Has Faith in Russia **But Thinks Kerensky** An 'Honest Visionary'

London, Sept. 12—Leslie Urquart, one of the most prominent mining and oil engineers in Russia, who has just arrived in London, in an interview to "The Daily Mail" says:

"I have faith in Russia. I have known the country more than 20 years and she will pull through. * * Whether General Korniloff will prove the savior of society' I cannot tell.

TO SAFEGUARD OCEAN TRAF-FIC THIS WINTER.

By Associated Press.

London, Friday Sept. 7. (Delayed by the censor).—It is learned here that the entente governments have agreed that the shipping situation is the most serious problem of all those facing the entente at the beginning of the fourth winter of the war, and every effort will be made during the coming months to impress the people of England and America with the fact that the greatest effort of the whole war will be necessary to solve it. A government official informed the Associated Press today:

government official informed the Associated Press today:

"There is no disguising the fact that the shipping situation is serious. Do not misunderstand me—the shipping situation has not grown serious through any increased success of the German submarine warfare. As a matter of fact, the German submarine war is being held down very well, and the average sinking shows no inscrease either in ships or tonnage.

Rate of Loss Low.

"The sinkings in the Atlantic main routes are now very low, and the greater proportion of the sinkings occur in out-of-the way spots, indicating

cur in out-of-the way spots, indicating that eiter the submarines have been driven far afield or a larger number

of them are operating.

"But the total available tonnage is shrinking slightly, while on the other hand, the demand for tonnage from all directions are increasing tremendously. Where three ships were needed a year ago, four are needed now. France is very short of coal, one of the vital necessaries for winter. Italy is short of coal, and the shortage is is short of coal, and the shortage is so serious that it is causing the Italian covernment the utmost concern. all these shortages there is only one emedy, namely, tonnage.

Demand From America.

Demand From America.

"But a still more important demand for tonnage comes from America. whence the entente great reserve of men must come this winter. The necessity for tonnage to transport the American army and keep them supplied is perhaps the most important feature of the shipping situation.

"So the entente statesmen have arrived at the conclusion that the winning of the war will depend on the new effort which will be demanded of England and America this winter, an effort to push quickly to completion—more quickly than ever attempted before—fleet upon fleet of ships to carry the sinews of war to the fighting nations."







JUDGE HARRIS MAKES TALKS AT NOON DAY LUNCHEON OF BODY.

"I have been asked many times what kind of roads the county is going to build. You can answer that question as well as I can." Judge Harvey Harris told the members of the Lions Club, at their regular weekly anticheon Wednesday.

He quoted the section of the county road law which provides penalties to members of the county commission ers' court of fines of \$500 to \$1,000 and jaff sentences of six months to one year for failure to complete the system. He said members of the court would be subject to these penalties if they failed to comply with the law, and that they were going to build the road system outlined when the road bonds were voted. He said he believed this system would aggregate nearer 120 miles than the 110 miles estimated. There could be no decision on the kind of roads that would be built he said, until the surveys now being made were completed and estimates as to the cost of various materials made. He said the and estimates as to the cost of va-rious materials made. He said—the road engineer and the county com-missioners' court were determined to give the people the very best system of roads the money available would

Judge Harris said he had receive reports that outside parties were try-ing to secure options on all the gravel deposits in this section, evidently un-der the belief that they could put up the price on the county. He said he wanted it known that the county had right to condemn any gravel deposi for the county's use, paying therefor a fair price to be fixed by a commis-sion of three men.



REMARKABLE SUBMARINE VIEWS IN "CIVILIZATION"
