WOMAN SUFFRAGE MEASURE AGAIN

BALLOTS FOR WOMEN ONE TO BE WORKED, AMENDMENT PROVIDES

Austin, Texas, Mar. 26,—Consideration of the nouse woman suffrage bill was resumed waen the Senate met towas resumed when the Senate met to-day. Action recurred on an amendment offered by Senator Johnson of Harris providing for separate voting booths for women. Senator Latimore oppos-ed the amendment on the grounds it may result in the law being held un-constitutional; besides he said, cer-tain counties may not comply with such a provision, which would result in the election in that county being held invalid. Senator Bee also opposed the amendment on the grounds it would destroy the secrecy of the bal-

A telegram was read from the Dallas grand jury urging the passage of the bill providing for stenographers for grand juries.

Senator Johnston's amendment was defeated and a substitute by Senator Lattimore adopted by a vote of 15 to 13. The substitute provides that while 13. The substitute provides that while there shall be no separate booth, the election judges shall stamp on each ballot the word "woman" which will serve as a check to show the number of female electors voting. Senator Hall offered an amendment that any qualified elector in Texas may institute suit in the district court of Travis county to test the validity of the act and that the ease will be given prevence over others. This was defeated by a vote of 11 to 15. An amendment was offered by Senator Johnston to refer the question of woman suffrage at the first Democratic primary election in the state. Senator Lattimore made the point of order that the amendment was not germane to the bill, which point was sustained.

GERMAN AIRPLANE DROPS GAS BOMBS ON AMERICAN LINE

(BULLETIN), With the American Army in France, Tuesday, March 19.—A German airplane, both last night-and this morning, flew over the American sector north of Toul and dropped rubber balls eighteen inches in diameter, filled with liquidied mustard gas. This is the first time, so far as is known, that an airplane has been thus employed.

RUSSIAN VESSELS LEAVE ODESSA AS **GERMAMS ARRIVE**

Washington, Mar. 20.—Russian war ships at Odessa escaped to Bebastopol when the German took Odessa, according to a dispatch to the state department today from American consul Summers at Moscow. Compatches quoted Berlin authorities as declaring that fifteen ships were taken when the city was occupied.

The falt of Petrograd is imminent, German troops, probably advancing along the Baltic coast, from Narva and northeast from Pskov and Dvinsk are nearing the Russian metropolis, according to dispatches received in London. The population is said to be awaiting the coming of the invaders passively and there are no indications that the Bolsheviki authorities will attempt to oppose the Germans before giving up the city.

Evacuation of Petrograd by the Bolshevik government departments was ordered last week and all are now in Moscow, which the Lenine government has declared the Russian capital. When the order to move to Moscow was given it was said that Petrograd probably would be declared a free port.

German possession of Petrograd German possession of Petrograd would give the enemy complete control of the Gulf of Finland and all the important ports on its coast except those in Finland yet in the hands of the Finnish rebels, who are being attacked by the German and Finnish government forces. Although they can advance in the cast against disorganized Russia, the Germans have not yet displayed any intentions to carry out their herakied offensive in the west. Except for most intense artillery bombardments in some acctors, there has been no great activity on the lengthy western front, areach raids having decreased in number.

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ARTILLERY SCHOOL IS SO IMPORTANT OTHERS DESIRED

Washington, Mar. 20.—The importance of accurate artillery barrage in trench warfare has so impressed army heads that the war department is considering plans to establish schools of instruction for artillerymen to supplement the work of the service school at Ft. Sill. Okla.

The Fort Sill school has been crowded to the limit since this country entered the war but the output has failed to equal the demand for trained officers.

Brigadier General William J. Snow an artillery officer of high standing, recently was appointed chief of artillery on the general staff for the purpose of reorganizing that arm to meet the increased demands. He is understood to have prepared an expansion schedule which would result in the turning over of one divisional camp exclusively to instruction in artillery work and the establishment of two or three additional centers for brigade insruction.
