Custodian Says Government Does Not Plan To Sell Small Holdings of Minor Individual Enemies

Washington, Mar. 8.—Property in the United States owned by the Kaiser, former Chancellor von Bethmann-Hollweg, the German "junkers," generally and the German government itself, will be the first to go under the hammer under the plans of A. Mitchell Palmer, the property custodian, to sell German owned property here to the highest bidder.

Washington, Mar. 8.—Organization of five more regiments of cavalry, in accordance with recommendations from General Pershing, has been ordered by the war department in addition to the complete cavalry division of the regular army already under way. The designation and organization of the new regiments will be as follows:

German Airplanes Drop Bombs Behind American Trenches. With the American Army in France, Thursday, Mar. 7.—A half dozen bombs were dropped behind the American front in the sector northwest of Toul last night by German airplanes, which were looking for ammunition dumps. They did not succeed in hitting any of their objectives, however, and none of the bombs dropped caused any casualties.

GERMAN FAMILIES SPEND OVER HALF PAY FOR FOOD. Washington, D. C., March 8.—The seriousness of the cost of living per cent of the average German family's expenditures are paid for food, fresh meat is scarce and smoked and conserved meats are high in price while fish is two and one-half to four times higher than in peace times. Potatoes are being substituted for grain and substitutes of all kinds are being used especially by the poorer classes. Jam very largely has taken the place of butter and olismargarine.

PRICE OF COAL AT MINES GIVEN NEW REDUCTION. Washington, Mar. 8.—Drastic reductions in the price of coal at the mines in Colorado, Utah, Montana and Wyoming, running in some cases as much as twenty five per cent were ordered today by the Fuel Administration. Coal operators declare practically half the mines in those states would have to stop production under the new scale.

Germany, having erected a barrier of weak states between herself and Bolshevik Russia and having "liberated" the Ukraine, the best food producing region of Russia, for her own benefit, now turns to the oil district of the Caucasus, which Russia has agreed to allow to be detached, apparently in the interest of Turkey, but doubtless most of the oil will reach Germany by way of the Black Sea and the Danube.

Wheat 111,272,000 bushels, or 17.1 per cent. Oats, 595,272,000 bushels, or 37.5 per cent. Barley 43,404,000 bushels, or 20.8 per cent.

TEN-MILE ZONE MEASURE STILL HANGS FIRE UPON DATE OF EFFECTIVENESS

House Refuses Concurrence in Senate Amendment and Bill Goes to Conference-Relief Act Passes.

Austin, Texas, Mar. 8.—The lower house of the legislature today refused to accept the senate amendment to the ten-mile prohibition bill around the army camps which fixes the date for it to become effective April 15, instead of April 1, as it passed the house and asked for free concurrence by the senate. The date on which the law would become effective is the only point of contention.

GOVERNOR HANDLES FUNDS. Before the vote to concur in the Senate drouth relief bill amendments was taken, a motion by Representative Terrell to ask for a conference committee was voted down. As finally passed the bill provides that the governor instead of the commissioner of agriculture shall have distribution of the funds to the counties needing relief. No county is to get more than \$20,000 and the money is to be paid back in two years at four per cent.

INTEREST RATES UPON LOANS TO ALLIES RAISED. (BULLETIN) Washington, Mar. 8.—The interest rate on loans to allies has been raised from 4 1/2 per cent to 5 per cent as a result of the recent increase of rates on certificates of indebtedness from 4 to 5 1/2 per cent.

DRAFT TREATIES TO BE EFFECTIVE UNDER THIS BILL. (BULLETIN) Washington, Mar. 8.—By unanimous vote a favorable report on the administration bill to give effect to alien draft treaties which may hereafter be negotiated, including those with Great Britain and Canada, already signed, by authorizing the president to order registration of such aliens, was ordered today by the Senate Military Committee.

TEACHING PATRIOTISM MEASURE FINALLY PASSED BY THE SENATE. Austin, Tex., Mar. 8.—Senator Martin Faust of Comal county, today obtained the final passage in the Senate of his bill providing for the teaching of lessons in patriotism in the public schools of the state. The bill provides that a daily program be carried out lasting at least ten minutes in which the pupils shall be taught patriotism.

FARMER FURLOUGHS WOULD BE GRANTED UNDER THIS BILL. (BULLETIN) Washington, Mar. 8.—Furloughs for farmers and other men in non-military pursuits in a necessary to the war, were authorized in a Senate bill passed by the house with the approval of the war department.

LANGUAGE RESOLUTION FINALLY VOTED DOWN. Austin, Tex., Mar. 8.—The lower house of the legislature today voted down the resolution which would ask Governor Hobby to submit to the legislature the subject of prohibiting teaching the German language in the schools of the state, the vote being 28 to 17.

ENFORCED LOYALTY PLACED UPON SOME BUSINESS LINES

SOUTHERN ILLINOIS COUNTIES OPERATED UNDER VIGILANCE COMMITTEES EYE

St. Louis, Feb. 22.—Enforced loyalty has been placed on a business basis in Macoupin, Madison and Montgomery counties in southern Illinois where the activities of pro-German propagandists recently became so pronounced that vigilance committees in numerous towns have forced hundreds of suspected persons to make public manifestations of their allegiance to the government.

On the same night more than one hundred persons were made to sign pledges of loyalty. News of the use of stern measures spread and within a week Worden, Mount Olive, Gillespie, Williamson, Hillsboro and several other smaller towns made demonstrations. In some of these towns scores of persons were taken from their homes and requested to make public profession of their loyalty.

Amsterdam, Mar. 8.—In reply to congratulations from Philip Henkens, director of the North German Lloyd Steamship Line, Emperor William has sent the following telegram: "The German sword in our best protection. With God's help it will also bring us peace in the west and, indeed, the peace which after much distress and many troubles, the German people need for a happy future."

The emperor detailed his gratitude at greater length in a message to the president of the Reichstag, saying: "The complete victory fills me with gratitude. It permits us to live again one of those great moments in which we can reverently admire God's hand in history. What turn events have taken is by the disposition of God."

"I do not doubt that a rich, strong and happy people will arise out of the storms and sacrifices of this time."

AN INDICATION OF INTENTIONS

Germany's peace agreement with Russia is likely to last just so long as the Russian people remain helpless. Even in their demoralized state, it will not be wise for the victors to exercise despotic authority over the people whom they have conquered.

No one can with any degree of certainty predict future course of affairs in Russia or their effect upon the future course of events in Germany. It is certain that already the seed of discontent has been sown in the Kaiser's dominions by Slavic Socialists.

The German workmen do not stand behind Von Rosenberg (Von Kuehlmann's assistant) or the principles for which he stands. Let us then face the facts and frankly declare that in this peace the success which was sought has been denied to Socialism of all shades of opinion.

The German policy with reference to both Russia and Rumania has been one of conquest. Valuable concessions have been demanded of both. This is just an indication of what the demands will be upon Italy, England, France and the United States unless the power of the Kaiser is crushed forever.

This is all the more reason that the people of the United States should not view the conflict with detached interest. When every turn of events across the water vitally affects the welfare of the people of this country, it is all the more reason why we should concentrate our every energy toward winning the war, subordinating all else, for the sooner this is done the sooner will victory crown the efforts of the people of the allies.

THE STATE QUARANTINE

Governor Hobby, at the request of Representative George B. Terrell, has submitted to the legislature the subject of providing for the sale and transfer to the United States of all property owned by the State on the Gulf coast and along the Mexican border.

Aside from the fact that this will mean a saving to the State immediately of \$210,000, and an annual saving hereafter of \$30,000, there is every reason to turn over to the government entire jurisdiction at the points named. Serious differences between State and Federal officials have heretofore arisen, particularly at Galveston, when as a matter of fact friction was by no means worth while.

Federal Officers to Stop Reign of Vice Near All Army Camps

Springfield, Ill., Mar. 8.—United States Marshal V. Y. Dallman and two deputies left here today for Rock Island, whence United States District Attorney E. C. Knotts preceded them yesterday to engage in the government crusade against liquor and vice in the military zone surrounding the federal arsenal.

later, made peace with the Austrians. Berlin's announcement of the capture of Kiev was made just as Russia and Germany agreed to peace terms and since then there have been no reports of military activity in that region. In five days Germany has forced peace terms on three different governments—Russia, Rumania and Finland.

Although the Germans apparently will permit King Ferdinand to continue to rule Rumania, the victorious enemy has compelled his victim to agree to humiliating terms. Important wheat, oil and salt concessions are to be given Germany, which is to control the Rumanian railroads for fifteen years and is to have a most favorable trade agreement with Russia, which loses Dobruja and control of the Danube.

Raiding operations have not yet developed into large operations in the western and Italian fronts. The artillery duels, however, continue intense at important sectors. All the entente armies from the North Sea to the Adriatic have withstood enemy raids, but the British have successfully penetrating the Torton lines.

British Labor Party Leaders Are Sought By National Party

Cooperation of British labor party leaders will be sought in propaganda launched by the National Party throughout the United States. At today's session of the first national convention the party unanimously adopted this resolution.

In consideration of the very close accord of their aims and ends, the National Party, through its national convention, recommends that one or two members of the British Labor Party be invited by our executive committee to tour our country under our auspices to interpret more fully to the American people their purposes and methods.

Juanita Youngblood Placed Under Bond; Bawdy House Charge

Juanita Youngblood was released on \$500 bond by U. S. Commissioner Lantz waiving a hearing on charge of running a bawdy house within a prescribed zone of five miles of a military camp. This is the first complaint of the sort filed in the local edging since the aviation camp was located here.

Smallpox Epidemic At Iowa Park Under Control—Is Report

The epidemic of small-pox which has been prevalent at Iowa Park for the past few weeks is now believed to be under control since the imposition of a more rigid quarantine. At one time, it is said there were as many as twenty-five cases in Iowa Park.

Failure to Register Now Charge Against Citizen From Bowie

Charged with failure to register, Bert Lovett of Bowie has been arrested on a federal warrant and his hearing set for this afternoon before U. S. Commissioner J. A. Lantz. Lovett claims to be less than 21, while his wife and numerous others, citizens of Bowie, say that he must be at least 25 or 26. Lovett has two children—the oldest of whom is 4 years old. He and his wife are divorced.

British Casualties Are Light for Week Says Official Report

London, Thursday, March 7.—For the first week of March British casualties were 3,345, the lowest of any week for several weeks. The official report for the week ending today follows: Killed or died of wounds: Officers 63; men 628. Wounded or missing: Officers 179; men 2,473.

Walter L. Fisher Is Injured by Fall and Is Now in Hospital

Chicago, Mar. 8.—Walter L. Fisher, secretary of the Interior in President Taft's cabinet, is in a hospital as the result of a fall at his home in which he sustained two broken ribs and a sprained back. It was said today by hospital attendants that it will be several weeks before Mr. Fisher can be out again.

NEW RIFLES ARRIVE AT FORT WORTH CAMP

Fort Worth, Tex., Mar. 8.—Nine thousand new Enfield rifles, which practically equip the Panther Division of Texas and Oklahomaans, reached here today.

FEELINGS OF ENMITY FOLLOW CONCLUSION OF PEACE PACT

Amsterdam, Mar. 7.—Commenting on the outcome of the Brest-Litovsk conference at which peace with the Russian government was concluded, the Socialist newspaper Vorwaerts says: "Peace was concluded, but the delegates parted with feelings of deadly enmity. That such was the case is deeply regrettable event. The German workmen do not stand behind von Rosenberg (assistant to Foreign Secretary von Kuehlmann and chairman of the second Brest-Litovsk conference) or the policy for which he stands. Let us, therefore, face the facts and frankly declare that in this peace the success which was sought has been denied to Socialism of all shades of opinion."

Over 200 Vessels Built By England During Past Year

London, Feb. 26.—(By Mail).—Sir Leo Chitezza, M.P., parliamentary secretary and shipping controller, declared in the House of Commons yesterday that 200 British-built merchant vessels of 1600 tons or over were completed last year. They aggregated 1,087,696 tons. The net loss of British vessels of 1600 tons and over during 1917 was 538, involving a loss of 200 percent compared with 1916. The actual cargo imported, however, was only about two percent less.

WOMAN WHO SHOT SELF DIES; BODY IS BEING HELD

Without ever regaining consciousness, Mrs. Dan Archer died at the Wichita General hospital Thursday afternoon at 4:30 from a bullet wound in the base of her brain, self-inflicted early Thursday morning. The body is being held at the Hill Undertaking parlors awaiting the arrival of her husband who was at work in Arkansas at the time of the tragedy.

Administrator Peden Wants Rice Industry To Meet in Houston

Houston, Tex., March 8.—Administrator Peden of the federal food administration of Texas has called a meeting of representatives of the rice industry and business men interested in developing the rice belt of Texas, to meet in Houston on March 12, for the purpose of working out a plan for the development of thousands of acres of rice land which has both the water facilities and the machinery, and which unless it has the stimulus will remain uncultivated during 1918.

Earnings of Texas Railways Show Big Increase for Year

Austin, Tex., March 8.—Income from operation of the Texas railroads for a period of 12 months ending December 31, 1917 reached \$48,198,668, which is an increase of \$7,749,519 or 21.86 percent over the previous corresponding 12 months, according to a statement issued today by the railroad commission. Total operating revenue for the same period amounted to \$142,407,423, an increase of \$15,898,871, or 12.57 percent; total operating expenses, \$94,208,754 an increase of \$3,149,351, or 3.35 percent; freight revenue, \$97,910,957, an increase of \$6,985,225, or 7.54 percent; passenger revenue, \$46,969,335, an increase of \$6,425,404 or 15.61 percent.

DUTCH GET DAMAGES FOR SINKING OF VESSEL

The Hague, Mar. 8.—The Dutch foreign office announces that it has received compensation from Germany for damage to the property of the Belgian Relief Committee resulting from a submarine attack on the Dutch steamer Rijnwijk on April 7, 1916. The Rijnwijk was beached after the attack but her cargo was damaged by water. Germany apologized to Holland for the attack in August, 1916 and last November it was announced at The Hague that she had paid compensation for damaging the Rijnwijk.

Kiev Is Reported Still in Hands of Forces of Russia

London, March 7.—Kiev, the capital of the Ukraine, is still in the hands of Russian revolutionary troops and has not been occupied by the Germans, according to a statement issued Wednesday by the Russian official news agency in Petrograd. The previous message saying Kiev had been lost to the enemy, the statement adds, was due to the receipt of a wireless message which must have originated from enemy sources.
The German war office in its official statement of March 3 said that Ukrainian and German troops had captured Kiev. Since then, however, there have been no claims of any advance beyond Kiev by the invaders.

New York, Mar. 8.—Women in uniforms, or members of parties containing women in uniform, cannot be served alcoholic beverages in leading uptown hotels.
The government's regulation is perfectly plain, one proprietor stated in an announcement today. "A uniform is a uniform, whether worn by a man or a woman. If a woman is in uniform it is impossible for her or any member of her party to have liquor in any form. We have no discretion in the matter."
