With the exception of a gain of some ground by the British on the northern side of the Flanders sallent there have been no events of moment recorded on the other parts of the front.

Little Activity Elsewhere. There has been little activity elsewhere on the western front, including the American sectors. British alremen continue their bombing raids and have accounted for 25 more German airplanes. SOME PRISONERS HARLEY GOES TO CONFER WITH THE

German Rush Halted; MANY VESSELS SUNK OFF NEW JERSEY COAST SUNDAY

NEW YORK, June 3.—Germany has carried her Submarine War to this side of the ocean and in the last 24 hours a number of vessels have been sunk. Some reports say the number of victims already is as many as fifteen. The presence of the U-boats has been reported in American waters for several days past, the first definite news that they were operating off this coast, came today when the crew of one victim, the Schooner Edward H. Cole, landed here. Their vessel was sunk Sunday off the New Jersey shore.

It is known that at least two U-boats are engaged in the campaign which is assumed to be aimed chiefly at the American transportation service. A report that besides the attacks on shipping off the New Jersey coast a submarine was operating off Nantucket Coast. Presumably the Germans are employing the new cruiser type of U-boats with a long steaming radius for these operations.

Passenger Steamer and 5 Schooners Sunk

NEW YORK, June 3.—The campaign of German submarines on the American Atlantic coast, according to reports received here up to a late hour today has netted them at least one American passenger steamer and five American schooners.

These are the losses definitely known. Reports of other attacks, including those on two American tankships and another passenger steamer came seeping in throughout the afternoon and shipping men fear that the toll losses through this German surprise attack will be added to.

The ships definitely reported as attacked were: Steamer Carolina from Porto Rico, 220 passengers.

Schooner Edward H. Cole; Jacob S. Haskell; Isabell B. Willey, Hattie Dunn and Samuel W. Hathaway.

The coastwise steamer City of Columbus Savannah for Boston with passengers was added late today as another probable victim of the German sea raiders.

The attack on the Carolina became known this afternoon when word was received here that an S. O. S. call for help had come from her last night. Her wireless message picked up by naval vessels, stated that a submarine was shelling the vessel and that the passengers had taken to the boats. Help was immediately sent and it is hoped that all hands will be reported safe.

Of the crews of the schooners, only eight of the Edward H. Cole are known to be safe.

News of the fate of those on other schooners is anxiously awaited. Naval vessels it is known have not only gone to the rescue but are scouring the seas for the enemy. Coast guards at all stations have been notified to watch for ship wrecked men.

AMERICA PREPARED TO MEET U-BOAT ATTACKS WITH EFFECTIVE WEAPONS

WASHINGTON, June 3.-Germany by striking with her submarines at the very doors of America has admitted to the world that the American army will turn the tide against her on the battle fields of France.

Information of submarines operating on the American coast brought to the Navy department today by Associated Press dispatches was followed by official reports. Naval officials declared that American Anti-Submarine forces in home waters were apt to meet the attack. All along the coast naval flying boats, submarine chasers and numberless other naval craft immediately got into action. All officials declared that the Navy Department was fully equipped to meet the thrust at the very fountain Head of the flow of American troops to Europe and that all its agencies were being brought into full force to find the submarines and destroy them.

This challenge to the fighting forces of the United States would be met, officials said, with the same measures which have driven the submarines to cover in the war zone and the steady flow of American transports to France will be guarded with the same effective program which has carried them through the infested waters of the British Isles and France with a remarkably low loss of life.

A submarine blockade in the principle transport lanes and about the principle embarkation ports for the American army has long been counted upon by American naval officers as one of the Germans' last cards and preparations have been made to meet it.

It was asserted in shipping circles that it was possible that as many as six additional vessels were destroyed not including those known to have been sunk.

Rumors of the presence of German submarines off the Amercan coast have been current for the past two weeks, the reports telling of one or more having been sighted in southern waters.

The attack upon American shipping almost at the very entrance of New York harbor is taken to mean that Germany has at last inaugurated a submarine campaign to break up transport of troops to France.

Information received at the maritime exchange here indicated as many as fifteen vessels have been sunk.

Although there have been frequent rumors of submarines having crossed the Atlantic since America entered the war none has actually before attacked American shipping on this side of the Atlantic. In October 1916 the German submarine U-53 after visiting Newport, R. I. lay in wait for British shipping off Nantucket Lightship and got six victims. Within the last week a South American ship arriving here brought reports of the presence of two German submarines in the vicinity of Bermuda. The reports that fifteen vessels had been sunk seems to indicate the presence of a number of submarines and that the enemy has inaugurated an attack in force.

The crew of the Edward H. Cole has been landed here. The Edward H. Cole was an American schooner of 1,791 tons gross owned in Boston. She was built at Rockland, Me., in 1904. According to the survivors, the Edward H. Cole was sunk

75 miles off the highlands of New Jersey yesterday afternoon. Two submarines attacked the Edward H. Cole, according to the commander of the vessel, Captain Newcomb. They appearside of the vessel the captain to heave to. The commander of one of the submarines then boarded the schooner in a small boat and gave the rew ten minutes to leave the ship.

The crew took to their boats immediately and the German sailors then planted bombs in the vessel and blew her up. Just before the explosion occurred an American steamship appeared in the offing and the U-boat immediately gave chase.

IN CITY COURT DURING MONTH

There were only seven drunks halled before the city tribunal of justice during the month of May, the first whiskeyless month for Wichita Falls, and the amount of tines as sessed and collected would have been practically nothing were it not for the speeders and the vagrants, against whom the law has been especially aroused by the orders to put men to work or in the army.

As a part of the movement to supplie more nurses for the army, through Red Cross Registration Week, June 12. Miss Incs Gates, superintendent the Wichita General Hospital, has liked for a number of girfs from Wichita Falls and surrounding towns to enter training at the local hospital so, that they may, after a few months, he alls to help release graduate nurses for duty in army camps here and abroad where the need for experienced nurses grows greater daily. Girls may enter training at the Wichita General Hospital under the same liberal arrangements obtained in all training school hospitals, and will be serving their country just as patriotically by staying at home and preparing themselves for graduate duty, and in the meantime releasing the more experienced nurses of service on the front.

Demand is Great.

At present there are only eight student nurses at the Wichita General Hospital, and the demand for train ed graduate nurses is greater than the local supply can fill. Miss Gates states. Five local nurses have volun teered for service, four of them already having been called, and while the Wichita County Graduate Nurses Association is antious to perform its patriotic duty and would be giad if it would contribute a large number of nurses to the army, yet it is the feeling that the people as home should have their health safeguarded and asthere are not nearly enough nurses in the country at present it will be impossible for many more of the nurses by go without leaving a serious gap in the local ranks. The best solution of the problem, will be found, in the opin in of local nurses, for the chrance of a number of young girls into impediate training. This course is advocated by Red Grose authorities, the war department and all others who are interested in saving lives in the camps and on the battlefield. Any young girl who has not decided upon a definite work, or who desires to be of actual value to the country in the procent crists would do well to enter the army service.
