

RELIGIOUS CENSUS TO BE TAKEN HERE ON MARCH TWELFTH

A complete religious census of the entire city will be made Tuesday, March 12th, from 8 a. m. to 11 a. m. At the last meeting of the Pastors' Association of the city, an invitation from the First Methodist church, South, to the other churches to join in with them in taking the census was accepted by the pastors present. At the suggestion of the Pastors' Association, representatives of the various churches met at the Christian church yesterday afternoon at four o'clock to perfect the organization to take the census as early as possible. E. C. Huckabee, assistant to the pastor of the First Methodist Church, South, was appointed general chairman. An executive committee, composed of the pastor and Sunday school superintendent of each church, to confer with Mr. Huckabee and meet at his call, was appointed. All the churches of the city are invited to take part in taking the census. In order that the census may be taken during the two hours, each church is called upon to furnish fifty workers. The names of the workers should be phoned to Mr. Huckabee at 1364 as early as possible. Those present at the committee meeting Sunday afternoon were Rev. O. L. Powers, pastor First Baptist church; Rev. C. H. Clark, pastor First Methodist Church, South; Mr. J. W. Bradley, superintendent of the Sunday school, First Christian church; Mr. C. H. Clark, assistant superintendent of the Sunday school, First Methodist church, South; and Mrs. I. A. Harris of the First Baptist church.

MILK SPECIALIST EXAMINATION WILL BE HELD ANY TIME

Cost Accounting Supervisor (male) \$2,400 to \$6,900 a year. N. B.—Where not otherwise specified, persons of either sex are eligible for examination, and salaries are for the period of one year.

of re-building and equipping what is now being destroyed, so that the need of intelligent conservation of capital will continue for many years to come. The Money in the Crop. A preliminary estimate issued by the Department of Agriculture at Washington places the money value of the crops of 1917 at the unprecedented figure of \$13,443,849,281, an increase of more than \$5,000,000,000 over 1916 and of almost \$9,000,000,000 over 1915. Crops were valued at over \$18,000,000,000, while animals and animal products reached a value of almost \$5,800,000,000. The value of farm crops by states, not including animals and animal products, shows Illinois first, Texas second and Iowa third. Last year Texas was first, Iowa second and Illinois third. The two leading crop states for 1917 were, in order of their importance, Illinois, Texas, Iowa, Ohio, Missouri, Georgia, Nebraska, Indiana, Minnesota and California. The value of the Illinois crop was \$42,042,000, while Rhode Island, forty-eighth on the list, produced \$3,367,000. The Cost of the War. To compute in actual dollars and cents the total cost of the war with any degree of exactitude is naturally an impossible task for the simple reason that a great portion of it cannot be computed in money values. It is manifestly impossible to estimate the value of the human life destroyed or removed from the channels of trade or the destruction of railways, ships, factories and other elements of production. However, a general estimate has been made based on carefully worked out figures, and this shows that the actual money expenditure during 1917 approximated a billion dollars a week. The cost of the first five months of 1914 was estimated at close upon eight billion dollars for both Allies and the Central Powers. During 1915 this figure increased to over twenty-six billions. The following year it was a little short of thirty-six billions, while in 1917, as stated above, it approximated fifty-two billions.

CIVIL SERVICE EMPLOYEES WELL TAKEN CARE OF

Good salaries and comfortable housing are not the only inducements which the Civil Service is offering to the army of new employees which is now invading Washington City. Provision for their social welfare and entertainment is also made as may be gathered from the following letter, issued by the Commission: The Federal Government is not only giving close attention to the matter of the proper housing of its new appointees in Washington, but the general welfare of the employees is now considered in greater measure than ever before. Many of the young people who have come to Washington for war work are hundreds, even thousands, of miles from home for the first time in their lives. They are strangers in a strange land, and it is not to be wondered at that they become homesick and magnify the troubles that they are bound to meet during the period of adjustment to new conditions. The department heads realize that a good clerk must be a contented one, and only officers have appointed welfare workers whose business it is to take an unobtrusive interest in the affairs of the employees and to try to help them with their difficulties. Experiments along this line have had such good results that the number of offices which employ welfare workers is increasing. Since the war began about 25,000 employees have been added to the civil service in Washington, D. C. The United States Civil Service Commission, whose duty it is to recruit this branch of the service, estimates that this calendar year will add another 20,000. Stenographers are being appointed in great numbers. There is also need for clerks, both men and women, who are trained in certain special or technical lines, ship draftsmen, mechanical draftsmen, and workmen in trades connected with shipbuilding. The representatives of the civil service commission at the post offices in all cities are prepared to furnish definite information and application blanks.

OUR BUSINESS LETTER

(National Bank of Commerce) The approach of the Third Liberty Loan finds the country well prepared to take up the duty of raising the additional billions of dollars that are needed to prosecute the war until a successful conclusion shall be reached. Two typical telegrams were as follows: "You can have everything in our bank except the fixtures." "Our resources are at your command. They will be no use to us if Germany wins." With such a spirit as this prevailing in the financial institutions from one end to the other of any kind that the raising of the Third Liberty Loan will be carried out in a spirit of energy and optimism that will spell unqualified success.

The Banking Power of the United States

The banking power of the United States represented by capital surplus, profits, circulation and deposits of national banks and other reporting banks and trust companies, including also the paid-in capital and deposits of the twelve Federal Reserve banks, is estimated under date of January 31, 1918, at \$27,529,000,000, having increased by \$14,348,000,000 during the past five years. The banking power of the world in 1896 was estimated at \$15,558,000,000, so that the banking power of the United States is today two and one-half times as great as the banking power of the entire world was in 1896. At that time the banking power of the United States was just one-seventh of what it is today. This country has now become the great financial reservoir and banking headquarters of the world and upon the United States rests the task not only of supplying its own vital needs, but also of meeting the demands which are being made, and will continue to be made, for increased financial co-operation with the civilization of Europe so long as the war lasts. The return of peace will unquestionably bring with it an era of great activity and development in the work

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DISEASE GERMS AMONG TROOPS FROM AMERICA

NO EPIDEMIC AMONG MEN IN FIELD SAYS MEDICAL STAFF

By GEORGE T. BYE. By Cable from London—After forwarding by Mail from Paris, March 1, it may give satisfaction to "made in America" enthusiasts to learn that whatever disease germs have been assaulting our boys in France are strictly of American ancestry.

There are no epidemics among our soldiers or people of France and England; thanks to this and to the entirely adequate organization of our Medical Corps, the sick and death rate of our army in Europe is considerably below that of the National army in cantonments in the United States.

From Official Charts. This information comes directly from the official charts of the U. S. Medical Corps at General Pershing's Headquarters and the readiness with which these charts were shown to me in itself a sufficient certification of the health of our boys, not to mention the excellence of the safeguards of that health.

At no time has the bed capacity of the American hospitals been taxed. The crest of the sick rate was reached the first week in February with 5.56 per cent from which there was an immediate drop. The average is about 5 per cent, of which percentage scarcely half are bed cases. A man who asks for a pill for indigestion or some liniment for a bruise is included in the sick rate totals. In reality there are about twenty-five men to a thousand and who are under careful treatment in hospitals.

Our boys can join the Medical Corps in pride over one phase of their health. The figures for venereal disease are far under the totals of the American cantonments. More than that; what venereal disease there is consists largely of cases brought over from home.

In dealing with venereal disease our Medical Corps has controlled the men with fatherly frankness and military severity. We have hundreds of prophylactic stations in France where the men may go for advice or care. It is the most frequent sign to be seen in American camps. However, there are few that avail themselves of this attention because they are moved by the fatherly advice. The very few that ruthlessly disregard both advice and warnings forfeit every cent of their pay during treatment, are not allowed to study hospitals and are banished over the time when it is possible for them to do light work and are court-martialed, degraded, and made to do the hardest and most objectionable work when they are physically able.

There is no army in Europe dealing so severely with venereal disease as General Pershing's force.

Among the germ forces the pneumonia heavy artillery has done the most damage, more in fact than all other agencies, germ or germless combined. Thanks to our magnificent hospitals the pneumonia death rate has been kept down to inconsequential figures. The losses from this cause have been almost negligible. Included, though having ample clothing, warm quarters and daily health inspection, are slower than the whites in becoming adjusted to the damp winter of France.

The Medical Corps has had its greatest trouble with measles and scarlet fever which are easily contained and spread rapidly if not given a prompt check. There have been very, very few deaths from scarlet fever or measles but it has cost sleepless vigil, and even now a great many men are in our hospitals suffering.

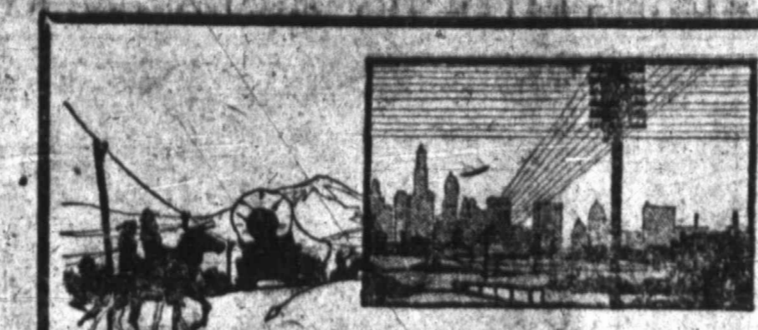

In fact, several camps have been quarantined because it was suspected that meningitis carriers were among the men. However, the meningitis death rate is at the bottom, almost ranking with suicide with a total of one.

Medical Corps. Our Medical Corps took up its duties in France largely under British tutelage. The British Expeditionary Force had to contend with unsanitary villages, crowded billets, insufficient clothing, and the depressing influence of a strange climate in its early days, even as the American army. Most of our doctors were temporarily stationed upon arrival at British hospitals in England and France, and this instruction is still going on.

That our sick rate has never approached ten per cent, of which General Pershing was warned in anticipation. In part due to reports, suggestions and training given our Medical Corps by the British hospital staffs.

Supplementary Treaties Signed by Bolsheviki

By Associated Press. Supplementary treaties between the Central Powers and the Bolsheviki government were signed at Brest-Litovsk in addition to the main peace treaty according to a telegram from Brest-Litovsk by way of Vienna and Amsterdam, which gives no details of the treaties.

As the German official statement of Sunday night mentions only the cessation of operations in Great Russia, it is inferred in some quarters here that the German advance in the Ukraine and Finland will continue while the German reserve for themselves a free hand outside the limits of Great Russia.

France is Making Brave Effort to Increase Yields

Associated Press Mail Correspondent. Paris, Jan. 25.—France, without a "bumper" crop of corn to fall back upon in making a brave effort to increase the yield of other foodstuffs and there are now for the first time signs that the effort is producing results.

Nearly a million more acres of wheat were sown last fall than in 1916, according to recently completed statistics. With ordinary good luck this means nearly 20,000,000 bushels more of wheat. Spring sowing this year may exceed that of 1917 by nearly the same extent which will bring the French wheat crop this year up to forty million bushels more than that of last year.

The bread card, taking effect January 25th was intended to save from food consumption the million bushels required for the extended seeding.

M. Comperre-Morel, Commissary of Agriculture, charged with the extension of seeding has already divided 600,000 bushels of Manitoba among farmers. He is confident important gains will be made in the crop of 1918.

The decision of the French Food Minister to issue cards regulating the distribution of bread to three hundred gramme (about 11 ounces) a day is causing much comment. Some critics, others approve but the consensus of opinion may be summed up in the good natured remark of a morning paper which says "that for one man who dies of starvation there are a hundred who succumb to indigestion."

Generally however, the press seems to adopt a very serious point of view of the innovation. The French are notoriously the greatest bread eaters in the world and much doubt is expressed as to the ration of a little over a half a pound per day being sufficient.

France has another "Commissary of Agriculture," Monsieur Le Rouzic, deputy from the department of Morbihan, who is sometimes called the "Potato Dictator." He is charged by the Minister of Agriculture with direct supervision of planting with reference more especially to vegetables. He is trying to increase the production of beans as well as potatoes, and is especially encouraged the planting of topinambours, or Jerusalem artichock. The topinambour plant is about as hardy as a goat; it thrives in poorly cultivated and slightly fertilized soil and is strong enough to throttle any weed that tries to encroach upon it.
