AMERICANS HOW AMERICANS TURNING MOVE FROM-SERINGES BEGUNBY AMERICAN IN ADVANCE TRAP FOR THE HUNS AND FRENCH TROOPS

(By Associated Press.)

American and French troops have begun a turning movement that if successful, will compel a German retirement over a wide sector east of Fere-En-Tardenois, at the center of the Soissons-Rheims salient.

They have attacked over a front of over three miles on each side of the village of Uesles, apex of the Allied wedge north of the Ourcq. Their greatest advance was toward the east, where the Americans pushed on some distance from the town of Sergy and approached Chamery.

Although the announced purpose of the attack was straightening out of the line between Serginges and Cierges, this is really secondary to the outflanking of the Germans to the southward. The enemy is holding very strong positions at Roncheres and St. Gemme, where his line is still less than five miles from the Marne and a continued advance between Nesles and Cierges would force him to fall back to escape being cut off from the rear.

This seems to be the only sector where the Allies are attacking with their infantry. Heavy artillery fire is reported along most of the line between Soissons and Rheims.

The Germans attacked the Allied lines on the heights of Bligny, southwest of Rheims, Tuesday night but were repulsed. Along the British front the German artillery has carried out heavy bombardments at Viller's-Bretonneux, east of Amiens, near Bucquoy, on the northern side of the Picardy salient, and in the neighborhood of Meteren and Merris on the western side of Lvs sector.

Last month the condition of cotton was \$5.8 per cent of a normal and a 15,235,000 bale production was forecast. 


