Washington, Nov. 26.—Declarations of war against Austria, Turkey and Bulgaria, Chairman Stone of the senate foreign relations committee, declared today, seem "exceeding ly advisable to simplify a situation now anomalous."

"We are, in fact," he said, "now at war with Germany's alies." Senator Stone's only reservation was that such action by congress should be in harmony with the policy of the executive branch of the government. Although he voted against the declaration of war on Germany, Senator Stone has reiterated that the war once begun has his whole support. His statement today was taken as indicative of the agitation for war on Germany's allies, which will face congress when it convenes a week from today.

Would Simplify Matters.

To have war formally declared against the German allies also, continued Senator Stone, would simplify matters of domestic concern, such as measures to prevent espionage.

New or amended war tax legislation, according to Senator Stone, who also is a member of the senate finance committee, should not be undertaken until after a thorough survey of the situation.

"It would, in my opinion, simplfy matters greatly if we should formally declare war against Germany's allies," sad the senator. "It seems to me exceedingly advisable.

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BLOODY BAYONETS OF BRITISH ARMY

BOURLON WOOD IS TAKEN

Thousand Prisoners Are Said to Have Been Placed in Cages Result of Byng Drive.

By Associated Press.
British Army Headquarters in France (delayed), Nov. 25.—This morning tound the battle line of the weary but determined British troops stretched in a semi-circle about Bourlon wood and Bourlon village, which nestles at the northwestern edge of the forest. It was a line which had been established in the face or dogged resistance on the part of the Germans who had tallen back step by step lighting with the fury of despair.

All day yesterday the opposing forces struggied bitterly at close quarforces struggied bitterly at close quarters for possession of the little village from which the British were forced Friday after gaining a footing in the trush that took them through Bourion wood. Nightfall still found waves of infantry surging back and forth through the street of the hamlet and among the bouses, their crimson bayonets telling the story of the tertible conflict being waged. Gradually the Germans fell back, the British pressing forward with grim persistence, which the enemy could not withstand, and the hamlet was finally cleared of the major portion of the German troops.

And, whilst the state inspector says that Wichita Falls has the best and most sanitary conducted meat markets in the state, there is nothing to prevent indiscriminate killing and peddling of meat, and this condition is in the opinion of the authorities, a menace to the public health.

Paris Has One.

The first municipal slaughter house in the United States was erected at Paris, Texas, in 1909, at a cost of about \$10,000. 



BRITISH COMMERCE HAS SUFFERED BY **GREAT WORLD WAR**

PRIOR TO CONFLICT FOOD STUFFS BROUGHT IN AMOUNT-ED TO LITTLE

IMPORTS ARE CURTAILED

Animals in London Zoo Are Placed on War Rations—Passing the Time "Wig-Wagging."

London.—British trade and com-merce, as a result of three years of war, has made great and increasing sacrifices in order that Great Britain's contribution to the effective and economic strength of the Allies in the war may be up to the full measure of possibilities. Because of the shortage of tonnage caused by war's requirements and the submarine losses, British imports have been severely cur-

Before the war Britain was importing at the rate of about 48 million tons a year. In 1916 the imports fell to about 43 million tons, and in the present year they will be considerably less. Even this large reduction does not exhibit the full amount of the sacrifices which Britishers have made both of articles for their own consumption and of commodities for manufacture and export to their world customers

Before War importations.
Of the 58 million tons which they imported before the war, foodstuffs were rather less than a quarter. The rest was practically all employed or consumed in promoting the industries and commerce of peace. In 1916, how-ever, two-thirds of all Brit.sh sup-plies from overseas consisted of food-stuffs, munitions of war, and the material for the manufacture of muni-tions, leaving only one-third (of a greatly reduced total) for productive industries. That is to say, while before the war Britain could, and did, import upwards of 40 million tons a year for the purposes of industries and com-merce, they obtained in 1916 only some 14 million or 15 million tons for these vital purposes, and in the pres-ent year they cannot look forward to getting nearly so much as even this reduced quantity.

British imports yields equally signifi-cant results. In 1513 the total imports were valued at 769 millions sterling, of which about 94 millions came from the countries now at war. In 1916 British imports were valued at 949 millions sterling, the enemy countries being, of course, eliminated from this figure.

Rise in Prices.

The great rise in prices accounts for a large part of the phenomenon of an increase in value with a decline in bulk, but on the best estimate that can be made it would appear that if in 1916 Pritain had imported the 43 million tons of goods which she obtained from the same countries and in the same proportions as she imported before the war they would have cost rather less than 800 million pounds. Britain paid, therefore, in the year 1916, 150 million pounds more than their imports would have cost if they had continued to buy the same class of commodities and fro mthe same sources as before the war Britishers have therefore, not only sacrificed, ruthlessly, the needs of industry and commerce they have in addition paid a far higher price for the unproductive material of war which circumstances have commelled to substitute. have compelled to substitute.


