

WICHITA COUNTY IS APPLAUDED BY RESERVE BOARD

J. A. KEMP TELLS OF MEETING HE ATTENDED RECENTLY IN DALLAS.

FIRST TO RAISE QUOTA

Believes That Best Sort of Advertising Will Accrue as Result of Action Taken There.

At the meeting of the officials of the Liberty Loan Reserve Board yesterday in Dallas, J. A. Kemp, as representing Wichita County, was given the glad and enthusiastic hand of congratulation on the smashing success of the county's Liberty Loan campaign, when he announced that he had a million dollars worth of subscriptions to his credit.

Mr. Kemp said this morning that every official in the meeting was loud and enthusiastic in praise of the work done and had elected himself a Wichita county booster. A telegram will be sent to Secretary McAdoo as soon as he can be located.

Mr. Kemp said that Wichita County would give her the best kind of advertising about the campaign. She had reported this morning that she had raised her full quota of \$50,000 and C. W. Reid stated that he had had a message from Electric Light and Power which would be cleaned up in a few days.

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Country Not So Well Up. Reports from the treasury department, however, are not so encouraging, and daily messages are being sent out urging speed, speed and more speed, and crying, like the leech's daughter, "Give, give, give."

These facts alone should cause civilians to flock in thousands today to square themselves with their consciences. How can they look an enlisted man in the face if they have not bought a Liberty Loan?

The civilians—farmers, business men, working men—have to make some reply, and it is expected of them right now. The government, the patriots who are sacrificing everything, our allies, the whole world, in fact, are depending on their response.

At 6 o'clock last night enemy aviators bombarded Nancy violently. Numerous victims among the civilian population are reported. Ten were killed and forty wounded in addition to 30 enemy machines fell damaged within the German lines.

Our bombing squadrons made a number of expeditions. Numerous projectiles were dropped on military establishments, railway stations at Tonnville, Metzler, Les Metz and Woippy and factories at Hagondange and Rombach.

ALLIED OFFENSIVE IN FLANDERS GOES STEADY FORWARD

LINE WELL ENTERED THROUGH THE CO-OPERATION OF THE FRENCH FORCES.

WEDGE IS DRIVEN FAR

Positions Are in All Places Maintained After Being Captured—Shells Plow Up Ground.

By Associated Press. Washington, Oct. 17.—French successes in Flanders, broadening the great wedge which the allies are relentlessly driving into the German lines are described as the outstanding feature of the week in the review of military operations for the week ending Oct. 13, issued by the war department.

The allied offensive in Flanders continues methodically, says the review, "assigned objectives are met with increasing regularity indicate efficient co-ordination of artillery preparation and infantry attacks."

The "readily" effect of allied artillery fire is confirmed by reports reaching us regarding the concern of the German high command at the new allied "typhoon" fire which is compelling the enemy to amend his tactical dispositions in an effort to meet the shock of shell rained upon his lines.

The zone of operations in the Ypres salient, formerly too narrow for the proper disposition of large masses of troops, has now, by the French co-operation and their recent successful advance, so extended the line, that it is no longer to be considered a salient, but an ever-extending wedge pressing steadily driven into the German lines.

The operations of the French during the past week are in fact complementary to the engagements which the British last June. During the engagements of the week, the French everywhere maintained the position won in the face of repeated onslaughts.

The review touches briefly upon the situation on other fronts. No mention is made of American forces or war preparations.

Local Successes Costly. "It must be remembered that if a commander in the field is willing to pay the price both in lives of his men, as well as in an overwhelming expenditure of munitions, he is taking into consideration a local success. This the Germans gained in their assault on the French positions along the right bank of the Meuse in the region north of Huy."

Paris, Oct. 17.—Ten persons were killed and forty wounded in a bombardment of Nancy last night by German aviators, the war office announced. On Monday and Tuesday 23 German airplanes were destroyed by the French or compelled to land in a damaged condition.

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U. S. REPRESENTATIVE WILL ATTEND ALLIED CONFERENCE

By Associated Press. Washington, Oct. 17.—While official announcement is being withheld, it is practically certain that the United States will be represented at the coming conference of all the nations at war against Germany, which probably will be held in Paris.

Secretary Lansing today authorized the statement that it definitely had been decided that there would be a conference and that the United States was considering participation in it, with the possibility that it would be decided to do so.

ROANOKE, VIRGINIA, MAN KILLED BY SHELL FIRE FROM SUBMARINE WHEN LEAVING TORPEDOED SHIP

By Associated Press. London, Oct. 17.—James Tingor, of Roanoke, Va., according to a dispatch to the Daily Chronicle from a British port, was killed by shrapnel fired by a German submarine upon the open boats of a torpedoed British steamer on which the American was employed.

Another member of the crew, a fireman was wounded by a shell from the submarine and died as he was being placed upon a rescuing ship. There were 12 Americans among the 40 survivors landed at a British port.

By Associated Press. American Training Camp in France, Oct. 17.—The more one studies the training of the American units already in France and analyzes the plans for those that are to come, the more ingrained becomes the knowledge that all instruction contemplates the assumption of a vigorous offensive when the United States forces are eventually ready to take their places with the French and British armies on the western battle front.

This purpose is being and will continue to be emphasized in every habit of training until it becomes a settled habit an dthought with officers and men alike. One comes to also realize that when the American soldiers assume the offensive there will lie back of them the necessary weeks or months of distinctly American training.

IMPORTANT MOVEMENT IN FLANDERS ON PART OF ALLIES IS EXPECTED

SOCIALISTS PLAN TO VOTE AGAINST GERMAN WAR BILL

By Associated Press. Amsterdam, Oct. 17.—A German Socialist newspaper says the Socialists have decided to vote against the new war credit of 10,000,000 marks, which is to be submitted to the Reichstag in December, unless Chancellor Michaelis resigns.

Except for the Independent Socialists represented in the Reichstag by about 20 deputies who broke away from the party last year, the Socialists have supported the German government through the war and voted for the war credits. Defection of the entire Socialist body in the Reichstag would represent a serious division.

By Associated Press. Copenhagen, Oct. 17.—The Berlin correspondent of the Fremdenblatt of Hamburg discloses indications that forces are at work in the entourage of Chancellor Michaelis with the thought of a military dictatorship or at least with the idea of having the chancellor continue in office in defiance of the Reichstag, supporting himself by military backing.

Attorney General Is Planning Defense In Suit Filed In Bell. Austin, Texas, Oct. 17.—Attorney General Looney said today that while he had not as yet been served with the papers in the injunction suit filed in Bell county by Representative Dunham, of Coryell county, against Comptroller Terrell, et al., to test the constitutionality of the appropriation made by the legislature for the University of Texas, he would defend the suit.

Case of George Ryan Dismissed By Court Of Criminal Appeals. Austin, Texas, Oct. 17.—The court of criminal appeals today dismissed the appeal in the case of George Ryan, indicted in Harrison county on a charge of killing William Black, an anti-Catholic lecturer on February 3, 1915.

Iowa Seems To Have Gone Dry In Prohibition Election Wednesday. Des Moines, Ia., Oct. 17.—With returns complete for two counties, the constitutional prohibition amendment was leading by a majority of eighty less than 1,000. Neither side is claiming victory, realizing the vote is so close that the official count will be necessary to determine the result.

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Petrograd, Oct. 17.—The Russian war office has completely lost touch with the Russian forces on the Island of Oesel, it was officially announced today. One German dreadnaught, which ran into the Russian mine field defending Oesel Island on October 12, struck a mine, the statement adds. After the explosion the warship made for the coast, and its ultimate fate is not known.

The war situation of today is summarized by the Associated Press as follows: All the important infantry action last night in the western war theater was confined to the French coast, where attacks by the Germans in Aisne and Champagne sectors, as well as in the Verdun region were repulsed by intense Artillery Fire.

There is promise of a speedy renewal of the activity in Flanders, however, Field Marshal Haig, for instance, sends from British headquarters in the day one of those laconic reports that so frequently have preceded the periodic attacks on that front.

The German high command apparently is anticipating a renewal of the British drive as the latest Berlin statement in reporting the intense artillery activity in Flanders said no infantry attacks had taken place "up to the present."

An admission of possible significance was contained in the German statement on the Macedonian front situation received late last night. Several villages in the Struma region on the right flank of the allied lines northeast of Saloniki have been "ceded" by the Bulgarians to the British, Berlin announces.

Conservative and Socialist papers in Germany have been engaged in a controversy on the subject of a dictatorship, but hitherto it had not seemed to be of such a nature that it should be taken seriously.

By Associated Press. Kansas City, Oct. 17.—Government agents were reported to be investigating today the cause of the fire which early yesterday morning destroyed a large portion of the Kansas City stock yards, entailing a loss of approximately \$750,000 in buildings and livestock.

By Associated Press. Kansas City, Oct. 17.—The strike of southwestern coal miners called for Friday morning, has not been canceled or postponed, President Alexander Howatt of District 14, United Mine Workers of America and leader of the southwestern miners, announced this morning.

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By Associated Press. Washington, Oct. 17.—All indications are that subscription to the second Liberty Loan have passed the one billion dollar mark. Official figures compiled last night showed only \$528,000,000 reported to Federal Reserve Banks, but later sent official returns and estimates made to the treasury department demonstrated that the official figures were far too low.

By Associated Press. Kansas City, Oct. 17.—No definite action in deferring the strike set for Friday of 35,000 coal miners of Missouri, Kansas, Oklahoma and Arkansas in response to telegrams from John P. White, president of the United Mine Workers of America and Fuel Administrator Garfield, requesting that such action be taken, has been announced.

By Associated Press. Petrograd, Oct. 17.—The generals arrested for participation in the Korniloff uprising on their departure from Berdichev, at Berezovka, on Oct. 1 were compelled to walk three miles to the railroad station while they were jeered, pelted with missiles and threatened by a mob of several thousand persons. The officers barely escaped alive through the strategy of a member of the cadet guard who started the train out of the station as it was being fired upon by the mob, according to reports which have just arrived here.

By Associated Press. Port Arthur, Texas, Oct. 17.—The Gulf Oil Corporation today subscribed for \$200,000 worth of Liberty Loan bonds and the Texas Company purchased \$100,000 worth.

Mungie was furnished him. He wrote, and the reply is given below.

This afternoon Mr. Merrill wrote another letter and he will send magazines within a few days and urge his friends to do likewise.

Letter From The Front.
 American Y. M. C. A.—On active service with the American Expeditionary Forces.

France, Sept. 19, 17.

Mr. Ben S. Merrill, Wichita Falls, Texas.

My Dear Friend and Backer:

I was surprised and pleased to receive your letter and believe me it

was appreciated all the more coming from one whom I know would be here with us here in France if the opportunity offered. It does us boys good, however, to know that we are not forgotten by those true blue Americans we left behind in God's country.

I doubt if you know what a letter means to us boys so far from friends and relatives. Our mail is irregular and when it arrives for distribution and you discover you are not among those favored with a letter from home the disappointment is great.

OLD TIMER TELLS OF BURNING OF FIRST DENVER DEPOT HERE, WHICH MADE CITIZENS HAPPY

"The evolution of Wichita Falls from a frontier town into a city, I might well be the title, or head, given an interview had this morning with C. H. Nicholson, who left here four years ago and who is now here, accompanied by Mrs. Nicholson. They came from Tulsa, their home, in an automobile.

In 1890 to 1903 Mr. Nicholson was a merchant here, his dry goods store being at Seventh and Ohio streets. He reached here the night the first Fort Worth & Denver depot burned and he used his energies to save the frame structure.

"Hev, don't work so hard," exclaimed one citizen. "Let'er burn and we'll get a depot—better looking."

Then Mr. Nicholson and everybody else quit trying to save the shack for they were town builders and wanted a real station here, as his store.

"Few of the old landmarks are left," said Mr. Nicholson this morning. "I would not have known the town if I did not even know you had the fine union station that is here, nor did I know the streets were paved or that a seven-story hotel and two big bank buildings had been erected. Really, Wichita Falls is a city."

"I greatly admire the spirit—that snappy western spirit, that has built a city here. Your factories are great, while the oil field and the agricultural interests have aided greatly in the making of the city. I made a mistake, I believe, by not staying."

George Filgo Injured When Car Overturned; Others Pinned Beneath

A right forefinger gone, two other nails from that hand torn off, and a broken wrist were the injuries sustained by George Filgo when his car failed to hold the road in making the turn from Sixth into Holiday, about five o'clock yesterday afternoon. The car turned completely over, pinning the five occupants beneath, and itself showed unmistakable signs of having attempted that for which it was not originally designed.

John Gerrock, J. P. Riggs, Jr. and Joe Perdue, who were untouched, and Clarence Fiteberg, whose ankle was badly sprained, were in the car at the time of the accident, and statements from them show that they were traveling at a normal rate of speed, and have no idea how it happened.

It is believed that if the top had not been up the boys would have been very seriously, if not fatally hurt. The top broke the fall of the car to some extent, and undoubtedly saved Filgo from very severe injuries, as his steering wheel was torn away, and the wind shield shattered. The fenders and radiator, were also damaged.

Pardon Is Secured For Emmett Puryear By Local Attorney

Ed Napier has returned from Austin where he went several days ago to secure a pardon from the state penitentiary for Emmett Puryear. The pardon was secured, and is probably the first one granted by Governor Hobbs. Puryear had served four months of a two year sentence in the penitentiary for attempt to murder. He was convicted in connection with the shooting of Mike Murphy in the Arlington Rooming house over a year ago.

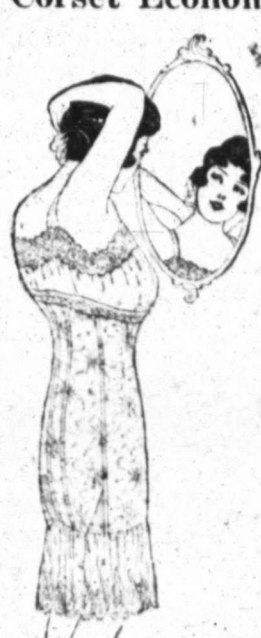

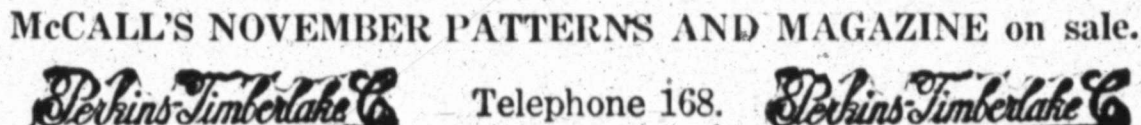

STORMY WEATHER FIRMS CORN IN EARLY TRADING

COTTON MARKET IS LESS ACTIVE AND IRREGULAR

New York, Oct. 17.—The cotton market was less active early today with fluctuations irregular. The opening was steady at a decline of 3 to 12 points under realising and Liverpool and Southern selling. Some of the local cap readers thought they saw prospects for another cold wave in the southwest within the next two or three days but immediate weather conditions were considered favorable and there may have been some nervousness over press advices that Germany is expected to extend the war zone to the American coast; December sold off to 27.24 and January to 26.76 shortly after the call or 15 to 19 points net lower. Trade interests were buyers on this decline however, and the market showed a steady undertone toward the middle of the morning. Early offerings were really absorbed by trade buying and the market turned firmer after the publication of the western belt forecast for unsettled and colder weather. British spot buyers were also a factor; the advance which carried Dec. contracts up to 27.65 and 28 points higher and Jan. to 27.24 or 29 points above last night's closing. Later, however, the market comparatively quiet but sold 15 to 29 points net higher on covering and scattered buying. According to a Memphis estimate at 500,000 bales. An early afternoon bulge carries January up to 27.30 with the more active months selling 28 to 35 points net higher. Offers then became much more active and general with January selling off to 26.99 and December to 27.37 toward 2 o'clock or back to nearly last night's closing. The bulk of the selling was attributed to realizing while trade buying was less in evidence after the advance about 27 cents for January. Cotton futures opened steady; Oct. 27.75; Dec. 27.25; Jan. 26.90; March 26.65; May 26.28. Cotton closed steady.

The letter follows:

Letter From The Front,
America, Y. M. C. A. On active service with the American Expeditionary Forces.

France, Sept. 19, '17.
Mr. Ben M. S. Merrill, Wichita Falls, Texas.
My Dear Friend and Backer:
I was surprised and pleased to receive your letter and believe me it

was appreciated all the more coming from one whom I know would be here with us here in France if the opportunity offered. It does us boys good, however, to know that we are not forgotten by those true blue Americans we left behind in God's country.

I doubt if you know what a letter means to us boys so far from friends and relatives. Our mail is irregular and when it arrives for distribution and you discover you are not among those favored with a letter from home the disappointment is great.

Address any mail you wish to send me to Private Dan'l. E. McMunigle, Co. C, 17th Regt. U. S. Engineers, (Ry.) American Expeditionary Force in France, via New York.

I am sorry I cannot at present tell you anything about our location or, in fact, write of any military matter, owing to censorship regulations, but this may be changed later and I can then send a more interesting letter. I am a great reader and anything you can send in the line of newspaper or magazines will be welcome.

ARE DESIRED BY
NATIONAL ARMY**

**WAR DEPARTMENT SENDS FOR
MAY REQUEST FOR ENLISTMENT OF ENGINEERS**

Uncle Sam's National Army wants road builders and it is likely that a civil engineer or two from Wichita Falls will enlist in the Twenty-third regiment. Engineers to go to France to assist in preparing highways over which the great army America is sending there will march. Ross Corlett has received from the Engineering Section the request of the war department for engineers.

Contractors Can Help.

In this it is noted that every contractor in the country can contribute a few men to the cause—men volunteering, of course. An application form accompanies the plea for men, which also contains the request that local newspapers use their space in efforts to induce engineers and road builders to volunteer—men not subject to draft. German prisoners will be used as laborers in the work and the war department urges that mature men, under 40 years of age, will be used as bosses of gang and made non-commissioned officers with pay higher than in any other branch of the service.

Who May Offer.

Men of the draft age who have not been called to the colors may also volunteer in the new regiment, which will contain more than 1200 men—men of the sturdy, healthy, out-door type.

The request was received by Mr. Corlett concludes:

"Here is your opportunity to help the country along the lines of your specialty. We know that the country will not call upon its road builders in vain."

**HUNDREDS SEE
TWO HOUSES BURN
EARLY IN NIGHT**

Two fires last night entailed an aggregate loss of possibly \$1,800, and attracted hundreds of people by their glare and picturesqueness. Earlier, the five companies of central station were called to the Star lodging house, next door to the city hall in Ohio street, where a gasoline stove exploded. The damage there was slight.

Shortly after 8 o'clock last night a frame barn in Seventh street between Scott and Lamar streets was found to be afire. The flames cast a great glare and residents in surrounding streets thought half the city was afire. The damage was about \$300, the firemen doing effective work after water was obtained, which was about three minutes after the alarm was turned in. The barn is owned and used by the Avis Hardware Company.

An hour later two houses in the 100 block of Mill street were totally destroyed, the loss being estimated at \$1,500. Both were of four rooms, vacant and owned by Perry & Marchman. No insurance was carried. The origin of the fire is not known, although it is possible a spark from a passing, Fort Worth & Denver engine ignited the building nearest the street, in which the fire was discovered by railroad men, who turned in the alarm.

Inability to get water for four or five minutes caused the loss of the house. Railroad men employed in the yards aided the firemen in their fight against the flames and it was partly due to their efforts that the fire did not spread. Lines of hose were run to the big oil storage tank and to the room house, to be used should occasion demand.

**Agreement Reached
With Mexico As To
Exporting of Metals**

By Associated Press.
Mexico City, Oct. 16.—An agreement has been reached between Ignacio Bonillas, the Mexican minister to the United States, and the United States treasury department according to reports here, by which Mexico will take off the restrictions on the export of metals which required the importation of an equal amount of gold for all gold bullion exported and 25 per cent on all silver exported. In return money due on the balance of Mexico will be paid in gold. Under the agreement Mexico will receive \$5,000,000 in this month's large, possibly \$2,000,000 and \$2,000,000 each month thereafter until a distinct understanding that Mexico must not ship the gold to other countries.

Times and speculators which discontinued operations ten days ago have resumed activities, now that an agreement has been reached.

It is said Mexico will have no difficulty obtaining iron and steel for railroad work and repairs.
