PRISONER TELLS OF FARE IN GERMAN PRISON CAMPS
Chicago, Aug. 21.—Albert Martin Dwyer is a smiling man, but he is a prisoner of war. He is a member of the United States navy when the European war broke out. He immediately shipped for France, joined the French army and served eight months in the Dardanelles campaign, was wounded, returned to New York and shipped again on the White Star liner Georgia while she was captured by the German commerce raider. They sank the Georgia, picked up 120 of the crew, let the rest go, each kicked me into the sea," he declared. He was rescued and was aboard the steamer Yarrowdale when it was captured. He was then taken to the German prison camp and was put upon the ration to which he offers such vigorous objections. Throughout a series of camps he went, he says, each worse than the other, until in rags and shoeless he was held at Bradenburg which is known among the prisoners as the "hell hole." Dwyer relates inhuman practices of the Germans.
Through the influence of Ambassador Gerard, he says, he was released in March, 1917, since which time he has leisurely viewed the war and worked his way toward home. He attempted to rejoin the United States navy but was rejected because of an injured foot, a result of the Dardanelles campaign.
