

BIG OIL WELL ON FOWLER FARM NEAR BURKBURNETT

Flowing through 1,000 feet of water at the rate of from 200 to 300 barrels a day, the first well of the Fowler Oil Company on the S. L. Fowler farm was brought in this morning, the sand being reached at 1737 feet. This well is directly north of the townsite of Burk Burnett, being on the Fowler farm which is separated from the townsite by the public road.

This is one of the most important wells brought in for many months, as it seems to indicate the extension of the Burk Burnett pool by about three miles, as the location is fully that far from production. Oil men returning from the well this morning gave it as their opinion that when the water cleans the well it could be around 1,000 barrels.

The Fowler Oil Company is composed of Burk Burnett and Wichita Falls oil men. Its holdings consist mainly of the Fowler farm.

NEW BORN BABY FOUND IN FACTORY DISTRICT STATION

Shortly after six o'clock Tuesday morning workmen at the Ball Brothers Glass Factory found a baby boy, wrapped in a sheet, lying in the factory street car station. The find was reported to City Physician Beckman, who immediately went to the house where the infant had been taken and found the child to be a strong healthy infant, apparently only about three hours old.

WOMEN OF 21 MAY VOTE WITHOUT HAVING REGISTERED

Ballots for Saturday's primary will be delivered to the judges in the various election precincts this afternoon or tomorrow.

To All Election Officers: The County Executive Committee of the Democratic party at its meeting on June 17, 1918, passed the following resolution: Be it resolved by the Democratic Executive Committee of Wichita County, Texas, that all persons offering to vote at the coming democratic primary election...

Before me, the undersigned authority on this day personally appeared, the undersigned who being first by me duly sworn, upon oath says: That I am a white democrat and if permitted to vote in this democratic primary election, I will support the nominees of said primary election...

Sworn and subscribed to before me this 27th day of July, 1918.

Election Judge, Precinct No. 1. The person offering to vote, if he shall have made the foregoing affidavit, shall be permitted to vote; if he shall have failed or refused to make said affidavit he shall not be permitted to vote.

The election judges shall preserve all such affidavits made before them, and shall enclose same with their returns of said election to the clerk of Wichita County and the said affidavits shall be open for inspection of public.

Be it resolved that the chairman of the Democratic Executive Committee of Wichita County, Texas, is hereby instructed to have printed and furnished to the presiding judge of each election precinct, a sufficient number of blank affidavits herein provided for. The cost of printing the same shall be paid by said committee.

You are therefore instructed to observe very closely the instructions above. The primary election on July 27, 1918, is intended for Democrats only, and Republicans, Socialists, Independents or members of other parties should not be allowed to vote in the primary election.

Please make arrangements for good clerks and judges and where more than 100 votes are expected in a precinct, have a double set so that counting may proceed during the day. Precinct Chairmen are authorized to call me on the night of July 27, at my expense and reports results of election by telephone, as to Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Superintendent of Public Instruction and County Officers where there is a contest.

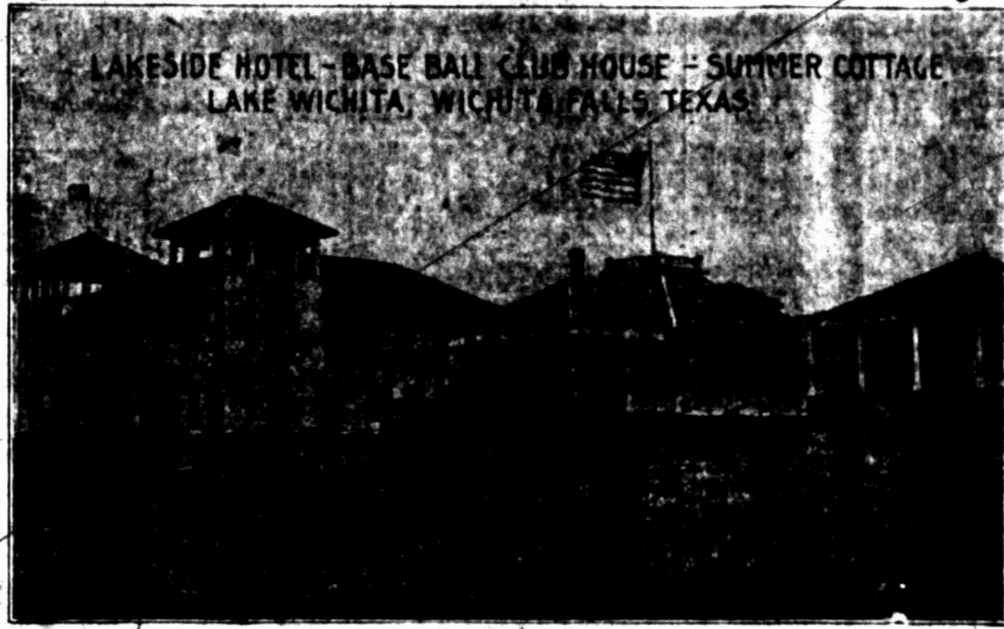

WHETHER COUNTY UNDER FEE BILL QUESTION OF LAW

Returning 21 additional indictments as a result of Monday and Tuesday's work, the grand jury for the June term of the 30th district court made its final report Tuesday afternoon at 5:45 and was discharged on its request by Judge Bonner.

The report in full follows: "Hon. Wm. N. Bonner, Judge 30th district court.

"We, your grand jury, beg leave to file the following additional report. We have been in session two days since last adjourning, and have examined 15 witnesses and have returned into court 21 bills of indictment, of which number 1 is for felony and 20 for misdemeanors.

"We believe the question as to whether or not this county is under the provisions of the fee bill is a matter of law. However, we can state that the county officers have not reported excess fees as required by the fee bill, and have stated as their reasons for not doing so that they did not consider themselves under the fee bill.

"We recommend to the city council and the police authorities a proper enforcement of the curfew law. Boys being a total of 21 true bills returned.

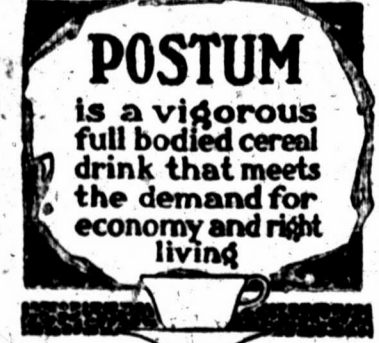
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
