

FIFTEEN KILLED IN AIR RAIDS ON BRITISH TOWNS

BOTH ZEPPELINS AND AIRPLANES TAKE PART IN THE ATTACK.

THREE VICTIMS WOMEN

More Than Seventy-one Injured By Bombs, Hurled For Most Part, From Heavier Than Air Machines.

The war situation of today as summarized by The Associated Press is as follows: The double air raid on England by German Zeppelins and airplanes last night resulted in the death of fifteen persons and the injury of more than seventy.

Nearly all the casualties were caused by the airplane division, two of the machines of which reached London. The bombs of the airplane fleet accounted for all the killed and all but three of the injured, according to the official reports today.

On the French front in Northern France the Germans are keeping up their activities north of Verdun. Their guns are still bombarding the Chauve Wood where the German infantry attacked yesterday but failed to drive the French from any portion of their line.

A new attack was delivered last night in the Beaumont region south-east of Chauve Wood and in this kind fire was employed by the cross-prince's troops. Here again they failed to gain ground and suffered heavy losses from the French fire.

The British front has quieted down considerably from the state of furious activity prevailing for a week or more. Nevertheless there is a great deal of artillery work in progress in the Lens region a surprise attack made on a British post northeast of Lens was repulsed while on the Somme front the British made a trench east of Epehy and brought back many prisoners.

TWO PLANES PENETRATE DEFENSES OF LONDON

Fifteen persons were killed and seventy injured in last night's air raid over London. The Zeppelins which crossed the Yorkshire coast did not penetrate inland being driven off by gunfire. Three women were injured. Only two airplanes at the most, penetrated the defenses of London last night. It is reported officially.

The following official report was given out by Lord French, commander of the home defenses: "Airplane raid: The latest reports concerning last night's airplane raid show that the group of raiders which appeared above London was driven off by anti-aircraft guns. Only one, or at the most two machines penetrated the defenses. The casualties in all the raided districts reported by the police up to the present are:

Killed, 15. Injured, 70. The material damage was not great. Airmail raid: Enemy airplanes crossed the Yorkshire and Lincolnshire coasts between midnight and 3 a. m. There was no serious attack, having penetrated to any distance inland. They were driven off by gunfire from various defended localities which they attempted to approach. Bombs were dropped at one coast town, three women being slightly injured. Little damage was caused."

Viewed by daylight this morning the damage resulting from the visit of the German raiders to London last night appeared to be unimportant. The number of bombs dropped in the London district was small and the practical results were almost negligible. The chief damage visible was broken glass. In one spot where a heavy bomb landed squarely in the middle of the street, a hole four feet deep was torn. The concussion of this bomb, including windows in neighboring hotels in which are many Americans, Canadians and Australians.

LIQUID FIRE IS EMPLOYED BY GERMANS IN ATTACK

Paris, Sept. 25.—Liquid fire was used by the Germans in an attack on the French lines in the Beaumont region north of Verdun last night. The French, however, repulsed the assault with heavy losses to the Germans, the war office announced today.

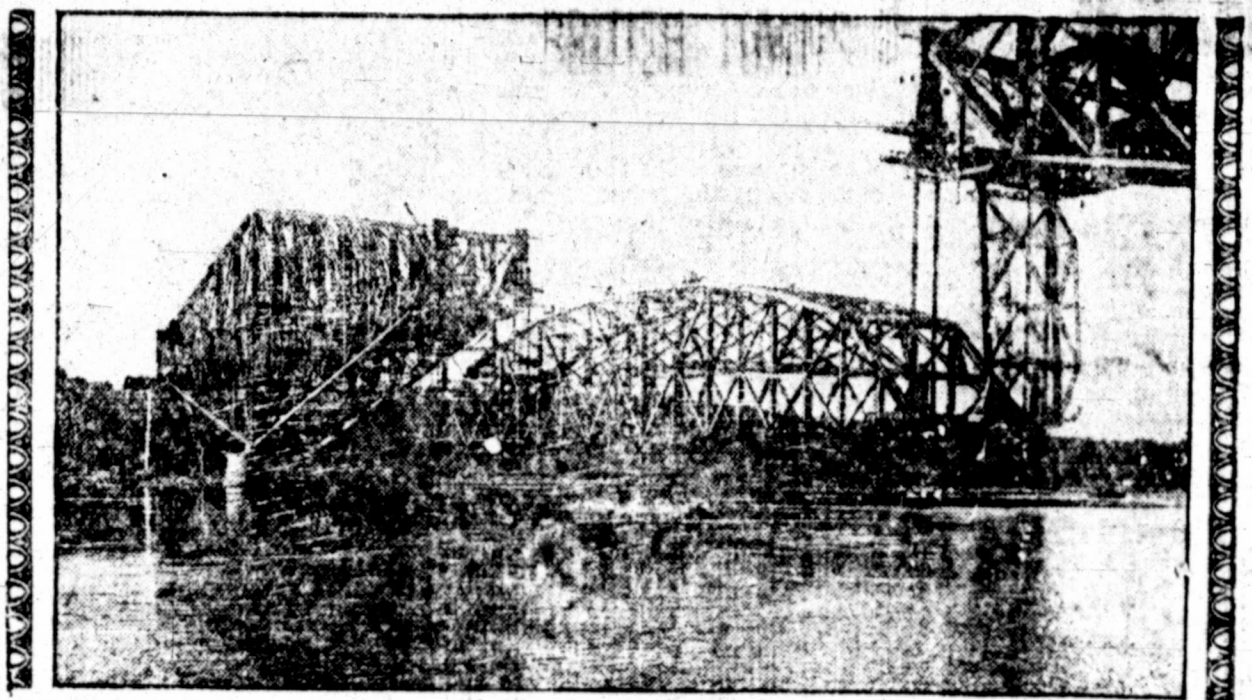
INQUIRY INTO MILK PRICE IS SET GOING

Camp Dodge, Des Moines, Ia., Sept. 25.—The federal government has refused to obey orders or do any part of a uniform of a United States soldier. Otto Wangerin, professor at I. W. W., drafted from St. Paul, has been confined in the guard house. It was said charges will be filed against him and a court martial probably held.

RAISING OF THE CENTER SPAN OF THE GREAT BRIDGE OVER ST. LAWRENCE RIVER AT QUEBEC



One year after the fatal accident at the big Quebec bridge another attempt to raise into place the center span that fell was made, and it was successful. The span is 122 feet above the St. Lawrence river. It is 640 feet long and was brought down the river to the bridge site on pontoons. It was suspended from the opposite ends of the bridge by chains and raised into place by powerful jacks.

PROHIBITION LEADER SEES GOVERNOR TOO LATE IN SESSION TO CONSIDER SUBMITTING LIQUOR LEGISLATION TO ASSEMBLY. STATEMENT OF EXECUTIVE

Austin, Texas, Sept. 25.—Dr. A. J. Barton, secretary of the Anti-Saloon League, conferred with Governor Hobby this morning relative to the submission to the Legislature of the question enacting statutory statewide prohibition. After the conference Governor Hobby said it is too late in the session to consider submitting this proposition. This means that no liquor legislation will be submitted at the special session.

STATEWIDE CAMPAIGN ANNOUNCED BY STATE CHAIRMAN AT DALLAS

Dallas, Texas, Sept. 25.—Announcement of the launching of a statewide campaign for a statutory prohibition law was made here today by M. H. Wolfe, chairman of the Texas prohibition committee. In a statement Mr. Wolfe expressed the opinion that the law could be made constitutional by forbidding the sale of intoxicants within ten miles of an army camp or a public or private school. This would close, he estimated, practically every saloon in the state.

HOBBY SUBMITS SEVERAL BILLS TO THE LEGISLATURE

Austin, Texas, Sept. 25.—Governor Hobby today submitted to the legislature for its consideration the subject of the enactment of a law to permit whole sale druggists on local option territory to sell alcohol in quantities of more than one gallon to retail druggists for medicinal purposes. Governor Hobby also submitted the subject of the enactment of a law which would permit the use of the new general land office building for state departments besides those designated in the act providing for the construction of the building.

GARFIELD PLEADS FOR BIG OUTPUT FROM COAL MINES

Washington, Sept. 25.—A plea for concerted efforts to obtain a maximum production of coal during the war was made today by Dr. H. A. Garfield, the fuel administrator, at the opening of a conference of central field operators and miners here to discuss a proposed wage increase. "Under no circumstances," said Dr. Garfield, "must we allow production to stop."

TROPICAL STORM IS CENTRAL NEAR CUBA AND MOVING NORTH

Washington, Sept. 25.—The tropical disturbance which first made its appearance Sunday north of Jamaica was apparently central this morning near the south coast of Cuba, and moving northward.

JAMACIA CROPS DAMAGED IN FERCE HURRICANE

Washington, Sept. 25.—I am a le a suffered heavy property damage in Jamaica and is now sweeping across the Gulf of Mexico. Dispatches from American consulate Port Antonio, received today, said the hurricane was the most terrific since that of 1903 and that the fruit crop of Port Antonio district was destroyed. No mention was made of any loss of life. The weather bureau said the intensity of the disturbance was impossible to determine and advised vessels in the Gulf of Mexico to be extremely cautious.

SIAMESE GOVERNMENT CALLS FOR VOLUNTEERS

London, Sept. 25.—The Siamese government, according to a Reuters dispatch from Bangkok, has called for volunteers who may be sent to the western front.

LONG-TIME CREDITS MAY BE ABOLISHED BY RESERVE BOARD

Washington, Sept. 25.—The federal reserve board has taken preliminary steps to abolish long-time credits in this country during the period of the war, to conserve the financial resources of the country in a more liquid condition. Hereafter the banks will not rediscount commercial paper that has more than 90 days to run except in the case of agricultural paper where often the six months period is essential.

HIGH COURT DECIDES THAT FERGUSON CAN NEVER AGAIN HOLD TEXAS OFFICE

Austin, Texas, Sept. 25.—By the action of the Senate high court of impeachment this afternoon in adopting the majority report of the committee charged with drafting the judgment in the case of James E. Ferguson, former Texas governor, the deposed executive is ousted from his office and forever barred from holding public office in the State of Texas.

GOVERNMENT ENDS EVIDENCE AGAINST F. L. P. A. MEMBERS

Abilene, Texas, Sept. 25.—Immediately after the government rested its case in the F. L. P. A. conspiracy trial this morning, Chief Defense Counsel W. H. Atwell moved for an instructed verdict of not guilty for all of the 49 defendants. He did this in the presentation of three demurrers.

DEMURRERS PRESENTED

Those against whom nothing has been said, those against whom only a few things have been said and those against whom the only testimony that they indulged in radical utterances, not against the government, but against a law which had not been passed. Atwell put seven of his clients in the radical class, nine in the second and thirty-three in the third.

NEW STATE NORMALS LIKELY TO BE BUILT ONLY ONE EACH YEAR

Austin, Texas, Sept. 25.—Governor Hobby will not likely recommend the repeal of the laws creating the new state normal schools, but will urge upon the legislature that the appropriations be postponed so as to construct one normal each year, according to information obtained today. He will leave it to the board as to which of the normals shall be constructed first. The board, it is understood made no recommendation as to the repeal or the postponement of these measures.

SWEDISH ELECTIONS NOT SATISFACTORY TO THE ENTENTE ALLIES

London, Sept. 25.—The parliamentary elections in Sweden now have been concluded and although complete results have not been announced, apparently has not made a large haul for the Socialists as expected. Branting, with socialist and liberal support, will have a large majority in the lower House but it appears doubtful whether the present government will acknowledge its defeat.

THIRTY PUT TO DEATH ON ESPIONAGE CHARGE

Amsterdam, Sept. 25.—Advises have been received from the frontier by the Telegram that about thirty men, who were Belgian, have been put to death in the last three weeks on charges of espionage.

GASSER BROUGHT IN ON ARMOUR ESTATE; VEIN IS IGNITED

Chicago, Sept. 25.—Gas has been struck by workmen drilling for water on the estate of A. Watson Armour near Lake Forest, a suburb of Mt. Prospect today ordered the work to be stopped to determine if the gas has a steady flow or is merely a "pocket-tapped."

PRELIMINARY TRIAL OF SINGLETON AGAIN IS NOT COMPLETED

W. S. Singleton, charged with threat against the life of the Commissioner, appeared before United States Commissioner Lantz this morning for his second preliminary hearing. He was released on his own recognizance, but was ordered to appear at the commissioner's court for trial on November 19th.

INCITING TROUBLE AMONG CITIZENS IS CHARGED TO TWO

John Warmuth and Will Selders were arrested last night by United States deputy marshals Goodfellow, on a charge of attempting to cause insubordination among citizens of the United States. The men were lodged in the county jail, where they will remain until the preliminary hearing, to be held shortly, before United States Commissioner J. A. Lantz.

BREAK WITH GERMANY IS DECISION OF ARGENTINE

Buenos Aires, Sept. 25.—The Argentine government has agreed to vote tonight on a rupture with Germany. From indications they will have a majority of 30 votes, virtually forcing the government to cease relations with Germany.

BLACKBERRY JAM IS GOOD FIGHTING FOOD

MAJORITY AND MINORITY REPORTS ARE ARGUED BEFORE HIGH COURT; FUTURE OFFICE HOLDING IS POINT

Austin, Texas, Sept. 25.—The Senate high court of impeachment convened shortly after 11 o'clock for the purpose of considering the judgment to be pronounced upon Governor James E. Ferguson, convicted Saturday upon ten articles of impeachment. At the suggestion of Senator Bee, an agreement was reached to bring the debate on the majority and minority reports to a close at 1 o'clock.

Senator Suiter moved the adoption of the majority report, which would remove the governor from office and disqualify him from holding any office of honor, trust or profit under this state. Senator Bee moved the adoption of the minority report as a substitute. It would merely remove the governor from office, not disqualifying him for the future.

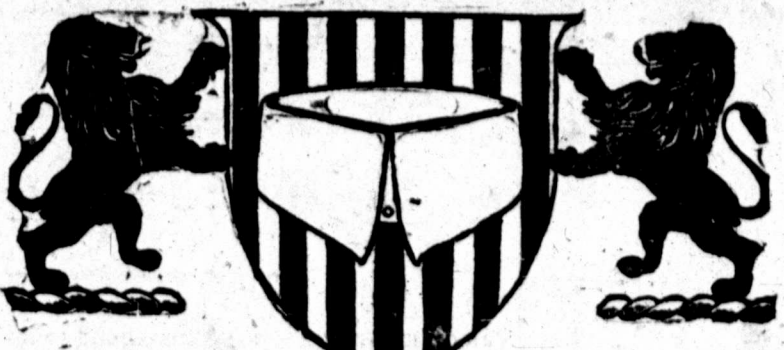

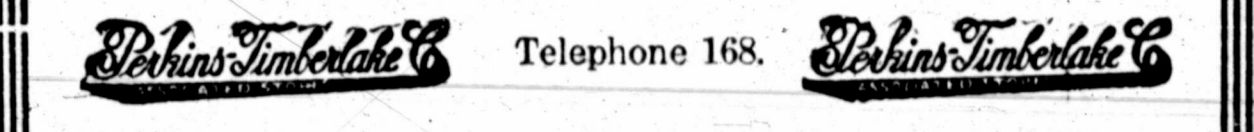

Ferguson Appointee Is Declared Legally Judge In Tarrant Co.

Fort Worth, Texas, Sept. 25.—District Judge Roy ruled this morning that the lawful occupant of the Tarrant County civil bench is T. T. Valentine, appointee of ex-governor Ferguson, and not R. F. Peden, who was named by Governor Hobby and confirmed by the Senate. Valentine was appointed to the bench by Ferguson when Judge Hovey of that court was promoted to a district judgeship. The Senate refused to confirm Valen-

time who had been a Tarrant county representative up to the time of his appointment by Ferguson. He had refused to vote for submission, though his county went for submission. When Hobby became acting governor he sent the name of R. F. Peden to the Senate to fill the county court vacancy and Peden was confirmed by the Senate. Valentine refused to give up his bench, filing court proceedings to confirm such an appointment and also denying that a vacancy existed in the court. Judge Roy sustained the plaintiff, ruling that the confirmation of a county judge was not within the jurisdiction of the Texas Senate.
