**ENTENTE BELIEVE  
GRAVEST PROBLEM  
THAT OF SHIPPING**

EVERY EFFORT WILL BE MADE TO SAFEGUARD OCEAN TRAFFIC THIS WINTER.

By Associated Press.  
London, Friday Sept. 7. (Delayed by the censor)—It is learned here that the entente governments have agreed that the shipping situation is the most serious problem of all those facing the entente at the beginning of the fourth winter of the war, and every effort will be made during the coming months to impress the people of England and America with the fact that the greatest effort of the whole war will be necessary to solve it. A government official informed the Associated Press today:

"There is no disguising the fact that the shipping situation is serious. Do not misunderstand me—the shipping situation has not grown serious through any increased activity of the German submarine warfare. As matter of fact, the German submarine war is being held down very well, and the average sinking shows no increase either in ships or tonnage.

Rate of Loss Low.  
"The sinkings in the Atlantic main routes are now very low, and the greater proportion of the sinkings occur in out-of-the-way spots, indicating that either the submarines have been driven far afield or a larger number of them are operating.

"But the total available tonnage is shrinking slightly, while on the other hand, the demand for tonnage from all directions are increasing tremendously. Where three ships were needed a year ago, four are needed now.

France is very short of coal, one of the vital necessities for winter. Italy is short of coal, and the shortage is so serious that it is causing the Italian government the utmost concern. For all these shortages there is only one remedy, namely, tonnage.

"But still more important demand for tonnage comes from America, whence the entente great reserve of men must come this winter. The necessity for tonnage to transport the American army and keep them supplied is perhaps the most important feature of the shipping situation.

"So the entente statesmen have arrived at the conclusion that the winning effort which will be demanded of England and America this winter, an effort to push quickly to completion—more quickly than ever attempted before—fleet upon fleet of ships to carry the sinews of war to the fighting nations.

**William Gauzer Goes  
to College Station,  
Resigning at Denton**

William Gauzer, district agricultural agent at Denton, resigned his position there, according to advices received here, on account of the changing of his headquarters from Denton to College Station. Mr. Gauzer had held the position for many years, and was very well known in Denton, where he and his family had made their home; and he did not like the idea of cutting loose from his moorings, so to speak, and going to College Station. No appointment of a successor has as yet been reported, and the friends of Mr. Gauzer are hoping that some arrangement may be possible by which he can retain his hold of the work, and yet remain at Denton.

B. F. Johnson, secretary of the Chamber of Commerce, was anxious to obtain the location of the agricultural district agent here, being convinced that Wichita Falls had many advantages to offer. The department of agriculture at Washington, however, declined the offer, as the following letter will show:

Dear Mr. Johnson:

In reply to your letter of the 1st inst. it is not the intention of the Extension Office at College Station to change the location of the district agent. In fact, it is the purpose of the office to have all district agents make their headquarters at College Station, where they can be reached from the main office as much time and expense as in bringing them to the office for conferences. It would be saved in traveling by having their headquarters with the district which they superintend. I assure you I appreciate the fact that Wichita Falls is an excellent place for such an office, in the event we found it necessary to open an office in that region. Yours very truly,

**WATER IS FOUND  
EIGHTEEN FEET  
BELOW SURFACE**

Messrs. Berry and Horry, who run truck farms about a mile east of town, have joined in digging a water well and have installed a power pump with which they hope to irrigate their farms. At a depth of eighteen feet they have found an apparently inexhaustible flow of water. They pumped this water all yesterday afternoon without lowering it an inch, the water being pumped with force through a two and a half inch pipe, at the rate of eighty gallons a minute. Overnight, however, clay had caved down around the bricks at the bottom of the hole closing the flow, and it was necessary to clean out this clay before the water flowed into the well. They believe they can pump a supply of water ample to irrigate their two farms from this one well.

A deposit of sharp clean gravel was found at a depth of twelve feet. The land in the valley east of Holliday Creek is said to be underlaid with a body of water found at a depth of from 12 to 18 feet. Others are planning to dig wells for irrigation purposes, since the supply of water for irrigation has been cut off at Lake Wichita.

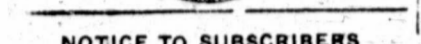

Men who ought to be at home preparing their land for wheat sowing are now cruising over the country in covered wagons with their families, searching for a new Eldorado.

The Nashville Banner, one of the oldest and the best afternoon papers in the country, now in its forty-third year of existence, is getting out a Sunday morning edition. Its first ef-

fort along this line was made Sunday morning, the 9th, and was 92 pages, including supplements. The Banner now boasts of an average daily circulation of 50,000, which, it claims, is by far a greater circulation than that of any other Nashville paper.

During the afternoon students of the school of marines were brought into the palace as well as parts of the Probrachensky and Litovskii regiments, while in the court yards were armed motor cars. Elsewhere in the city there was little military show, but all through the night posts of five and six "infantrymen" paraded the streets and occupied the court yards.

During the night Premier Kerensky had a conference with the procurator and dictated a lengthy description of the details of the conspiracy. The government has suppressed "The Novoe Vremya," a prominent printing prominently Korniloff's proclamations, while publishing M. Kerensky's in contracted form.

Petrograd, Tuesday, Sept. 11.—Members of the Kerensky government have informed the Associated Press that while they are unable to report the final overthrow of General Korniloff, they are optimistic concerning the general situation.

General Kozmin, commanding the Petrograd city garrison, declared before the meeting in the Winter Palace of the representatives of the different organizations: "No Negotiations Possible. Our only future conversation will be carried on through cannon."

The opening was 72 points higher on September and six to 20 points higher on later positions, with the tone barely steady at the advance. Heading was very heavy, and the trade took rather a more favorable view of the weather map which showed slightly higher temperatures in the south. After selling at 20.95 on the call October eased off to 20.80 while January reacted from 20.70 to 20.65, or back to nearly last night's closing. There was further covering and some scattered buying on bulk spot advices from Texas, but this was less general after the advances of the past two days.

Slight rallies preceded the weekly weather report, but this statement read more favorable than expected, and the market soon weakened again under continued realizing, southern and local selling. At midday October had sold off to 20.49 and January to 20.12, making a decline of 35 to 40 points from last night's close and of about 55 to 60 from the high level of the morning.

One of the chief requirements for the new National Army, as far as can be judged by instructions to the recruiting station, are men for the ordnance department who have been formerly gunsmiths, or machinists of any kind, would be good men for this department. The following list of names has been issued from headquarters and sent to all the local recruiting stations: "Accept for enlistment in the Ordnance Corps, National Army, any qualified applicant, who is a native-born citizen of the United States, and from chief of ordnance requesting such acceptance. Send applicants to arsenal for enlistment, if so requested by the chief of ordnance. If not a native-born citizen, he must be naturalized; otherwise to proper depot."

LEVI GAMBILL HELD GUILTY OF VIOLATING FOOD LAW

Levi Gambill was given a new trial this morning in police court. He was charged with violation of the sanitary code and pure food laws of the city. The jury returned a verdict of guilty, and assessed a fine of \$25.00. Gambill was held in jail until he could pay the fine. He was found guilty by a jury, who recommended a suspended sentence, when no penalty had been assessed. Gambill, wanting the matter cleared up fully, asked for and received a new trial. The case drew out of the court for several days. Gambill's attorney, who has been retained, thereby allowing files and other insects to enter.

REMARKABLE SUBMARINE VIEWS IN "CIVILIZATION"  
"Civilization," Thomas H.
