Austin, Texas, Sept. 20 .- The Senate high court of impeachment this afternoon voted 22 to 7 that Governor James E. Ferguson must tell who loaned him \$156,000, with which he paid his debts. There was one present and not voting.

Austin, Texas, Sept. 20 .- Amid a turmoil of argument over what action should be taken following a refusal by Governor James E. Ferguson to tell who loaned him \$156,000 in currency this year, the Senate high court of impeachment today recessed at noon for two hours.

The question before the court, due to be decided this afternoon, is whether the refusal of the governor shall be referred to the committee on civil jurisprudence for a report, or whether the court shall itself act directly on the matter.

The long-awaited question from the proponents came soon after the high court, delayed by a legislative session, met this morning. Some minor evidence was introduced, and then M. M. Crane, chief counsel for the House board of managers, leaned for-






