COLQUITT DENIES NEGOTIATING WITH HERR DR. DERNBURG

By Associated Press. DALLAS, TEX., Aug. 12. O. H. Colquitt, former governor of Texas, today explained a conference he had in New York at which the purchase of a New York newspaper was considered. He denied Dr. Dernburg, German propagandist, and George Sylvester Viereck had been concerned in the conference as had been said in a statement attributed to Viereck by the attorney general's office in New York.

"Late in January, 1915, during my second term as governor I visited New York on business not connected with the purchase of a newspaper," he said, "but discussed with several prominent Texans in a general way the matter of purchasing a New York newspaper. Some of these gentlemen were largely interested in business matters in New York and it is unnecessary for me to give their names. The statement was made that the New York Sun could be bought and this matter was discussed informally with the Texas gentlemen referred to, and as I recall, a gentleman since appointed by President Wilson in a high office. No German propaganda was at the bottom of the conversation and the suggestion was made the paper could be made a great factor in democratic politics.

"I had no conference with Dr. Dernburg and if I ever met him at all I do not remember it. I discussed the matter with Herman Fisher, since dead, for a long time treasurer of the national democratic committee, and I have an indistinct recollection of meeting Mr. Viereck at a hotel. This was about five months after the war in Europe began.

"The former governor then denied that he had any negotiation connected with any propaganda having for its object the creation of disloyalty in the United States.

AMBASSADORS OF ALLIES ARE NOW AT ARCHANGEL

(Continued from page 1.)

I thought secrets had been abolished in Russia.

"Upon hearing that the press was forbidden to publish further correspondence concerning our removal to Moscow the diplomatic corps decided to have printed in pamphlet form in Russian the entire correspondence on the subject together with some excerpts from the stenographic report of an interview between your representative, Kadek, and myself. These pamphlets have been ready for delivery for two days but we are informed that the central soviet committee or the extraordinary revolutionary staff of Volodga has prohibited the delivery of the same to us.

"Ambassador Francis then informed Titcherlin that all the Allied ambassadors were acting in harmony and shared the same views.

"He continued: "Your telegram states that Archangel is not a fit residence for an ambassador in the event of a 'siege.' Do you expect a German siege of Archangel? Certainly you do not anticipate an allied siege of that city.

"Believes People Will Turn.

"I can only repeat what I have said to you and to the Russian people: we have nothing to fear from the Russian people with whom they consider themselves still in alliance against the common enemy. Speaking for myself I have no desire or intention of leaving Russia unless forced to do so and in such event my absence would be but temporary. I would not properly represent my government or the sentiment of the American people if I should leave Russia at this time.

"The Allies have never recognized the Great Atrocity peace and it is becoming so burdensome to the Russian people that in my judgment the time is not far distant when they will turn upon Germany and the reputation of the enemy from the Russian borders will demonstrate what I have continuously believed and that is that the national spirit of great Russia is not dead but has only been sleeping."

ESTABROOK WILL LOANS FOR SEEDING HAVE CHARGE OF

By Associated Press. AUSTIN, TEX., Aug. 12. In a letter to Governor Hobby today, Leon M. Estabrook, assistant to the secretary of agriculture, assigned to make seed loans to wheat and rye farmers in drought-stricken regions of the southwest, including western Texas, explains how loans will be made from the \$5,000,000 some time ago set aside for that purpose by President Wilson. The loans, he says, will be made through the federal farm loan bank upon my certification of the applications, payment to be made after the seed is in the ground.

The letter further explains that the loans will be made only to farmers whose credit is exhausted by reason of two successive droughts. The plan provides that no loan will be made in excess of three dollars per acre, and that no application will be financed beyond one hundred acres. Notes will bear 4 1/2 per cent in the southern districts, 5 to 7 1/2 per cent in the northern districts, to November, 1919.
