MET HERE BY DELEGATION WHICH ACCOMPANIED PARTY TO WILBARGER CITY

The State Highway Commissioners, together with delegations from Alvord and Henrietta, arrived this morning after a little hard riding, and were met by a delegation from the Chamber of Commerce, who accompanied the whole party to Vernon.

The party included Mr. and Mrs. Curtis Hancock, H. C. Wells, federal engineer, J. B. Mabry, Secretary of the State Good Roads Association, who is also piloting the party; H. C. Odle, commissioner from Meridian, R. R. Lewis of Miami, Fla.; J. W. Walker, county judge from Decatur, S. M. Ward, J. E. Tippets, commissioner from Alvord, W. H. Chilson and wife, Henrietta and H. H. Haggard, Henrietta.

The Wichita Falls delegation included E. G. Hill, Morris Marcus, Judge Harvey Harris, B. F. Johnson, Miner A. L. Orth and Commissioner J. P. Jackson.

Mr. Hancock said that at Alvord, the party was met by a delegation with twenty watermelons, none of which weighed less than fifty pounds. To Mr. Hancock fell the honor of cutting the first melon, which weighed slightly over forty pounds. He said that after the melon feast, one of the party made a speech, which did not at all do justice either to the melons or the hospitality of the hosts.

GREAT NEW SLAV NATION OUTLINED BY SERB PREMIER

DEMOCRATIC MONARCHY LARGER
THAN ANY OF SECONDARY
POWERS OF EUROPE HAS
ENTELE SUPPORT

Corfu, Island of Corfu, Aug. 1.—(By Mail).—The premier and minister of foreign affairs, the Venerable Nickola Pachitch today summed up for the Associated Press the main features of the proposed new nation of the southern Slavs which is to unite under one flag and king, a self governing population of some 14,000,000 people.

This, in effect, is the appearance of a new state and the overthrow of monarchs, for it is the careful work of all the political leaders of the sister Slav nations and has besides the powerful support of the Entente Allies. M. Pachitch had before him the formal proclamation of this and stated a new declaration of independence, which had been agreed upon by the council between various ministers, the president of the Serbian parliament, the king and regent now at Saloniki, and all the other elements affected.

Pachitch first took a large map of the Balkans and pointed out the sweep of territory he intended for the Slav kingdom. He drew a large circle to include Serbia, Montenegro, Bosnia, Herzegovina, Dalmatia, Croatia, Slavonia, and the eastern part of Istria.

These together make an imposing area, more than triple the size of Spain or any of the powers now existing in Europe in area and population and approaching some of the great powers.

It would be a great sea power as well and the premier pointed to the long sea front on the Adriatic giving access to the Mediterranean and the Atlantic and to the commerce of the world.

"Here we propose to establish a united Slav nation," M. Pachitch went on. "With a government having these essential points: A monarchy based on democracy and the right of the people to constitute with a representative system, a parliament and a responsible ministry. Elections will be by universal, equal and direct suffrage by secret ballot. All titles of nobility will be abolished."

"Complete freedom of religion will be guaranteed to Greek-Orthodox, Roman Catholic and Moslem alike. While there will be state religions, and a king for the united nation yet each state, Croatia, Serbia, Dalmatia, etc., will be represented and self governing on local affairs as much as the states of the United States."

General Korniloff then outlined the most important of these measures, in addition to restoration of the death penalty, which are:

First—Restoration of discipline in the army by the strengthening of the discipline over the soldiers and non-commissioned officers.

Second—Improvement of the financial condition of the officers who have been in a very difficult position in the recent military operations.

Third—Restriction of the functions

of the regimental committees, which, although managing economic affairs of the regiments, must not be permitted to have any part in decisions regarding military operations or the appointments of leaders.

C. W. REID DESCRIBES ATTRACTION OF MENA, ARKANSAS

Charles W. Reid, president of the National Bank of Commerce of the city, wrote the following letter from Ark., where he has recently joined his family who are summering in the Ozark mountains.

Wichita Falls is built upon a tableland lying on the southern slope of Rich mountain, the loftiest peak between the Alleghenies and the Rockies. The altitude of the business portion of the town is 4,100 feet; while many of its houses are from three to three-and-a-half stories high. Because of the protection of the mountains on the north, zero weather rarely ever occurs, last winter's record showing + above as the coldest. The farmers here boast of six months growing weather, and are now putting potatoes for their usual fall crop.

This pretty mountain town has a resident population of less than 5000, although at present there are many summer visitors. It has all the modern conveniences. A public telephone and water supply comes from a natural gravity system supplied from springs and a deep well up in the mountains.

The chief attraction, however, is Jansen Park, a real beauty spot, credit to the city. It covers four acres in the center of the city, and in its making Nature and art have worked with lavish hand. The wonderful spring flowing from the basin in the little valley fills two small lakes, which abound in game fish, and is stately with swans floating about and cast from the hands of strangers.
