While the question of the next con-vention city has not yet been brought before the convention, it is conceded by most of the leaders that Atlanta, Ga., will entertain the body next year. Miami, Florida, had conducted a vig-orous campaign to obtain the conven-tion, next year, but at the last with-drew its invitation in favor of At-lanta, with the understanding that Miami would get the convention, in 1920.
