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





It is the opinion of food control officials that eggs which contain yolks stuck to shell, mouldy eggs, black spots, mixed rots, addled eggs, black rots, and any other eggs which consist wholly or in part of a filthy, decomposed, or putrid substance, are adulterated.

The United States Department of Agriculture gives notice that ship-ments containing more than five per-cent (18 eggs to the case) of bad eggs, will be regarded as violating

the Food and Drug Act,


