Amsterdam, May 4.- Emperor Charles of Austria has empowered the Austrian premier to adjourn parliament and forthwith inaugurate measures to render impossible the resumption of its activities, a Vienna dispatch says.

A statement published in Vienna indicates that the closure of parliament is due to the seriousness of the food situation. The Statement says:

"The government will devote its entire strength to the economic problem and will try to create conditions required to enable the population to hold out."



Another important provision would punish statements designed to curtail production of war necessities or the cause of any country with which the United States is at war or by word or act oppose the cause of the United States therein."

Another section of the bill, which was the most vigorously attacked in the senate provides that, if the post-

tive of the espionage laws as amended by the bill, he may withhold it from addresses. Another clause provides for dismissal of federal employes committing any disloyal act or uttering disloyal remarks.

Controversy in Senate

One of the chief controversies in the senate was elimination by the conferees of the France amendment providing that the bill should not apply to truthful statements made with good motives—te general libel law.

Senator France of of Maryland, its author and Senator Johnson of Calitornia, led the fight to retain the amendment declaring it would preserve constitutional liberty of speech and the press, it was opposed by the department of justice, however, as a burden in securing convictions.





BRITISH LOSSES PUT AT 250,000 **DURING ATTACK**

NATURE OF ENEMY'S ATTACK INDICATES HE MUST HAVE SUFFERED HEAVIEST

The situation is summed up here by embers of the British mission as Hun Losses Staggering

"This estimate would appear to be in remarkable contrast to the enormous German losses in the drive. The German war office, of course, has not disclosed to the world what its losses in the great battle have been, but the estimates of allied observers have estimates of allied observers have loss of German life at a staggering figure.

"From the very nature of the fighting, military experts have pointed out, the losses of attackers were bound to Pa., John P. Maolejewski, Priceburg be heavier than those of the defen-ders. But in addition to that, the method of German attack, advancing troops in waves faster than machine guns could mow them down, must. military experts say, have entailed enormous losses. An inkling of how serious the German losses are came come time ago when it was reported that the German military chiefs dared not disclose their extent to the Ger-man people and therefore were send-ing the wounded to Belgium. Other reports have told of railway gateways being choked with trains of wounded, while the dispatches of correspondents at the front have told how the battlefields were carpeted with gray

Emphasized by Wireless

As examples of what the British have gone through the statement cites two divisions which lost a large percentage of their effectiveness. The twenty fifth, a new division in the fighting between March 22 and 26 lost four thousand men. Put in the fighting again from April 10 to April 19 it lost five thousand more. Despite these losses it was brigaded with the French for a counter attack and still later it beat off four heavy German attacks.

The twenty-first division fought continuously from March 21 to March 28 and lost 4000 infantry men of a total strength of 9,000. It later drove back a German attack in which five German divisions were engaged and increased its losses to 6,000.

"Statistics such as these," said the statement, "brings home to the military mind the terrible ordeal through which the British army is now passing. Mistory correctly reviewing facts will record what is perhaps often now lost sight of in the crowded interests of every day life and obscured by hearsay and extravagant writings. Britain at this very moment is making the supreme sacrifice of endurance for right against might and now strengthened by and shoulder to shoulder with the famous French fighting divisions, is prepared to hold the masses in check until the right moment arrives for the great revenge."







Are Often Gassed
On the morning of the attack on Kemmel, the German gunners placed ten big shells per second on the crest of the hill and during that day the French put on their gas masks fifty different times, for as fast as the wind cleared the gas away, another deluge of the poisonous vapor poured over the hill, Part of the time the poilus had to sleep in their gas masks. Despite the great quantities of gas thrown the French had only 12 casualties from it according to the latest ualties from it according to the latest reports which speaks eloquently of the efficiency of the French gas pro-

A large part of the fighting was with machine guns of which the Ger-mans always had great numbers and at times the Germans enfilleding fire was terrific. The French artillery and machine guns, however, in their turn reaped a great harvest from the gae-

At times the French 75's got into heavy concentratous of infants and literally tore them to pieces. The German losses in many instances are placed as high as forty per cent.

BOOTLEGGING COSTS OSAGE INDIANS

By Associated Press
London, May 4.—In discussing Germany's next "peace offensive" signs of which have begun to appear, the newspapers reflect the determination of the British nation and its ailies to see the war through. They say it is impossible that Germany should succeed in duping the allies into a peace which does not fulfill the principles

for which they are fighting. The Times says the expectation that the Germans would inaugurate a peace campaign seems likely to be fulfilled. It continues:

"On the one hand German speakers and agents show suspicious readiness to dilate upon the food shortage and general discomfort in Germany, with the obvious intention of lending a ring of sincerity to Germany's profession of anxiety for peace. At the same time neutral emissaries of well known antecedents and thoughts are understood recently to have arrived in England and affied countries for the purposes of suggesting that if the allies will only show a pacific dispo-sition they will find Germany ready to meet them on moderate terms. In some instances these emissaries are believed to have put forward proposals as to the best policy for the allies

"The allied governments are likely to present as firm a front to any peace intrigue as the allied armies presented to the German military at-



Many of them had fought at Fluery and they knew what hard fighting was, but declare that Verdun was child's play compared to the conflict in Flanders recently.

The bombardment at Verdun had not be the content of the conflict in Flanders recently.

The bombardment at Verdun had set a high water mark for concentration of guns of all calibers, but say those who went through it, it, was nothing compared t owhat the French troops experienced during the German drive against Kemmel. The French troops took up position about Kemmel on April 22, relieving the battle-weary British. Throughout April 23 and 24 before the attack, the Germans maintained a tremendous bombardment tained a tremendous bombardment and threw hundreds of thousands of gas shells mixed with ordinary explo-

Are Often Gassed
On the morning of the attack on
Kemmel, the German gunners placed
ten big shells per second on the crest
of the hill and during that day the French put on their gas masks fifty different times for as fast as the wind cleared the gas away, another deluge of the poisonous vapor poured over the hill. Part of the time the poilus had to sleep in their gas masks. Despite the great quantities of gas thrown the French had only 12 casualties from it according to the latest reports which speaks eloquently of the efficiency of the French gas pro-

A large part of the fighting was with machine guns of which the Ger-mans always had great numbers and at times the Germans enfilleding fire was terrific. The French artillery and machine guns, however, in their turn reaped a great harvest from the ene-

At times the French 75's got into heavy concentrations of infantry and literally tore them to pieces. The literally tore them to pieces. The German losses in many instances are placed as high as forty per cent.

Runners Do Well

The work of French runners with messages was noteworthy. They re-

messages was noteworthy. They re-fused to rest and kept at their task.

The rationing of one famous regi-ment which fought at erdun was a great feat. It had always been noted for its fine rations and the command-er decided that nothing should deprive the men of accustomed fare. It was impossible to use the transport be-cause of the artillers fire so that racause of the artillery fire so that ra-tions were brought forward on ma-chine gun carriages under a heavy fire. The regiment had its beefsteak and wine every day and furnished neighboring regiments as well.

Nearly all the stretcher bearers were killed. One stretcher bearer worked six cays and nights without

rest.

German airplanes were out in force. They flew at an altitude of 100 meters and used machine guns continuously against the infantry.

BRITISH NEWSPAPERS

By Associated Press London, May 4.—In discussing Germany's next "peace offensive" signs of which have begun to appear, the newspapers reflect the determination of the British nation and its allies to see the war through. They say it is impossible that Germany should succeed in duping the allies into a peace which does not fulfill the principles for which they are fighting.

The Times says the expectation that the Germans would inaugurate a peace campaign seems likely to be fulfilled. It continues:

"On the one hand German speakers and agents show suspicious readiness to dilate upon the food shoriage and general discomfort in Germany, with the obvious intention of lending a ring of sincerity to Germany's profession of anxiety for peace. At the same time neutral emissaries of well known antecedents and thoughts are understood recently to have arrived in England and allied countries for the purposes of suggesting that if the allies will only show a pacific dispo-sition they will find Germany ready to meet them on moderate terms. In. ne instances these emissaries are believed to have put forward proposals as to the best policy for the allies

"The allied governments are likely to present as firm a front to any peace intrigue as the allied armies presented to the German military attacks.





It is not generally known just how important a fighting instrument aerial photography has proven itself, but since early in 1915 the allies have been at work, perfecting the science, until now it is practically a new art, according to those who have made a close study. To the outsider it seems wonderful beyond comprehension that a picture taken thousands of feet in the air will be so minute in detail as to reveal a machine gun and even a barbed wire entanglement. For this detection a magnifying glass is required, but the picture always gives up every detail. The most careful camouflage of the enemy is absolutely nullified with the aerial camera's all seeing eye. For this reason it can be seen how very important this branch of the aerial training is, and also how very important it is that the United States put a large aerial force in the field and gain the air supremacy for the allies.

acy for the allies.

One of Late Sciences

The advent at Call Field of the new section in Aerial Photography, is coincident with the introduction into the American Army of one of the latest sciences applied to modern warfare, Aerial photography has made the strategy of past wars impractical inasmuch as it has removed the element of surprise. Concentration of troops without the knowledge of the enemy is no longer feasible for aerial reconnoissance has rendered these maneuv

ers abortive.
It is to be seen, therefore, that air superiority insures you two things a screen for your own movements and a knowledge of the enemy's Such knowledge, eventually, therefore, leads to but one conclusion, the ultimate superiority in arms of the aerial-
