









CAPPS AND HURLEY INTRUSTED WITH THE GOVERNMENT'S SHIPBUILDING PLANS



Rear Admiral Washington Lee Capps, chosen by President Wilson to succeed General Goethals as general manager of the Emergency Fleet corporation, has won distinction as chief constructor of the navy department and is credited with being largely responsible for the development of the American dreadnaught. The skeleton, or basket, was one of his ideas for the improvement of fighting vessels. It is said: Rear Admiral Capps was born in Portsmouth, Va., in 1864, and was graduated from the Naval Academy in 1884. He was appointed assistant naval constructor in 1888 and was promoted to naval constructor in 1895. He was stationed at the Brooklyn navy yard from 1889 to 1892 and with the bureau of construction and repair in Washington from 1892 to 1895. He was on the staff of Admiral Dewey in 1898, and from 1901 to 1902 he was in charge of the construction department of the Brooklyn navy yard. In the latter year he was chief constructor of the navy and chief of the bureau of construction and repair, with the rank of rear admiral. In 1912 he resigned from the navy to accept a permanent commission as chief constructor in 1913. In 1913 he was appointed by President Wilson to succeed General Goethals as general manager of the Emergency Fleet corporation. He was chairman of the conference committee on safety of construction. Edward N. Hurley, who takes the place of William Leitch as chief of the shipping board, is a "friend" of the Wilson administration. He was a prosperous manufacturer and stock raiser, living in Wichita, Kan., until 1915, when he was appointed to the

KENNEDY RETURNS FROM MARKETING TRIP TO THE EAST

E. D. Kennedy and wife returned last night, he from eastern markets, and from visiting the mines in Greenville, Celeste and Bonham. There will be more cotton in the market, in practically the same quantities than ever was dreamed of. Woolens suits have advanced pretty considerably. "As regards dyes, we have solved the color proposition as completely as Germany, and feel that the consumer has nothing to fear in that direction. The finest colors, in practically the full line of shades, are now made in America. "The silk trade is better than it ever was. Consumers are glad to pay the price, and want the best goods. There is no outlet now for the cheap silks which a few years ago had the run of the market. American made silks are in a class all to themselves, and the price is no object with the consumer if she can get the quality and style. "The hosiery situation shows that the cheap grades have advanced more than the higher priced goods. Stockings which were 85 cents a dozen wholesale a year ago are now up

OVER A BILLION DOLLARS ADDED TO WAR TAX BILL

Washington, July 31.—Increase of the pending \$1,670,000,000 war tax bill to a total of \$2,600,000,000 was decided upon today by the Senate finance committee. Increases on corporations' normal-income taxes, on incomes of individuals of \$15,000 and over a further increase of \$1 per gallon on distilled spirits and 50 cents increase on beer with a few other minor tax increases will make up the additional levy. The committee decided to increase the present 2 per cent normal rates on corporate incomes to 6 per cent as against 4 per cent the bill as originally drawn. It is expected to yield \$162,000,000 additional revenues. The increase in surtax rates on individual incomes of \$15,000 and more was est-

**GUARD COMPANIES BECOME FEDERAL UNITS SUNDAY**

On Sunday the National Guard will become an integral part of the federal army, under orders of and subject to the same regulations and discipline as the regular troops.

It is of the utmost importance that every enlisted man in the National Guard be present at the mustering into federal service or he will come under the regulation stating "Department commanders will take steps to apprehend and bring to trial all members of the National Guard who fail to report for duty in response to the call or draft." The directions to the company commanders are very definite and explicit, and there is no possibility of their going from their orders in any particular. Excerpts from the Special Regulations No. 55, War Department, Bureau of Militia Affairs, have been sent to the company commanders, who must follow them to the letter.

These orders have to do with every detail of the work, not only as to the particulars for mobilization, but with regard to the conducting of the entire affairs of the camp. All expenses items, vouchers, and receipts must be looked after in the most business-like way, and the letters state that the supply departments of the army are exceedingly exacting in their requirements in accounting.

All records and reports must start anew from the date of mobilization, so that there shall be no confusion between the affairs prior to the Guard's being in federal service, and after. Supplies and equipment will be furnished all commands as soon after August 5 as it is possible for the department to do so.

The two companies of the National Guard here will remain at the camp at the Lake until further orders. It has not yet been definitely decided when they will break camp to go to Camp Bowie at Fort Worth, but one of the Federal officers said today that in all probability the movement would take place sometime between August 15 and September 1.

A prominent publicity man in town suggested that it would be a perfect immense stunt from a publicity standpoint for the boys to march from here to Fort Worth, and would also be a means of getting their hands-in this case feet-in. The officers of G company, without showing any marked enthusiasm over the project, thought it might be an excellent thing for F company. F company, however, on being approached, said that their natural modesty made them shrink from assuming the importance of publicity agents for the National Guard.

In publishing the rosters of Companies F and G yesterday, the caption "Company G" appeared over both rosters. The first roster was that of Company F.
