BUDDING FARMERS TO BE ENCOURAGED BY FEDERAL AGENT

BOYS AND GIRLS WILL BE GIVEN AN OPPORTUNITY TO SHOW THEIR WORK.

HE PLANS FIELD DAYS

Tells of Child Who Kept Exact Record of Hens and Showed Splendid Profit.

J. W. Campbell, county agricultural agent, stated today that he was going to organize exhibits and prize-givings for the various farm products clubs of the boys and girls of the county. These field days will be held in Burk Burnett, Iowa Park and Electra about November 1, and there is a great deal of enthusiasm over the event, among the budding farmers of the county.
Mr. Campbell said that he had one hundred and forty-seven boys in the county who had raised prize pigs, and besides these there are the girls' poultry clubs, and some grain exhibits. The children have shown the keenest interest in the work, and some unusually fine exhibits are promised.

Would Offer Prizes.
"The best way to get these boys and girls interested," explained Mr. Campbell, "is to offer plenty of prizes. Last year, and for several years, every boy or girl has gotten a casey prize of some sort, even if it were only 50 cents. We have first, second, third, fourth prizes, and so on, and finally, honorary prizes of equal value given to those who have not been fortunate enough—perhaps through no fault of their own—to raise a very fine animal or bird. There is a great deal of consideration for the interest they have taken, and the work they have done. It has been my experience, in the eight years I have been running these county clubs, that if a child works hard and gets nothing for it, he will drop out next year. If he gets something, even if it is not very much, he is encouraged to go in again next year, and try again. You cannot handle children like grown folk; and for that matter, I never heard of a grown person who was averse to a little encouragement."

Made Her Hens Pay.
Mr. Campbell spoke of a little girl in the county who has raised hens last year, and kept an exact record of the whole financial end of her venture. She made an average of three cents per hen on about thirty hens, and kept a record of all deaths, for whatever cause; of the sale of eggs, and birds, the price of feed, and every other item. Her birds won the first prize—a ten-dollar hat, which she picked out with great pride, at the store. Many of the prizes, apparently, are taken out in merchandise, if it is so desired.
There is no difficulty whatever, Mr. Campbell says, in raising prize money. Merchants are always glad to help these clubs along, because they like to encourage industrious habits among the children and will willingly give either money or goods, and sometimes both.

He was immediately arrested and placed in jail, and orders were issued by Judge Scurry that he be held without bail until he told where the children were, and they were recovered.

Physical Culture Class for Girls Is High School Feature

Prof. T. M. Clark has started a physical culture class for the girls at the high school, and much interest is being taken in the new movement, over a hundred girls taking the exercises each day. No gymnasium equipment is available at the high school at this time, but it is planned to install some in the near future. The calisthenic exercises are being given in the hallway of the basement until a room for this purpose can be provided. While this course of physical culture is optional nearly all the girls have entered the class, and Mr. Clark feels sure much good can be derived from it.

RED CROSS DOING GREAT WORK JUST BEHIND LINES IN FRANCE HELPING RETURNING PATRIOTS

Washington, D. C. Sept. 26.—H. P. Davison, chairman of the Red Cross War Council, announces the receipt of \$250,000 from the Red Cross Commission to France.
"Along that desolate path of ruin behind the French and British lines from Belgium to Switzerland, the American Red Cross work of relief and economic rehabilitation under Edward Eyre Hunt, chief of the bureau, has rapidly taken shape. Returnees, refugees and repatriates have earth under them and sky over them—that is all. The land has been swept clean."
First Thought Food.
"Twentieth Century Frenchmen have to begin again where North American Indians would begin—by hunting for food, temporary shelter, a few clothes to cover their bodies, and household goods and utensils, such as pots, pans, knives and spoons, an agricultural implement or two, and perhaps a rabbit and some chickens, and, if they are very lucky, a goat or a donkey."
"It is to help such people as these that the American Red Cross has located its relief warehouses at strategic points just behind the lines, such as Soissons, Noyon, Ham and Peronne, and is shipping in food, clothes, blankets, beds, mattresses, stoves, kitchen utensils, reapers and binders, mowing machines, threshing-machines, garden tools and hundreds of other articles of prime importance to people who were prosperous and contented only three years ago. The service of relief and economic rehabilitation has divided its field into six districts.
Oversee Distribution.
"One for the extreme north and Pas de Calais, one for the Somme, one for the Oise; one for the Aisne; one for the Marne and Meuse; one for the Moselle and Metz."
"Resident American delegates have been assigned to these whose duties are to oversee distribution of relief, to report new needs, and to cooperate with every possible way with the admirable relief work of the French government and scores of devoted-French and other organizations."

MARKETING SUGGESTIONS GIVEN FOR CANNING CLUBS

Washington, Sept. 26.—Close attention to marketing problems should be given by members of boys' and girls' canning clubs, says that the products of their canning should be turned out in considerable proportion to specialists of the United States Department of Agriculture. Unless steps are taken to bring about the disposal of the canned goods in a well-ordered and practical way, it is pointed out, there is likelihood that the operations of the clubs will not be remunerative.
The specialists offer suggestions for the solution of marketing problems facing the clubs in a publication, "The Marketing of Canning Club Products," recently issued as Markets Document No. 3.
One of the first essentials to satisfactory marketing arrangements, say the specialists, is standardized products. Standardization should be brought to the point where cans or jars of a given fruit or vegetable put up by the different members of the clubs are uniform in pack, appearance, quality, and condition. Every can or jar should conform to the standard represented by the label or brand will then be an advertisement in itself and often a guarantee of further purchases.
Specialties.
In preparing the products which are to be sold, it is well also to put up a large quantity of specialties in comparison with the quantity of plain canned goods, such as tomatoes, since there will then be less competition with commercial goods.
Having assured the quality of their products, the clubs should then make an informal survey of the conditions in their community to ascertain the consuming capacity of the community served by retailers, the quantity of the various kinds of products handled by

CRANE BELIEVES RUSSIA WILL LONG REMAIN DISTURBED

By Associated Press. Stockholm, Sept. 25.—Charles R. Crane of Chicago, a member of the American commission to Russia who spent two days in Stockholm enroute from Petrograd to England and France, describes Russia as facing a long period of trial and inner chaos and to be suffering from an overdose of exaggerated modernism in Socialist reform ideas.

He sees no immediate prospect of a clarification of the situation and thinks some time will elapse before Russia gets on her feet and takes any vigorous part in the prosecution of the war.

Wichita Falls Boy Says Camp Travis Is Enjoyed By Recruits

Work of making an army out of the men of the selective draft is progressing rapidly at Camp Travis, San Antonio, according to recruits here from a number of the Wichita Falls men who left last week. Claude Thornton, a former employee of The Times, mechanical states that all of the men seem well satisfied and anxious to get down to business with as little delay as possible.

On account of receiving such a large number of men at one time arrangements were somewhat incomplete and for two nights some of the men had to sleep on cots without any mattresses. Now they have their hay filled ticks and according to Mr. Thornton "nothing ever felt so good." The men are enjoying the facilities of the military department under M. C. V. at Camp Travis very much. The associations provide, beside a place for the men to read and spend their leisure, a vaudeville program at night.

Vaccinations have been begun and the men are doing all sorts of work from picking up rocks to working in the kitchens, according to the writer. Uniforms will probably be received some time this week it is thought as measures were taken soon after the men's arrival.

Petrograd, Sept. 24.—(Delayed.) Another political crisis is threatening Finland, presumably as the result of the difficulties of the Petrograd government, which as in July, encouraged the Bolshevik majority in the parliament to press its radical aims. The provisional government here has received an intimation that the speaker of the Landtag has published a manifesto calling the dissolved house to meet on Friday. The newspaper says the session will be prevented by force of arms, if necessary.

Lack of Cordiality Between British and Americans Is Denied

British Headquarters in France and Belgium, Sept. 4.—German agencies have recently been spreading broad rumors on the continent that serious differences have arisen between the British army medical service and the American surgeons and physicians who have been working with the British forces in France. The story has been given special publicity by its sponsors in Belgium and France. ENGLAND IS EVER INCREASING OUTPUT OF SUPPLIES FOR ARMY WHILE AMERICA IS PREPARING

By GEORGE T. BYE, Special to The Times.

London, Sept. 25.—Whether England has spent her full effort in the war, or is lying back a bit waiting for America's help, may be best judged by a visit to "the black country," the center of England almost entirely devoted to the production of munitions.

I have just made a trip through this part of England, visiting various large plants, and I can say that the experience was quite reminiscent of the America which I left just a month ago.

New Buildings Going Up.
 It was as if the war had only begun. Every plant has great additions under way that are being pressed into service. The numbers of employees growing to keep pace with new buildings and additional machinery. Supplies of iron ore are required in much greater quantities than a year ago.

One plant has so extended itself that it now ranks as the largest producer of munitions in the world, considerably exceeding even Krupp's in size and output.

Output Increased.
 Another manufacturer, not among the first ten, has increased its output of cartridges by 155 times since the first big war order was received. During the South-African war this same plant contrived to produce a certain number of cartridges for ten weeks that was advertised everywhere as nothing short of a miracle. In a steadily increasing average, covering the past six months, the output now exceeds by 12 1/2 times the achievement of the miracle.

All for the greater effectiveness of the world's slogan, "Fewer and better Germans!"

"Spirit of 1917."
 One of my first sights in the first of the great munitions works that I visited would be immortalized if some adequate artist would paint it as "The Spirit of 1917."

It was at Sheffield. She might have been an American high school girl. Her hair was dark and parted boyishly on one side. She was brightly alert. I would swear that her face was an American type—and now I know where those faces first came from. She must have been 16 years old and about 110 pounds in weight. Light and young as she was, this school girl was flying high overhead in the ungraceful business of lifting and moving ten-ton chunks of steel, some of them roughly shaped like cannon.

She was alone in the operator's basket of an enormous traveling crane that thundered along on great rails a half block apart. She was the operator.

Gazing wide-eyed into candy shops in Wichita Falls are many such little darlings. You often are tempted to go in and buy the sweets, but you aren't you? It is probable that our girls' English cousin, looking down out of serious eyes from her aerial perch, with her hands tightly holding the controller of massive apparatus, waiting for a signal from a squad of grimy men out of shouting reach, has little time for shop gazing.

What a picture she would make! **Grow Like Mushrooms.**

These English establishments did not have time to expand gracefully. One great works at a Midland town is sprawled all over eighty acres, and is quite unightly as compared with similar works in America whose buildings are erected in units which are duplicated when there is need. The disorderliness gives an uncanny awfulness to the places of manufacture of retriative frightfulness. But though a visitor is startled by suddenly encountered furnaces and by housed caverns traversed by aerial pathways, there is an air of well directed effort everywhere that proves that there are efficiency engineers even in this chaos.

When I saw the men at work I agreed with the New Zealand lieutenant with me, who also was seeing cannon cast for the first time, that the front end hardly be more terrifying than furnaces, rolling mills and batteries of stamping machines, that are a part of a munitions work.

In the Rolling Mills.
 In the rolling mills slabs of white-hot iron weighing 1500 tons are slowly moved out of the gas ovens on an electric railway. Then they go to rollers which move them to a huge wringer that squeezes them through like cakes of cheese. After several rollings, large quantities of dry tree branches are thrown on the glowing slab as it enters the wringer. This causes a magnificent spatter of excursions and a fiery shower in all directions. The effect is to remove any scale from the metal.

When the door of a gas oven slowly lifts, exposing one of these glittering, shimmering, hissing and hissing heat penetrates all corners of the building. As the slab majestically emerges on its catafalque, tender-skinned men 200 feet away feel that they are being blistered.

In the Smelters.
 But the greatest heat is in the smelters, whose heat is reduced. These furnaces are smaller, and in one plant a long row of them is high up near the roof. Back of the furnaces you look down into a cavernous shop where a great traveling crane moves the 4-story urns into which the milk-white iron runs when a furnace is tapped.

many of them had had factory experience before the war but never at the big machines they now operate. I saw that these women are standing the strain of long hours, swift work and the great clatter and clangor with remarkable fortitude. The plant hospitals get few cases of breakdown among the women. One shift goes on, to cite an example, at 8 a. m. and quits at 7 p. m. After an hour of house-cleaning at the works the second shift comes at 8 p. m., working until 7 a. m. One shift has an hour at noon for dinner, the other an hour at midnight. There also is a 15-minute period for tea at 4 p. m. and 4 a. m.

In spite of all, most of them have a womanly interest in pretty things. I saw hundreds of girls at stamping machines, pressing cartridges into shape, who were almost as tidy as American shopgirls though they did wear long colorless aprons and city gloves. Their hair was well taken care of; they smiled in a comfortable, independent way, not too brightly and not meekly. I know now where a lot of our American smiles originate.

When the Tommies come back from the trenches they will not supplant all of these girls. The superintendents have found that the "feminine touch" has meant better work and less wear and tear on machines. The most delicate stamping operations will always be entrusted to women in the future, I was told.

This munitions region is not to make the Midland desert of empty shops after the war. I was told that not a new building was erected, nor a machine installed, that did not have a peace-time function anticipated. Rails are to be turned out by miles, and bridge and building girders by the thousands, to accomplish the reconstruction of Europe in the smallest possible time. However, the dominant idea of the Midland is—
 "Win the war!"

Dallas Drops Back Into Fourth Place As Recruiting Point

Dallas dropped to the fourth place in the standing of the navy recruiting headquarters for the United States, for the week ending Sept. 13, and was head in the nation for the point.

The standing of the cities is New York, 85, Philadelphia 58, Houston 24, Dallas 23. As a matter of fact, the Dallas record is the highest in the United States, taking into consideration the population. Chicago, Los Angeles, San Francisco, Boston, Portland, Me., New Orleans, Minneapolis, Milwaukee and many other cities of much larger population than Dallas have turned in a great many less recruits. For the same week as this record, Milwaukee produced only eight men and Baltimore a like number. Los Angeles gave thirteen and San Francisco fourteen. It will be seen that Dallas, therefore, stands out as a recruiting center, and that Texas generally is one of the best recruiting grounds in the country.

Seventh War Loan For Germany Being Discussed In Press

Amsterdam, Sept. 26.—Count von Rosen, secretary of the imperial German treasury in discussing a public meeting held in Berlin the seventh war loan, said the German Reichsbank, which has already prepared a great scheme for taking up and granting loans on war script, which would mean the virtual seizure of the entire money forces, in view of the immense demand for capital likely to ensue after the conclusion of peace.
