Fresh enemy divisions have been brought forward hastily to take they laces of those exhausted by the advance of the last three days and continue the pressure on the Allies.

PARIS, May 36.—The battle along the fighting front continued all night, with the French maintaining the western outlets of Soissons the war office announced today.

# Washington Sees No Cause As Yet For Uneasiness

By Associated Press

WASHINGTON, May 30 .- Military opinion here today was that the German success at Soissons will bring to the attackers little real benefit and that the present contour of the line gives no cause for grave uneasiness.

Although the Germans in the last three days apparently have advanced about five miles a day there has been nothing to indicate danger of a break through along the whole front of attack. In the Aisne battle it is apparent that General Foch has so thoroughly welded the French and British armies that there is little danger of a rupture.

Officers here believe reserves from the Somme front reaching the Aisne sector in strength and reserves that have been held in the region of Paris, will stop the thrust within

a very few days at the most. The difficulty facing Foch, it is said is determining to just what extent he may use reserves at the Somme and Flanders front to block the attempt on the Aisne line. It is believed here that the real purpose of the German high command is to force a withdrawal of reserves from the Picardy battle theater, which would permit of a renewal of the attack.

# EIGHTEEN MILES DISTANCE WEDGE HAS BEEN DRIVEN

MANY ATTEMPTS OF GERMANS TO DEBOUCH FROM SOIS-SONS FAIL.

# ONE DRUG STORE MAY LOSE PERMIT FROM GOVERNMENT

On account of violation of some sanitary regulations, the permit to serve soldiers was taken away from a local drug store today, Mrs. T. B. Smock announces, but when the condition on which the complaint was made is remedied, the store will receive it's permit again. The complaint was made that the clerk at the soda fountain served drinks in wet glasses, that had just been rinsed and not washed and dried as the regulation provides, and that the clerk also refused to serve the customer that made the complaint in a dried glass, when he requested it. It happened that the customer was a Federal sanitary officer and that he immediately preferred charges to the city department of inspection.

All cards certifying that the place showing the card is passed by the military and city inspection are given on consideration that the regulations be rigidly observed at all times. Any infraction will result in the cards being taken away, by order of the military authorities and the place losing its card will be placed on the black list of places not to be patronized by soldiers. It will be possible for a card to be regained, however, after it is lost, if the necessary improvements are made. Today's occurrance was the first of the sort since Major Atkinson and Mrs. Smock began their inspections and granting of cards.







WITH THE AMERICAN ARMY IN France, Wednesday, May 29.—After a period of almost unprecedented quiet, the American sector northwest of Toul suddenly has become very ac-

Last night and today the Germans threw over hundreds of shells of all sizes and kept up a destructive and harrassing tire. The American guns harrassing tire. The American guns have been just as busy and are giv-ing the enemy more than he sends. The artillery duel continues strong

It is not improbable that the Ger-

It is not improbable that the Germans have some plans in which they may employ their infantry.

German airplanes also were very active today but as a strong wind was blowing from Germany and American aviators were constantly on the alert, few enemy machines ventured across the lines. Those that did were promptly driven back by the American filers.

The gas bombardment that preceded the infantry engagement by the enemy began at 1:30 o'clock this morning. The Germans had brought up additional eight inch projectors to replace those that had been destroyed by the American guns Monday night and mustard, phosgene and chloride shells fell by the hundreds on the American positions. In one small area alone 300 of these arrived. Many of these as a result began to show the effects of slight gassing and were harboring a large grudge against the enemy. When the gas shells began to fall there was hardly any wind, making certain that the fumes would remain in 'he localities where the Germans placed them and the men in the

ing certain that the fumes would remain in 'he localities where the Germans placed them and the men in the American trenches hoped the enemy would follow up the shelling with an infantry attack.

The hopes of the resentful defenders were fully realized and the result completely satisfied the Americans, for in one trench at daybreak this morning lay he nine dead Germans who perished in the bayonet attack, while to the east where the men in the trenches had gone to work with their machine guns, the ground was dotted with gray clad bodies. Many of the machine gunners, still

wearing their gas masks, stuck to their guns throughout the preliminary bombardment and when they saw the advancing forms of the Germans just outside the American wire they cut loose with their fire.

At one of the largest of the base hospitals the nurses and some of the less seriously injured men covered every grave with a flag and crowned each with wreaths. The last resting places of American women who have d in service as nurses were honor-equally with those of the soldiers.




