

STATE-WIDE BILL IS BEFORE SENATE WHICH AMENDS IT

MORE DRASTIC PENALTIES FOR VIOLATION OF PROVISIONS ARE ADDED

WOULD SEARCH TRAINS

Letter, However, is Withdrawn As Opposition—Appears—Supreme Commission is Advocated

By Associated Press. Austin, Texas, Mar. 14.—The statutory prohibition bill as passed in the house was taken up in the Senate just before noon today and was still being considered when recess was taken.

Several important amendments were adopted. Senator Westbrook had adopted an amendment which provides that all beverages containing one half of one per cent alcohol shall be considered intoxicating liquors and shall be prohibited.

Senator Suter had adopted an amendment adding a fine of not less than \$1,000 nor more than \$5,000 for the violation of the act, besides making it a felony. The attorney general would institute suit for collection of the fine.

In individual counties. The amendment originally provided that suits shall be filed in Travis county, but Senator Page insisted that prosecution should be instituted in the county where the offense is committed.

Another amendment by Senator Suter would empower the sheriff of any county to search railroad trains, automobiles and other conveyances for liquor. Senator Suter is engineering the bill, said a source going so far as to say that he has teeth enough in the bill as it came from the House.

Senator Suter then withdrew the amendment. Senator McNamara asked Suter if he were not attempting to "put over" the Looney bill in the Senate in disguise. Senator Suter said it was not his intention.

Supreme Commission. When the Senate met today, Senator Johnson of Hall introduced a bill providing for the creation of a supreme commission of appeals to be composed of nine members, who shall sit in three sections, the purpose being to relieve the supreme court. The commission to be elected one from each of the nine supreme judicial districts.

Senator Huapeta introduced a bill providing for the creation of a reclamation and conservation of the natural resources of the state. A senate committee of civil jurisprudence today made a favorable report on the bill providing for the creation of a central board of control, with an adverse minority report signed by Senators Bailey and Hall.

Senator McNamara presented a black grip containing a petition, which he said contained over five thousand names of women in Dallas county asking the legislature to pass the bill permitting women to vote in the primary and general election. It was presented in the House.

METHOD OF NOMINATING CERTAIN CANDIDATES UP. By Associated Press. Austin, Tex., March 14.—Nomination of candidates for the supreme court, court of criminal appeals and appellate court by conventions in lieu of primaries is provided in a bill introduced today by Representative Carlisle of Tarrant. The bill was referred to the judiciary committee.

The House finally passed the bill which would create a new criminal court in Bowie county after an extended debate. The McCoy bill which provided that persons having liquor in their possession in dry territory should tell where they got it was dropped out of order by Speaker Fuller after Mr. McCoy said its provisions were amply protected in the statutory prohibition that already has passed the house.

Representative Canalis introduced a reclamation bill providing that water improvement drainage or levee districts may be organized and that indebtedness incurred may be met by whatever taxes are necessary. The senate reclamation bill was introduced on first reading and referred to a committee.

Speaker Fuller appointed the following committee to make an investigation of conditions at the Woman's Confederate Home as provided in a resolution adopted yesterday: Butler, Miller of Austin, Peyton, Schlossham and Thomas.

A resolution of sympathy was adopted as a result of the death of R. F. Gross, former member of the legislature from Grayson county.

SENATE COMMITTEE DISAPPROVES CUT IN AVIATORS' PAY

All Aviation Landing Fields To Come Under Ten Mile Zone Measure

By Associated Press. Austin, Texas, Mar. 14.—Attorney General R. F. Looney in an opinion today held that the ten-mile prohibition zone bill, as passed by the legislature, applies to all aviation landing fields that are located at different places over the state, whether or not the sale of and traffic in intoxicating liquors is prohibited within the ten miles surrounding these landing fields.

The attorney general points out that aviators land at these fields in varying numbers daily where they repair their airplanes and frequently spend the night at the landing place. It is necessary to protect these cadets the same as if they were within a prohibited zone, his opinion says.

The attorney general also held that provisions of the ten-mile zone bill prohibit the traffic in liquors by local clubs, several hundred of which are scattered throughout the state and some within the zone territory.

These are the first rulings issued by the attorney general construing the ten-mile zone bill.

By Associated Press. Austin, Texas, Mar. 13.—The ten-mile military zone bill will likely be signed some time during the day by Governor Hobby. The measure, as finally passed, was placed on his desk and as soon as he scrutinizes the measure he will affix his signature thereto. The act becomes effective April 15.

Denver, Colo., March 14.—Howard Holaday, aviation cadet killed in a fall at Kelly Field, near San Antonio, yesterday was 24 years old, according to his mother, Mrs. Howard W. Holaday of Denver. He attended the first officers training camp at Fort Riley, Kansas, but gave up a commission in the infantry to become an aviator.

He was a graduate of the University of Idaho, where his brother, Charles A. Holaday is a professor of chemistry.

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BELGIAN NURSE IS WITH FAIRBANKS

MUCH RAIDING IS REPORTED ON WESTERN FRONT

ARMIES ARE KEPT TO HIGH PITCH AWAITING THE EXPECTED GREAT OFFENSIVE.

ARTILLERY VERY ACTIVE

Germans Are Not Remaining in Their Trenches—Eight Americans, But Depart When Raid Is Forecast.

Favorable weather on most of the western front has led to increased fighting but none of the armies yet has made an attack in great strength. All apparently are keyed up to the highest pitch and the raids into opposing trenches are becoming stronger each day.

In the Champagne where the German artillery has been very active, the French have withstood a German attack. The effort was repulsed by the French with severe losses to the attackers. American raiding parties and American gunners both are busy on the sectors northwest of Toul and east of Lunerville. The Germans do not remain in their trenches to fight the Americans but flee to the rear lines when General Pershing's men appear.

British Take Initiative. British troops in the Ypres area Wednesday took the initiative and in a raid southeast of Polygon Wood captured 37 prisoners and three machine guns and inflicted casualties on the enemy. The German artillery activity is intense on the Ypres sector and between Arras and Armentieres, where strong German raids earlier in the week were repulsed by British and Portuguese troops.

On the coastal sector in Palestine north of Jaffa, the British have advanced three miles on an eleven mile front. Six villages were taken and two streams crossed in the face of Turkish resistance. A slight advance also has been made in the Jerusalem-Nabulus road in Palestine.

Germans Hold Odessa. In the east the Germans now hold Odessa, the great Russian seaport on the Black Sea, which probably will be used either as the base for an invasion of India by way of Persia, or as the terminal of the grain shipments from Russia to the Central Empire. Turkish-German planes in the Caucasus which included the surrender by Russia of three Caucasian provinces which would provide a roadway to the Caspian Sea are opposed by the Caucasus army. The Caucasus government does not recognize the treaty with the Bolsheviks and that it should treat with the Caucasus direct.

British shipping losses for the past week total eighteen vessels, the same number as were lost in the two previous weeks. There is an increase, however, in the number of large ships sunk. Fifteen of 1,600 tons or over, as reported this week, while in the last week the ships of large tonnage numbered fourteen and twelve respectively.

German airships again raided the coast of England Wednesday night. A number of bombs were dropped. Tuesday night's Zeppelin raid was ineffective.

By Associated Press. Waco, Texas, Mar. 14.—The city commission today ordered the city ordinance and amended the service car ordinance so as to include jitneys. The jitney drivers are required to have \$1,000 bond in place of \$200. The effect of this action is to turn the jitneys loose throughout the city to run where they please.

The strikers on the street car system have organized a "hit squad" and are hauling people at street car fare anywhere in the city. The company was operating 19 cars today lacking seven cars reaching normal. There is no indication of settlement, both sides seeming determined.

By Associated Press. Laredo, Tex., Mar. 14.—A patrol of the 37th Infantry is today beating the brush for a party of eight or ten Mexicans who fired on them near Arroyo El Tigre, slightly wounding a private in the hand and shoulder. The bandits fled after firing on the troopers at long range.

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Tremendous Rally Here On March 22 Is Believed Sure

Mademoiselle Marie Van Gestel, Belgian Red Cross nurse wounded in the siege of Antwerp, early in the war, will assist Douglas Fairbanks, the much worshipped movie hero, in bringing to Wichita Falls the realization of the seriousness of the great war on March 22, when a patriotic rally, which is expected to surpass anything ever held in this part of the state, is to be held.

The party will travel in a special car, which will contain a war exhibit, curios taken from the battlefields of Belgium and France. This exhibit will be opened to the public during the day. Plans for the rally will be perfected within the week and it is planned to advertise the advent of the noted personages in Wichita Falls and over the county.

The widespread popularity of Douglas Fairbanks, the man with the "million dollar smile" is enough to guarantee a vast audience and Doug is going to take advantage of the curiosity of the American people to drive home his message with the telling force that marks his interpretation of a virile, red blooded man, be lover, warrior or desperado, on the screen of the silent drama.

The Belgian heroine, who nearly lost her life during the first days of the war, has an interesting story to tell and tells it in an unusual manner, according to those who have heard her. Her audiences interrupt with cheers, or sit silent while tears run down their cheeks, at her recital of the horrors of the war and recounting of German atrocities which her own eyes had witnessed.

The personnel of the party outside these two has not yet been decided upon, but will consist of soldiers of France, Belgium and England, who have seen much service and have been wounded, and American men of prominence who are giving their time to raising funds for the pursuit of the war.

By Associated Press. Bern, Tuesday, March 12.—The Swiss Federal Council at a meeting last night discussed a request on measures of neutrality which deal with the recognition of Swiss neutrality by belligerent powers. The report stated that the declaration made by the United States had been called for by the federal council which had learned of the presence of American troops on the Swiss frontier.

President Callender said he was surprised at the declaration concerning Swiss neutrality, made by the United States, France and Great Britain. He said that the federal council in its reply had formally protested, insisting that if the neutrality of Switzerland was violated, it would be the duty of Switzerland to defend, and such was the only conception in conformity with Swiss treaties.

"We refuse," said the president "to be under the protection of powers which guarantee our neutrality. We wish, in case of invasion, to freely conclude an alliance with them and which was respected, to call to our help the powers which signed treaties of 1815 and 1816. The three powers in question have not replied to the answer of the federal council.

"We have every reason to believe that their declaration was not intended materially to injure our neutrality and we are on our friendly terms with them."

A dispatch from Bern on December 5 said that the Swiss Federal Council had been informed by the United States that it recognized the neutrality of Switzerland. The American note was reported to have declared that the United States was in complete agreement with the allies and the inviolability of Swiss territory, so long as Switzerland maintained neutrality and the enemy respected that neutrality.

The proposals for a general agreement now have lain for two months without action. The United States and the allies are represented as not disposed to resent these defaults by the Netherlands since it is realized that Holland has no alternative.

Holland has been notified that a large supply of food has been placed at its disposal and that it can freely send ships to take it back under the most ample guarantees that the ships will be bunkered and allowed to return without restriction. If Holland is prevented by Germany from sending ships to transport it, the responsibility for cutting off Holland's food supply, officials here say, can only rest with Germany.

The war trade board has authorized the transfer of two cargoes of food now aboard Dutch steamers prevented from sailing by the refusal of the German government to permit the ships to leave Holland to the Holland-American liner Nieuw Amsterdam, which will sail shortly with a cargo of food for Holland. Without this action by the United States these two cargoes would have been prevented by Germany from reaching Holland.

American officials stated the action of the United States and Great Britain with the attitude of Germany which for months by threats has attempted to coerce a control over Dutch shipping and take over all such jurisdiction not warranted by international law or civilized customs.

A large amount of tonnage still is left free for Holland's own needs.

GREAT BRITAIN PLANS TO ACT WITH AMERICA. By Associated Press. London, Mar. 14.—Because of the long delays in the negotiations with Holland, the British government has decided to act in this respect. Great Britain and the United States have reached an agreement to end the negotiations and take over all such ships next week for the use of the allies.

By Associated Press. London, Mar. 14.—The hospital ship Guilford Castle was attacked unsuccessfully by a submarine in the Bristol Channel on March 10, it was announced officially today. She was struck by Red Cross flags and had all the hospital lights on.

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DUTCH VESSELS WILL BE TAKEN FOR ALLIED USE

GREAT BRITAIN AND UNITED STATES EXPECT THIS TO BE SECURE 1,000,000 TONS BURDEN

AGREEMENT DEMANDED

Failure of Netherlands to Grant Request Will be Followed by Requisitions but Owners Compensated

Washington, Mar. 14.—After months of delay and unsuccessful negotiations with the Netherlands, the United States and Great Britain have decided to take over on March 15 for allied use all Dutch ships in allied ports unless the Netherlands government accepts an agreement to that purpose before that time.

This will bring practically a million tons of ships to the aid of the allies at a time when they are sorely needed.

The Netherlands minister, Augustus Philippa had an engagement with President Wilson today and it was expected he would present from his government a final appeal that the action be delayed or at least modified.

Not Expected to Recede. There are no indications, however, that the allied governments will recede from their decision. In fact a final communication is understood already to have been presented at The Hague by the British and American diplomatic representatives.

In addition to being recompensed for the loss of any of the ships the Dutch are to receive liberal compensations in export privileges of breadstuffs which they need badly.

German pressure is expected to deter the Netherlands government from accepting the agreement the allies propose unless they are certain that the ships under international law is looked upon as a logical solution and not entirely an unfortunate one for Holland.

Will Remain Neutral. Officials and diplomats here have no fears that the taking over of the Dutch ships will force Holland into the war unless they are certain that Holland will continue her policy of neutrality.

The taking over of all the Dutch fleets at the greatest move of its kind since the beginning of the war.

Official Explanation. The official explanation here is that Holland obviously is in a state of distress, and that the German submarine menace, the necessity of feeding the neutral nations of the world, officials add, calls for the use of every available ton of shipping.

The United States and Great Britain, officials say, go no further than Holland proposed to go until German threats prevented putting into effect the voluntary agreement already negotiated. Holland's interests will be safeguarded in every way with ample food supplies and the United States and Great Britain will undertake to facilitate the continuance of Dutch sailings to the East Indian colonies and provide bunkers for such ships, so that Holland will be relieved from the apprehension as to the nature of her colonies and their trade.

Officials reiterate that the taking over of Dutch ships involves nothing new in international law, but is an exercise of recognized sovereign rights, such as have been exercised by Germany herself.

The proposed voluntary agreement provided for the departure of ships now in Dutch waters to replace ships sailing from this side with supplies but Germany would undertake to replace any Dutch ships starting for this side of the Atlantic. The intent obviously was to tie up as much shipping as possible at a time when it was most needed.

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### OIL BELT ROAD AGAIN TAKEN UP, PLAN OUTLINED

CHAMBER OF COMMERCE TO SEND BIG DELEGATION TO BRECKENRIDGE

### MAN MAY BE EMPLOYED

Work of Organizing Various Counties is Expected to be Taken Up in Near Future

Unanimously adopting the report of the Oil Belt Highway committee, which in one week has laid the foundation of organizations to build a hard surfaced road from the Wichita county oil fields to the new Brownwood pool, the Chamber of Commerce at a called meeting this morning authorized the committee, which is composed of C. L. Rodgers, W. S. Curlee and W. W. Silk, to employ a man who is considered necessary, who will devote his entire time to the work of organizing the counties which the highway will traverse and carry on an educational campaign so that bonds may be voted to build the necessary hard surfaced roads. The Chamber of Commerce also voted to send a large delegation to the big rally which will be held at Breckenridge, Stephens county, Thursday, March 21, when representatives from the seven counties which the road will traverse will be present.

**Question of Extending Road**  
With a road to the south assured, the question of extending the oil highway into Oklahoma, through the new pool now being opened in Cotton county and to the other oil fields into Oklahoma City, was brought up and Frank Kell was appointed to take the matter up with the Oklahoma City Chamber of Commerce and with Tulsa interests as well.

C. E. Rodgers gave the report of the committee's work of the past week, reporting much enthusiasm all along the route. Mr. Rodgers with Mr. Curlee and Mr. Silk having just returned from a trip over the proposed route, it is the opinion of the entire committee that the Oil Belt Highway will be the most popular road ever proposed in this section. It will be 200 miles in extent, the longest stretch of hard surfaced road in the state promoted as a single unit. County commissioners, judges, Chambers of Commerce and other civic organizations and the individual citizens all along the route proposed have acclaimed the idea of a road which will make travel to and from the oil fields quick and easy and there is no doubt in the minds of those who have attended the meetings held during the past week that the road building will be pushed and that bond issues will be voted as soon as possible. In fact before Messrs. Rodgers, Curlee and Silk leave each community temporary organizations were formed and permanent organizations will be perfected before next Thursday, when the meeting will be held at Breckenridge.

**People Interested**  
The people of Brownwood are especially interested in the highway according to Mr. Rodgers and the Brownwood Chamber of Commerce, which is now headed by Porter C. Whaley, formerly of Amarillo has promised all necessary support, moral and financial and will have at least 50 representatives at the Breckenridge meeting, when the highway association will be permanently organized. The counties which the road will traverse going south are: Wichita, Archer, Young, Eastland, Stephens, Brown and Comanche. Wichita county has already voted for the road, the roads from the oil fields to Archer county being included in the good roads system for which bonds were passed last summer. Eastland county also has all but one of the proposed highway through that county provided for by a bond issue, and the remaining 4 miles will be paid for out of private subscriptions. The other counties were very glad to promise immediate action on bond issues and the local committee does not anticipate any delay beyond that of the natural course of affairs in putting the highway through to completion.

### MUCH SPECULATION IS OCCASIONED BY TROOPS IN CHINA

MOVEMENT OF FORCES CONNECTED WITH DESIRE OF PRESIDENT TO RESIGN

**By Associated Press**  
Peking, Mar. 14.—The mysterious movements of troops by Governor Chang Soulin of Szechuan province, coupled with the reported desire of President Fong-Kwo-Chang to resign is causing speculation in the capital. General Chang Soulin recently intercepted a large shipment of arms from Japan intended for the Chinese government. The cause was made on the allegation that there was danger of the arms falling into the hands of the enemy of the Northern military leader through evil counsel in the government.

**Shortly Resigns**  
General Chang Soulin began to move his troops southward, ostensibly to aid the northern leaders against the southern forces. His troops are now at Lawan Chow Shan Hark Wan and Tien Tsin, in Chi Li Province in which Peking also is situated. President Fong's desire to resign was expressed at a cabinet meeting where he produced a telegram which he proposed to send to the provisional government, declaring that the situation was too difficult for him to solve. He is said to have withheld his resignation temporarily on the advice of the pending negotiations with General Chang Soulin for the removal of his troops and the restoration of the arms he seized.

**Would Resign**  
In a mandate early in January President Fong assumed responsibility for the country's political troubles and announced he would resign shortly. A report was received on March 3 that President Fong probably would be forced to resign. It was added that he was practically a prisoner of the northern military leaders. In July 1915 General Chang Soulin was reported to be preparing to make an attempt to reinstate the Manchu dynasty in China but his efforts never bore fruit.

**Tibetans Rebel**  
Peking, Monday Mar. 11.—Taking advantage of disorder in the province of Szechuan, the Tibetans have rebelled and are marching into Szechuan, where they have captured several towns. The force is estimated at 10,000 and is armed with modern rifles.

Tibet is controlled virtually by the natives who are a branch of Mongol races. The Chinese government looking after foreign relations and maintaining small garrisons of Chinese troops. There is a regent appointed by the Chinese government selected from the lamas or religious leaders. In 1912 Tibet demanded complete autonomy and in October of that year the Tibetans were successful in fighting against the Chinese. A conference at Simla, India, in July 1914, failed to agree on a convention between China.

### GULF COAST OIL NOW WILL OPEN OFFICE IN CITY

RAPID DEVELOPMENT OF THIS FIELD CAUSES PERIODICALS ACTION

The Gulf Coast Oil News of Houston is opening a branch office in Wichita Falls having leased suite 404, First National Bank building for that purpose.

R. L. Dudley, editor of the publication, is here in connection with the opening of the office which will be in charge of R. V. Ellzey. "We have had a correspondent at Wichita Falls but the development in North Texas is assuming such proportions that we believe it justifies the opening of a North Texas headquarters here and the covering of developments in a detailed and comprehensive manner," said Mr. Dudley.

About 35,000 persons applied for admission to these examinations. The most pressing need of the Government service in Washington right now is for a large number of well qualified stenographers. The Civil Service Commission urges persons who are equipped to pass the stenography part of the examination to apply at once. Examinations are held at least once a week in 450 of the principal cities.

The local post office is constantly receiving long lists of vacancies in all branches of the civil service work and is ready to give necessary information concerning qualifications, examinations, salary and other important matters.

The Commission, in a letter sent here, says of the situation: "That American men and women are eager to accept every opportunity to help in the nation's greatest undertaking is evidenced by the responses received to the announcement of the United States Civil Service Commission."

**HOLLAND TO FURNISH SHIPS**

Holland, whether she desires or not, will furnish the Entente Allies with about a million tons of shipping.

Vessels of the Netherlands, now in Entente ports, will be taken over by Great Britain and the United States and used during the period of the war.

Strange to say, in spite of vocal and written protests, it is probable the Dutch are really very well pleased with the turn of events.

An agreement had been offered Holland by the Entente, in which ample provision is made for remuneration of the owners of the vessels used and in which the further promise is made that breadstuffs and other food will be carried from the United States to Holland and the supply now is short.

Holland was on the point of signing this agreement, but Germany, alive to the peril of an increase in shipping facilities in the hands of the United States, threatened the little kingdom with dire calamity by the submarine route if such an agreement was reached.

Therefore Holland has protested, urged and pleaded, all strictly according to Hoyle, but in the meantime we have an idea that the promise of food from the United States "listens well." Holland will be able to tell Germany that she had no option in the matter.

There is every indication that Holland does not intend to rush into the war as a consequence.

Since the beginning of the conflict, the Netherlands has occupied a most uncomfortable position. Literally, the nation has been between the devil and the deep blue sea, with the Hun on one side and only dykes keeping salt water off the land on the other. The position has been even more untenable in view of the fact that the Dutch know exactly what they have on the side that the sea doesn't occupy.

The taking of Dutch ships by the Allies is going to aid materially in shipment of troops and munitions to Europe, on the one hand, and mean a better chance for a living for the people of Holland.

**ANOTHER BIG WELL IS BROUGHT IN BY FISHER-GATES CO.**

WAS FLOWING FIFTY FEET OVER DERRICK EARLY THIS AFTERNOON.

**IS UPON THE BIRK LEASE**

Much Mud Blows Out of Hole and Well is Now Believed Good for 800 Barrels.

The Fisher-Gates Oil Co. has brought in a big well on the C. Birk lease about three miles south of Burk Burnett and about twelve miles northwest of Wichita Falls. The well blew itself in this afternoon and was flowing fifty feet over the derrick at 2:30. It is one of the big wells in the Burk Burnett district.

The flow is uniform and at about J. A. Fisher, F. W. Gates, C. W. Terday and the casing was set preparatory to drilling in. The bailer was started and it was soon seen that it was likely to blow itself in and the bailing was stopped. Early this afternoon fifteen hundred feet of mud was blown out of the hole and the oil flowed high above the derrick.

The well is believed to be good for not less than 800 barrels.

Gilliland and Horace Nutt are the principal owners of the Fisher-Gates Co. The Roberts Drilling Co. drilled the well.

This is the first big well in that part of the field. There is considerable shallow production already developed.

**DUTCH VESSELS WILL BE TAKEN FOR ALLIED USE**

 arrangement is one million tons, of which 70 per cent is in the United States, 15 per cent in British ports and 15 per cent in other allied ports.

Every precaution will be taken to safeguard the rights of the owners. The ships will be insured and armed and any ships sunk will be replaced at the earliest possible time after the war.

A similar arrangement already made in case of Norway is working satisfactorily to the Norwegian owners and shipping interests.

Allied Decision  
 The allied decision finds a legal basis in the lex angaria, or the law covering the forcible seizure of a ship for public use, under which a belligerent nation may use neutral tonnage if adequate compensation is paid. Germans exercised this right on British vessels in the Franco-Russian war.

As regards Dutch ships no other than in ports in Great Britain and the United States. It is believed the arrangements covers a number of such vessels in far western ports. A telegram from The Hague yesterday stated that the Dutch foreign office had learned that clearances had been refused to several Dutch vessels at Singapore.

## COTTON MARKET OPENING STEADY AT AN ADVANCE

New York, March 14.—The cotton market opened steady at an advance of 1 to 2 points in spite of disappointing cables and reports of favorable progress with new crop preparations. There seemed to be overnight buying orders around the ring which absorbed scattered realizing or liquidation at the start with May selling at 31.85 and October at 30.40 on the call. Reactions of 2 to 3 points followed with May relatively easy under selling by people who were rebuying in later deliveries but Liverpool was a fair buyer of May and July. Cotton futures opened steady: Mar. 32.25; May 31.80; July 31.40; Oct. 30.40.

The closing weakness of Liverpool served to restrict buying here but created no selling power. Cotton futures opened steady: Mar. 32.25; May 31.80; July 31.40; Oct. 30.40.

Reports that Dutch tonnage in allied ports was to be made available were followed by a bulge late in the noon hour which carried old crop months back to about last night's closing figures while later deliveries sold a point or 2 net higher. 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## PRICES OF CORN TEND DOWNWARD THROUGHOUT DAY

Chicago, March 14.—Corn prices had a downward tendency today influenced more or less by uncertainty due to meeting here to discuss enlarged facilities for reaping tractors. In this connection a representative of the food administrator is expected to be here tomorrow. Bears put some stress also on the fact that primary receipts continued in excess of last year. After opening a shade lower, with May 1.27 1/2, the market rallied a trifle and then sagged lower than before.

Oats receded on account of commission house selling due to rapid progress of seeding. All transactions, however, were in small lots. Opening prices, which varied from unchanged figures to 1/4 cent advance, were followed by a moderate general decline. Strength of hog quotations made provisions ascend. Offerings were readily absorbed.

As a result of persistent commission house selling, associated more or less with the embargo on east-bound shipments, May delivery fell to below 1.37 for the first time in more than a week. Good progress was said to have been made in formulating plans here for betterment of the grain trade. Corn closed heavy 1/4 to 3/8 cent lower with March 1.27 1/2 and May 1.26 1/2.

The market later reacted sharply. Weakness of corn values appeared to be in a large measure responsible.

### MAY PITCH FOR REDS IN EXHIBITION GAME WITH DETROIT HERE



Pete Schneider

Standing 6 feet, 1 1/2 inches in his stocking feet, Pete Schneider is in his 26th year a splendid specimen of the American Athlete. He may be one of the Pitchers in the exhibition game with Detroit in Wichita Falls April 4. The Los Angeles boy who was purchased by the Reds' Management from the Seattle Club of the Northwestern League, made more progress in his profession under Manager Mathewson's tutelage than all the other years in which he has worn a Cincinnati uniform. Under his tutelage he is the speediest runner on his team and has no rival at base hitting. His batting average is not high but he is consistent; he has never been out or over the infield at a terrific pace.

Pete, who was in the points in 46 championship games last season, was

credited with 20 victories and charged with 19 defeats, but ranking fourth in the official records with an average of 1.97 earned runs off him. His heart spoke in the depth of poor support, as 53 of the 123 runs charged against him were after chances had been offered to retire his opponents.

Pete and Sallee of New York were tied for the record of 1917 consecutive victories in the National League, the former going from June 9 to July 25 without defeat. He secured an even break in the Ohio State Series of last season. In his 4-to-2 victory, he held the American Leagues to 6 hits and 2 runs lost his next event 6 to 3, his opponents obtaining eight singles off the big fellow.

#### WHAT IS A CAMP PASTOR

I have been requested to explain in the newspaper the term "Camp Pastor" and I gladly do so.

First of all, the "Camp Pastor" is the representative of the church to which he belongs. He is appointed by those in authority in his church, and is supported by his denomination. However, very few "Camp Pastors" pay any attention to denominational lines, for they desire to help the men in every possible way, regardless of the church to which they belong. There are at the present time between three and four hundred "Camp Pastors" in this country, located at the different camps, and they represent almost every evangelical denomination.

The "Camp Pastor" is neither appointed nor supported by the national government. He has no official connection with the government, nor does he seek any. He is the official representative of the church, and is absolutely content with that, for as long as he does right, his church is behind him. If he has a tabernacle it is built outside of the camp, and the only entrance sought for him within the camp is that he may freely have access to the men and mix and mingle with them. When he enters the camp he enters by courtesy of the commanding officer, and it speaks well for the officers of the American army that in practical every camp in this country when it has been sought, this courtesy has been extended. The "Camp Pastor" respects and obeys military authority, and it is his sincere desire and effort to promote both obedience and respect for those in authority. He seeks to bring the message of the army to the highest standards of efficiency for it is his purpose and the purpose of his church to cooperate with and aid the government in every possible way by seeking to instill in the men those ideals and purposes which make them better soldiers. Again, the "Camp Pastor" is not in opposition to the chaplain or Y. M. C. A. secretary, but strictly in cooperation. Dr. Harbison, head of the religious department of the Y. M. C. A. recently called a conference of "Camp Pastors" and presided during the conference. In the larger camps the Y. M. C. A. keeps the representative of the church, and the most constantly employed speaking, preaching, and working in the camp. The works of the chaplain and Y. M. C. A. secretary is similar, which with in the camp, and outside the camp, are broken. The "Camp Pastor" works in neither wholly within or without the camp. His eyes is inside and outside and therefore, connecting link between the spiritual forces within and without the camp. The reflex moral action which comes to the denomination through the work of their "Camp Pastors" is apparent as the work accomplished with in the camps.

To win the war our men must physically, here, mental and physical strength, their hearts must be the best, but government is coming to realize that the most important thing to consider is the spiritual or moral condition of the soldiers. This is the first step of history in which nations realized the fact that sin weakens the soldier, hastens defeat or postpones the day of victory. Hereafter, the church and the denomination which give their assistance to the church have fought alone against sin, but now the

invention comes forward and that the day of victory may come, that its men may not be demoralized, and their usefulness destroyed, commands that certain evils shall be banished from around the camps. It is almost unbelievable, but gloriously true and we are just in the beginning of things. This war in the end, will bring about the greatest moral reform the world has ever seen. It is a fight of right against wrong, and the "deals of America in the conflict are Christian through and through."

For near two thousand years the teachings of the "Man of Galilee" have been working in the hearts of men, until at last a mighty nation has arisen, which dares to fight not for greed or gain or selfishness or conquest, but for the dreams, purposes and ideals of the "Lowly Nazarene." Every war aim laid down by our great President can be traced straight to the Christ. Our armies fight beneath the "stars and stripes," but above all by the "sign of the Cross." In our armies there are otherwise noble men who fight for these ideals, but know not the Christ who brought them to the world. For the sake of those men, as well as for the sake of those already Christians, the church sends their special representatives to the camp to preach Christ, the Savior of the world.

In the tabernacle thousands of "soldiers of this country are seeking and finding the Christ—in one of the leading camps of this state recently late one night a "Camp Pastor" was called to the camp. By Associated Press. Rome, Tuesday, Mar. 12.—The fifth national war loan closed yesterday. The subscriptions in Italy reached five billion lire with results in some cities not yet reported.

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
