Attacks Today

The Associated Press war summary today says:

Russia's shaken armies in Galicia are still in retreat, which bids fair not to end until they reach the line occupied by them last year before General Brussiloff began his big offensive.

Despite this retrograde movement covering practically all the front between the North Galician border and the Carpathian footbills, the tone of both official and unofficial dispatches from Petrograd is not pessimistic.

Objection Made to Abilene

"One of the greatest objections urg Abilene was on account of the insuf-ficient water supply. Commissioner water supply Commissioner presented to the committee a report from some authority stating that it was practical to bring the water from a certain dam site some distance from Abilene, and Davis in dicated that he was advised that he was practical to supply Abilene with water from the proposed dam site, but he did not indicate that he would you for Abilene. vote for Abilene.





riotic program that will be educational as well as entertaining.




