BY AIR CRAFT PROGRESS APPROVING CHEERS AND OPPOS-Prospects for Future, However, Look More IRISH DRAFT TAKEN UP Favorable, and Needs Are Expected to Be Met. Trouble With People Over Proposed Conscription Seems Now to Be Forecast

Washington, April 10 .- The government's aircraft program is characterized as "gravely disappointing" and a drastic reorganization of production machinery was recommended in a report by the Senate military committee today, which charges government officials with misrepresenting the situation and misleading the public, and with "procrastination" and "indecision."

The prospects for the future, the committee said, look more favorable and the production of the last few weeks promised to get the program under way to such an extent that a sufficient number of planes will be furnished later to meet all requirements of the troops in France.

One-man control of production is proposed and the committee suggests that building be taken entirely out of the hands of the signal corps. Delay is charged not only in the manufacture of Liberty motors and machine parts, but in the training of fliers as well.

Wants One-Man Power The committee recommended that the one-man administrator be appoint. the one-man administrator be appoint. ed by the president and assisted by a corps of expert eng.neers and de-signers. It suggested that 'no man who has any year or remote interest in a company manufacturing airplanes or engines should be permitted to act as adviser or be in authority." The Liberty motor, the committee declared 'is just emerging from the the development or experimental stage and is not designed for and cannot be used in the swift single seated fighting machines."

fighting machines." Of 22,500 Liberty Motors ordered the committee said only 122 have been completed for the army, 152 for the navy and four shipped oversea. "The production of Liberty motors to date is of courses gravely disant

"Govern-ment officials-have made the misment officials—have made the mis-take of leading the public and the al-lied nations to the belief that many thousands of these motors would be completed in the spring of 1918. 

The new German attacks today car ried the fighting to a stretch of ap-proximately 130 miles from near the Belgian town of Ypres, in the north to the vicinity of Coucy Le Chateau, on the extreme French right.

The fresh German blow struck yes-terday between La Bassee and Armen-tieres, has already driven a deep sa-lient into the British lines below Ar-mentieres and the Arméntieres region itself was reported under attack this morning.

The infantry fighting is spreading to the northward, following a heavy bombardment by the German guns which extended as far as the Ypres-Comines Canai, just to the southeast of Ypres.

Armentieres in Pecil

Armentieres in Peril Armentieres, already near the tip of a sharp bend in the me has now been further pocketed and seems in serious peril from converging attacks north and south. The British, however, are holding the line of the river Lys to the southwest of the town, and at the latest reports had prevented an at-tempted crossing by the Germans at tempted crossing by the Germans at Bac St. Maur, four miles southwest of Armentieres and another at Estaires. still further to the southwest.

From the vicinity of Estaires the British are holding the line of the river Lawe southward for a short dis-tance, the front then curving in a southeastely direction and coupling un with the original line at or near Circondy. Givenchy,

The maximum depth of the German penetration was apparently about 4 1.2 miles as Estaires. Givenchy, at one time in German hands during the atteck, was retaken by the British in a counter thrust.

On a front of about four miles be-tween Neuve Chapelle and Cardon-niere Farm, the Portuguese and Brit-ish have been forced back about a mile and Laventie, west of Fauquis-sart, is in German hands. The enemy also has occupied Rotchebourg. On the end, the British still hold Fleurbaix and have thrown back the Germans at the LaBasse Canal on the southern extremity. southern extremity.

No Heavy Operations

No Heavy Operations For more than 18 months there has been no beavy operations on this front. The community cannery idea looks like a good one and every citizen ought to be glad of the opportunity to provide materials to keep it pusy after it is once placed in operation




