ALLIED RESERVES ARE BEING HURLED INTO ACTION

SWIFT WORK IS BEING DONE BY ALLIED ARMIES

FRESH ENEMY DIVISIONS ARE BEING BROUGHT TO THE ATTACK

KNEW GERMAN INTENTION

Battle Continues With Unabated Violence Throughout, and Reserves New Being Brought Up.

WITH THE AMERICAN ARMY IN FRANCE, Wednesday evening, May 29.

Allied reserves now are taking up positions in the battle line. They are being thrown in to strengthen the defending forces where they are weakest, in preparation for the placing of a barrier to a further German advance. Fresh enemy divisions have been brought forward hastily to take the places of those exhausted by the advance of the last three days, and continue the pressure on the Allies.

South of Vesle.

The territory south of the Vesle River, which the Germans have crossed at several points, is more difficult for the attack.

FRENCH OFFICIAL REPORT IS GIVEN OF BATTLE

PARIS, May 30.—The battle along the fighting front continued all night, with the French maintaining the western outlets of Soissons the war office announced today.

Northwest of Rheims the Franco-British forces broke all the German assaults and maintained the defensive positions.

Attempt to Break Through.

The Germans made an attempt to break through the defense in the Soissons region but were each time held up by the determined French resistance.

In the center of the German advance, fighting is taking place in the neighborhood of Vezilly (approximately 15 miles south of the Chemin des Dames), where the German attack was launched on Monday.

Extreme Violence.

Further south engagements of extreme violence developed in the region of the road between Soissons and Parthenay and on the front between Fere-en-Tardenois and Vesilly where French troops supported by reserves are opposing the German advance with indomitable tenacity.

On the right Franco-British troops along the front between Bollette and Villers and also northwest of Rheims, broke all assaults and maintained their positions.

Washington Sees No Cause As Yet For Uneasiness

WASHINGTON, May 30.—Military opinion here today was that the German success at Soissons will bring to the attackers little real benefit and that the present contour of the line gives no cause for grave uneasiness.

Although the Germans in the last three days apparently have advanced about five miles a day there has been nothing to indicate danger of a break through along the whole front of attack. In the Aisne battle it is apparent that General Foch has so thoroughly welded the French and British armies that there is little danger of a rupture.

Officers here believe reserves from the Somme front reaching the Aisne sector in strength and reserves that have been held in the region of Paris, will stop the thrust within a very few days at the most.

The difficulty facing Foch, it is said is determining to just what extent he may use reserves at the Somme and Flanders front to block the attempt on the Aisne line. It is believed here that the real purpose of the German high command is to force a withdrawal of reserves from the Picardy battle theater, which would permit of a renewal of the attack.

ENEMY AIRPLANE IS BROUGHT DOWN BY FRENCH GUNS

ATTEMPTED RAID ON PARIS FAILS THROUGH BOMBS FALL ELSEWHERE.

PARIS, May 30.—An enemy airplane was brought down by French anti-aircraft guns during an attempted raid on Paris last night. None of the German machines was able to fly over the city. A few bombs were dropped in the suburbs.

Several points behind the battle line however, were bombed by the enemy. The official statement issued today says:

"Enemy airplanes were most active last night, and bombed various localities behind the front. Several were observed making toward Paris, and an alarm was given at 11:24 o'clock. The air defenses organization got to work, and no enemy machine got past our curtain of fire and none flew over Paris. A few bombs were dropped in the suburbs.

An enemy airplane was struck by a shell from an anti-aircraft battery and fell in flames. 'All clear' was sounded at 11:34 a. m."

ANOTHER STRONG ATTACK REPULSED AROUND CATINGNY

ALMOST CONTINUOUS ASSAULTS ARE MADE ON AMERICAN LINE.

WITH THE BRITISH ARMY IN FRANCE, May 30.—Another strong enemy counter attack against the American troops in the Catingny sector, west of Montdidier, seems to have met with a complete repulse according to a brief report from the south.

The Americans evidently have been subjected to almost continuous attacks since they stormed their way into Catingny. In every case the enemy waves have been broken against the stone wall resistance of the Americans.

GERMAN FLOOD IS NEARING POINT OF FINAL DAMMING

CHEERFUL SEMI-OFFICIAL NOTE GIVEN BY THE FRENCH.

PURPOSE NOW IS PLAIN

Command Retains Undiminished Confidence in Leaders Directing Them.

PARIS, May 30.—The German flood will soon be dammed says a semi-official note issued today summarizing the situation between Rheims and Soissons.

The note says: "The Germans again progressed yesterday but while on the one hand they failed to pierce our lines on the other it is comforting to observe that their march was slackened considerably by the arrival of our reserves."

"As these come into play the balance will gradually be restored and soon the German flood will be dammed."

"The French command retains undiminished confidence based as it is on the power of our resources and the incomparable valor of our soldiers."

As the battle proceeds the enemy's purpose becomes plain. It is two fold.

Purpose of Enemy.

First is an attempt to break through the Vesle flows the Marne, which forms, with the Oise, one of the great avenues of approach to Paris. Along its course runs the Châlons railroad, the main eastern artery. To gain a footing in the Marne valley, or even to approach within artillery range of it, would be an appreciable result.

The second objective which the German staff considers even more important, judging by the efforts made at Soissons, is to broaden the salient to the westward. By enlarging the action there the German crown prince intends to approach nearer to Paris on the direct route.

The French command is fully aware of the importance of this movement. Although Soissons was evacuated, the French hold all the roads leading out of the town.

Heavy fighting still lies ahead for the Allies but those most competent to express an opinion are now satisfied that the German drive will be stopped in the near future.

OFFICIAL

GREAT BRITAIN.

LONDON, May 30.—The statement follows: "During the night the enemy attacked the strong point known as 'Route A-Keep' northwest of Festubert, and was completely repulsed. We carried out a successful minor operation in the neighborhood of Merris and improved our line slightly. We captured a few prisoners and a machine gun in these encounters."

"A party of our troops raided the enemy's trenches last night near Locon and brought back a few prisoners."

"The hostile artillery has been active east of Villers-Bretonneux and in the Hinges and Robecq sectors."

Heir Apparent To Russian Throne Is Now With Parents

MOSCOW, Tuesday, May 28.—Alexis Romanoff, formerly the Russian heir apparent, and the daughters of the former emperor have arrived at Yekaterinburg, in the government of Tyumen, on the Asiatic side of the Ural mountains.

The former emperor and empress had fled to Yekaterinburg for several weeks having been removed from Tobolsk Siberia after the reported discovery of a conspiracy to bring about the escape of Nicholas Alexis, Alexis remained at Tokohsk for a time on account of ill health.

Pneumonia prevalence is reported at Camp Travis, Texas, Dodge, Iowa, and Gordon, Georgia, with measles generally prevalent at all camps.

Deaths decreased from 178 last week to 161 this week.

London Regarding News From Front As Most Grave

LONDON, Wednesday, May 29.—The news from the front tonight is regarded here with the utmost gravity. With Soissons in the hands of the enemy and Rheims closely threatened, the question whether the enemy's original intention was to make the thrust on the Aisne front his main operation hardly arises.

Yesterday the situation seemed to be more hopeful from the fact that the two wings of the allied line were holding firmly but the enemy has developed attacks of such strength on both right and left that this is no longer the case.

Dispatches from the front speak of the fine co-operation between the French and British in the retirement. Considerable comment has been caused by the fact that Field Marshal Haig, who in the opening phases of the Aisne operations reported their progress has ceased since yesterday evening's announcement to make any reference to them.

MRS. VANDERBILT EXPECTS TO WED MINT DIRECTOR

RAY BAKER TO BE THE GROOM AT AN EARLY JUNE AFFAIR.

WASHINGTON, May 30.—Mrs. Alfred Gwyn Vanderbilt and Ray Baker, director of the mint, will be married at Mrs. Vanderbilt's country place at Lenox, Mass., early in June. Announcement was made today by Mrs. Vanderbilt's father, Captain Isaac E. Emerson of Baltimore.

After the wedding ceremony at Home Wood, Mrs. Vanderbilt's estate, Mr. Baker will take his bride for a trip to California and upon their return will live in Washington. Mr. Baker is from Nevada where he was engaged in mining and other business.

About four years ago he went to Russia as secretary to the American ambassador at Petrograd and on his return here a year ago was appointed director of the mint by President Wilson. He is prominent in the White House circle and has accompanied the President and Secretary Tamm on several trips. His father was chief counsel for the Southern Pacific Railway system.

HOSPITAL ATTACK BY HUNS THOUGHT MOST DELIBERATE

WITH THE AMERICAN FORCES ON THE FRENCH FRONT, Wednesday, May 29.—The German air attack Tuesday night on American hospitals in a town many miles behind the front was carried out with the utmost apparent deliberation. The German air men used umbrella flares to aid them in picking out their targets. Their bombs also fired a garage which lighted up the neighborhood in which is one of the four finest cathedrals in France.

The air men also turned their machine guns on the firemen who were fighting the flames and upon ambulance drivers.

Besides the killing of one French nurse and the probable mortal injury of another, patients in one American ward were hurled out of their beds by the shock of a bomb explosion. In some of the hospitals patients were taken to the cellars for safety.

Nearly every window in one of the largest hospitals was shattered, as were the windows in the historic church adjoining now also used as a hospital. Scores of American patients and hundreds of sick and wounded French soldiers were in the hospitals attacked.

BREAD CRUMBS SAVED BY AUSTRIAN CHILDREN

LONDON, May 19.—Bread crumbs are being collected by school children in certain parts of Austria to be sent to starving children in Croatia. A newspaper in Sarajevo reports that 48 boxes of bread crumbs were dispatched recently from that town. The population of Herzegovina, mostly Slavs, is said to be starving as a result of the food shortage.

Farmers in that region have received four pounds of flour since Christmas.

CUBAN SUGAR IS CONTRACTED FOR.

HAVANA, May 30.—H. H. Morgan, representative in Cuba of the United States food administration, has been notified that the Inter-Allied sugar commission has signed a contract for the purchase by the United States from the Cuban sugar producers of the remaining 25 per cent of this year's crop. No information has been received, Mr. Morgan said regarding the price to be paid for the sugar.

EIGHTEEN MILES DISTANCE WEDGE HAS BEEN DRIVEN

MANY ATTEMPTS OF GERMANS TO DEBOUCH FROM SOISSONS FAIL.

ALLIES FLANKS STEADY

Chief Progress of Enemy For Day Is Reported to be in Center Of Their Big Push.

The war situation of today is summarized by the Associated Press as follows:

General Foch's reserves have begun to come into action in the fight against the powerful German thrust southward from the Aisne and the enemy is finding his progress increasingly difficult in consequence.

Again the Allied flanks are standing firm and while Soissons has been lost on the west, Rheims is still holding out on the easterly edge of the battlefield.

The chief progress of the Germans revealed in today's official reports was in the center of their advances, where some three miles additional ground have been taken from Loupigny 17 miles north of the Marne to Fere-en-Tardenois.

The blunt of the German wedge is shown to run here from Fere-en-Tardenois about 10 1/2 miles directly east to Vezilly, 15 1/2 miles southwest of Rheims.

Along this line the Germans are about 18 miles south of the Chemin-des-Dames, giving them a penetration of approximately that distance at the beginning of the fifth day of their offensive.

The steadiness of the Allied flanks under the heavy German pressure is one of the outstanding indications in the Paris official report. The Germans, for example, after several attempts to debouch from Soissons after gaining that town but the determined French in the outskirts prevented the enemy from achieving this object.

To the southeast the French reserves are coming into play and here the Allies are resisting the enemy in engagements of extreme violence along the road from Soissons to Artois-Et-Taux, 7 1/2 miles southeast of Fere-en-Tardenois, 8 1/2 miles to the southwest of Sartannes-Et-Taux, apparently marks the limit of the German advance towards the southwest with 10 1/2 miles eastward, representing the extreme easterly progress of the enemy.

From Vezilly, the front trends sharply northwesterly. Brouilly, the next point mentioned in the official communication, lies 3 1/2 miles north of Vezilly and only slightly east of a north and south line running through the latter town. Brouilly is 13 miles southeast of Rheims and along the ten mile line from that point to Thillois, three miles west of Rheims, and thence trending northward, the Franco-British defensive line is reported to have broken all the German assaults and to have maintained the front intact.

On the Flanders front the Germans made a local attack on a British position northwest of Festubert in the Ghenvy sector which met with a complete repulse. The British improved their line by an advance of some 200 yards in the Merris sector to the west.

Still further attacks have been made against the Americans established in the village of Catingny, west of Montdidier, which they recently captured. The assaults have been almost continuous, news dispatches report but each has been broken up by the American stone wall resistance.

AMERICAN FORCES ARE PAYING HONOR NOW TO THEIR DEAD

WITH THE AMERICAN ARMY IN FRANCE, May 30.—From Flanders to Switzerland and from the battle line to the sea, the American expeditionary forces today are paying homage to their dead. Wherever American flags are flying they are at half staff and before the day is over the Star-Spangled Banner which they will be placed on virtually every American grave.

At one place in the vicinity of Lunelville the graves had been decorated in the morning darkness when the enemy could not see clearly for the soldiers performing this duty might have drawn the German fire as did the burial party. Here both the American and French flags were placed on the mounds with bunches of wild flowers—great blood red poppies and yellow and white daisies.

BOHEMIANS ARE ANXIOUS TO GAIN THEIR FREEDOM

REGIMENT GOES INTO BATTLE WITH ENTEENTE UNDER THEIR OWN FLAG.

ITALIAN HEADQUARTERS IN Northern Italy, May 2.—Bohemians' hopes of independence from the domination of Austria-Hungary assumed a more concrete form recently in a large city near the Italian front when a regiment of Bohemian troops received a battle flag on the eve of their departure for the fighting line.

The formation of the Bohemian regiment gives a definiteness to the recent congress held in Rome of representatives of the various Slav elements which seek to throw off the Austrian yoke.

The close relations established between Italy and the Jugo-Slavs are of especial importance to the harmony of the Allied cause, for together the Italians and Jugo-Slavs completely encircle the Adriatic.

Albania was the only one of the Adriatic communities not represented at the recent congress. The Albanians are not Slavs but they are a people with a league of their own.

CITY CARRIER EXAMINATION TO BE GIVEN JUNE 22

An open competitive examination for the positions of clerk and city carrier in the postoffice service in Wichita Falls will be held at the local postoffice on June 22.

1. Spelling (twenty words of average difficulty in common use)—10 points.

2. Arithmetic (simple tests in addition, subtraction, multiplication and division of whole numbers, common and decimal fractions and the ordinary weights and measures)—20 points.

3. Letter writing (a letter of not less than 125 words on some subject of general interest. Competitors may select either of two subjects given)—20 points.

4. Penmanship (the handwriting of the competitor in the subject of copying from plain copy will be considered with special reference to the elements of legibility, rapidity, neatness, general appearance, etc.)—20 points.

5. Copying from plain copy (a simple test in copying accurately a few printed lines in the competitor's handwriting)—20 points.

6. Reading addresses (test in noting with pen or pencil, on a printed sheet of addresses, differences between the printed addresses and the written addresses of which they are a copy)—10 points.

Total—100 points. Clerks in offices of the first and second classes, and carriers in the city delivery service, are divided into five grades, the salaries of which are \$300, \$350, \$400, \$450, and \$1,200 per annum, respectively. Clerks and

carriers at first class offices will be promoted successively, a grade at a time, to \$1,100, and clerks and carriers at second-class offices will be promoted in the same manner to \$1,000.

Promotions of both clerks and carriers will be made at the beginning of the quarter following the expiration of a year's service in the next lower grade. No promotion will be made except upon evidence satisfactory to the Postoffice Department of the efficiency and faithfulness of the employee during the year.

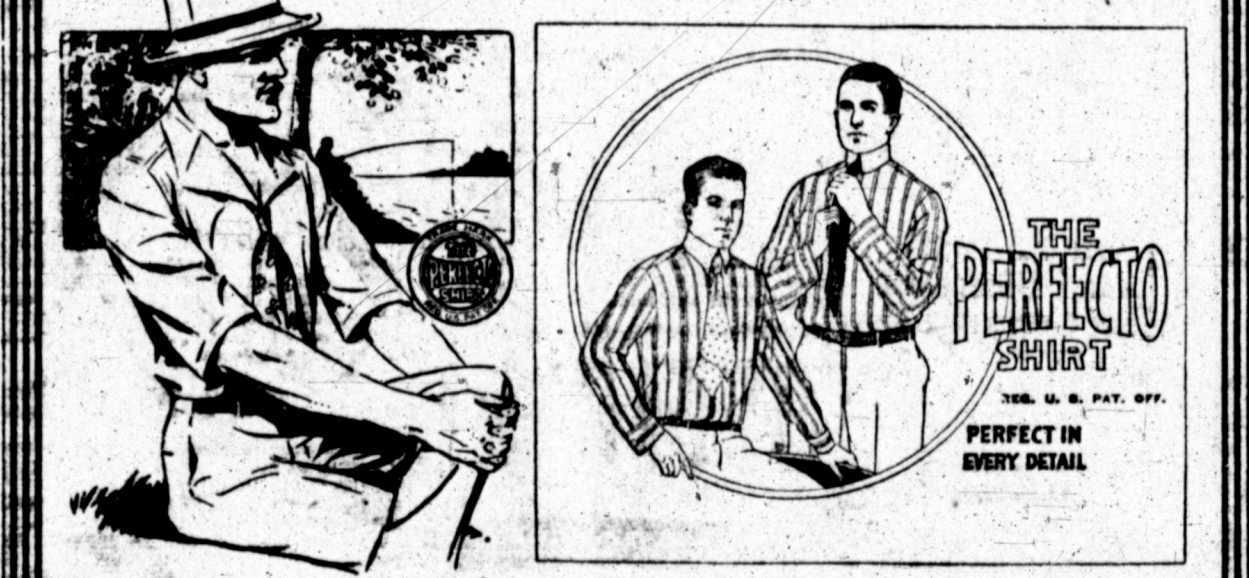

JEWISH SOLDIERS ARE BEING GIVEN GOOD TREATMENT

PROVIDENCE, R. I., May 30.—Col. Harry Cutler, president of the Jewish Board for Welfare Work in the United States Army and Navy, has received from Maj. S. Lipson, Senior Jewish Chaplain, Home Forces, in London, a letter telling how the Jewish soldiers are being administered to in France and in England. Major Lipson estimates there are more than 40,000 Jews in the army and navy, but many others are anticipated through the plan to enlist Russian Jews.

"In France," the letter reads, "the senior Jewish chaplain, Maj. M. Adler, has under his control nine chaplains, some stationed at the base and others attached to armies up the line. Two chaplains have been appointed for duty in Egypt, their headquarters being Cairo and Alexandria. One chaplain is serving the spiritual needs of the Jewish soldiers in Saloniki and another has been appointed for duty with the Italian army."

"In the United Kingdom there are fourteen officiating clergymen. At Aldershot, one of the largest military centres, a chaplain holding military rank devoted his whole time to the needs of the troops. Similar arrangements are now contemplated for other military centres in this country, such as has a chaplain's entire time and energy."

"As necessitated, chaplains will be nominated for service with the newly formed regiment composed mainly of Jews of Russian nationality. In the event of any American military center being formed here, it will afford me much pleasure to apply for authority to enable me to arrange for American troops receiving spiritual ministrations until such time as chaplains may be available from the United States."

"I shall also be pleased to place at your disposal the extensive organization of this committee in connection with the visitation of sick and wounded in hospitals in the United Kingdom and to furnish any information which may be of interest to you as well as to the relatives."

AMERICAN SECTOR IN TOUL ACTIVE FOLLOWING LULL

By Associated Press. WITH THE AMERICAN ARMY IN France, Wednesday, May 29.—After a period of almost unprecedented quiet, the American sector northwest of Toul suddenly has become very active.

Last night and today the Germans threw over hundreds of shells of all sizes and kept up a destructive and harassing fire. The American guns have been just as busy and are giving the enemy more than he sends. The artillery duel continues strong tonight.

It is not improbable that the Germans have some plans in which they may employ their infantry. German airplanes also were very active today but as a strong wind was blowing from Germany and American aviators were constantly on the alert, few enemy machines ventured across the lines. Those that did were promptly driven back by the American fliers.

The gas bombardment that preceded the infantry engagement by the enemy began at 1:30 o'clock this morning. The Germans made a show of an occasional eight inch projector to replace those that had been destroyed by the American guns Monday night and mustard, phosgene and chlorine shells fell by the hundreds on the American positions. In one small area alone 300 of these arrived. Many of these as a result began to show the effects of slight gas and were harboring a large grudge against the enemy. When the gas shells began to fall there was hardly any wind, making certain that the fumes would remain in the localities where the Germans placed them and the men in the American trenches hoped the enemy would follow up the shelling with an infantry attack.

The hopes of the resentful defenders were fully realized and the result completely satisfied the American troops for in one trench at daybreak this morning lay the nine dead Germans who perished in the bayonet attack, while to the east where the men in the trenches had fought to work with their machine guns, the ground was dotted with gray clad bodies.

Many of the machine gunners, still wearing their gas masks, stuck to their guns throughout the preliminary bombardment and when they saw the advancing forms of the Germans just outside the American wire they cut loose with their fire.

At one of the largest of the base hospitals the nurses and some of the men seriously wounded in the attack every grave with a flag and crowned each with wreaths. The last resting places of American women who have died in service as nurses were honored equally with those of the soldiers.

LONDON PAPER SAYS TIDE MAY BE ATTEMPTED

By Associated Press. LONDON, May 30.—Speaking of the situation in France, a military critic of the Daily Telegraph today says: "The present is a critical period for the fate of France and with France is bound up the fate of the Entente. The British and French still have very valuable assets if they know how best to use them.

We possess numerical superiority of soldiers on ocean routes are at the disposal of the Allies, and all the world's wealth for the fetching. The Allies possess the means of concentrating more men and more airplanes in the decisive theater than the Germans.

It is unnecessary to repeat the cause which hitherto has nullified these inestimable advantages. It is high time our war cabinet and war officers found out how to bring this superiority of resources to bear upon the field of action.

An administration of the highest order is needed to turn the tide. The military situation also demands a master of strategy and a commander who change the face of affairs in France.

ONE BRITISH DIVISION COVERS SELF WITH GLORY

By Associated Press. WITH THE FRENCH ARMY IN France, Wednesday, May 29.—One of the most brilliant actions Monday was carried out by a British territorial division at Craonne. The Germans threw their heaviest forces against the remnants of the British and Berniercourt, where the British were holding the line, and against the French along the Chemin-Des-Dames.

The British division made a most gallant effort to stem the onflowing tide and even vigorously counter-attacked against the fearful odds. The attempt although carried out with spirit failed because of the entrance of the enemy tanks on the flanks. One brigade of this division fought a heroic rear guard action at Ville-Aux-Bois southeast of Craonne side by side with French territorials. The Allied troops resisted the Germans until the last extremity.

The enemy is still pushing on with every atom of strength to obtain possession of as much territory as possible before the Allied reserves come up in full force to check the advance. The German crown prince, who previously has met with invariable defeat, may claim a primary success on this occasion. However, no breach has been made in the Allied line which has merely been pressed back by irresistible masses of troops and has maintained complete cohesion.

MANY TANKS ARE USED BY GERMANS IN OFFENSIVE

LONDON, May 30.—In their initial onslaught Monday the Germans are believed to have used more tanks than ever before, says Reuters, correspondent with the British forces on the French front, writing, Wednesday. The fiftieth British division near Craonne withstood a gas attack of three hours and held the Germans in their attempt to reach the Aisne until "the men were drowned under the German combats."

The same fate overtook the French division to the right of the fiftieth. After falling back the fiftieth made a gallant attempt to recapture Craonne but was defeated by machine gun fire from the enemy tanks. In the end the fiftieth was obliged to fall back toward the river.

BOILER MAKERS ARE NEEDED BY U. S. GOVERNMENT

MORE AND MORE OF SKILLED LABOR OF THIS SORT REQUIRED AT YARDS.

Machinists and boilermakers are urgently needed for important war plants and the United States public service reserve is expected to start a vigorous campaign to enroll such men in the near future, according to H. W. Lewis, district superintendent of the United States Employment Service with headquarters at Smithville, Texas. Mr. Lewis states that the ship yards have drawn heavily on the boilermakers trade, but that the employment service does not want men to leave essential work for similar employment elsewhere. The superintendent's statement in full follows:

Draw Heavily. The ship yards have been drawing very heavily on the boilermakers trade, as members of that craft are used not only for making boilers, but for riveting, chipping and caulking, and as ship fitters. With the increase in the order for steel ships there will be a further demand for boilermakers and at the present time we hardly know where to turn for them in any number.

It is expected that within two or three weeks the United States Public Service Reserve will be asked to make a vigorous campaign to secure machinists and boilermakers for important war plants that are being seriously slowed down on account of shortage of men in these trades. The plants must be kept going at full capacity, if it is possible to do so. We earnestly desire to enroll every man of these trades as members of the United States Public Service Reserve, but we do not wish them to leave work that may be essential in order to accept similar employment elsewhere.

Is Important. The importance of securing these men is so great that it becomes second only to sending a fighting force to France. Those members that have the spirit of the Reserve should be willing to be transferred from the less essential work at the request of the Government, when it means so much to the success of our arms. Enrollment cards may be obtained from this office, or from Chairman of County Council of Defense.

RAIDS BY HUNS MADE TO TAKE U. S. PRISONERS

MANY OF ENEMY KILLED NEAR LUNEVILLE; NO AMERICANS CAPTURED.

By Associated Press
 With THE AMERICAN ARMY IN FRANCE, Wednesday, May 29.—The purpose of the German attacks today against the American positions near Brement east of Luneville, was to capture Americans. The determined American resistance, however, repulsed the enemy with heavy losses and no Americans were taken prisoners.

The Germans attacked at three points and at one place a group of fourteen got into the American trenches. It never went back. Nine of the fourteen Germans were killed; four are prisoners and one is dead of wounds.

Sought Prisoners.
 The prisoners reported that they were ordered to capture Americans at any cost, their superiors being anxious to determine where American troops are stationed and their present fighting strength.

At a point west of Brement, after a heavy barrage, fifty German soldiers attempted to reach the American line. They were in three groups and the two larger ones were held up and then dispersed by the American machine gun and rifle fire. The third group, consisting of 14 men managed by reason of terrain conditions to reach the American trenches and jump into them.

Farmer Makes Good.
 Under the leadership of a lanky youth, who was a farmer until he enlisted, a group of Americans gave the Germans a hot reception. Bayonets on the end of American rifles flashed white and then red almost as quickly as it takes to tell it and the enemy party was soon overpowered. During the engagement a big German non-commissioned officer who directed the party, stood on a parapet. He raised his arm to hurl a grenade at an American soldier but he never threw it. Another American who had come through a severe gas attack last Monday morning reached the German with his bayonet. The grenade fell from the dying German's hand and exploded harmlessly on the parapet.

These workers will start early next month harvesting the winter wheat crop in Oklahoma, then going into Kansas and afterwards moving into the spring wheat section of the northwest and finally crossing the border and assisting Canadian farmers later in the summer.

The army of workers will return in time to assist in harvesting the corn crop in the early fall.

Recruiting and direction of these workers is in charge of A. L. Barkman, former chief of the farm service division of the employment service, who is now employment director for the district comprising the grain belt.

'CHRISTIAN SCIENCE' IS SUBJECT OF EVANGELIST

Tonight, 8 p. m., "The Big Fool," Friday.
 4 p. m., Boys and girls—Mr. Stover.
 8 p. m., "Sam Jones Last Sermon"—Mr. Brown.

EDITOR'S NOTE.—The following attack upon Christian Science made by Evangelist Brown at the tabernacle Wednesday is being published by The Times in the daily routine story of the services held there. In fairness to the Christian Scientists, The Times will publish a single article of equal length written by some authorized member of the Christian Science church, and there, so far as The Times is concerned, the controversy will end.

This morning at the ten o'clock service Mr. Brown made a raid in force of the Christian Science trenches. The assault was well planned and bore the marks of premeditated battery with intent to put a crimp in the whole works from the founder down. Mr. Brown said calmly in the beginning that he was aware that he would be called a liar and ignorant. He said he would let his talk speak of his ignorance for itself, but would resent the lie part, and demand that proof be brought of his lie, that it be specified and not just blanketed with one charge that he was a liar on general principles.

Why Out of Path.
 "I am asked why I go out of my beaten path to attack Eddyism," said the preacher. "My answer covers several counts. First, I never have and never will attack a Christian church. But this determination does not cover cults or hypocritical institutions outside the church. Eddyism has attacked my church and declares all it stands for is false, that to get the light I must leave my church and follow the most divorced way of the Boston High Priests. When I counter attack they bawl like a calf in a thunder storm and cry, 'O, he is attacking us; he is attacking us; and the next cry is, 'We never fight.' No institution in the ages has such a record for proselyting as the cults of Eddyism, Mormonism and Russellism. All three are yoked together, work largely to get church members to join them, and instead of working for the salvation of the world, work for the dissatisfaction of church members. They are sheep thieves and Eddyism is by majority composed of people they have coaxed and coaxed out of their folds into the hog pen of Eddyism. I attack Eddyism because it attacks every orthodox church. I attack it because it is an hypocritical institution sailing under a false flag. If I find a Mason who has never joined the lodge but impudently flaunts the badge and is trying to gain credence and undermine Masonry

with his work, under that badge, everybody would assent to the public pillorying of that hypocrite and tearing from him the badge he wore falsely. Eddyism wears the badge of orthodox Christianity and yet subtly denies all the church teaches. Some Eddyites will say 'that is a lie.' Is it? What is orthodox? It is the doctrine of a revealed Bible. It is the doctrine of a lost man. It is the doctrine of a Saviour dying for the sin of the world. It is the doctrine of a living, engineering person all powerful God. Eddyism says it has outgrown orthodoxy.

"Has it outgrown a revealed and complete Bible? Yet it has. Mrs. Eddy claims for her book an appendix to the Bible another revelation that God forgot when he closed the Book on Patmos with St. John's hand. Has this Eddyism outgrown a lost human race as taught in orthodoxy from the Bible? It certainly has. Mrs. Eddy says there is no such thing as a lost man; no such thing as sin. Has this Eddyism outgrown a Saviour? It certainly has. Mrs. Eddy says definitely that Jesus did not suffer on the cross, that he did not die in expiation of the sin of earth, and that he did not rise from the dead. Has Eddyism outgrown Theology, another element of orthodoxy? It certainly has. Mrs. Eddy says God is a 'mathematical principle,' an influence, incapable of answering prayer, not a being of central power but a sort of insupportable gas. 'God is an 'It' God and man, she says, are co-existent. The Bible and orthodoxy says, 'In the beginning God created.' Mrs. Eddy says that is not so.

Tenets of Churches.
 "These are the tenets of the churches of Christendom, that God is a being, that he created, that he rules, the universe, that he revealed himself to man by the Bible, that Jesus Christ was His Son, that Christ was God, co-partner with His Father. That he suffered, took on himself the form of a man and died on Calvary, rose from the dead by virtue of His power as a God, and the world has the chance for salvation through the shed blood and sacrifice. Now this is the Christian teaching based on the Bible. Mrs. Eddy calls herself 'Christian.' When pressed for her position she teaches covertly the opposite to all these things that the name 'Christian' stands for. Is this a lie? She says God is an 'arithmetical principle.' She says there is no sin. God is good, and God is everything and therefore there can be no sin. That is not Bible, that is the word of Mrs. Eddy. She says Jesus did not die on the cross. The Bible says he did. She says he did not suffer, that pain is impossible. Jesus said he suffered. Who is telling the truth? I attack Eddyism because it is a glaring hypocrite claiming to be Christian when it is rank Unitarianism, cheap Pantheism and a good deal of charlatanism. Probably some scientist will say this statement is a lie. Is it? Unitarianism denies the deity of Christ. Mrs. Eddy does

the same. A Unitarian preacher edited her earlier editions of the inspired 'Key.'
 Couldn't Turn Lock.
 "When God sent the key he failed to fix Mrs. Eddy so she could turn it in the lock, and her first editions of 'Key to Scriptures' were actually pitiful in ill-formed sentences, crude ideas and illiterate use of grammar. As the baby grew she saw this from outside criticism and hired Rev. Wiggins, a Unitarian, to cast into readable English her ideas gained from Ann Lee and Dr. Quimby of Portland, Maine. She was married some of her times by a Unitarian, associated with Unitarians, hired a Unitarian to transcribe her book and it is her own confession. I wonder why Eddyites squirm so when the charge is laid at their door that they are only Unitarians with Pantheistic frills on. The Unitarian attitude and Mrs. Eddy's attitude are identical as to Christ. He was not God, but just a son of God, like the rest of mankind. This is a hypocritical masquerade. When I say Pantheism enters into Eddyism there is a yell of protest from Eddyites and ever from Mrs. Eddy herself. She says, 'I knew nothing of Pantheism. I think this is extremely probable. She was a very ignorant woman, indolent, lazy, fitful, high tempered, but with a naturally sharp mind. Her ideas that are so nearly of the pantheistic stripe she got from Dr. Quimby, and a smattering from Ann Lee, of infamous Shaker notoriety. Being ignorant of Indian pantheism Mrs. Eddy was swept off her feet when this first came to her and she thought it was something brand new. 'God is all' all is God' seemed to her brilliant, but the idea is old as heathendom. It struck so hard that she attempted to bolster up the bare pantheistic statement as something she knew was revealed from God and says with the innocence of a lisping baby, 'I know it is revealed because these propositions of mine can be read backward and forward with equal facility and mean the same.' The sort of logic is peculiarly scientific according to Eddyite standards, and she never measures by any standards except her own. Everything else is wrong and she is right. If common sense and research clash with her 'Key' and settles it beyond controversy.
 Now, if reading both ways mean her words were inspired straight from God, then 'P-U-P' is also a divine personal revelation because it reads equally well backward and forward and means the same. Honestly I am claiming my 'P-U-P' as nothing divine. I think it is as silly as her reason, or so-called reason, for proving divinity of her 'Key.'
 Seeks to Destroy Sacrifice.
 "I attack Eddyism because it seeks to destroy sacrifice of Jesus' blood on Calvary. Mrs. Eddy says in her 'Key' 'The blood of Christ was just as efficacious when He was alive walking around Jerusalem as when shed on Calvary.' This sort of blasphemy is not Christian, and I am tearing the badge off of a sneaking money grabbing hypocrite. The Bible and God says 'Without the shedding of blood there is no remission for sin.' Here is a direct clash between the Boston divorcee and God Almighty. I am fighting for the honor of a Calvary Cross Saviour, against this woman, who by a breath of her blameworthy lips blows away His death for the sin of the world. I attack Eddyism because of its teaching that Jesus was not the God, of our Bible and the orthodox church, but her teaching

records of her endeavoring to pray one enemy out of the world.
 I do not specially care about discussing the retired divorcee, but since she has set herself up as the divine hand of God, who is only an "It," an influence, since she has set herself up practically the equal of Jesus Christ, I may be excused if I say, "Wait there Sister, let's see what God is using."
 Was But Scribe.
 Somebody says, "There is another 'It': our 'other Eddy' never did anything of the kind." She claims for her book God authority doesn't she? Did she or did she not say in 1901, "I should blush to write the Science and Health as I have were it of human origin, and I apart from God author, but as I was only a scribe echoing the harmonies of heaven in divine metaphysics I can not be supermodest of the Christian Science text book." Well the old lady can plead guilty of a lot of things but modestly is not one of them, and that is no lie either. When I say she places herself on the pinnacle along side of our Saviour somebody says with open eyes, "you story teller." Well I have seen the admonition several hundred times from the parrot-like administrators of the cult. "If you want to know the truth about our sainted founder, don't listen to this man Brown, who is ignorant, but get the life of Mary Baker Eddy, by Sibly Wilbur, the authorized edition, which is to be found in every public library." Well in my ignorance I went to the library and got this work of art. Believe me it is some literature. It was given to Sibly Wilbur, by the Madame Eddy herself and is in fact an autobiography. Certainly if anybody ought to "now what the sister was, it ought to be the good sister herself. That is authorized beyond cavil. She vouches for herself as a child of wonder, religion beyond the belief of moderns." She says in her "authorized" life by the wonderful Sibly (whose literary style is on a par with Laura Jean Libbey's, sickening love novels of nobility) that she heard voices when a mere child just like little Samuel of Bible fame, and Joan of Arc. She goes on to tell in her super-modest way how she just like Jesus went into the church one Sunday morning at twelve years of age and confounded the preacher, with her knowledge of the Bible until the people round about were struck to tears and amazement. The little modest violet lets it all out in her "authorized" version by Sibly Wilbur. She worked miracles. A mad dog once was threatening to bite a school yard full of children. Little Mary calmly walked out and looked at him. It was too much for the mad dog. He turned tail and ran. Later on she developed this so that husband after husband looked, then got mad, red, or died, or was divorced, and she finally was left with Fry to comfort her in her old age. Any respect-

makes of Him another charlatan, an advance Christian scientist. She says she heals the same way Christ did. That is a lie. Unitarian false guise she has compiled and written another Bible and places it even on a higher plane than the Bible. Where the two come in direct opposition she says her 'key' is to be taken as the last word. She explains things as suit her, sets up rag tables and knocks them down, interprets to suit herself, mutilates the Bible till he is a joke. In her glossary which explains what things means she says 'Mother' means God. She goes on to say that 'oil' means 'gentleness and prayer'; 'wine' is defined as meaning 'error, fornication.' The sweetness and beauty of this divorcee's writing is beyond human expression when analyzed. The Bible tells us that the good Samaritan poured oil and wine into the wounds of the man who fell among thieves. According to these illuminating definitions of Mrs. Eddy the man poured a mixture of gentleness, prayer, error and fornication on the poor devil. It's a wonder he ever lived to get to the inn. Any way the highway robbers didn't treat him any worse than this Christian scientist.
 "Don't Blame Me."
 Now if this sounds hard don't blame me; I am distinctly hewing to the mark. I have not exaggerated or misconstrued one word or line. I don't have to when the whole is one tissue of absurdities and hypocrisy. I fight Eddyism because it fights and brands as unnecessary and false the rock bottom doctrines of Christianity. Christianity declares with the Bible that baptism is an order of God. Mrs. Eddy in her new bible takes issue with that and there is no baptism in the Eddyite cult. She wipes out the baptism in one puff of her breath, and then declares, "Why I am a Christian, don't you dare say I am untrue." She denies that Jesus is God, and one of the Holy Trinity, and yet with the denial on her lips the Divorcee, plaintively cries out, "What make you say cross things to me, I'm a Christian." She declares that the Lord's supper is unnecessary and it is never celebrated in her cult meetings. Yet every orthodox church and catholic, on top however they may differ in other things, all stand in one line on baptism, the Trinity, Godness of Christ, the Last supper and remission of sin by his blood. Mrs. Eddy says impudently, "It isn't so; none of it," and then when the Christian comes back she huddles up and cries piteously, "Oh you are attacking a woman, you horrid thing." I have attacked Mrs. Eddy very little, because her teachings are what I am exposing. If I want to start on an exposing trip of her it would be a pretty soiled journey, leading back to attempted arson, attempted breaking of a home, lies without number, many marriages, divorce courts, libel suits, law suits, many and unsavory

COMPROMISE REACHED ON PRUSSIAN FRANCHISE

IRELAND WILL NOT BE PRESSED SAYS LONDON STATEMENT

LONDON, May 29.—With the recent changes in the government in Ireland and the arrest of Sinn Fein leaders, the parliamentary correspondent of the Daily Telegraph says he understands the British government considers it desirable to refrain from pressing forward at this time anything calculated to produce a disturbance. A more settled feeling prevails in Ireland and it is hoped the improvement will grow in every direction.

The Irish home rule bill is not expected to be ready for introduction for a few weeks and until then conscription will remain in abeyance. This is believed to be the policy which the Lord Lieutenant and the chief secretary are in agreement with Walter Hume Long, secretary for the colonies and the war cabinet.

Ireland seems to be settling down in a wonderful manner despite the short time the new regime has been in existence, continues the correspondent, who has just returned from Dublin. The Nationalists and even some Sinn Feiners accept the coming of Lord French as Lord Lieutenant with relief. Edward Shortt, the new chief secretary, also has made an excellent impression.
