GERMANY AGREES TO RESTORATION OF BELGIUM ON SOME CONDITIONS

OFFICIAL STATEMENT SENT VER-BALLY TO POPE, IS LONDON REPORT

DEMANDS TO HAVE RIGHT BUSINESS ALLIANCE

Teutons Said to be Willing to Contribute Share of Compensation For War Damage

London, Sept. 26.—Germany has agreed to evacuate Belgium on certain conditions, it is declared in a German official statement, according to a dispatch from Berne today, given out by the Wireless Press.

Germany, it is stipulated. must have the right to develop her economic enterprises freely in Belgium, especially in Antwerp.

The proposal was made in a supplementary note to the Vatican, replying to the peace initiative of Pope Benedict.

Verbal Communication.

It was in the form of a verbal communication made by Foreign Secretary Kuehlmann to the papal nuncion at Munich, wherein the foreign secretary specified the conditions, under which Germany was willing to conclude peace on the basis of the evacuation of Belgium.

The verbal note to the papal nuncio said Germany would contribute a share of compensation to be paid to Belgium for war damages. Belgium would be required, it is said, to give a guarantee that any such menace as that which threatened Germany in 1914 yould in future be excluded.

The following official anouncement was given out: "The latest information shows that the first group of raiders which approached London last night was turned back by gun fire, not more than two machines actually penetrating the defenses. The two machines dropped a number of bombs in the southeastern outskirts of London at about 7:45 p. m., which damaged several dwelling houses, killing seven persons and injuring twenty-five. Tells of Child Who Kept Exact Rec-ord of Hens and Showed Splendid Profit.

J. W. Campbell, county agricultural agent, stated today that he was going fo organize exhibits and prize-givings for the various farm products clubs of the boys and girls of the county. These the boys and girls of the county. These field days will be held in Burkburnett, lowa Park and Electra about Novem ber 1, and there is a great deal of enthusiasm over the event, among the budding farmers of the county.

Mr. Campbell said that he had one hundred and forty-seven boys in the county who had raised prize pigs, and besides these there are the girls poultry clubs, and some grain exhibits. The children have shown the keenest interest in the work, and some unusually fine exhibits are promised.

Would Offer Prizes.

Would Offer Prizes.

"The best way to get these boys and girls interested," explained Mr. Campbell, "is to offer plenty of prizes. Last year, and for several years, every boy or girl has gotten a cash prize of some sort, even if it were only 50 cents. We have first, second, third, fourth prizes, and so on, and finally, honorary prizes of equal value given to those who have not been fortunate enough—perhaps through no fault of their own—to raise a very fine animal or bird. These are entitled to some consideration for the interest they have taken and the work they have

or bird. These are entitled to some consideration for the interest they have taken, and the work they have taken, and the cast of characters includes the county clubs, that if a child works hard and gets nothing for it, he will drop out next year. If he gets something, even if it is not very much, he is encouraged to go in again next year, and try again. You cannot handle children like grown folk; and for that matter, I never heard of a grown person who was averse to a little encouragement."

Made Her Hens Pay.

Mr. Campbell spoke of a little girl in the county who raised hens last year, and kept an exact record of the whole financial end of her venture. She made an average of three dollars per hen on about thirty hens, and kept a record of all deaths, for whatever cause; of the sale of eggs, and birds, the rice of feed, and every detail. Her birds won the first prize—a tendollar hat, which she picked out with great pride, at the store. Many of the prizes, apparently, are taken out in merchandise, if it is so desired.






