OPINION FROM LOONEY SOUGHT BEFORE ACTION

ATTEMPT TO SEAT COLLINS AT ONCE AS SENATE MEMBER IS FAILURE

MOTION LOST 14 TO 11

Senator Adopts Motion By Lattimore To Refer Question To Attorney General

By Associated Press. Austin, Texas, Sept. 3.—An attempt to at once seat V. A. Collins of Beaumont, recently elected Senator from the Fourteenth District at a special election, today overshadowed interest in the impeachment proceedings against Governor James E. Ferguson, in the Senate, sitting as a high court.

The attempt came just before the high court convened and was initiated by Senator Hudspeth of El Paso after Senator Lattimore of Fort Worth had moved that the Senate obtain from Attorney General B. E. Looney, an opinion as to the legality of Collins' election.

Mr. Hudspeth moved a substitute that the Senate immediately call Mr. Looney before the Senate and confirm him. This motion was lost 11 to 14, one present and not voting.

Senator Bailey, who had previously failed on a point of order, to have the matter referred to the committee on privileges and election for investigation, introduced his motion. It was tabled, however, and the Lattimore motion was adopted.

In his argument favoring the obtaining of the attorney general's opinion, Mr. Lattimore said he expected a ruling could be obtained by noon, and Mr. Collins "could be seated" this afternoon.

The morning was spent in reading the articles of impeachment presented by the House and the governor's answer and demurrer. If Mr. Collins is sworn in this afternoon he will miss none of the evidence.

Just before the afternoon session, Attorney General Looney said in an opinion in the V. A. Collins case would not be completed today.

Mr. Looney added that Collins, he understood, has come to Austin with his certificate of election, and had been chosen by a large percentage of the voters in the Fourteenth District.

In ordinary times no question as to his being seated would have arisen, he said.

Reading of the governor's answer continued in the afternoon. M. M. Crane, counsel developing the testimony against the governor, planned first to take up the evidence regarding the governor's financial affairs, and H. F. Blum, assistant cashier of the Temple State Bank, was the first witness called.

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RIGA GIVES GERMAN BASE ON THE RUSSIAN RIGHT FLANK

GERMANS MAY NOW SWING BACK ENTIRE RUSSIAN LINE

Much Depends Upon The Forces Germany Can Spare From Russian Front

EVACUATION OF PETROGRAD IS NOW FORECAST

CLAIM SERBIAN ATTACKS WERE UNSUCCESSFUL

The Associated Press war summary follows: Riga, Russia's principal Baltic port, has been abandoned to the Germans under the threat of an offensive by land and sea in which the deciding stroke of the land side was delivered by the Germans last Saturday.

The fate of Riga was practically sealed when German troops, powerfully initiating their offensive, forced a crossing of the Dvina southeast of the city and pushed northward after making good their foothold on the right bank of the stream.

Menaced also by the attack of a column of Teutonic forces moving from Mitau, southwest of Riga, and by the German naval forces recently reported hovering in the vicinity of the Gulf of Riga, the Russian military authorities evidently considered the city no longer tenable and decided to evacuate it.

The possible ultimate military consequences of this development are difficult to estimate. The right flank of the entire Russian western front was anchored on the Gulf of Riga at a point to which the size of the forces at their disposal for operations in this war theater. It is too early yet for it to be made apparent whether they will be content to present the occupation of the Baltic seaport the Russians have left to them, or if the advantage is to be pushed and an attempt made to swing back the entire Russian line on this front, creating an opening for an operation by land and water with Petrograd as the objective.

On the Italian front, General Cadorna while confining his activities along the greater part of the line mainly to rounding Austrian positions with his big guns, has effected a farther advance in the district south of Gorizia. The Italians here have made a determined attack and pushed their lines further east in the Brestovizza Valley.

The instability of the Russian troops has an important influence upon the decision to order the evacuation of the Riga district. As had been the case in Galicia and Roumania, some of the Russian units left their trenches without making a fight.

The Russo-Romanian armies are showing a much firmer resistance on the Roumanian front, repelling all the Teutonic advances. Several attacks were delivered yesterday in which the attacking forces sustained large losses and gained nothing.

Amsterdam, Sept. 3.—Serbians on Petrograd during the last few days have been successfully repulsed costing the attacking force heavy losses while Bulgarian detachments co-operating with Germans in the Sereth district of the Russian front, inflicted severe losses capturing 63 prisoners and several guns, according to the Bulgarian official statement issued today.

BUSINESS ADJUSTING ITSELF TO LOWER PRICES AND NEW CONDITIONS IN WHOLESOME WAY

Review of business for the past week follows: In volume, new business is not what it was a year ago, but conditions are clearly more wholesome and the transition to a more normal range of prices, though accompanied by some evidence of unsettlement, can only be regarded as favorable in its ultimate bearing on the future.

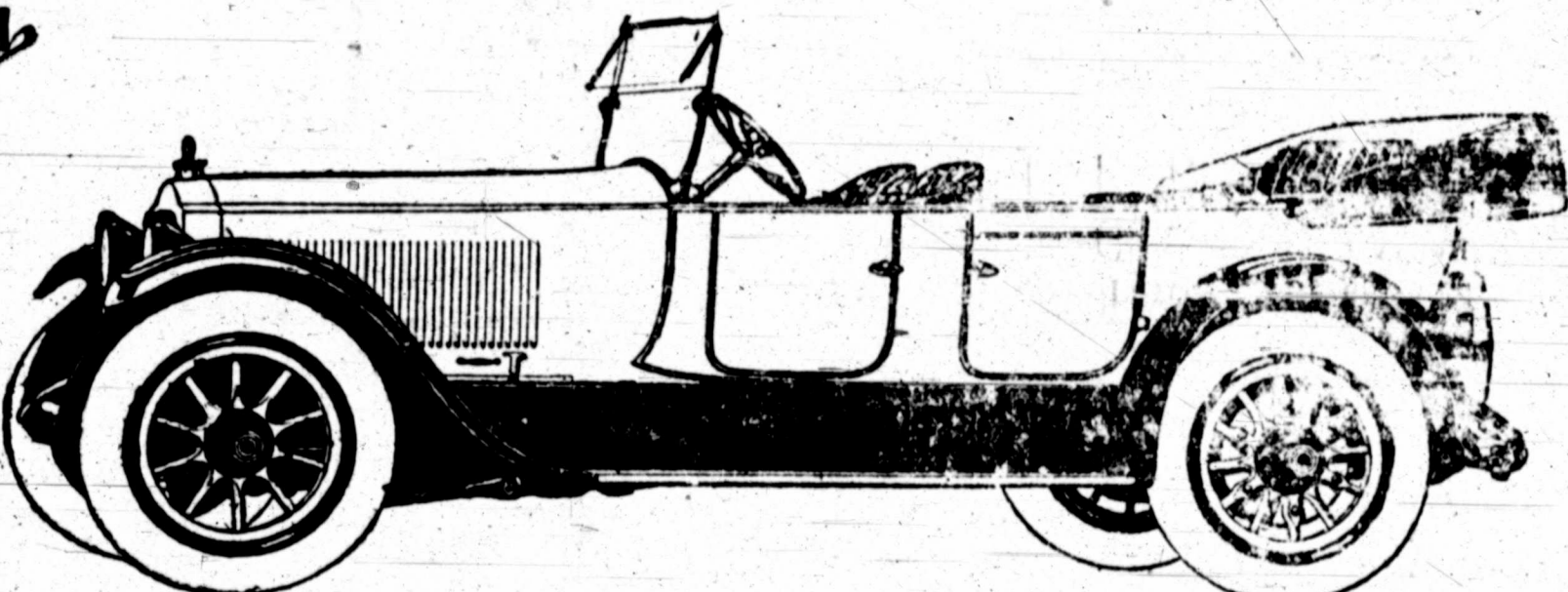

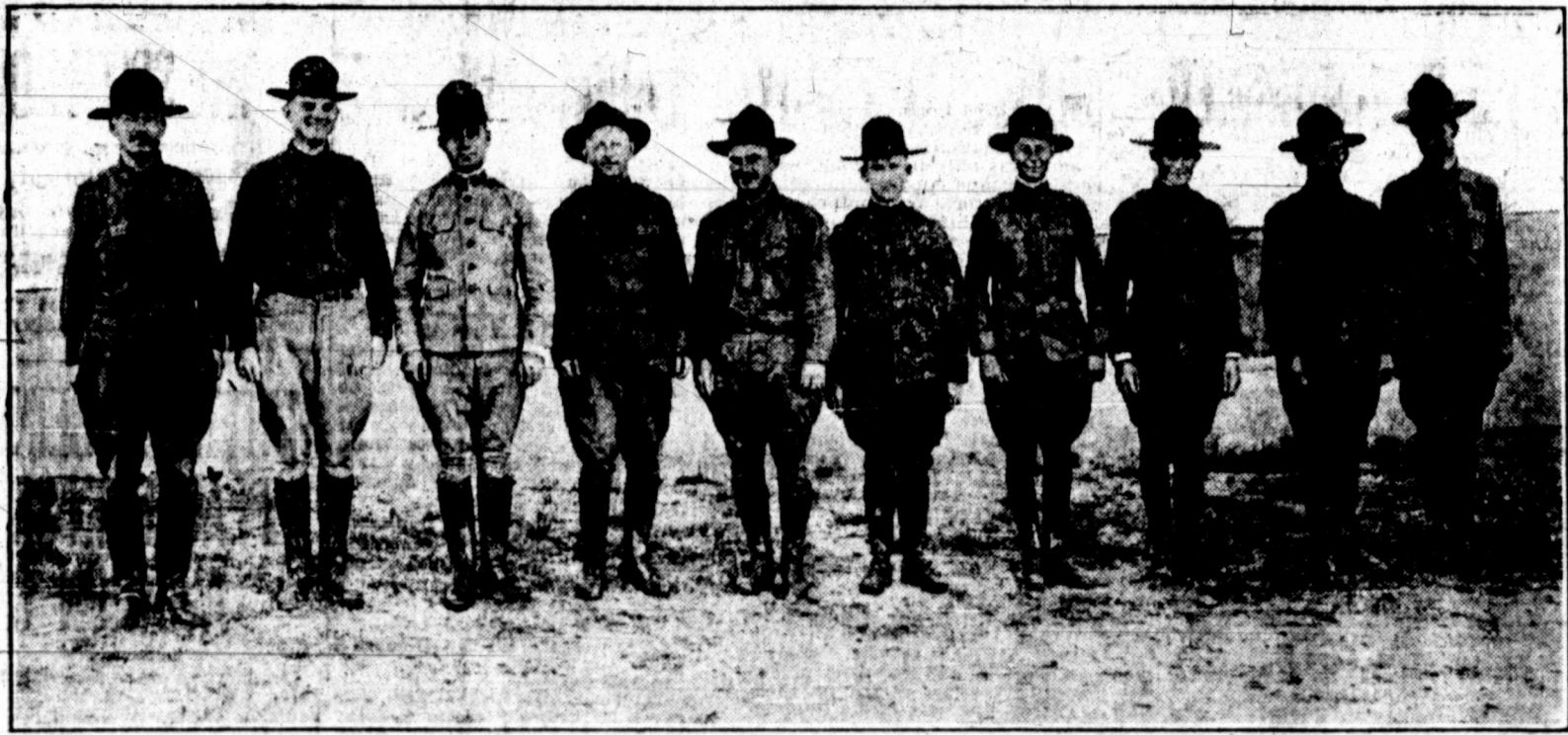

NEW RECORD SET IN CONSUMPTION OF WHISKEY AND TOBACCO DURING THE FISCAL YEAR JUST TERMINATED

By Associated Press.

Washington, D. C., Sept. 3.—All previous American records for consumption of whiskey, cigars, cigarettes and tobacco apparently went by the boards during the past fiscal year. The preliminary reports of Commissioner of Internal Revenue Osborne covering the 12 months ending June 30 indicate public shows record tax collections on these and other articles.

Here are the grand totals of production upon which taxes were paid:—Distilled spirits from every source, 164,665,246 gallons, an increase of 26,000,000 gallons over the previous year, yielding a tax return of \$186,563,055.

Cigars of all descriptions, 9,918,991, 113—approximately nine per capita as compared with 8,337,729,530 the previous year.

Cigarettes, 30,529,192,538, an increase of 21,087,757,078, an increase of more than forty per cent.

Tobacco, chewing and smoking, 44,783,206 pounds, an increase of 28,500,000 pounds. Even snuff went to apparent new high figures of production with 35,377,751 pounds, an increase of 2,200,000 pounds in the year.

The return to the government in taxes on cigars, cigarettes, tobacco and snuff was \$103,201,592, an increase of approximately \$15,000,000 over the previous year.

The record figures indicate great nationwide prosperity, officials state, and in the case of cigarettes, tremendous growth of the habit among workers.
