

POINTING TO THOSE WHO WERE SINCERELY ANXIOUS TO FIND ANY REAL AND GENUINE DESIRE FOR PEACE IN THEM.

The action of Germany with reference to Russia proves that all her declarations are empty promises. Her denials or contributions have no real meaning. No answer has been given with regard to Poland or the legitimate French claim for the restoration of her lost provinces. Not a word is said about the men of the Italian race and tongue now under the Austrian yoke. What you come to Turkey, so far from von Herffing or Czerwin indicating they were prepared to recognize the rights of the Arabs in Mesopotamia and Arabia, is a pure refusal of those rights and an indication that they meant to maintain the integrity of Turkey.

"I should like any member of this house to point out anything in these speeches which he could possibly regard as proof that the Central Powers are prepared to make peace on a reasonable basis. I fail to find anything of the kind and it is with the most profound regret that I say so."

Had Preponderance
Premier Lloyd George then turned to the question of the Versailles conference and said he was not prepared to enlarge upon the extended duties of that body. He said it was giving no military information to any of the present belligerent powers and preponderance on the western front and any attack which the Germans could bring to bear upon the British or French armies could have been dealt with in the main by the reserves of the respective armies.

"That situation is entirely changed," he said. "If we had not treated the situation we should have been guilty of gross declaration of duty."

Contrasting previous councils with that at Versailles, he emphasized the fact that at Versailles the civilian and military members were sitting together—the prime ministers, the commanders in chief and the chiefs of staff of three countries. The discussion was absolutely free and there was complete unanimity reached. There was no division of opinion upon any details of the conference.

Must Speak Cautionously
"I must speak cautiously," the premier continued, "because military decisions are involved in every word he had chosen. One in Germany or Austria whose ears were glued to the keyhole of the war councils of Germany and whose ears were glued to their decisions in the newspapers, a man who had done that could give us information which would be worth twenty army corps. I must talk with caution because it might give information to the enemy. I would rather that the responsibility was on other shoulders than mine."

"To give away such information (concerning the enlargement of the duties of the Versailles council) is treason beyond description and I decline to do it. It is to betray the security more depends on the decisions being carried out than the British army, which is holding the most important part of the line."

Some comment was caused in the house by the premier's refusal to give more details of the Versailles conference.

In conclusion Premier Lloyd George said that if the house and the country are dissatisfied with the conduct of the war and if they think there is any government which might do it better, it was their business to put the other government into power.

ONLY SIX DRAFT MEN WILL LEAVE FEBRUARY 23RD
Only six white men of class one will be sent to camp on February 23rd, according to George Thornburn, clerk of the exemption board, who stated this morning that the army had been flooded with inquiries and visits from men who were as far down the list as 2000 and more, who had actually thrown up their jobs in anticipation of being called on that date. Mr. Thornburn declared that those who were lower on the list than 2000 would probably not be called till next Christmas, though he admitted it might be sooner.

May Be Months
It will be several months, Mr. Thornburn said, before the men are called, and there is no profit nor necessity for any man to throw up his job until he has been notified of a definite date of call. Mr. Thornburn mentioned the case of two men who came this morning all the way from Louisiana, where they had held good jobs, believing that they would be sent from here on 23rd inst. and he requested that publicity be given to the fact that due announcement and personal notification will be given in ample time for registrants to prepare themselves for their call.

MISS SADIE OLIVER GIVES THREE RECIPES FOR FLOUR "SUB" BREAD.

Three recipes calling for white flour substitutes were used with great success. In answer to questions on the subject Miss Oliver stated that in making quick breads, leavened by soda or baking powder, any white flour substitute might be used in "fifty-fifty" proportion with the flour.

The housekeepers of the city were asked to report their own success with recipes involving wheat substitution for the benefit of the public. Organizes Canners. Today Miss Oliver has been organizing canning and poultry clubs among the girls of Burk Burnett and Cashion. These clubs are intended to stimulate interest and increase efficiency along the lines suggested among the people of small communities and rural districts.

Though no notification other than the printed order in the daily papers has come to the Overstreet Produce company, licensed poultry dealers of this city regarding the discontinuance of the sale or purchase of hens and pullets for stock, Mr. Overstreet has already discontinued the purchase of poultry.

The order permits disposal of the stock on-hand or in transit at the time of the order's issuance. Feb. 11, for 10 days and Mr. Overstreet states that he will have the poultry killed and in storage and on hand to be shipped at any time up to Feb. 21. The Overstreet Produce company receives its poultry and eggs from the farms in the surrounding counties and along the Wichita Valley and up the Denver. This order will serve to stop a very considerable movement of poultry in this section until April 30, it is believed.

WE'RE JUST "OLD FOGIES"—20 YEARS FROM NOW.

The sight of airplanes has grown to be a common one in Wichita Falls. Figure eights and upside-down flying stunts occasion only passing comment. These things, which appear risky in practice, sometimes save the life of the fighter when in battle and they must be learned.

While Wichita Falls has quickly adjusted its mental—and physical—focus to the airplane, this has not been more rapid, comparatively, than the adjustment of the entire country to the advent of the automobile.

Comes now the statement from Washington that mail routes, carried by airplanes, are soon to be established in certain sections of the east, not in the nature of experiments, but as permanent institutions. Each plane is to carry 300 pounds of mail a distance of 200 miles at top speed and without a stop.

In twenty years from now, the younger generation will think of those who recently questioned the practicability of the airplane as a commercial proposition as do we of him who doubted the possibilities of the automobile some twenty or thirty years ago.

GERMANY MUST PROVE THE CASE.

Premier Lloyd George declines to see anything that is hopeful in the substance of the address recently made by Count Czernin regarding peace. He admits, with President Wilson, that the "tone" of the Austrian declaration was more friendly than that delivered on the same day by Count von Hertling for Germany. (rian declaration was more friendly but he insists that there is nothing definite to be found upon which the Entente may build a hope that either of the Central Powers is really ready to cease the war on terms that will leave the rest of the world safe from their military power.

Austria, alone, is no menace to the world. While a strong military power, Austria has been drained of its manhood and materials by the war. The possibility exists that Count Czernin spoke truly when he said that the terms of peace which have been sanctioned by America, would, in the main, prove satisfactory to that country.

The war aims of the United States and Great Britain are identical. But one problem to be considered by these two great nations now is whether it would not be a good idea to make peace with Austria, if it can be definitely shown that that country has an honest desire in that direction and then complete the work of forever breaking the power of the German kaiser.

We believe that President Wilson had some such idea when he carefully worded his last address in dealing individually with the utterances of the representatives of Germany and Austria, respectively. We believe that he has given Austria an opportunity to continue negotiations, if Austria so desires, but finding nothing worthy of consideration as a basis for common action in von Hertling's address, he "closed the door," so to speak, with the invitation to "return when he had something to say."

There has not been the slightest turning aside from the main issue by President Wilson, nor has there been by any of the Allies. All are determined that no "conqueror's terms" will be permitted Germany; all are absolutely determined that the end will be a Germany that is no longer

capable—regardless of its will—to upset the world and precipitate anguish and suffering, now or in the future. It is simply "up to" Germany and Austria to advance the complete proof that the world is "now" safe for democratic peoples, and by final agreements and arrangements, the Allies will see to it that it is kept safe.

FAVORS EDITORIAL STAND FOR LAW TAKE BY THE TIMES

I want to congratulate the Times on its editorial of yesterday, and for its stand for the enforcement of law. The argument that because one law is violated it is therefore justifiable to violate another is sophistry of the weakest kind, and worthy of the intelligence of any good citizen. Such a theory put into practice would lead not only to lawlessness, but to anarchy. It has been also urged in this city that since the Sunday law has resulted in an accident, the whole matter should be dropped, and the picture shows should be allowed to run un molested. Now I want to say that if this is a good argument, there is not a law on the books today that should be enforced, for time after time jurists have acquitted men of theft, arson, murder and every other crime. Does the fact that a jury acquits a man of murder, etc., annul the law? If so then your property may be stolen, your home burned, you may be murdered, and the criminal should be left free and unpunished, for jurists have acquitted men of all these crimes. The jury does not make the law, neither does it annul the law. The state of Texas made the law, the courts of Texas have upheld the law, and the people of Wichita Falls as citizens of Texas ought to obey the law.

There has always been a lawless crowd that wanted a wide open Sunday. Before the war they pleaded for the poor, down-trodden working man, when the real motive that prompted them was their own ungodly desire. I for one resent the fact that they now seek to lay their lawlessness on the shoulders of the American soldier boys. Of course some of the soldiers probably desire Sunday shows just as some civilians desire them, but do not believe that those boys want the law violated for them. As the Times said they are having to fight because Germany had no respect for international law, and surely men who have to fight and die in defense of law should not be allowed to have Sunday shows just as some civilians desire them. It has been said that the shows are opened on Sunday not for the good boys, but for the "riff-raff" that they would get if worse means. Certainly the boys understanding this will appreciate the fact that the shows are opened for them.

Now, Mr. Editor, if these shows are opened for the soldiers why are civilians admitted? I may be wrong, but I'm under the impression that more civilians than soldiers can be found inside the shows on Sunday afternoon. If it is necessary that "Uncle Sam's" boys have a picture show on the afternoon of the day of the Lord, why do not the people get together and raise money to pay for the films, and then put up a sign over the free shows. "None but soldiers admitted." But, Mr. Editor, the Y. M. C. A. gives to the boys at Camp Field three good picture shows a week, and I do not believe that men who have a chance to see three shows a week either need or want to take the Holy Sabbath for another.

TWO TUBERCULAR COWS ARE FOUND IN DAIRY HERDS

EXCELLENT STATE OF HEALTH ENJOYED BY MOST "BOVINES" IN THIS SECTION

Two hundred and eighty-eight cows have been given the tuberculin test by the city inspection department recently, and out of this number, only two have been found reactors. This is considered a remarkable good record, showing that the state of the health of the cows, at least as regards freedom from any trace of tuberculosis, is splendid. Ten dairies are represented in this aggregate herd, which is practically all the milk cows which are supplying the city. The city inspection department has received from Washington a large number of copies of five or six bulletins dealing with a variety of subjects of interest to farmers and dairymen. Among those which have been received, and which are for distribution to any interested parties, are "The Stable Fly," a biography, "Flytraps and their Operation," deal-

ing with methods of fighting them. "Practical Methods of Disinfecting Stables," "The Care of Milk, and its Use in the Home," "Tuberculosis," facts regarding the disease in cattle, and "A simple steam sterilizer for Farm Dairy Utensils." The department also has a bulletin on "The Dairy Industry in the South," which gives a great many facts and figures, together with the latest improved methods of sanitation, handling, and so forth, and claims that the South is very far behind the rest of the United States in this matter.

Those Who Applied For Ship Yard Work Are Not Sent Away

Offering to mis-information, the statement was made yesterday that those who had applied for work in the ship-ping yards had been sent away as soon as their applications had been made out. J. W. Walkup, who is undertaking the work of registering this class of labor, states that the purpose of the registration is so that the government may have records of available labor, which it may send for as required. The applicants so far registered are waiting on their call from the government. The following additional applicants were registered yesterday: S. F. King and M. W. McGinnis, carpenters, C. F. Sivelis, W. W. Burdett, and F. J. Isley, painters and C. H. Maupin, laborer.

Y. M. C. A. FUND IS OVER SUBSCRIBED OVER THIS STATE

DALLAS AND TARRANT COUNTIES FAIL TO GET QUOTA BUT THIS DISTRICT GOES OVER.

The statement issued by the Y. M. C. A. headquarters at Dallas shows that the War Fund raised by the association was over subscribed in Texas by a little over ten per cent. \$559,234.85 being raised, with the quota at \$501,132.00. Out of the forty-five districts which are reported in the statement, twenty seven, of which the fifty-first, which included Wichita County, was one, were over-subscribed, and eighteen fell short of their quota.

Among the latter were Dallas and Tarrant counties, and though they subscribed much more than Wichita County, District 34, which included Dallas County, subscribing \$91,240.01, and District 33, which took in Tarrant County, \$33,593.62, the quota for the former was \$106,500, and for the latter \$40,500. District 41, which included Wichita, Clay and Montague counties was called upon to raise \$10,100, and gave \$10,608.38, an over-plus of about 5 per cent. The banner county of the state, however, was No. 12, which, with its quota set at \$287, according to the statement, turned in \$17,768.09, an over-subscription of something like sixty-five thousand per cent.

It is possible, of course, that there is a mistake in the figures. Next to this comes District No. 7, with an over-subscription of 100 per cent, and District No. 11, which overshoot the mark by 90 per cent.
