement as the affidavit and its call are entwined like the Siamese twins," he replied. The Governor wanted to know if Fuller had made the direct charge against him of fraud in connection with the location of the West Texas A. and M. College in the affidavit. He would not say whether or not he favored now reopening the West Texas A. and M. matter until he had seen the Fuller affidavit.

RAZVOFF APPOINTED COMMANDER IN BALTIC

Petrograd, July 25.—Rear Admiral Razvoff has been appointed commander-in-chief of all the naval forces in the Baltic Sea.

REORGANIZATION SHIPPING BOARD IN FULL SWING

By Associated Press. Washington, July 25.—Reorganization of the shipping board and the emergency fleet corporation was in full swing today, following President Wilson's acceptance of the resignation of Chairman Denman and Major General Goshals. The Senate committee recommended confirmation of Edward M. Harley of Chicago as the new chairman, but action was delayed on the nomination of Bainbridge Colby to succeed Captain John B. White. Administration leaders, however, expect no serious opposition to Mr. Colby. Acting Chairman Brent today also offered his resignation, but President took no action. Mr. Brent was a supporter of Mr. Denman.

WOULD ELIMINATE MOTORING FOR PLEASURE

Oklahoma City, July 25.—Fifty per cent of the gasoline propelled vehicles in the state are pleasure cars, and their operation could very well be dispensed with, said Art Walker, chief of the oil and gas bureau of the Corporation Commission, today in discussing the appeal sent out from Washington to conserve the supply of crude oil and gasoline. Following the appeal that has been sent out from Washington the Oklahoma State Com. of defense will this week ask that automobiles operated only for necessary purposes. It is observed that the production of crude oil is becoming more expensive, and that the supply is jeopardized in the use of it. "It will be a sad reflection on the people of this country if they, in the face of a million troops going to fight, will not cut off part of their luxuries to end the war a little sooner," said Mr. Walker.

CALLING OF MEN FOR EXAMINATION IN SOME STATES

By Associated Press. Washington, July 25.—The race between states for the honor of being the first to fill their quotas for the new army was on today in earnest. Calling of men for examination began this morning in several regions. Meanwhile details of the machinery for actually calling accepted men into service and sending them to mobilization camps are being worked out. Provost Marshal General Crowder already has worked out the claim of the army attaches to any registered man as soon as local registration board has posted him as accepted. From that time on unless exempted he will be subject to military law and articles of war. Failure to report when called will bring military officers in search of the man and he will be tried for any violation of military law before a courtmartial. It appears probable that accepted men, when the mobilization order for the new order is given, will be first assembled in their selection board headquarters. Their distribution among cantonments, General Crowder said, today, would be governed by two rules, first, the section of the law requiring that they be assigned as far as practicable to duty with troops from their own state, and secondly, the location of the nearest cantonment to reduce the transportation problem as much as possible.

HOW DESTROYER ACTS WHEN ATTACKED BY SUBMARINE

A British Port on Southeast Coast, Wednesday, June 27.—By mail—Just how a British destroyer acts when attacked by a submarine was unexpectedly demonstrated to an Associated Press correspondent today while traveling on one of the Martin oil burner torpedo boat destroyers from England to raise. Two periscopes were sighted and immediately disappeared. The high-angle guns were swung into position and trained on the spot where the periscopes were seen, waiting for them to appear. Simultaneously a torpedo was seen glowing on the water toward the destroyer. The coxswain quickly turned a lever stopping the destroyer, and the torpedo passed 6 feet ahead of it. The submarine did not reappear.

HALF MILLION GALLONS GASOLINE DESTROYED

By Associated Press. Philadelphia, July 25.—Nearly half a million gallons of gasoline was destroyed at the Atlantic Refining Co. fire last night entailing a loss of half a million dollars. One employe was missing.

TRAVIS COUNTY GRAND JURY HAS MADE NO REPORT YET

Austin, Texas, July 25.—The Travis county grand jury today resumed its investigations but so far no reports have been made. It is generally expected that a report will be made tomorrow or the day following.

WICHITANS TO BE EXAMINED FOR SECOND TRAINING CAMP

A number of Wichitans who had made application for the second reserve officers training camp have received notice to appear in Fort Worth on Friday for examination. Among those receiving this notice were: Bentley Bacon, Louis Nussbaum, E. H. Whipple, C. E. Thacker, F. L. Mercer, and Jerome S. Strum. Mr. Stone, after putting in his application for the reserve officers training camp, applied for the aviation camp and was accepted.

LENINE TO BE ARRESTED BY RUSSIAN AUTHORITIES

New York, July 25.—Information that the Russian provisional government has decided to terminate the apparent pro-German activities of Nikolai Lenin, the radical socialist leader, by arresting him and many of his followers, has reached the Russian information bureau here. These advisers indicate Lenin probably will be shot if he is convicted as a spy working in the interest of Germany. So far information received by the bureau shows no evidence has been uncovered in Petrograd to confirm the statement implicating Lenin as an agent of the German general staff, although the provisional government's present determination leads Russians here to suspect that the government may know he has been guilty of taking German gold.

STATE FARMERS' INSTITUTE CONVENES AT AUSTIN

Austin, Tex., July 25.—With an attendance of approximately 1,000 delegates and visitors, the seventh annual session of the State Farmers' Institute convened here today. Commissioner of Agriculture Fred W. Dyer, president of the organization presided. The meeting will last for three days. Prominent horticulturists from all parts of the state are among those present as are members of the State Council of Defense. This meeting is regarded as quite important in view of the campaign for the production of more food products and less cotton. 80 WORKMEN KILLED IN NOVA SCOTIA

They reported to have been successful, although the battalion suffered some losses, the extent of which being not known. A correspondent at the front reports that the women behaved in an exemplary way gaining the respect of the men soldiers.

WICHITA COUNTY'S QUOTA IS 140 FOR THE NEW ARMY

DISTRICT HAS BEEN GIVEN CREDIT FOR NATIONAL GUARD AND ARMY ENLISTMENTS

QUOTAS OTHER COUNTIES

Archer County to Furnish 50 Men, Clay 128, And Wilbarger County 46 Men

Wichita county's quota for the new army has been reduced to 140 through its enlistments in the Regular Army and the Texas National Guard by persons living in the county. An Associated Press telegram bearing this news was received early this afternoon. Quotas for all the districts in the state were announced by the Adjutant General this afternoon at Austin. In some of the registration districts there have been so many credits for National Guard and Regular Army enlistments that such districts will not only be exempt altogether from the first draft, but will have credits against the second draft, if there is such a draft. Other counties in this section have had their quotas reduced largely through National Guard enlistments. Wilbarger county will have to furnish only 46 men through the draft. Archer county's quota is 50, Clay county 128, Montague county 211, Baylor county 61, Tarrant county 347, Dallas county 462.

TEXAS QUOTA WILL BE 30,345 MEN

By Associated Press. Austin, Texas, July 25.—Adjutant General J. M. H. Stone today made public the list of districts and the quota of men that must be furnished by each county or district in the state. The quotas for the state are 30,345. The quotas are not in every respect. The net quotas are for all cities of over 20,000. Credit has been given in every instance for members of the Texas National Guard in service on April 1 or those enlisting on or after that date. Similar credits have been given for enlistments in the regular army from April 1 to June 30. The credits were certified to the state adjutant general by the adjutant general of the army, the chief of military bureaus in the Texas organization commanders. No credit was allowed for enlistments in the navy or marine corps. Those districts marked with an asterisk (*) will have to furnish no men upon the first draft and will be given credit for the excess on the second draft. Among these are Waco with an excess of 237 and Austin with an excess of 311.

PAST WEEK UNFAVORABLE TO COTTON GENERALLY

SPEAKER FULLER MAKES AFFIDAVIT AS TO HIS VOTE

Houston, Texas, July 25.—The affidavit of Speaker Fuller as to the West Texas Agricultural and Mechanical college is as follows:

The State of Texas, County of Harris, P. O. Fuller of Gold Springs, San Jacinto county, Texas, having first been duly sworn on his oath, does depose and say:

"When the locating board of the West Texas Agricultural and Mechanical college met in Austin on the 29th day of June to select a site, it was first agreed that all proceedings should be in executive session and that nothing should be given out by the members of the board except the result of the ballot.

"Each member then entered into a discussion of the various sites. Governor Ferguson expressed a decided preference for the location of the college at Abilene. Superintendent Doughty indicated that there were several good sites, but that his preference was Abilene. Lieutenant Governor Hobby expressed himself in favor of either San Angelo or Amarillo. Commissioner Davis stated that he was undecided as to whether the college should be located on or off the plains. He did not express preference for any city; he stated that he would not vote for Lubbock because someone at that place had made him some offer for his vote and influence.

"Objection Made to Abilene. "One of the greatest objections urged to the location of the college at Abilene was on account of the insufficient water supply. Commissioner Davis presented to the committee a report from some authority stating that it was practical to bring the water from a certain dam site some distance from Abilene, and Davis indicated that he was advised that it was practical to supply Abilene with water from the proposed dam site, but he did not indicate that he would vote for Abilene.

"I expressly advised the committee that I was for Haskell first and Snyder second, and went into details as to my reason for supporting either one of these locations.

"The vote was taken by ballot, each member writing the name of a town on a slip of paper; the ballots were received in a hat. "The first ballot resulted in two votes for Abilene, one vote for Haskell, one vote for Snyder and one vote for San Angelo; the second ballot stood three for Abilene, one for Snyder and one for Amarillo, Haskell being my first choice, I cast my first vote for that city, but as Haskell received only one vote on the first ballot and no member of the committee had at any time expressed a preference for Haskell, I cast my vote on the second ballot for Snyder. "The reason that Snyder was my second choice, and, this place had received one vote on the first ballot, I thought that by voting for Snyder on the second ballot my second choice would be selected.

"Abilene Receives Three Votes. "When Abilene received three votes on the second ballot, I naturally thought that either Davis or Governor Hobby voted for Abilene.

"Later a motion prevailed to make the vote unanimous for Abilene, and by a viva voce vote the motion prevailed.

"A motion then prevailed requiring Abilene to execute a \$50,000 bond, conditioned that the city of Abilene should carry out certain agreements as to the water to be furnished the college. The board then adjourned, subject to the call of the chairman.

"Shortly after the adjournment of the board I was informed that Lieutenant Governor Hobby and Commissioner Davis had made statements as to how they had voted, and I was requested by certain newspaper men to make a similar statement. I declined to make any statement whatever, because of the agreement for an executive session. However, when I learned that I was to be interviewed by the press, I stated to the press that I did not vote for Abilene, and that I made statements with reference to their votes. I stated to the press that I did not vote for Abilene, and that I made statements with reference to their votes.

"I visited several of my friends living at Snyder and other places that I voted for Haskell on the first ballot and Snyder on the second ballot. "I returned home on the 30th of June, and on the first day of July I wired a delegation of citizens from San Angelo and Lubbock—then in Austin—that I favored a reconvening of the board.

"On July 2 I wired Governor Ferguson that I would be in Austin the following Friday for a conference with him, and on the same day wired Governor Hobby and Commissioner Davis urging upon them the necessity of having the board reconvened.

"On July 3 I wired Governor Hobby that I would be in Austin on the following Friday morning, and requested him to meet me at an incident.

"Hobby Misses Meeting. "On July 4 Governor Hobby advised me by wire that if I wanted to have a meeting of the board in Austin on Friday he would do so, but suggested that I meet him in Houston Thursday and discuss the matter and determine, if necessary, to go to Austin, and on the same day I answered him by wire and requested that he meet me at the Brazos hotel in Houston at 8 o'clock Thursday morning, and stated that I would be in Austin Friday morning. I arrived in Houston and was at the Brazos hotel at 8 o'clock Thursday morning, but failed to meet Governor Hobby. I have been advised since that time that Governor Hobby did not arrive at the hotel on time and for some reason we failed to meet. The proof is evident, however, that our failure to meet was an accident.

"I went on to Austin Thursday morning, Friday morning I called on the governor and tried to prevail on him to reconvene the board. After several conferences with the governor with reference to reconvening the board, the governor finally stated that he had a conference with Governor Hobby the day before at the Rice hotel.

"The statement that I voted for Abilene on either the first or second ballot, is an unqualified falsehood, and no one has any better reason to know it than Governor Ferguson. I have sought in every way to have this matter reopened and would have continued to insist upon it in Austin except for the facts above stated.

"To leave the matter in its present form, when three members of the board have signed affidavits showing that there was either a mistake in the original count, or a deliberate fraud, is a disgrace to the state. If there was a mistake in the count, it is a fraud now upon the people of this state, and on the committee, for the governor to fail to recall the committee for a fair and open vote as to the location.

"I am giving this statement to the press so that the people of this state may know the facts in reference to the manner of the location of this institution.

tel in Houston, Texas, in which conference Governor Hobby had indicated that he thought that the location was fair, honest, etc., and that Governor Hobby did not favor a reconvening of the board, and the governor suggested that he thought it was for the best interest of the college that the matter be not reopened, but that the board issue a statement which the governor approved. Superintendent Doughty and Commissioner Davis thought that it was the proper thing to do to issue such a statement provided Governor Hobby would sign a statement protesting against signing the statement unless Governor Hobby, who was then in Houston, would join in the statement.

"Appeared Regular on Face. "So, as the election appeared to me while I did not see the ballots, yet upon its face, everything appeared to be regular, honest and fair; and as Governor Hobby, as I thought, desired to close the matter by the issuance of the statement, I advised the governor to call in Commissioner Davis and Superintendent Doughty and Commissioner Davis thought that it was the proper thing to do to issue such a statement provided Governor Hobby would sign a statement protesting against signing the statement unless Governor Hobby, who was then in Houston, would join in the statement.

"The governor advised Doughty that Governor Hobby would be anxious to sign the statement, and that he would call Governor Hobby and get permission to affix his signature to same. With this assurance the statement was signed. At no time was the committee advised that Governor Hobby would make any reservation in signing the statement.

"Commissioner Davis told the committee that he had made certain promises as to an affidavit and that if a demand he would give the affidavit, but he left the impression with the committee that he did not expect to file an affidavit unless same was demanded of him.

"At the conclusion of the meeting, Commissioner Davis handed Governor Ferguson an instrument in writing and told the governor that this instrument was his reservation in case the affidavit was demanded.

"I handed the instrument to the governor and he did not read either by Superintendent Doughty or myself.

"That Davis Interview. "Immediately after the adjournment of this meeting, Commissioner Davis gave out an interview stating that he signed the statement with the reservation that three members would make affidavits that they voted for Abilene on the first and second ballots, and Governor Hobby also telephoned from Houston to a press correspondent that he authorized the execution of the statement with the understanding that three members would not file affidavits that they had voted for Abilene.

"When this matter was called to my attention I again stated to my friends as to how I had voted on the first and second ballots, and stated to the press that I was willing to make my affidavit, but I did not vote for Abilene on either the first or the second ballot, and I stated to the press that I executed an affidavit to that effect.

"I have recently had a conference with Governor Hobby, and he informs me that Governor Hobby told him on the telephone on the day the statement was signed, that I had admitted to him having voted for Abilene on the first and second ballots. It would be best for them all to issue a statement, so that the matter would be dropped. I have no doubt that Governor Ferguson made the statement to Governor Hobby.

"The statement that I voted for Abilene on either the first or second ballot, is an unqualified falsehood, and no one has any better reason to know it than Governor Ferguson. I have sought in every way to have this matter reopened and would have continued to insist upon it in Austin except for the facts above stated.

"To leave the matter in its present form, when three members of the board have signed affidavits showing that there was either a mistake in the original count, or a deliberate fraud, is a disgrace to the state. If there was a mistake in the count, it is a fraud now upon the people of this state, and on the committee, for the governor to fail to recall the committee for a fair and open vote as to the location.

REGULATIONS GOVERNING PHYSICAL EXAMINATION OF THOSE DRAFTED

The Times today prints another installment of the regulations governing the physical examination of persons drawn under the selective draft. Today's installment takes up the causes for rejection, beginning as follows: Causes for Rejection. 3. The following defects are causes for rejection: Mental—Lack of normal understanding. Skin—Chronic, contagious and parasitic diseases, when severe and extensive; chronic ulcers, deep or extensive.

Abdomen—Chronic inflammations of the gastro-intestinal tract, including chronic diarrhea and dysentery and other diseases of the contained organs; great care should be exercised before exempting for these conditions; hernia in all situations. Anus—Hemorrhoids of a pronounced type, prolapsus, fistula, and fissure. Genito-urinary organs—Syphilis, when discernible by inspection and physical examination; light urethral stricture; undescended testicle; chronic orchitis, marked hydrocele; chronic disease of the bladder and kidneys. Variatilis does not constitute a cause for rejection with locomotion; it frequently occurs among the most robust men and often without their being aware of its existence. Gonorrhoea, acute and chronic, is not disqualifying, but individuals so affected should be advised immediately to secure appropriate medical treatment pending receipt of orders to report for duty. Affections common to both extremities—Chronic rheumatism and diseases of the joints of disabling type, irreducible dislocation or false joints, old dislocations if attended with impairment of motion or distortion of the joint, severe sprains, chronic synovitis, badly united fractures, caries, necrosis, atrophy or paralysis, extensive or adherent scars, permanent contraction of muscles.

Section 1. The power of impeachment shall be vested in the House of Representatives.

Section 2. Impeachment of the governor, lieutenant governor, attorney general, treasurer, commissioner of the general land office, controller and the judges of the supreme court, court of appeals and district courts shall be tried by the Senate.

Section 3. When the Senate is sitting as a court of impeachment the senators shall be on oath by affirmation, impartially to try the party impeached...

Section 4. Judgment in cases of impeachment shall extend only to removal from office and disqualification from holding any office of honor, trust or profit under this state.

Section 5. All officers against whom articles of impeachment may be preferred shall be suspended from the exercise of the duties of their office during the pendency of such proceedings.

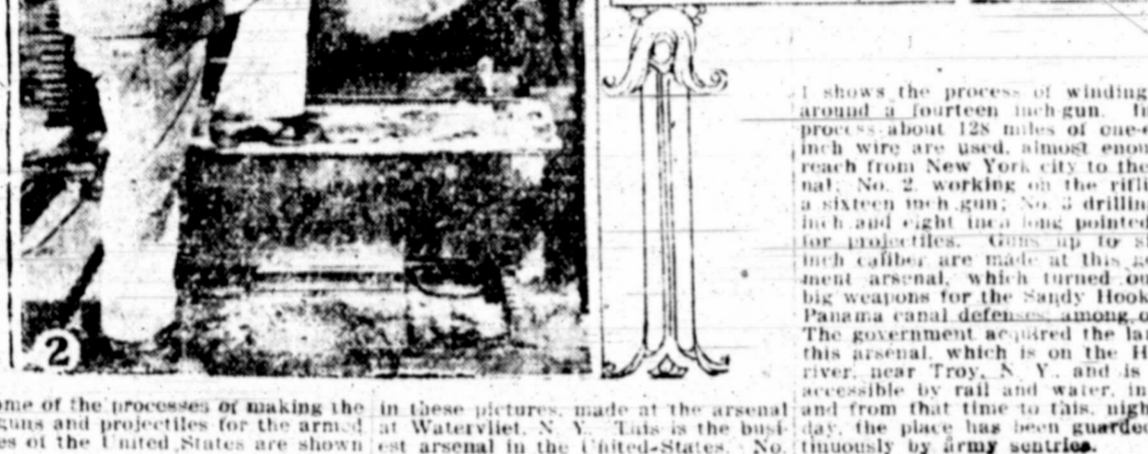
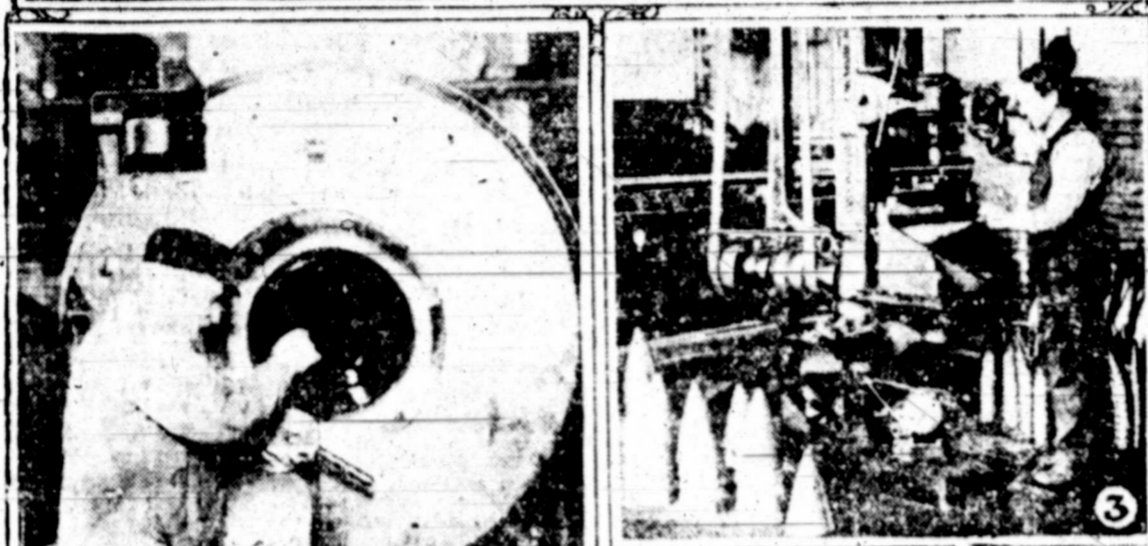
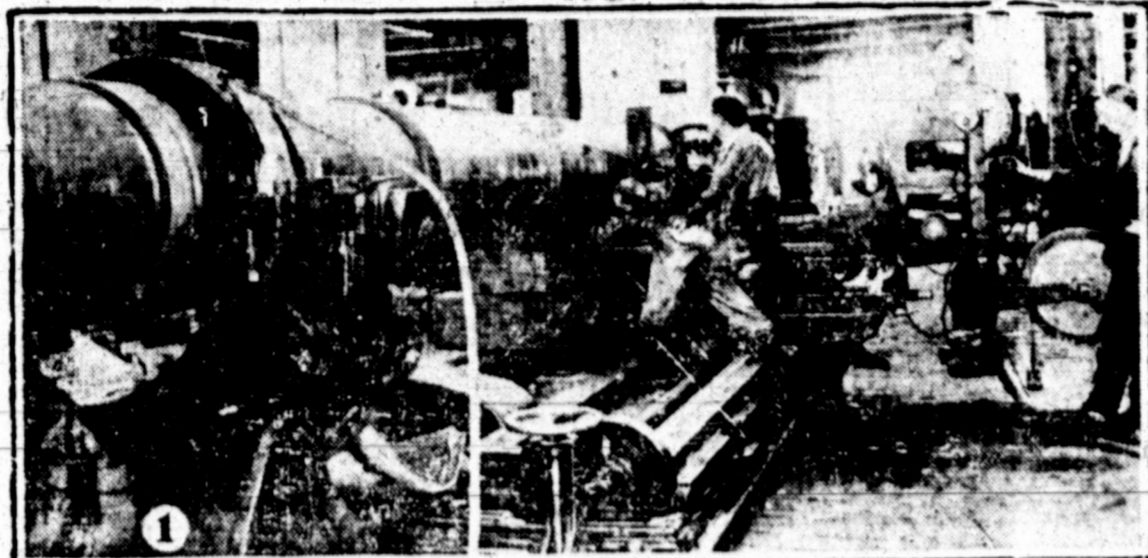

WATERVLIET ARSENAL, WHERE THE BIG GUNS ARE MADE, IS RUSHED NOWADAYS



Some of the processes of making the big guns and projectiles for the arm and forces of the United States are shown in these pictures, made at the arsenal at Watervliet, N. Y. This is the busiest arsenal in the United States. No. 1 shows the process of winding wire around a fourteen-inch gun. In this process about 125 miles of one-eighth inch wire are used, almost enough to reach from New York city to the arsenal. No. 2 working on the rifling of a sixteen-inch gun. No. 3 drilling five-inch and eight-inch long pointed caps for projectiles. Guns up to sixteen-inch caliber are made at this government arsenal, which turned out the big weapons for the Sandy Hook and Panama canal defenses, among others. The government acquired the land for this arsenal, which is on the Hudson river near Troy, N. Y., and is thus accessible by rail and water, in 1867, and from that time to this, night and day, the place has been guarded continuously by army sentries.

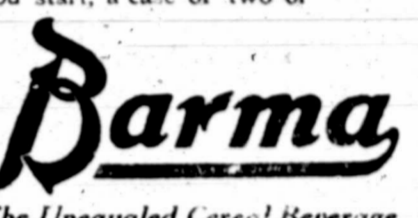

GOVERNMENT IN NORWAY HAS LOST PEOPLES' RESPECT

HAS STOOD FOR ONE HUMILIATION AFTER ANOTHER FROM GERMANY WITHOUT ACTION

PEOPLE DEMAND REDRESS

Government Being Condemned And Friction With Germany Openly Discussed In Legislature

Associated Press Staff Correspondence. Christiania, Norway.—The latest German acts against Norway are being criticized in the press and condemned by the legislature as showing the alleged failure of the Norwegian government to uphold the self-respect of the nation.

Royal mail boats between Denmark and Norway, outside of the German "barred zone" with cargo of killed cattle exclusively for use in Norway are captured by German U-boats, brought to German ports and no satisfactory explanation or satisfaction given.

A Norwegian steamer, the Thorum, in coast traffic, chartered by the Norwegian government itself with cargo of hay to relieve the fodder famine in the northern part of the country was stopped by German U-boats inside the 3-mile line, that means in Norwegian

waters; the Norwegian flag was lowered and the German flag was run up, as the German U-boat chief declared the steamer a German prize because of lack of special clearing papers. A Norwegian torpedo boat arrived, the Norwegian captain declared that as the steamer was in Norwegian waters she was not liable to be seized by German U-boats, ordered the Norwegian flag flown again and the German lowering flag for the second time displaced by the German.

This happened May 16 and, upon an interpolation in the legislature regarding this affair which has turned the whole press and public opinion more anti-German than ever, Minister of Foreign Affairs then answered that the government's protest in Berlin at the affair and give a satisfactory excuse. On the contrary there was no prospect of the ship being released in the near future as the case would be tried before a prize court, humiliating was the announcement that the Norwegian crew now would be brought before German court-martial because they, according to orders from a Norwegian naval officer in Norwegian waters, had hoisted the Norwegian flag.

Discussed In Legislature For the first time since the war broke out a friction with one of the belligerent nations has been discussed openly in the legislature. In other cases the Minister of Foreign Affairs has kept everything secret and been unwilling to let the public know what steps the Norwegian government has taken to protect the rights of their citizens against the new numberless encroachments from German side.

All the leading politicians, in very strong terms, condemned this last humiliation from the German government.

The press requested that the Norwegian crew at once be given their liber-

ty and sent home if the Thorum was not released, asserting that the crew acted according to Norwegian law and should not be punished in Germany.

The only paper that tried to belittle the affair was the Social Demokrisk, which expressed the hope that Germany "will show justice to a small nation not able and not willing to sustain its rights by power."

Only a few days before this, German U-boats in the Arctic Ocean, off the Norwegian coast and outside of the "danger zone" attacked small motor fishing boats, fishing for the Germans and therefore provided with German outfit, sank some of them in the open sea with small chances for the crews to be saved, and in others destroyed the motors and everything on board, seized what they needed of provisions, instruments and even money.

Nobody understands what benefit these acts can be to the great war—to destroy people working for the benefit of Germany itself. The Foreign Minister has sent some messages and protests to Berlin without obtaining a satisfactory explanation. And in these very fishing districts German agents are buying all the Norwegian fish they can get, according to orders from the government. German boats sail safely inside the territorial line guided by Norwegian pilots with their cargoes of fish and provisions for Germany.

Infested With Spies At the same time from all over Norway come reports of arrests of alleged German spies who are sent across the Norwegian border. Norwegian citizens are being convicted by the court in Bergen as paid spies for the German government, and sentenced to imprisonment for not more than six months, although it is proved that their information to the Germans regarding the sailings of Norwegian ships has caused these vessels to be torpedoed and some of the crews to be killed. In the cases the court acted according to the law. The whole nation was struck aghast that this crime against the country should not be punished more severely. The Germans involved were acquitted.

Of the Norwegians involved, two

were captains on route steamers between Newcastle and Bergen, who had acted as spies to the German espionage control in Bergen everything they saw in England and on their way between England and Norway.

The espionage control was established, it is charged, by the Antarctic explorer, Lieutenant Fiehnner who, before the war, had been very kindly received everywhere in Norway, had been the guest of the Geographical Society, and who now used his knowledge to plot against this country, draw Norwegian men in his net and make them traitors to their own country. The whole press condemned Fiehnner and to report to the German espionage control in Bergen everything they saw in England and on their way between England and Norway.

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The whole nation felt ashamed and dishonored by this case, remembering the way Swedish Baron von Rosen, with his anthrax and glanders bacilli in sugar, was treated by Norwegian authorities and the way a German provost, Lieutenant, also was allowed to go back to Germany.

In the legislature it was strongly demanded that the police authorities and the customs should be allowed to stop export of anything the country needs for its own citizens, the fish export to Germany still is going on and the export of canned milk is not stopped, although the prospects for the people in the coming fall and winter are worse than ever.

Why Haven't Exports Stopped Why the government, which week after week suffers humiliations at the hands of the Germans, has permitted all export on Germany until satisfaction is given, is regarded here as a mystery. A great many anti-socialists agree with the socialists who criticize the government for having spent \$10,000,000 in three years on the neutral guard. The socialists say it would have been better to use this money to relieve the people of living, to be of any use and that the money is wasted.

Other citizens who believe in armament for the defense of the country now ask, with the socialists, what the country has obtained for the \$100,000,000. They indignantly declare that more than 400 Norwegian vessels have been destroyed, with the loss of 600 sailors, by the acts of a so-called "friendly" nation, that no excuse for satisfaction has been given for any of the numerous violations of the international law, that Norwegian sailors have been murdered in the life boats; money and private trinkets on board Norwegian ships stolen by German officers taken to Germany; Norwegian government vessels in coast traffic in Norwegian waters seized and taken as prizes to German ports; and that a ship has been fired from a Norwegian gun to defend Norwegian rights, not a Norwegian boat nor a Norwegian sailor has been allowed to fight for his life. Meanwhile they add, the country which has spent \$100,000,000 is threatened by famine of food and fuel during the coming winter.

Such criticism as the foregoing can be read every day in the most prominent papers of the country and heard every day in the social and political situation, but the leading men in the cabinet seem not to listen to public opinion or to be unwilling to restrain their hands from the newspaper Tidsens Tegn, in an editorial the other day, criticizing the political line Norway's government has followed, said: "The whole nation was struck aghast that this crime against the country should not be punished more severely. The Germans involved were acquitted."

Well, that's all part of the job—our

back of this country's allies. It is fine for us, you bet, but what I can't understand is how they get away with it so easy. I guess Uncle Sam can't read German, he is so ignorant. Honest, I better say dumb!

Yes, dumb, because he can read English and he does nothing with the Irish papers here. They are just as strong for Germany as any German paper in this country—and they are printed in English!

Well, that's all part of the job—our

job—and it's a lot better than blowing up factories and railroads and such things. Germany is smart, the smartest in the world, and everybody that reads a German language paper now, it and they now that fighting a war is not just guns and ammunition and submarines and airships. We got other things too. We got secret service but we don't need it. Nothing is secret in this dumb country. We say what we please in our newspapers, here in German and English. We have the

careless and slow-pokes and dummies!

USE EVERY DROP OF MILK

Don't throw away left-over-skim milk, says the United States Department of Agriculture. It is a nutritious food and every drop of it should be used. One way to utilize it is to make milk-vegetable soups.

Milk-Vegetable Soups. To each 2 cups of milk use 1 tablespoonful of flour, 1 tablespoonful of butter, 2 1/2 cups of a thoroughly cooked vegetable, finely chopped, mashed or put through a sieve, and salt to taste. Thicken the milk with the flour and milk, gravy and add the other ingredients.

Practically any vegetable except tomatoes may be used with the other ingredients as stated. If tomatoes are used, 1/2 cup of soda should be added to them to prevent the milk from curdling.

KANSAS CITY MEMBER OF SHIPPING BOARD RESIGNS

By Associated Press. July 23.—John B. White of Kansas City, has resigned as a member of the shipping board and President Wilson is said to have accepted the resignation. Officials of the White House declare Mr. White's resignation was not connected with the difficulties which have developed between Denmark and the United States. Mr. White was said to have found the work exceedingly heavy and was anxious to get out on this account. He was one of Mr. Denman's supporters.

The report that J. Donald of New York, another board member, had resigned, was denied.
