MILITARY COMMITTEE IS GRAVELY DISAPPOINTED BY AIR CRAFT PROGRESS

Prospects for Future, However, Look More Favorable, and Needs Are Expected to Be Met.

Washington, April 10.—The government's aircraft program is characterized as "gravely disappointing" and a drastic reorganization of production machinery was recommended in a report by the Senate military committee today, which charges government officials with misrepresenting the situation and misleading the public, and with "procrastination" and "indecision."

The prospects for the future, the committee said, look more favorable and the production of the last few weeks promised to get the program under way to such an extent that a sufficient number of planes will be furnished later to meet all requirements of the troops in France.

One-man control of production is proposed and the committee suggests that building be taken entirely out of the hands of the signal corps. Delay is charged not only in the manufacture of Liberty motors and machine parts, but in the training of fliers as well.

Wants One-Man Power

The committee recommended that the one-man administrator be appointed by the president and assisted by a corps of expert engineers and designers. It suggested that "no man who has any year or remote interest in a company manufacturing airplanes or engines should be permitted to act as an adviser or be in authority."

The Liberty motor, the committee declared "is just emerging from the development or experimental stage and is not designed for and cannot be used in the swift single seated fighting machines."

Of 25,000 Liberty Motors ordered the committee said only 122 have been completed for the army, 152 for the navy and four shipped overseas.

"The production of Liberty motors to date is of course gravely disappointing," says the report. "Government officials have made the mistake of leading the public and the allied nations to the belief that many thousands of these motors would be completed in the spring of 1918. Information of this sort, not borne out by the facts, has injured the public and its constant dissemination the committee regards as misleading and detrimental to our cause."

Regarding the training of aviators, the committee found there has been "very serious delay" in providing them with training planes.

"As a result," the report says "several hundred of the American cadets have been practically idle and have made no progress. About 1,200 cadets were sent to England, France and Italy last year to receive primary and advanced training."

"The experience of a great many of these schools has been most unfortunate," says the report "in that at some of the schools a very serious delay has occurred in providing them with training planes which was expected to be manufactured in foreign factories in sufficient numbers. About 450 of them are reported as having completed the primary training after long delay. The signal corps is giving serious consideration to the advisability of bringing the remainder back to the United States."

New Schools Under Way
With four new schools under construction to be finished in this country the committee said the signal corps now is conducting twenty aviation schools in this country with a total capacity of 3,000 cadets. Graduates have numbered 1,226, commissioned as reserve military aviators but "very few" have received their advanced training.

With the exception of what the committee referred to as "severe disappointment" the primary training of aviators was said to appear to be progressing favorably. Statistics from the committee said were distressing but "appear to be less frequent than in the schools of our allies." Regarding airplanes, from the committee's report it is noted that the production of the work on primary training planes "it gave ground for grave concern."

RESUMPTION OF RAILROAD OPERATION IS ORDERED

He also signed the bills abolishing the office of pension commissioner, and the primary election law.

PREMIER THROWS POLITICAL BOMB INTO PARLIAMENT

APPROVING CHEERS AND OPPOSING HOOTING MET LLOYD.

IRISH DRAFT TAKEN UP

Trouble With People Over Proposed Conscription Seems Now to Be Forecast

London, April 9.—A political bombshell was thrown in the House of Commons today by David Lloyd George, the prime minister, when he announced that conscription would be extended to Ireland and that the government intended to extend the home rule to Ireland. The scenes during the course of the premier's speech in reference to Ireland were dramatic, approving cheers and cries of protest arising from all parts of the house. During the latter part of his speech the premier was frequently interrupted by angry Irish members. A test of strength soon developed when Joseph Devlin, Nationalist member, moved a motion to adjourn. The government carried a closure on his motion and then adjournment was defeated by a overwhelming vote.

Irish approval of the proposed measures was not fore-shadowed by the attitude of the nationalist leaders, nor did the Ulster faction show any signs of conciliation. John Dillon, the successor of John Redmond's nationalist conception, Sir Edward Carson, the Ulster leader, while approving conscription, objected to the introduction of the home rule bill at this time. The house approved the introduction of the government's menpower bill by 299 to 80 and it was announced that time for discussion of the bill had been extended until next Tuesday.

War Is Irish Too
Premier Lloyd George said the exclusion of Ireland could not be justified any longer and the character of the war was as much Irish as English. Ireland, through her representatives, had approved the war. After reading a declaration of the Irish people approving the British participation in the war, the premier continued:

"I also refer to a speech delivered by the late John Redmond at Mansion House, Dublin, when he was addressing a recruiting meeting there. He said: 'The heart of Ireland has been profoundly moved by the sacrifice of Belgium. The other day in London I met Cardinal Archbishop Mercier and I took the liberty of promising him that Ireland would bring her arms and her strength to avenge Louvain and to uphold and defend the integrity and independence of Belgium.'"

America Given as Proof
"The fact that America is in the war is the best proof. There are more Irishmen in the United States than there are in Ireland. They are all subject to conscription and the military service bill in 1916 said:

"Let me state what is my personal view on this matter of conscription. I am content to take the thrusts and blows by the prime minister in this last speech and I am prepared to say that I will stick to nothing which is calculated to win this war and that the principle of conscription is the people of Ireland. Then he said that with him conscription was not a question of principle, it was a question of necessity for the raising of men. I think the member for May (Mr. Dillon) took substantially the same view in a speech which he made at the same time. The member said:

"We are now engaged in discussing an important political question. Like the member for Waterford (Mr. Redmond), we should view the point from one side and in particular circumstances. I would not hear of a conscription tomorrow if I thought it was necessary to maintain liberty and if there was no conscription we ran the risk of losing the war."

Mr. Dillon interrupted: "That was conditional on Ireland having the liberty to decide her fate and if Irish liberty were at stake I certainly would not hesitate to support conscription."

"I do not want to enter into a controversy as to what my friend meant," retorted Mr. Lloyd George, "but that is what he conveyed to the house and if he will take the trouble to read the speech he will see that is the case. Mr. Redmond himself on the third reading, in delivering his speech put it on the ground that we were fighting for small nations and that was not true, was the interjection of Mr. Devlin."

LARGE CASUALTY LIST GIVEN OUT AS OF TUESDAY

TOTAL OF 283 NAMES ARE UPON LIST, MANY BEING OF FICERS

By Associated Press. April 10.—The largest casualty list for any day since the United States entered the war was announced by the war department today. There are 283 names on the list. Five men were killed in action; three died of wounds; 11 died of disease; 7 died from accidents; 10 were severely wounded; 245 wounded slightly and two were missing in action. Thirteen lieutenants were among the men wounded.

50,000 ACRES OF INDIAN OIL LAND OFFERED

By Associated Press. Washington, April 10.—Another 50,000 acres of oil bearing land on the east side of the Osage reservation in Oklahoma were advertised today for lease by Indian Commissioner Sells. Production must begin within nine months, a reduction from the former limit of two years, in accordance with the government's policy of stimulating production from new sources because of the increased demand for war purposes. Sale of the leases will be held May 15 in Pawhuska, Okla.

ARMENIERS IS THREATENED BY NEW HUN WEDGE

EFFORT TO BREAK THROUGH BRITISH LINES AT THIS POINT ALLEGED

London, April 10.—"On the Messines front the enemy's attack today was repulsed," Major General F. H. Maurice, chief director of military operations at the war office announced this afternoon. "The enemy has obtained no footing on the high ground anywhere."

BATTLE ON LONG FRONT

The war situation of today is summarized by the Associated Press as follows:
American troops will soon be in the thick of the fighting against the German drive for a decision on the western front, according to the indications in today's dispatches.
They have appeared in the British battle zone where their presence is expected to be felt shortly, the advocates state.
Meanwhile the German offensive in Flanders appears to be developing into more than a local operation. The fighting has spread to the north of Armentieres, south of which it first broke out, and a drive is now on between Armentieres and Messines, behind which lies the famous ridge, the taking of which by the British in their terrific blasting operation of last year gave them their firm hold on the Flanders situation.
The German effort in the Flanders zone is really of such magnitude as to constitute another attempt to break through the British lines, in the opinion of at least one of the close observers at the front, the tremendous concentration of artillery and the throwing in of dense masses of infantry denoting this purpose.
The new German attacks today carried the fighting to a stretch of approximately 130 miles from near the Belgian town of Ypres, in the north to the vicinity of Courcy and Chantilly, on the extreme French right.
The fresh German blow struck yesterday between La Bassée and Armentieres, has caused a deep salient into the British lines below Armentieres and the Armentieres region itself was reported under attack this morning.
The infantry fighting is spreading to the northward, following a heavy bombardment by the German guns which extended as far as the Ypres-Comines Canal, just to the southeast of Ypres.
Armentieres in Peril
Armentieres, already near the tip of a sharp bend in the line has now been further pockmarked by serious peril from continuing attacks from north and south. The British, however, are holding the line of the river Lys to the southwest of the town, and at the latest reports had prevented an attempted crossing by the Germans at Bac-St. Maur, four miles southwest of Armentieres and another at Estaires, still further to the south.
From the vicinity of Estaires the British are holding the line of the river Lawe southward for a short distance, the front then curving in a southerly direction to the east, following the original line at or near Givency.
The maximum depth of the German penetration was apparently about 4 1/2 miles as Estaires, Givency, at one time in German hands during the attack, was retaken by the British in a counter thrust.
On a front of about four miles between Neuve Chapelle and Cartonniere Farm, the Portuguese and British have been forced back about a mile and Laventie, west of Fauquissart, is in German hands. The enemy also has occupied Rocquembourg. On the end, the British still hold Fleurbaix and have thrown back the Germans at the La Bassée Canal on the southern extremity.
No Heavy Operations
For more than 18 months there has been no heavy operations on this front. Prior to the offensive on the Ploeghe front, the Germans bombarded this front heavily. Raids and local attacks there made them were repulsed by the allied troops north of Neuve Chapelle, however, was the center of much severe fighting during 1914, 1915 and 1916.
On the Franco-British battle front below Arras and across the Somme to the region of Concy, there has been no infantry activity although the artillery duels have been most violent. French artillery broke up German formations in the region of the Somme, and west of Noyon an enemy assault was repulsed by artillery. The German advance between the Somme and the Aisne, however, has been checked by the French who are now on their prepared positions.

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WAR GARDENS ARE INSPECTED HERE BY MRS. MARSHALL

FINDS MANY VACANT LOTS WHICH SHOULD BE CULTIVATED.

SOME NOT WELL WORKED

Moisture Cannot Be Conserved Unless Ground is Broken After Rain Preventing Forming of Crust.

Wichita Falls is letting a lot of important garden space go to waste this summer, in the opinion of Mrs. Bulah Marshall, gardening expert who was here from the A. & M. College department of extension and yesterday afternoon made an inspection of the city from a gardening standpoint. In a number of sections of the city, particularly in Floral Heights, splendid gardens were found already up and a number of others were in various stages of preparation, but there was also a large number of vacant lots which could be well utilized for gardens.

Should Have 2000. Wichita Falls should have at least 2,000 war gardens, Dallas has 12,000, Mrs. Marshall stated, and if this number is put in the municipal canyery which the Chamber of Commerce will finance, should enable the city to feed itself for months. Mrs. Marshall before leaving made arrangements for a series of instructive articles on preparation and care of gardens, under the present conditions and recommendation as to what to plant to be run in the Times.

The greatest fault of the gardeners, as revealed in Tuesday's inspection, according to Mrs. Marshall, is in letting the moisture escape by letting a crust form on the ground, after a rain, instead of thoroughly working the soil after every rain, every day, preferably so as to let every bit of the moisture remain in the ground. There were a large number of gardens observed, that had been thoroughly worked in a scientific manner, though there were fewer of these than could be desired.

Chamber of Commerce. An organized effort is to be undertaken by the Chamber of Commerce to have the number of war gardens planted in Wichita Falls increased very considerably, and this body will have the co-operation of the extension department of the A. & M. College, through its various representatives, and the state agricultural department, and the other agencies to increase the production of food for the duration of the war.

SAYS TRANSPORT WAS ATTACKED BY SUBMARINE

INTERESTING LETTER IS RECEIVED FROM CARL A. HURST, NOW IN FRANCE

Telling how his transport was twice attacked by submarines on the voyage across the Atlantic and how both of the German submarines were sunk, Carl A. Hurst, 165th Aero Squadron, American Expeditionary Forces, who is now "somewhere in England," has written to his mother, Mrs. J. M. Hurst, of 1312 Twelfth street. The letter is as follows: March 10, 1918.

Dear Mother and Al: I have landed safely in England, and had a very pleasant trip. Saw some mighty pretty country both in England and the States.

We took a bike up town the other afternoon and looked the town over. I saw a church that was eleven hundred years old and it is still in good condition. We generally take a bike every morning and drill in the afternoon.

Everything over here is green and the trees are beginning to bud out. Some of the finest homes here I ever saw, holly hedges around the yards and large trees all over.

It is cold in the mornings for about an hour or two and stays warm until about six o'clock in the evening. It is not so cold here as it was there.

We have plenty to eat but everything has an "L.D." on it. We are now eating the British rations.

I run across Byrd Hamric here the other day but I haven't seen him any more. I think he has left. He is in the 169th Aero Squad. Tell his folks that I saw him and he is looking fine.

Tell all my friends hello for me, and give my best regard to all the relatives. I can write to them later but I haven't very much time now, but just as soon as I get settled down right I will write more. I am in the mess tent now, just finished supper, and it is the only place where there is a table so I can sit down and write, except the Y. M. C. A. and it is always crowded, believe me.

When coming across the ocean was attacked twice by submarine, but they both were sunk. They said the first one fired at us, but I couldn't say for sure.

We are in darkness at night in our tents. We have to burn a candle and a coal oil stove, but we don't really need the stove.

This is some place to live, all the streets are paved, and houses are of brick. The streets run any way. You can go down a street and run into houses.

Well it is getting most too dark to write so I will close and write more the next time. With lots of love to all. Your son,

CARL FLEMING IS MAKING RECORD AS EXCELLENT BOXER

The U. S. Government is expecting a more serious shortage of coal this coming winter than was experienced during the winter just passed.

Carl Fleming, once the pride of Wichita Falls sporting circles, has attained a new dignity and a new title, "The Pride of Kelly Field," the young boxer having enlisted with the first call and now being stationed at Kelly Field, San Antonio, with the 633rd Aero Squadron. Fleming is taking a leading part in the athletics of Kelly Field and his boxing matches with soldier and civilian boxers are features of the Y. M. C. A. cards at Kelly Field.

The San Antonio Light gives the following account of a match between Fleming and Bobby Burns, who Fleming had met in the ring here, which took place at the camp Y. M. C. A. last week:

"In the fifth event a feature was put on when Bobby Burns, a civilian boxer of Dallas, met Carl Fleming, the pride of Kelly Field. Fleming gave Burns the surprise of his life. Carl is fast as lightning, giving Burns a receipt for every tap landed. The second round was without exception the fastest, cleanest round ever witnessed at Kelly Field. When the whistle announced the end of the second round both boys were fighting so hard that the referee, Lieutenant Schmitt, referee, received several jolts that were not intended for him. The third round was a duplicate of the second, fighting and then more fighting."

Fleming is anxious to go across, according to a letter received by friends here, and is much pleased with army life. He says he stays in splendid condition all the time, and in addition to being training up to "do his bit for Democracy" is putting in some good work in athletics at the camp and keeping fit.

Ministers of the Gospel of all denominations have been asked to help in this work by taking the matter up with their congregations and editors of newspapers throughout the country have been asked to give their urgent request publicity. In his general appeal, Fuel Administrator Blair adds:

"To make it plain to the consumer and to enable him to lay in his supplies at less cost, the Government has reduced the price of coal for summer shipments. This reduction is based on the April price being lower than the other summer months, but they graduate up from April, monthly, until September comes, when practically the prices in effect last winter will again become operative. Consumers should bear this in mind and buy early."

"While it is desired that all domestic consumers shall purchase their requirements, yet you are requested to caution consumers to buy only a sufficient amount to do them. Every citizen should practice economy for his government's sake as well as his own—not waste fuel but conserve it in every manner possible."

"Instruct and caution all retail coal dealers that they must be careful and not sell any consumer more coal of wood than is actually necessary for his requirements when used economically, between now and March 1919. Dealers will not be permitted to sell any more than their actual requirements, and will be held responsible should it be shown that they have done so. Coal must not be hoarded by any one above their needs. When the people of Texas realize how necessary it is to conserve coal to aid our Government who must have same in quantities larger than ever before, for the transportation on land and on sea, of all supplies necessary to keep our Army fully equipped and well fed, they will, I know, efface all selfishness, which we all have in us in a more or less degree—and give to our Government every effort possible, and the conservation of fuel is one way in which all can help."

The Federal Fuel Administrator for Texas is now working on and will name in the next few days, a price which retail coal dealers shall not exceed in selling to consumers. This price will be fair to both the consumer and dealer, and you are requested to advise all consumers to make their contracts for their requirements on basis of the price that will be named. This price will give the consumer the benefit of the summer reduction in price that will be in effect during the different summer months."

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HOW COMMITTEE PLANS TO RAISE LOAN OUTLINED

TAX ROLLS OF COUNTY WILL BE GONE OVER AND EACH WILL BE ASSESSED.

FERGUSON TELLS LIONS

Committee Does Not Want to Ask Anyone to Subscribe More Than His Fair Share

Just how the local committee is planning to get at every taxpayer in Wichita Falls for his just quota of the \$1,875,000 assigned to this city to raise during the present Liberty Loan Campaign, was explained in detail at the Lions Club luncheon at the St. James Hotel this afternoon, by W. H. Ferguson, president of the Wichita State Bank.

You know we are trying to be fair. It's up to you!

Great Moral Atmosphere. Among the speakers at this afternoon's luncheon also were two of the leaders in the present campaign to clean up the moral atmosphere surrounding training camps.

B. O. Greening, representing the War Department Commission on Training Camp Activities, and S. A. Kincaide, representing the War Department Commission on Training Camp Activities in Community Organization, both spoke at the luncheon and both were assured that a movement is now on foot in Wichita Falls to provide a proper club-house gathering place for soldiers while in this city.

In his address, Mr. Greening, who hails from Fort Worth, said in part: "Our nation is preparing this army for war as no army has ever been prepared before. Already the surgeon-general's department has eliminated smallpox and typhoid fever as evils to be dreaded. Now we are going to eliminate the so-called social diseases. We are going to eliminate them in several ways.

Non-Military Department. "Today there is an entirely new non-military department under the Secretary of War, headed by Dean Keppel of Columbia University. This particular commission that Mr. Kincaide and I are working for is headed by Raymond A. Fosdick and is known as the Post-Office Commission. This commission has various departments. They have an athletic department; a singing department; a club-house; a Liberty theatre—all inside the camp.

"Outside the camp we have what is known as a law enforcement department and protective work for girls. There also is a War Camp Commission Service. Now, our particular business is to organize the communities near training camps that not only will provide entertainments that are clean substitutes for evil but also supply the home environment that the soldier was accustomed to before he enlisted.

"There is a tremendous psychological feature bound up in that statement of mine. If you were torn from your natural environment and thrown suddenly into the 'organized boredom' of an army camp, it is practically certain that you would be a prey to neurosthenia. This is an enemy to the soldier three times as important in its deadly results as tuberculosis. This is not an exaggeration. Figures from the service show that it has been actually true among our troops in the Philippine Islands. It is just as true today.

"Neurosthenia—homesickness—is what gets the soldier. It's our business to eliminate this, by supplying the actual needs of the men. That's what we're here for. "Our whole end and aim is to send first class fighting men out of this country. Our part is to supply clean

and wholesome substitutes for the things to which the men were accustomed at home.

Excellent Spirit. "I have never seen a better spirit than I have encountered in this busy city of yours. If you need a club-house here where the soldier in your city can go and write letters and make himself at home, what steps will you take to provide it? He will be better off and a better soldier and a better man if you provide just such a place. What plan will be taken here I do not know yet, but I believe it will be provided."

Mr. Kincaide followed his co-worker and said in part: "I heard a man say not long ago in one of the camps: 'I've got to go to France and my wife says I can't go. That's what I came here for. But I tell you I've seen things. I saw a lot of raw recruits brought into camp—drafted—from Arizona, Oklahoma and New Mexico. They didn't know why they had been called. Some of them felt a little resentful.

"Then I saw those same men turned from an inefficient bunch of resentful, raw recruits into an army of 40,000 soldiers rearing to go. It wasn't the amusements, patriotic talks, lessons as to why they had been called to go, that made the change. It was the amusements, patriotic talks, lessons as to why they had been called to go, that made the change."

"I know you men of the Lions' Club want to have your share in the making of that kind of an army. You can do this through your own community job. To me, the having something to do with that kind of a job makes life a little more worth while these days. You can do your share."

With a unanimous vote, when the question was put by W. S. Curlee, who presided at the luncheon, the members of the club pledged unqualified support.

After the War. Mr. Parker, one of the club members, added a word in favor of the action. He said: "Some of you men here know what the aftermath of war has been in the past. It is part of our work to help train these soldiers of ours morally as well as physically and patriotically. We want to support these corollary works that they shall be a big factor in bringing back real men after this war is won."

"We will win it—there is no gain-saying that. You cannot destroy liberty and democracy. When our men return, we want them to come back real men. So I hail with delight such movements as these guests of ours represent."

Fire Insurance Rates

Another matter of importance touched on at the luncheon was the question of "Fire Insurance Rates," a point responded to by G. D. Anderson.

"What I have in mind," he declared "in responding to this topic, is 'The Best Built City in Texas,' the slogan of our Chamber of Commerce. If you gentlemen will look over fire losses here in Wichita Falls you will find that most of them come from the shingled roof. This has been so great a menace here that a huge raise in rates in Wichita Falls was allowed by the State Insurance Commission. A shingle roof is like an open dammer on a stove. Put on a non-combustible roof and it will prove a closed damper."

"I would like to see the Chamber of Commerce here insist on living up to the law prepared by the Insurance Commission. This would immediately gain a reduction of five cents a hundred on every business building and 2 1/2 cents a hundred on homes."

"Would that mean that all the old shingled roofs would have to be queried one of the members. "Not at all," replied Mr. Anderson "but it would mean that all new buildings would have to have non-combustible roofing and that where part of a roof had been destroyed, it would have to be repaired with non-combustible roofing. It sometimes seems as though nothing would save our city if a fire got a good start here in windy weather. Let us do what we can to see that our new roofs are non-combustible."

A committee to take this matter up was appointed consisting of G. D. Anderson, chairman; W. B. Hamilton and W. R. Ferguson.

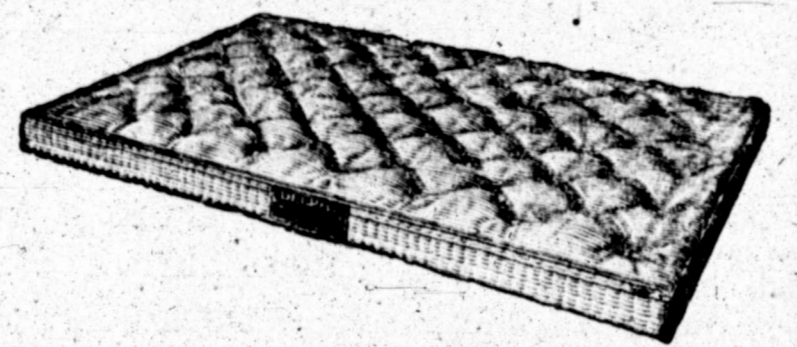

The directors of the Chamber of Commerce have agreed with the A. & M. College to underwrite a community cannery in Wichita Falls and have pledged the College authorities that Wichita county will have something to can. It's up to the community to make good this pledge, for it would be a waste of efforts and money to have a cannery and nothing to can.

It now looks as if there would be a good fruit crop here, but other things besides fruits can be canned. Beets, beans, tomatoes and many other vegetables can be canned and it should be remembered that every can of fruit or vegetables canned here will allow the commercial canneries so much more capacity for providing for our allies and our soldiers abroad. It will also relieve the railroads of a part of their great burden and at the same time will employ labor which might not be employed so effectively in the work of winning the war in any other way.

TODAY'S MARKETS

LIQUIDATION IS RENEWED; COTTON MAKES DECLINE

New York, April 10.—There was a renewal of liquidation and scattering pressure at the opening of the cotton market today. Uncertainty as to the outcome of today's conference between the cotton goods trade and Washington officials, was probably the chief factor. Selling was also promoted by expectations that the first weekly weather report of the season due before midday would make a favorable showing and the easier value of Liverpool. First prices were barely steady, with a decline of 11 to 22 points and the active months sold 25 to 27 points net lower after the call.

Cotton futures opened barely steady. May 22 1/2; July 22 1/2; Oct. 21 1/2; Dec. 20 1/2; Jan. 19 1/2.

Offerings increased after the publication of the weekly report of the weather bureau for the season. This carried no complaints regarding the new crop start and was considered one of the most favorable initial reports in the history of the market. July contracts sold off to 22 1/2 and Oct. to 20 1/2 with active months generally showing net losses of 25 to 41 points. Trade interests were nervous on the decline and there was enough covering to cause rallies of several points around midday.

CORN INCREASES IN VALUE RESULT OF SOME BUYING

Chicago, April 10.—Corn gained a little in value today, aided by scattered buying preparatory to the chance tomorrow making commercial grades the standard grades and removing the maximum price level so far as new style transactions are concerned. Continued largeness of receipts seemed also to give the bulls an advantage. Opening prices which varied from unchanged figures to 1/4 higher with a 1/274 to 1/274, were followed by maintenance of values slightly above yesterday's finish.

Favorable crop conditions eased the oats market. Besides there was no evidence of any revival of seaboard demand. After opening unchanged to 1/4 lower with May 86 1/2 to 86 1/2, prices reacted a trifle.

PREMIER THROWS POLITICAL BOMB INTO PARLIAMENT

(Continued from Page 1.)

"It is indefensible" "It is indefensible that you should ask young men of eighteen years and married men of thirty five and forty with families and even up to 50 in England, Scotland and Wales and compel them to fight for the freedom and independence of a small Catholic nationality in Europe while the young men of twenty to twenty five in Ireland are under no obligation to take up arms which is just, it is not merely illogical."

"There is such a thing as justice for Ireland, England and Wales, an emergency which Mr. Redmond contemplated and which I will not fully suggest the member for Mayo also has contemplated, that we should not win this war without taking this measure, has arisen. President Wilson's dramatic decision in the last few days is the best proof and there is a special emergency with regard to Ireland."

"Irish battalions and divisions, according to all testimony, have maintained the high honor and repute of their native and Irish battalions, and are sadly depleted and they are now filled or half filled with Englishmen. If it were merely Enriand's battle, the young men of Ireland might regard that fact with indifference but it is not. They are just as much concerned as the young men of England."

"Would Extend Act" "Therefore we propose to extend the military service act to Ireland under the same conditions as in Great Britain. As there is a machinery in existence and no register yet been completed in Ireland, it may take some weeks before actual enrollment begins."

"As soon as the arrangements are complete, the government shall by an order in council, put the act into immediate operation."

"Meanwhile we intend to lay to parliament to pass a measure for self government for Ireland, which may take some weeks before actual enrollment begins."

"You can keep it," said Alfred Byrne, Nationalist for Dublin. "Let there be no misapprehensions. Both questions will not hang together. Each must be taken on its merits," said the premier.

"You can keep both," replied Mr. Byrne. "Well," said the premier, "if that is the view of home rule, it is a new view for Ireland."

"For National Rights" "While Great Britain is fighting for national rights in Europe with all her strength, she is prepared to concede her own rights in her own empire. The remarkable concession which has been held in Ireland and which has just brought its proceedings to a termination, affords the British parliament another opportunity of approaching this vexed question with more hope of success."

"This convention has just determined its labor. The cabinet, of course, has not had time to consider that report because it has only just arrived. I understand it is reported by a major and I fear the majority is not such as to justify the government in saying that it represents a substantial agreement."

"That means that the government fords, such proposals for the establishing to parliament, with such guidance as the convention's report affords as they have just and which an insistence of self-government in Ireland that they should feel they are not in their judgment be carried without violent controversy."

"To Introduce Measure" "We propose, therefore, at an early date, to introduce such a measure into the House of Commons and to pass it into a law as soon as the session begins. When the young men of Ireland have been brought in large numbers in the fighting line, it is important that they should feel they are fighting to establish a right and a principle abroad which is denied to the land in which they live."

"I ought to say that appeals which have been addressed to the dominions have produced a fine response. The dominions already have furnished the empire with something like one million magnificent fighting men, and they are each and all taking the necessary steps to send more."

during the course of his address, "I must call to the attention of the House that it became obvious after the treaty battle that the allied armies were suffering from the fact that they were fighting as two separate armies and had to negotiate support with each other, a serious loss was thus lost. Some of us had been deeply impressed by this peril for some time and had done our best to avert it. But the imminent difficulties to be overcome are enormous. The difficulties of getting two or three separate armies to fight as one are almost insurmountable and it can only be done if public opinion in all these countries insists upon it as one condition of victory. The Versailles conference was an effort at a remedy."

"A few days after the battle commenced there was not merely the government but the commanders in the field. We had not merely field marshals, but army commanders present. We were so convinced and the same in a similar plight at the first battle of Ypres, rushed the French army there by every conceivable expedient—supplies, torries, anything he could lay his hands upon. He crowded French divisions through and undoubtedly helped to win the battle."

"There is no doubt about the loyalty and comradeship of General Poch, I have no doubt that the arrangement will be carried out not merely in the letter, but in the spirit. It is the most important decision that has been taken in reference to the coming battle."

"This strategic unity, I submit to the House, the fundamental condition by the complete cooperation between the governments and the generals and by something more than that—the unshakable public opinion behind it."

"Germans Need Men." "The Germans are calling up another class of men to produce 550,000 efficient young men. These will be prepared to be thrown into the battle line. This is the 1920 class, aged 18 and a half, and they will be thrown into the battle line, before this fight is over, and we must be prepared for their advent in this struggle this year."

"Therefore, we have to submit to parliament the totals for increasing, and increasing very materially, the reserves which will be available for reinforcing our armies in the field during this prolonged battle, upon which we are only just entering. I will now give roughly some of the proposals we intend to make in order to increase the number of men available."

"A call for 500,000 men has been made already on the coal industry and these men have been rapidly recruited. I regret to say that similar calls for 200,000 men in the iron and steel industry, 150,000 men in the shipbuilding industry, and 100,000 men in the engineering industry, have not yet been met."

"To Release Men." "The transport service also has been called upon to release the greatest possible number of fit men. Further calls are to be made upon the civil service."

"It is proposed that no fit men below the age of 25 should be retained. That is the clean cut. We comb out beyond that."

"When we are adding to the age and when we are extending the military age, it should not be said there are fit young men of 25 who are employed in the various industries of the country. This will bring the civil service into line and on a general level so far as a clean cut is concerned with the munition industries."

"Under an act passed in January of this year we are issuing orders cancelling all occupational exemptions by age blocks in specified occupations. The first of these orders is being laid out on the table in the House today, and other orders of the same power will follow. I know that the House will appreciate that it is not merely necessary to have men, but to have them quickly. It is no use raising them unless they are available."

TEXAS COMPANY COMPLETES WELL IN STEPHENS CO.

The Texas Company's first well on the J. S. Lauderdale lease in Stephens county, Texas has been completed at 2,234 feet and at the latest report was making 640 barrels after starting with a flow of 500 barrels. The same company is drilling its Kuntley at 3,290 feet, having about 150 barrels flow from the same sand that is producing in the Lauderdale well. The Lauderdale was the only completion of the week in the new pools.

Completes Well

Over in Palo Pinto county the Texas and Pacific Coal Co. has completed its Stuart 3 at 1,549 feet. It is making about three barrels a day. Its Stuart No. 7 is drilling at 1,549 feet after having passed through a broken sand from 1510 to 1540 feet.

The completions at Electra include five twenty barrel wells in shallow sand on Sunshine Hill, one two barrel, one ten barrel and one fifteen barrel well there. A feature of interest at Sunshine Hill was a fifteen barrel well on the Ward and Todd brought in by W. J. Sheldon from a sand at 837 to 825 feet. This is the first well in which a producing sand has been at that depth. The 6666 Oil Company's Burnett 2 in the Culbertson district is a 40 barrel well, having the sand from 1,943 to 1,952 feet. The Wichita Fuel and Development Co.'s Bean 3 is making 40 barrels from 7 feet of sand. It completed at 668 feet. The Texas Company's Bickley 5j is balling at 2,325 feet; its 131 Wagoner waiting for cement to set at 2,612 feet; setting packer in its 140 at 2,235 feet; its second Bywaters 64 is being plugged back to a sand at 1,892 feet after reaching a depth of 2,030 feet.

Twenty-Four Wells

Twenty four wells from 2 to 8 barrels were completed in the shallow sand at Burk Burnett; Myers and Shultz, Miller & Robinson 1 was abandoned at 2,206 feet as dry; F. Cullman got a 60 barrel well from a sand at 1,705 to 1,720 feet in Ruyle No. 1; Ruyle Farm Oil Co. got a well on its tee making 255 barrels from two sands. The bottom was 1,610 feet; Frank Kell and others Heiserman No. 1 is making 25 barrels being completed with 20 feet of sand at 1643 feet. Fisher and others are in the sand at 1,592 feet in Markowitz 3; Magnolia Petroleum Company's Ramming 5 has a sand at 1,517 to 1,527 feet.
