**EXEMPTION BOARD SEEMS LIKELY TO BE FULLY UPHELD**

ALLOWANCE FOR FAMILIES OF MEN TAKEN IN DRAFT DEEMED AMPLE.

That few appeals from the decision of the local exemption board on the ground that the men drafted have persons dependent upon them will meet with reversal when they are examined by the district board, is indicated by the fact that ample provision has been made for dependents by the government.

The following statements have been telegraphed to local and district boards, which will prove of interest here:

**GOVERNOR'S OFFICE**  
Austin, Texas  
27 October, 1917.  
The following telegram has just been received from the Provost Marshal General and is transmitted for your information and guidance:  
"No. 5503. In connection with decision on claims for discharge on the ground of dependency and for consideration in determining appropriate action relative to reopening dependency cases under the provisions of Compiled Rulings No. 12, subsection (m), your attention is invited to the following important extracts from the Act of Congress approved October 6, 1917, providing family allowance, allotments, compensation and insurance for the military and naval forces of the United States. Section 291 provides for allotments of pay of every enlisted man, compulsory as to wife (divorced wife in certain cases), compulsory as to child, voluntary as to other persons. Monthly compulsory allotment shall be in an amount equal to family allowance hereafter specified but not more than one-half pay, nor less than \$15.00. The enlisted man may allot any portion or amount of his pay in addition to the compulsory allotment for such purposes and persons as he may direct, subject to regulations. The Secretary of War may require that any portion of one-half pay which is not allotted shall be deposited in the military pay deposit fund for the benefit of the man. Compulsory allotment may be waived on written consent of wife supported by evidence of her ability to support herself and children. Compulsory allotments may be excused for good cause shown."

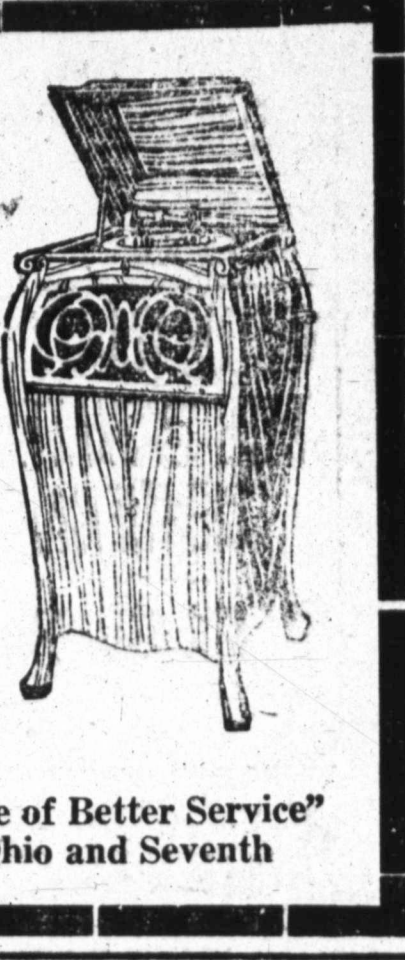
"2. A family allowance not to exceed \$50.00 per month, in addition to pay allotted by the man shall be paid out of the treasury of the United States. Such family allowances shall be paid upon application, which may be made by the man, or made by or in behalf of the beneficiary. No family allowance shall be paid for any period preceding November 1, 1917. Family allowance will be paid from time of enlistment.

"3. BENEFICIARIES ENTITLED TO FAMILY ALLOWANCE AND SCHEDULES: Class A. Wife, child or children:  
(a) If there be a wife but no child, \$15.00.  
(b) If there be a wife and one child, \$25.00.  
(c) If there be a wife and two children, \$32.50, and \$5.00 per month additional for each additional child.  
(d) If there be no wife but one child, \$5.00.  
(e) If there be no wife but two children, \$12.50.  
(f) If there be no wife but three children, \$20.00.  
(g) If there be no wife but four children, \$30.00 with \$5.00 per month additional for each additional child.  
Class B. Grand children, parent, brother or sister:  
(a) If there be one parent, \$10.00.  
(b) If there be two parents, \$20.00.  
(c) For each grandchild, brother, sister, and additional parent, \$5.00.

"The Act contains further provisions relative to contribution from the government and allotments from enlisted men's pay, but which are too long and involved to set forth in this telegram. Compensation for death or disabilities is also provided for.

"This telegram should not be construed as directive in any sense but merely information. I am confident that the provisions of this Act will be of considerable aid in disposing of requests to reopen dependency cases under the provisions of Compiled Rulings No. 12, subsection (m)."

**HORSE SHIPMENT FINALLY CLAIMED BY OWNER HERE**

The owner of the 105 head of horses and mules which were received at the local Wichita Valley freight office over a week ago made his appearance Saturday and took charge of the stock.  
It seems that the stock had been shipped from a small town near Abilene, and were in charge of young boy who had instructions as to where they were to go. Misunderstanding on his part caused him to bring the car to this city, and thinking he was not needed any longer returned home. The owner was waiting for the stock in another nearby city, and when they failed to show up made inquiry, and finally located them here.

The theft of a number of horses and mules from Hamilton several months ago had been reported to the local officials and they were on the lookout for the stolen property. When they heard of this, the parties at Hamilton were arrested and carried to identify them, and found they were not his. The matter caused quite a little speculation at the court house, and Constable Gwin, who was handling the case was at a loss as to where to turn to look for the owner. It was rumored, though not confirmed, that the freight office, that a man came there shortly after the stock arrived to get them, but after being informed that there was something over \$100 freight due on them he decided they were not his.

**ROAD ENGINEER TO REACH CITY ON MONDAY NEXT**  
PURPOSE OF VISIT HERE WILL BE INSPECTION OF HIGHWAY NO. 5.

State Division Engineer, Foshee is due to arrive here on Monday next for the purpose of inspecting Highway No. 5, according to a letter received from the State Highway Commission, Work of obtaining Federal and State aid is being pushed by the commission as rapidly as possible.  
The letter follows:  
"Replying to your letter of October 24th, addressed to Hon. Curtis Hancock, chairman, received in his absence, beg to state that on or about November 6th, the State Highway Engineer, Mr. Foshee, will probably be in Wichita Falls on reconnaissance survey of Highway No. 5."  
"It is our desire to proceed with inspections, reconnaissance surveys, and appropriations of Federal and State Aid in a systematic way, and it is our desire to inspect Wichita Valley Highway at our early convenience, or on or about the time of letting contract for construction of State Highways No. 2 and No. 5 in Wichita county."

COLLINS FORECAST OF BUSINESS NOT VERY OPTIMISTIC

RAILWAY SITUATION CONTINUES SERIOUS ACCORDING TO STATEMENT

The Collins Forecast of general business conditions of the country, dated October 25th, has been received by the Wichita State Bank, and the general tone is less optimistic than for the past three months. The railway situation, according to the forecast, continues serious, prices of some of the standard railway securities having declined recently to a point lower than at any time since the Civil War. Applications for further advance in rates are now pending.

Farm Loan Bonds. In connection with the agricultural situation, the forecast states that farm loan bonds are being looked upon with growing favor in a number of states. They have been declared legal investments recently in Kansas, Idaho and Oklahoma. The sale of these bonds will provide the funds required to greatly extend the operations of the Federal Land Bank System.

Depression in the stock market continues, and there is some feeling that the reaction which was naturally expected, after the long era of rising prices that followed the large European war orders, has arrived. The high prices which manufacturers could obtain formerly have been cut down, and in many instances, they may sell only to the United States government at a fixed price. It is estimated that during the current month a total of \$202,005,172 will be paid to investors, representing dividend and interest disbursements by railroads, traction and industrial corporations. This compares with \$70,141,595 in the corresponding period last year. The sum of \$95,165,725 will be distributed among stockholders in the way of dividends, as against \$97,141,895 last year. This is the first monthly decrease reported in years.

Circulation in Money. The per capita circulation of money in the United States on October 1 was \$48.10, as compared with \$49.62 on October 1 last year. For the months of July, August and September the Comptroller of Currency received 53 applications for charters for new national banks with capital of a little over two million, as compared with 47 applications received during the corresponding period during 1916, with capital of nearly two and a half millions.

Mercantile Failures. For September last year were 1,154, the liabilities totaling \$11,569,078. The same month this year shows fewer failures, but a large aggregate of liabilities, the figures being 963 and \$11,903,051. Business generally, however, the forecast says, is good, except in those lines where there is a lack of transportation, and in others where delay in the adoption of a price fixing policy has resulted in some uncertainty. Preparation for the great winter ahead goes forward steadily in all departments with a swing which gives assurance that the productive forces of the nation are doing what was expected of them.

Announcement has already been made of the increased price of motion picture shows, the extra admission to go to the government without any red tape, and now comes the announcement that the shows at the Wichita Theatre will cost the audiences from 10 to 20 cents a head more.
