CAPTURED PRISONER SAYS ALL PLANS ARE BEING MADE FOR MOVEMENT

#### NOW BUSY BEHIND LINES

Special Training is Said to be Part of Preparations of Men Who Will Make Attack

France, Feb. 12—Some time in March has been set by the Germans for at least one offensive operation on the British front, according to a German prisoner who has just been taken. This captive did not know whether

The statement of the prisoner is not surprising in view of the offensive preparations that are being made by the enemy all along the front and the remarkably fine drying weather which now has continued for many days. #### GERMANS IN ITALY ARE SHOWING CRUELTY

#### Federal Amendment May Be Acted Upon

# IS AFFIRMED BY APPELLATE COURT ITALIANS CHEER

Astin, Texas, Feb. 13.—The court of criminal appeals today affirmed the death penalty cases assessed against Leonard Dodd and Walter Stevenson: from Dallas county. They were given the extreme penalty on conviction of criminal assault on Miss On Own Initiative Florence Orcutt, on the right of June 25, 1917, no reversible error having been found in the record.

"To make such a demand for the first time in the fourth year of the war is the best possible proof that the German empire, or those at cresent controlling it, is not a smood to discuss reasonable terms of peace. I regret it profoundly but there is no use in crying 'Peace' when there is no peace.

"These terms were examined carefully and were examined with a real desire to find something in them, which indicated the central powers were prepared to come somewhere near a basis of agreement and I confess the examination of these two speeches proved profoundly disap-

pointing to those who were sincerely anxious to find any real and genuine desire for peace in them.

"The action of itermany with reterence to Russia proves that all her declarations about no annexations, in demnities or contributions have no real meaning. No answer has been given with regard to Poland or the legitimate French claim for the restoration of her lost provinces. Not a word is said about the men of the Italian race and tongue now under word is said about the men of the Italian race and tongue now under the Austrian yoke. When you come to Turkey, so far from yon Herting of Czernin indicating, they were prepared to recognize the rights of the Arabs in Mesopotamia and Araba, it

"I should like any member of this house to point out anything in these speeches which he could possibly regard as proof that the Gentral Powers are prepared to make peace on terms he would regard as just and reasonable. I fail to find anything of the kind and it is with the most profound regret that I say you.





## M. C. A. FUND IS OVER SUBSCRIBED OVER THIS STATE

DALLAS AND TARRANT COUNTIES FAIL TO GET QUOTA BUT THIS DISTRICT GOES OVER.

The statement issued by the Y. M. C. A. headquarters at Dallas shows that the War Fund raised by the association- was over subscribed in Texas by a little over ten per cent. \$559,234.85 being raised, with the quota at \$501,132.00. Out of the forty-five districts which are reported in the statement, twenty seven of which the ffty-first, which included Wich-lta County, was one, were oversub-scribed, and eighteen fell short of

Among the latter were Dalias and Tarrant counties; and though they subscribed much more than Wichita County, District 34, which included Dalias County, subscribing \$91,240.01, and District 33, which took in Tarrant County, \$33,593.63, the quota for the former was \$106,500, and for the latter \$40,500. District 41, which included Wichita, Clay and Montague counties was called upon to raise \$10,100, and gave \$10,608.38, an overplus of about 5 per cent. The banner county of the state, however, was No. 12, which, with its quota set at \$287, according to the statement, turned in \$17,760.09, an over subscription of something like sixty-five thousand per cent.


