

NEW YORK GIANTS TAKE THIRD GAME OF WORLD SERIES

FURTHER DISCLOSURES OF GERMAN INTRIGUES ARE MADE BY LANING

By Associated Press. Washington, Oct. 10.—Another series of sensational telegrams which passed between the German government and its embassy in this country was made public today by Secretary Lansing.

The three telegrams comprising this series form the natural complement to the correspondence already disclosed by the state department conveying absolutely convincing evidence of a well-calculated and systematic violation of American neutrality by Germany during a period of more than a year preceding the beginning of ruthless submarine warfare and the breach of relations between Germany and the United States.

The secretary of state published the following two telegrams from the German foreign office to Count Von Bernstorff, in January, 1916: "Would Destroy Southern Pacific."

It is considered possible that the persons named were unaware of the recommendations involving them that had been made by the German foreign office. If the state department has further information on this phase of the subject it has not yet given any intimation of the fact.

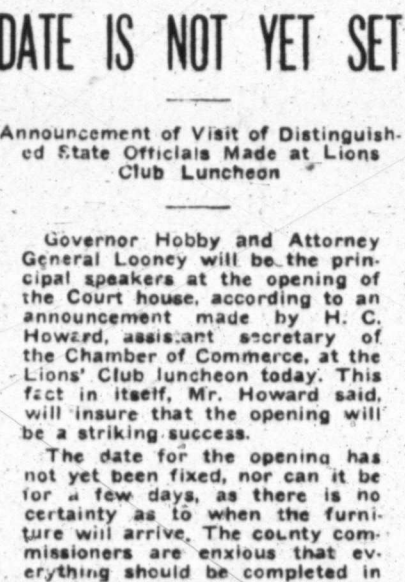

IMPORTANT FOOTBALL CONTESTS ARE SCHEDULED TO TAKE PLACE IN TEXAS DURING LAST OF WEEK

FOOTBALL SCHEDULE

Saturday, Oct. 13. Baylor vs. Trinity, at Dallas. T. C. U. vs. Rice, at Houston. Southwestern vs. State University, at Austin. Howard Payne vs. Simmons, at Brownwood. University of Oklahoma vs. Illinois, at Urbana. University of Arkansas vs. Hendrick, at Fayetteville.

As far as the winning of the games is concerned, the football results of the week just passed were about as everybody expected, but the scores in at least three cases were a little surprising. The A. & M. squad seem to have come out of the rut they have been running in for so long, and looks as if the Aggies are going to give the Longhorns a much harder fight late in November than they did last year. However, that is quite a way off as yet, and there is a number of games of importance to be played before that time.

First Game of Week. The first game of the week will be played at Sherman, between Southern Methodist Red and Blue squad and the Austin College Kangaroos. This will be the second game of the season for each of the teams. S. M. U. has started off well this season, and Coach Rix was successful in breaking up the offense and then hitting down the defense of the Meridian College squad—with his eleven incomplete passes. The Kangaroos suffered a defeat of 66 to 0 at the hands of the A. & M. squad Saturday. They presented a good defense, however, which, taken into consideration with the fact that five of their varsity men are temporarily out of the game, the sixty-six points does not look so bad, after all. It promises to be a hard fought game, though, for should Dallas be successful, they will have a team that, with confidence, throw against the University of Dallas, and to defeat that institution seems to have been their highest ambition since the day the school was opened. S. M. U. and Dallas U. will engage at Dallas on the last Saturday of the state fair. But we are getting away from our subject again, for on the same day that S. M. U. and Austin College are fighting it to a finish at Sherman, the University of Dallas and

A. & M. are staging the battle royal in College Station—and A. & M. is the squad that is coming out of the rut this season, and beginning to put on speed. Dallas U. has only played one game this season, and that with Oak Cliff High, which was won by the small score of 18 to 0. Both the games of Saturday, so it seems, are somewhat one-sided, but nevertheless we can't see that it is going to be easy pickings for either of the teams. Baylor to Meet Trinity. The most important game for the following day—Saturday—promises not only to be the closest of the three to be played, but one of the closest of the season. Baylor Bears and Trinity Tigers are to tangle up as one of the attractions for the opening day of the State Fair at Dallas, and it's going to be nip and tuck for both squads from the time the whistle sounds until the last quarter is finished. True Baylor has won her only game, and Trinity lost her only game of the season, but here's another thing: Baylor made 17 points against Howard Payne, but both teams had gone in for a hard fight, and got it. Baylor had to fight hard for every one of the points made on Howard Payne. Trinity suffered defeat at the hands of Texas Saturday, but then, there is this consideration: Coach Bivins had almost an entirely new team this year, and it was their first game of the season, played on a foreign field, and against a team that has always been far superior to them. And, doubtless Trinity had no idea of taking the game when they went to Austin, but they do have an idea of taking the game next Saturday, and every day are working hard to be in shape for the contest. T. C. U. and Rice are scheduled to meet in Houston, and Southwestern and the State University at Austin. These games, while of much importance in deciding the state championship, will not be watched with as keen interest as the Baylor-Trinity game, as they do not promise to be as closely played. Each of the four teams have played a game this season and each of them has won one, with the exception of T. C. U., who has won two.

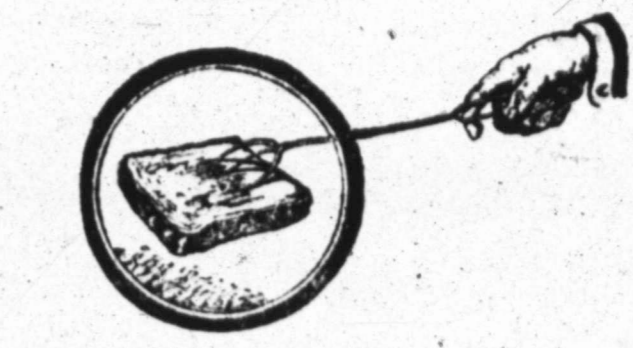

British Troops Not Used More Than Others

Associated Press Mail Correspondence. London.—Reports said to be prevalent in America and elsewhere that troops from the British dominions are used more freely on the Western front than are those from the United Kingdom, are denied in "authoritative statement," published by Reuters. "The proportion of casualties on the Western front is actually higher among the troops from the United Kingdom than among those of the dominions," says the statement. Figures showing the property of divisions from the dominions and from the United Kingdom employed in the battles on the Somme, around Arras, and Ypres and at Messines, are given to show that troops from the "Motherland" exceeded those from the dominions in the ratio of two to one to five to one. "The casualties also are compared showing, according to the statement, that those of the United Kingdom troops have been higher than those of troops from the dominions. "Clearly there can be no question that the "motherland" troops have been spared at the expense of the dominions," adds the statement. "On the contrary, the evidence points to the fighting having been shared very

equally between the available troops irrespective of the part of the British Empire from which they came. Assertions that large numbers of trained soldiers fit for service are retained in idleness in the United Kingdom also are denied. In all the actual theaters of war, the proportion of troops from the Motherland as compared with those of the dominions is between five and six to one, that is "of every six British soldiers serving at the front, at least five have been recruited in the United Kingdom."
